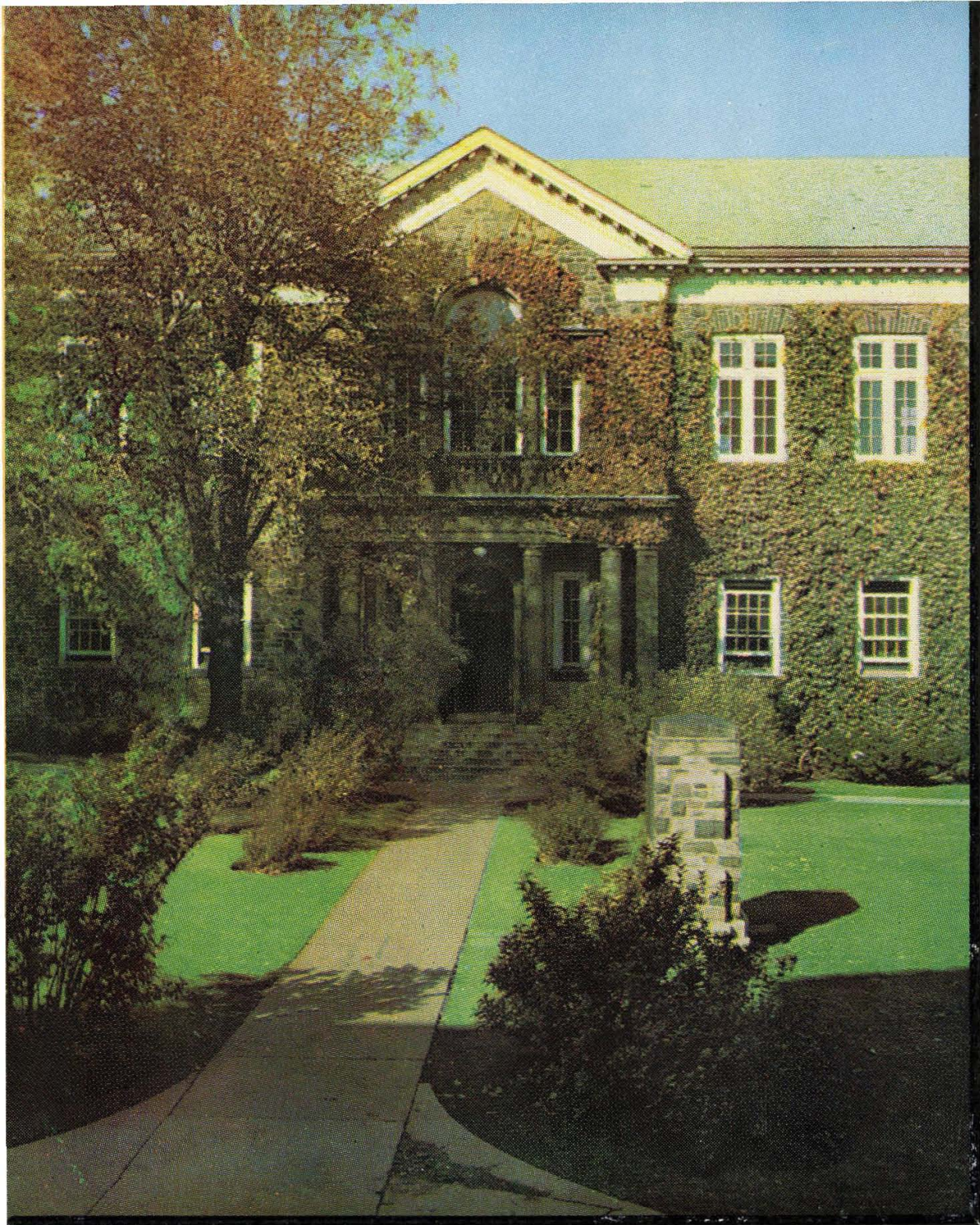

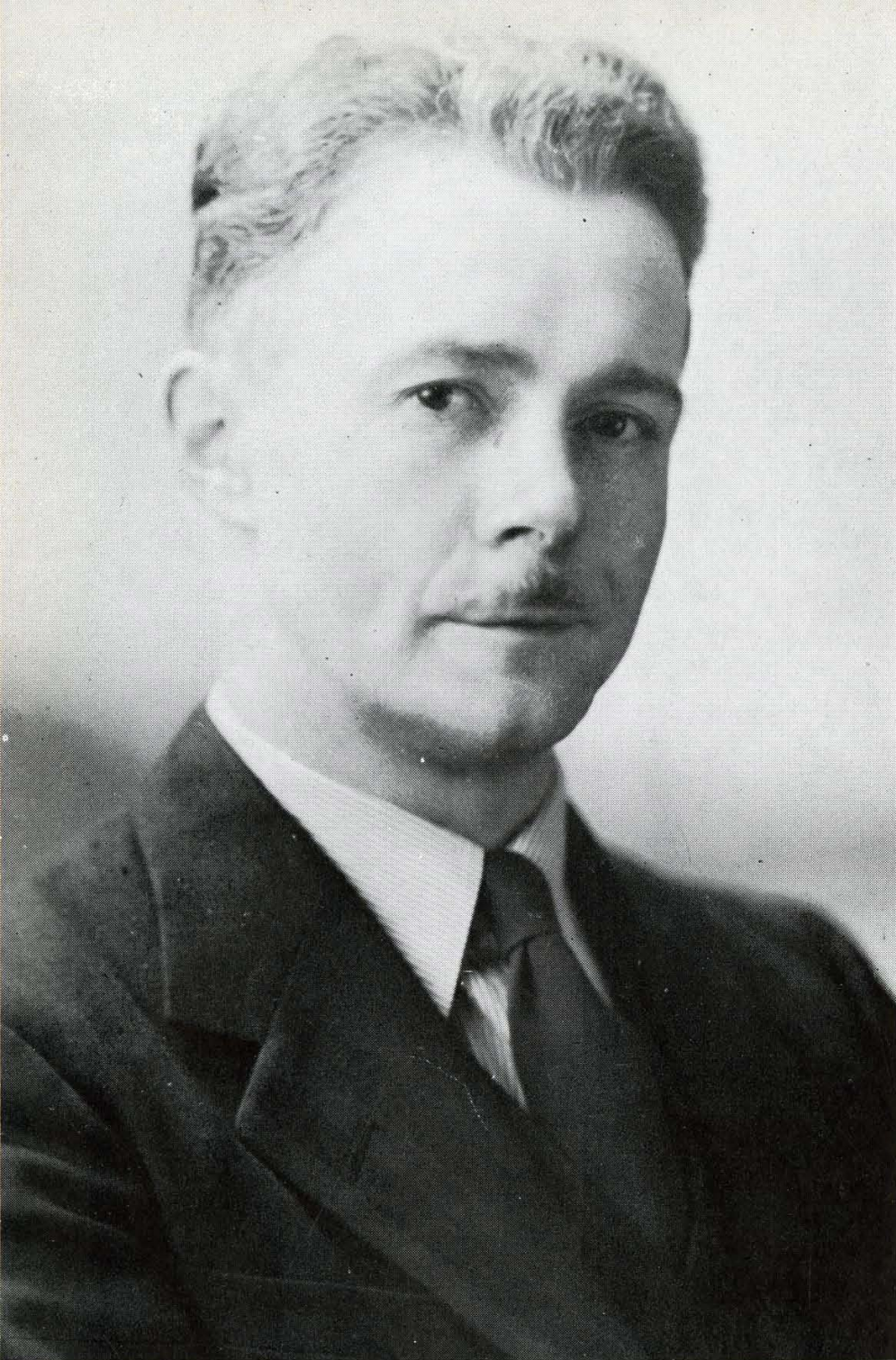

Dedication...

This volume is respectfully dedicated to a great Dalhousian, Murray MacGregor Rankin, who resigned this year as Secretary-Treasurer of the Students' Council, after twenty years' service as mentor and advisor to student government at Dalhousie.

He is a graduate of Dalhousie, having first come here in 1923. He received his B.A. in 1927. Continuing his studies, he entered the department of Commerce and was granted his B. Comm. in 1929.

While a student, Murray Rankin took a very active interest in extra-curricular activities, being a member of the Council of Students for five years. He was Secretary of the Council during the 1927-28 session and was elected President the following year. He was also active in other phases of student life and took a keen interest in the DAAC.

In 1931 the present system of accounting of Student Council funds was first instituted and the need was seen for a full time Secretary-Treasurer. Murray Rankin accepted this position and held it continuously for twenty years.

