
























An addition to Shirreff Hall was completed during the summer of 1963.

Medical Building



NEW DALHOUSIE MEDICAL BUILDING · J PHILIP DUMARESQ & ASSOCIATES · ARCHITECTS

This is a picture of the proposed new Sir Charles Tupper Medical Building, Nova Scotia's contribution to the nation's Confederation Centennial memorial projects. It is to be named in honour of Sir Charles Tupper, one of the Fathers of Confederation and the only medical doctor to have achieved the rank of Prime Minister. The building, the largest, tallest, and costliest to be built by the University, is to be situated on the north-east corner of the Carleton campus.

Law Building



Canada's oldest law school is to have a new building. The new building, which is scheduled for completion by July, 1966, will enable the law school to more than double its present enrolment. The location for the new building is the north side of University Avenue between Henry and Edward streets.

Student Union Building

The past two years has seen an intensified interest in obtaining a Student Union Building. Attempts had been made previously to obtain a student center, even to the point of having plans drawn by an architect, but the plans did not materialize.

When the University embarked on its expansion program, construction of a S.U.B. was placed on a list of priorities. Students have assisted in the fund raising campaign through various activities and have contributed over \$118,000 to the fund. A yearly assessment of \$10 has been, and will continue to be levied against each student by the Students' Council to add to this sum. The total will be applied against the cost of the S.U.B.

Feeling that the need for student facilities had become urgent, and that construction of the building should not be delayed any longer than absolutely necessary, the 1964-65 Students' Council set out to determine the needs of the students with a view to having new plans drawn up to replace the ones obtained years ago which were felt to be obsolete.

A special ad hoc committee was set up to:

I) prepare a brief history of efforts which have been made in the past to obtain a S.U.B.

II) prepare a comprehensive outline of student needs projected to 1975.

III) prepare an outline of alternative methods of financing the building.


IV) prepare a list of possible sites.

V) propose alternative plans (architectural and furnishing)

VI) propose alternative methods of operating and administrating the S.U.B.

The completion of these preliminary objectives is but the first step in the long march to the construction of the long overdue student center, but the first step is often the most difficult.



Dr. Henry D. Hicks President of Dalhousie University



I am pleased again in this, my second year as President of the University, to be asked to extend greetings to Dalhousie's graduating class of 1965, through the medium of PHAROS.

It is of particular significance to me that I came back to Dalhousie as Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Science four years ago when many of you entered the University in the Freshman Class. We have seen an astonishing growth in our enrollment during that period. The total registration in 1960-61 was 2058 students and this year it is 3412.

The Faculty and the Administration have done everything in their power to maintain high standards of instruction and to keep the size of classes as small as possible. In four years the staff in the Arts and Science Faculty has been doubled and private houses have been purchased and converted into additional classrooms and offices. You in turn have been patient with the inconveniences that gradually diminishing space has imposed upon you, and I am grateful for your co-operation.

If you should return to the campus in ten or fifteen years' time - and I hope you will come back for a visit - you will almost certainly find double the number of students that are here today and many new buildings to accommodate them.

In the meantime, I wish each and every one of you well in the new life which you will be commencing on graduation. I hope the memories that you take with you after these years at Dalhousie will be mostly pleasant ones.







Besides Head-coach Rutigliano, the team received terrific direction from Ass't. Coaches Alan Yarr, Dick Loiselle, and Ron Simmons.





The MALCOLM HONOUR SOCIETY is the order of merit at Dalhousie, formed by the students, to recognize such attributes of character in students in their graduating year as James Malcolm possessed.

"James Malcolm spent the five richest years of his life at Dalhousie. Graduating in Arts in 1903, he returned the following year for Theology. During his stay at college he came to be the idol of his fellow students, the life and soul of various college clubs and social activities, and the captain and mainstay of the football team, as well as being an excellent student.

His first year in Theology had hardly closed when he himself had passed on to higher service. His death was in harmony with his life. While swimming with a companion during the summer, he heard a cry. A few strokes carried him to the spot where his friend had disappeared. Twice Jimmy Malcolm dove and twice he was forced to the surface. Once again he dove, and the waters closed over him . . . Every action of James Malcolm breathed the spirit with which he made his happy sacrifice".

The standards demanded are high, making the group of recipients of this award a small one. The Malcolm Honour Award gives by its small gold key, concrete recognition that the person so honoured has consciously or unconsciously set the welfare of the institution before the welfare of self and has often trod the harder rather than the easier path. Each year the entire graduating class is considered with care by a committee and from this body, representing so many diverse activities and achievements, there are chosen some who, it is believed, have given substantial evidence of this devotion to their fellow students, and some measure of this spirit of self recognition.

On the whole the Engineers, as in the past, set the pace for Campus spirit with their ability to stick together and act as a unit in the interest of the Society and the University.







The co-operation of our staff member, our advisors, and the members themselves made it a rewarding year for Inter-Varsity.



Publicity Dept.'s view of the typical dormatory room.



U.N.T.D. C.O.T.C. R.O.T.P.





A number of Dalhousie students have chosen one of the three armed services as their career upon graduation, while others have made use of their summers and occasional evenings during the term to receive reserve officer training. All agree that the camaradie, the extra training, and pay are decided benefits.

