ARTHUR STANLEY MACKENZIE

On the eve of publication of this number, The Dalhousie Review records with profound sorrow its loss through death of one who assisted at its founding and has shared ever since in promoting its development.

To the University of which he was always so proud to be himself an alumnus, Dr. A. S. Mackenzie rendered service first with rare and memorable skill as a teacher, afterwards for twenty years with wisdom, administrative efficiency and constant vision for the future as President.