It was a sad Council that met last Feb. 19th to consider his letter of resignation. In the letter Mr. Rankin said that outside activities and the demands of family life forced him to tender his resignation. He added that he took this step with the utmost regret and only after lengthy consideration. He said that he would give any assistance he could to future Councils.

The Council unwillingly accepted this resignation after paying tribute to the great work Mr. Rankin had done for Dalhousie students during the many years he had been associated with the University.

A suitably engraved silver tray was presented to Mr. and Mrs. Rankin as a special ceremony during the Munro Day programme.

It would be difficult to find any other living man who has made such a generous contribution of his time and energy to the cause of Dalhousie student activities and whose interest has been reflected by such a lasting impression upon the minds and lives of the members of the student body who had the opportunity to meet him.

There is therefore no person to whom this volume could be more fittingly dedicated.

May he ever prosper and may his happiness increase.

In Memoriam...

The world lost a great teacher and this university a great Dalhousian with the death this winter of Professor Murray Macneill, M.A., LL.D.

Professor Macneill graduated from Dalhousie in Arts in 1896. He received his early education at Pictou Academy, and first came to Dalhousie in 1892.

After his graduation in Arts, at which time he was awarded the Sir William Young Medal, he went to Cornell. After that he spent a year in France, during which time he served as a professor at the Anglo-Saxon College while attending Sourbonne. He then went to Harvard University where he received his M.A.

He was awarded fellowships at both Cornell and Harvard.

Professor Macneill taught mathematics at McGill and returned to Dalhousie in 1907 where he became head of the Mathematics department.

He retained this post until 1942, during which time his untiring efforts on behalf of Dalhousie University earned him universal respect from both students and members of the teaching staff.

Professor Macneill served as Registrar of the university for 27 years.

During his stay at Dalhousie he was the prime mover of many projects for the advancement of learning and the betterment of the university. He was one of the founders of the Alumni Association and helped get the organizations under way.

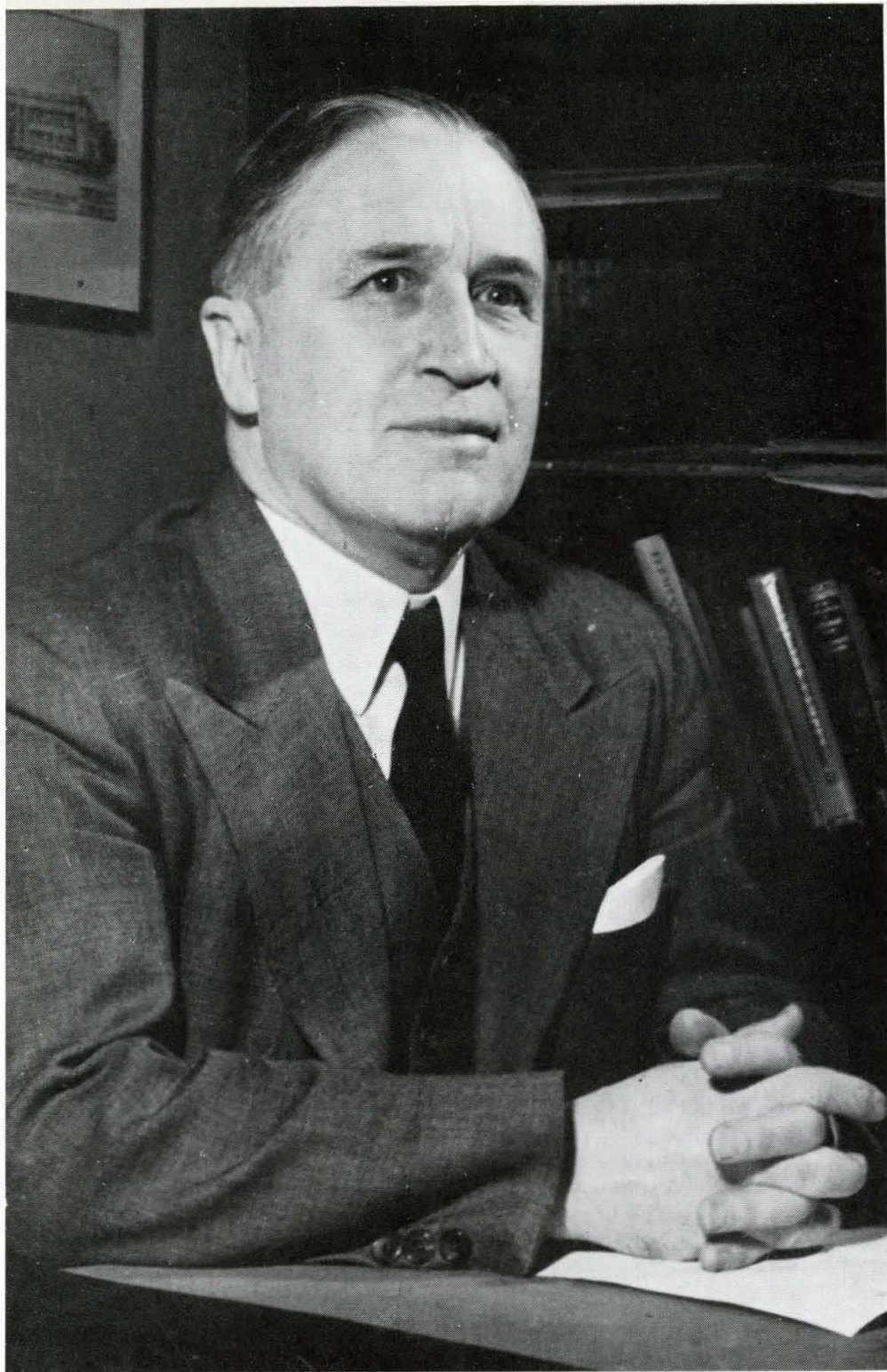
He was very well liked by all of his students, and took a keen interest in all their activities. He opened his home to them and was a familiar figure at student social functions.

