Dedication Professor J.G. Adshead

It is with great pride and pleasure that we, the editors, dedicate PHAROS '64 to Professor J. G. Adshead.


Professor Adshead was born in Manchester in 1904 where he attended the Stockport Grammar School for eight years, receiving in his last two years the gold medal awarded to the best student in the school. From Stockport, he went to Cambridge University, entering Gonville and Caius College as Senior Student; i.e., the top entering student at the college. Three years later he graduated, not only with first class honours in mathematics but with distinction (known at Cambridge as a "b*"). He continued to study mathematics for a fourth year with a George Green Studentship.

Well as he did in the field of scholarship, Professor Adshead's interests were not confined to books. At his school, he was captain of the football, cricket, and lacrosse teams. The latter sport he continued at Cambridge, obtaining his half-blue for four years, and being a member of the Oxford-Cambridge team that toured the United States in 1926.

In 1927 he came to Canada and was appointed to the staff of King's College. He was nominated in 1929 by Cambridge University to the Joseph Hodges Choate fellowship for a year of study at Harvard University. Some years later he studied for a summer at Hamburg University in Germany under Professor Blaschke and another summer at Freiburg in Breisgau. In 1947, he was transferred to the Dalhousie teaching staff as acting Head of the Department of Mathematics and in 1953 was appointed Head of the Department.

Professor Adshead has spent many of his summers travelling in Europe, mostly on foot, and there are very few places on the continent which he has not visited with his close friend and fellow staff member Dr. G. E. Wilson.

Professor Adshead is especially remembered by all his students for the enthusiasm displayed in the presentation of his lectures, and as a true educator, he is thought of with only the greatest of respect and admiration.




Dr. H.R. Theakston

The death of Dr. H.R. Theakston, Rt. Hon. C.D. Howe Professor of Engineering, on August 26, 1963, brought to an end a distinguished career as engineer, educator, and soldier. His association with Dalhousie lasted for forty years. In 1915 he graduated from Dalhousie with an Engineering Diploma and then joined the 85th Highland Battalion of the C.E.F., serving with distinction in France. On his return from overseas, he completed the B. Eng. at Nova Scotia Technical College, where he won the Governor General's Medal in 1921. Shortly after graduation, he joined the engineering teaching staff of Dalhousie and served the university in several capacities. In 1929 he was made Professor of Engineering and in 1946, Head of the Department. During the Second War, Dr. Theakston was in charge of the R.C.A.F. University Reserve Training Plan at Dalhousie, from which he retired in 1954 with the rank of Wing Commander. When the Rt. Hon. C.D. Howe Chair of Engineering was established in 1952, Dr. Theakston became its first occupant. In 1954 he was honoured by Nova Scotia Technical College with the degree of Doctor of Engineering. He represented the University in many professional groups related to his dual occupations of engineer and teacher, and sat in the Senates of both Dalhousie and Nova Scotia Technical College.

Dr. Theakston's energy and enthusiasm were dedicated to the University and his profession. As University Engineer during his period of service he supervised the planning and construction of fifteen major building units on both campi ranging from the Law Building in 1922 to the Men's Residence in 196l, thus making a major contribution to the "Vision of Dalhousie" as it exists physically today. His teaching, both by precept and example, inspired many of his students to go on to positions of responsibility and trust in all parts of the world, and all these remember him with affectionate respect.




Dr. James Robert Corston

DR. JAMES ROBERT CORSTON was born in Halifax on March 12th., 1879, the son of James F. and Nancy MacLennan Corston. After attending the Halifax Academy, he entered Dalhousie from which he graduated in Arts in 1898 and in Medicine in 1902. While at Dalhousie he was a noted athlete and football star.

He was a member of the teaching staff of the Faculty of Medicine from 1911 to 1948, retiring with the rank of Associate Professor of Medicine and Clinical Medicine. In addition to his many years of teaching, Dr. Corston was for a long time a member of the Board of Governors of Dalhousie University where his wisdom, diplomacy, and innate sense of what was right and good were a source of real strength to his associates. He had a deep and abiding love for his alma mater which was manifest in deeds rather than in words.









The Society ended its year with elections of new executive and a Banquet on February 29, free to all Society members.





The Science Society members participated in an active program during 1963-1964. The science ball with theme "Aquanight", held on November 15 at the Lord Nelson Hotel, was a great success.



Liquid air being put into helium cryostat.







I.S.A.

The relatively new name, International Students' Association, introduced in the university 1959-60, replaced a previous organization known as F.R.O.S. (Foreign Relations with Overseas Students).

Since that time the Association has grown steadily, and is now quite large. It consists offoreign students from many different countries and cultures, and also interested Canadian students.

The I.S.A. has two aims in view. The first is to foster good relations and to promote cultural exchanges between foreign students and Canadian students. A.I.E.S.E.C.



D.A.B. handled the advertising for the Gazette, Pharos, D.G.D.S. program, the Student Directory, and the Winter Carnival Program.



In co-operation with the various student organizations and the university Engineer's Office, the campus co-ordinator's purpose is to arrange and co-ordinate student activities and dances.