In the tri-service Regular Officer Training Plan (R.O.T.P.), undergraduates with the rank and pay of officer cadets attend Dalhousie, take their degrees and become regular officers in the career of their choice upon graduation.

The military training program has been endorsed by the National Conference of Canadian Universities. The Conference and the Department of National Defence realize equally well the importance of educated leaders, with military experience, in the preservation of our national liberty.

University Naval Training Division

Training during the academic year at Dalhousie begins the first year as an introductory to seamanship, navigation and communications, the second and third years advance this training, concentrating on leadership and strategy. Dalhousie cadets spend a portion of the summer on boardship applying the winter training in various departments. They may find themselves on look-out, navigation, or below in the engineer room. Rounding the cadet's experiences at sea are the interesting calls at foreign ports in the South Atlantic or Europe. After graduation, cadets may enter the General list in the rank of Sub-Lieutenant.

Regular Officer Training Plan

The plan consists of summer training at R.C.A.F. stations in Canada and overseas, and weekly lectures and parades at Dalhousie during the winter. Summer training is composed of Reserve Officer's School, to be followed with the appropriate branch training in perhaps, aeronautical engineering, telecommunications, or air traffic control. The R.O.T.P. Officer Cadets are on regular air force duty throughout the term, receiving actual flying training in summer, and upon graduation a permanent commission as Flight Officer in the R.C.A.F.

Canadian Officer Training Corps

The training program of C.O.T.C. is divided into two phases: (a) Theoretical and (b) Practical. The Theoretical Phases are conducted during the academic year, surveying such subjects as Introduction to the Army, Organization and Administration, Minor Tactics, National Survival, and Nuclear Warfare. The Practical Phases are conducted during the summer vacation period at Corps Schools where cadets are guaranteed a minimum of sixteen weeks employment. The training consists of a detailed study of General Military subjects during the first phase, subjects special to corps during the second phase and "In-Job" training with regular army units in Canada and in Germany during the third phase.

D.G.D.S.

The Dalhousie Glee and Dramatic Society had its most active and successful season in recent years in 1964-65. With a greatly expanded program, the society welcomed many new members to its activities especially among new students at Dal. The largest operating budget ever granted DGDS allowed the society to carry out projects which had been merely discussed in past years.

Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet* produced with the co-operation of the English Department's Drama Workshop was the first production, and the first society effort since 1947 to turn a profit. A large cast, special costumes and a specially constructed stage in the Gymnasium which simulated the essential features of the Elizabethan theatre all contributed to the show's success.

Romeo was followed by a completely different venture – Brendan Behan's "The Hostage," staged by the society in the Neptune Theatre. This show too was a financial and artistic success, and proved to be a great deal of fun for the cast as well as a stimulating experience for the audience. This was the first production of a Behan play in Halifax.

For the first time since 1962 the society sponsored the Connolly Shield Competition for one-act plays produced by groups of students. The newly refurbished Shield was presented to the Education Society for their winning entry "The Boor" by Anton Tchekov. The Arts Society, Delta Gamma and King's Dramatic Society were the other entries.

As in past years the largest item in the society's program was the musical. This season's production was "L'il Abner," based on the characters created by cartoonist Al Capp. Staged in the Capitol Theatre with a cast of more than 60, the show was the largest single venture ever undertaken by the society and was the most successful.

The extensive program undertaken by the society this season is indicative of the increasing interest in the theatre among Dal students, and the society anticipates an equally extensive and varied program for next season.

Arrangements have already been made not only to include this year's information in the next Students' Directory, but also to give the complete home address and phone. With the assistance of the IBM Computer big advances are arranged to speed material from the campus to the printer and hence give a better product at an earlier date.

Dal-Kings Chorale and Orchestra



This has been the second year for the Dalhousie Chorale and Dalhousie Orchestra which were organized in the autumn of 1963 by the Department of Music and are directed by Prof. David Wilson.

Combined concerts were given by the Orchestra and the Chorale on November 8 and March 7.

On November 29 a program of Christmas music was given by the Chorale and musicians from Halifax Symphony Orchestra. The featured work was the Christmas Oratorio for chorus and orchestra by Camille Saint-Seans.

Two smaller groups have been organized from the Chorale. They are the Dalhousie Chambers Choir and the Rennaissance Singers. These two groups gave a performance of music from the Rennaissance on February 14. In this concert they were assisted by the Dalhousie Recorder Consort whose players included members from the Dalhousie Orchestra and the Chorale.

The Chorale also took part in the folk singing concert sponsored in November by the International Students' Association and the Open House variety concert in March.

C.U.S.

In May, a Regional CUS Conference was held at which time the idea of an Association of Maritime Students was formulated. The idea was followed up in October in the founding conference of AMS with George Cooper presiding. AMS acts as a linkage to form a strong tie between the Atlantic Universities.

A Student Mental Health survey of representative professors and students at Dalhousie was taken to determine the necessity for developing a psychiatric consulting service. Initiation of a large calibre speakers series got under way and a solid foundation was laid for future years. The Student Means Survey is being conducted in conjunction with the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and National office to form a report for the Bladdin Commission on financing higher education with government grants.


