England; Associate Professor of English at the University of Manitoba; his recent publications include A New Interpretation of the Waste Land in Essays in Criticism. \* \* \* DR. GERHARD R. LOMER, for many years Librarian of McGill University and Director of the McGill Library School; Honorary President of the Quebec Library Association, contributor of numerous articles in leading scholarly periodicals in Canada, the United States and the United Kingdom. \* \* \* CHARLES BRUCE, General Superintendent of Canadian Press, Toronto; born at Port Shoreham, Guysborough County, Nova Scotia; graduate of Mount Allison University, 1927 (D.Lit. 1952); winner of the Governor General's Award for Poetry, 1951, with The Mulgrave Road, a collection of pieces reflecting the atmosphere and landscape of Eastern Nova Scotia and the character of its people; began his newspaper career with The Halifax Chronicle in 1927 and before assuming his present post served two years as London Bureau Chief of Canadian Press; Mr. Bruce is author of a novel The Channel Shore to be published by Macmillans in 1952. \* \* \* D.