This year's main problem evolved from an insufficient number of free Friday nights which were available for student dances. Consequently some societies did not sponsor a dance.

U.N.T.D. C.O.T.C. R.O.T.P.

A number of Dalhousie students have chosen one of the three armed services as their career upon graduation, while others have make use of their summers and occasional evenings during term to receive reserve officer training. All agree that the camaraderie, the extra training (whether communications for science or personnel work for arts student) and pay, are decided benefits.

In the tri-service Regular Officer Training Plan (R.O.T.P.), undergraduates with the rank, pay and allowances of officer cadets attend Dalhousie, take their degree, and become regular officers in the career of their choice upon graduation.

The military training programme has been endorsed by the National Conference of Canadian Universities. The Conference and the Department of National Defence realize equally well the importance of educated leaders, with military experience, in the preservation of our national liberty.

Canadian Officers' Training Corps



The training programme of C.O.T.C. is divided into two phases: (a) Theoretical and (b) Practical. The Theoretical Phases are conducted during the academic year, surveying such subjects as Introduction to the Army, Organization and Administration, Minor Tactics, National Survival, Nuclear Warfare. The Practical Phases are conducted during the summer vacation period at Corps Schools where cadets are guaranteed a minimum of sixteen weeks employment. The training consists of a detailed study of General Military Subjects during the First Phase; subjects special to Corps during the Second Phase; and "In-Job" training with Regular Army units in Canada and in Germany during the Third Phase.

Pay is at the rate of \$235.00 per month with allowances as applicable. During the academic year cadets may receive up to \$100.00.

University Naval Training Division

Training during the academic year at Dalhousie begins the first year as an introduction to seamanship, navigation and communications, the second and third years advance this training, concentrating on leadership and strategy. Dalhousie cadets spend a portion of the summer boardship applying the winter training in various departments; they may find themselves on look-out, navigating room, or below in the engineroom. Rounding out the cadet's experiences at sea are the interesting calls at foreign ports in the south Atlantic or Europe. After graduation, cadets may enter the General list in the rank of Sub-Lieutenant.



Regular Officer Training Plan



The plan consists of summer training at R.C.A.F. stations in Canada and overseas, and weekly lectures and parades at Dalhousie during the winter. Summer training is composed of six weeks at Reserve Officer's School, to be followed with the appropriate branch training in, perhaps, aeronautical engineering, telecommunications, or air traffic control. The R.O.T.P. 
The minority Conservative government was able to remain in government for the two day parliament held in the Men's Residence Library on Feb. 18 and 19.

Chapter members visit the class to assist the teachers and plan parties for the children, and the chapter makes gifts of books and supplies of the specific kind needed by physically hand-

icapped children.

The history of Pi Beta Phi dates back to 1867 when twelve young women at Monmouth College, Monmouth, Illinois, founded the first national college fraternity for women, then called I.C. Sorosis. The Greek letters Pi Beta Phi were used as a secret motto and not until 1888 was the original name changed officially to Pi Beta Phi.

From one chapter with twelve members, Pi Beta Phi has become an international fraternity with 104 chapters, 288 alumnae clubs, and over 70,000 initiates. The Nova Scotia Alpha Chapter of Pi Beta Phi was established in Halifax in 1934. The membership has steadily increased since. This season the active membership stood at thirty-nine with a pledge class of thirteen.

On campus, the Pi Phi's assist in the rink canteen. The National Altruistic project of Pi Beta Phi is the Settlement School in Gatlinburg, Tennessee which was established in 1914 as a lasting memorial to its founders. The fraternity has greatly increased its services in the area since then, embracing such programs as eductation, health, and handicrafts. Besides contributing to the national project, the five Canadian Pi Phi Chapters have established their own project. Funds are distributed equally among the eight schools of Social Work in Canada to provide for scholarships.



In 1932, twelve Dalhousie students associated themselves with Tau Epsilon Phi Fraternity, and on April 19th of that year, Tau Iota Chapter was awarded its charter. Since that date, it has grown and progressed. Now, as the only Canadian chapter of Tau Epsilon Phi, Tau Iota preserves the international nature of the fraternity.

The years of growth and development were trying. Initially, the fraternity lacked a chapter house. Disappointed, but not discouraged with the lack of facilities, the brotherhood held meetings in houses, basements, and hotel rooms, applying themselves to the task of building and expanding their fraternity. Finally in 1954, a chapter house was obtained on Vernon Street, giving tangible expression to the long hours and ceaseless devotion of the brotherhood. 
established in Canada, creating strong international ties.


The winter conditioning programme introduced by the coach last year, and the new high school training programme for students from the Halifax area should provide Dal with some new and exciting football players in years to come.

Bill MacInnes broke a track record this year with a hop step and jump mark of 43'8 1/2''.







Virginia Neve and Hari Swaminathan had very little difficulty in beating the other two teams entered


in mixed doubles, and thus became the first winners of the Mt. A. W. A. A. challenge cup.

Sharon beat all other teams, but lost in a close game to U.N.B.








whose prime athletic interest is basketball.
