- JOHN WALKER MACMILLAN. Professor of Sociology in Victoria College, Toronto. Formerly Professor in Manitoba College. Formerly Minister of St. Matthew's Church, Halifax.
- JOHN EDWARD ANNAND MACLEOD. A lawyer, head of the firm of MacLeod, Robertson, Smith and Co., Calgary, Alberta.
- EFFIE MAY Ross. An energetic Nova Scotian writer, who has published many articles on musical, historical, and artistic subjects.
- JOHN E. BLAKENY MCCREADY. A veteran journalist of Prince Edward Island. Successively editor of the *Moncton Transcript*, the *St. John Telegraph*, and the *Charlottetown Guardian*. President of the Press Gallery at Ottawa, 1882. Widely known throughout a long life as writer, speaker, and lecturer.