He returned from his teaching position May 14, 1942, after thirty-five years service. In 1947 he was granted a degree of LL.D. by Dalhousie University.

He was an active curler and in March, 1948, he was elected president of the Dominion Curling Association at its annual meeting at Calgary.

At the time of his death, Professor Macneill was Honorary President of the Dalhousie Alumni Association.

Professor Macneill left an undying impression upon all he met and his name will long be remembered at Dalhousie University.

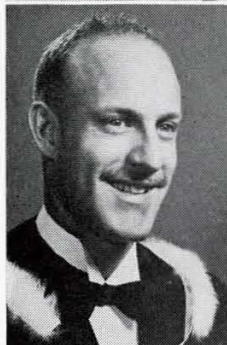


CATHERINE PATRICIA AHERN

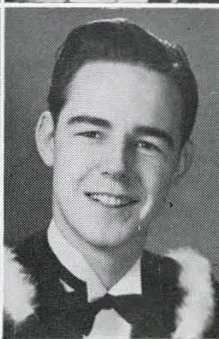


JOHN EARLE BOYD

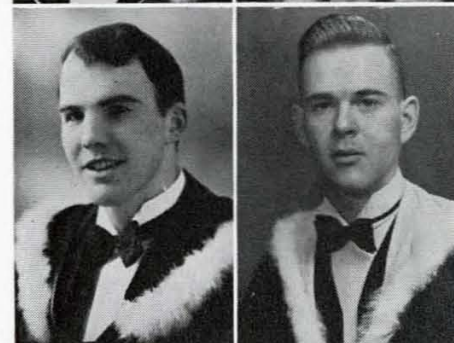
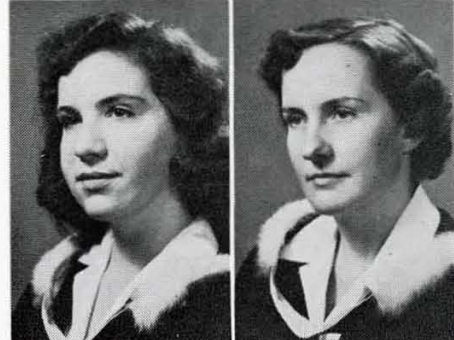

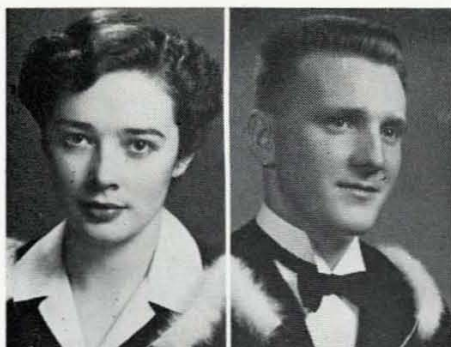
ROBERT MacDOUGALL FEAR

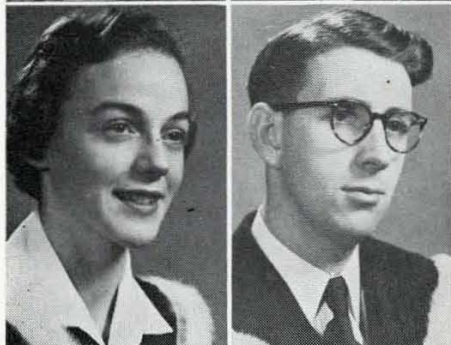

Halifax, N. S.

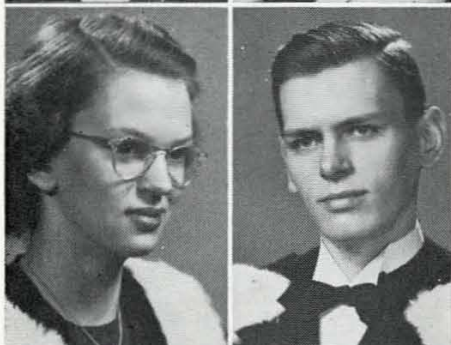

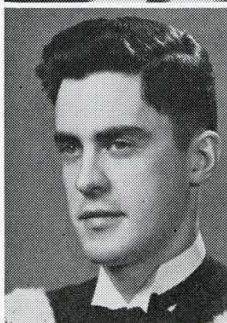
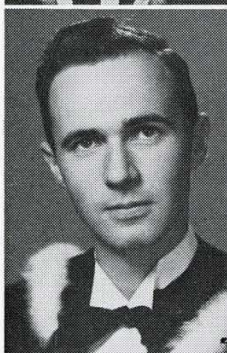
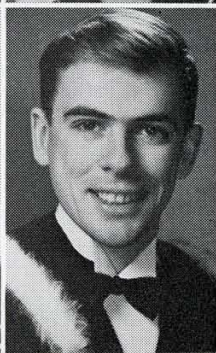
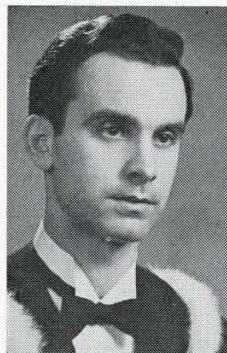
Donkin, N. S.

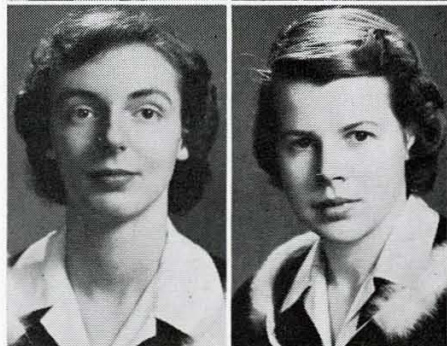


ALAN HAMILTON MARSHALL

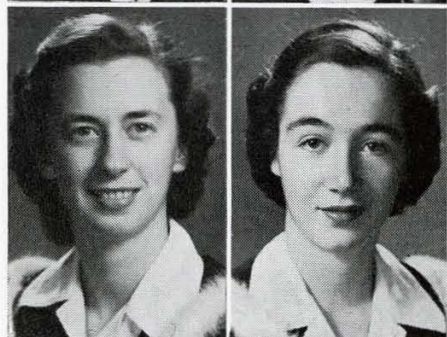


NOLA OLIVE MURRAY

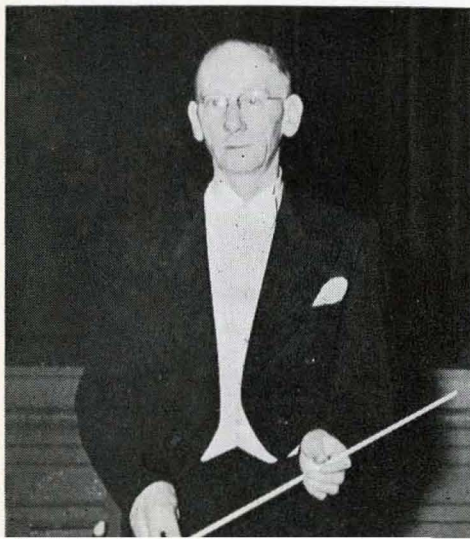

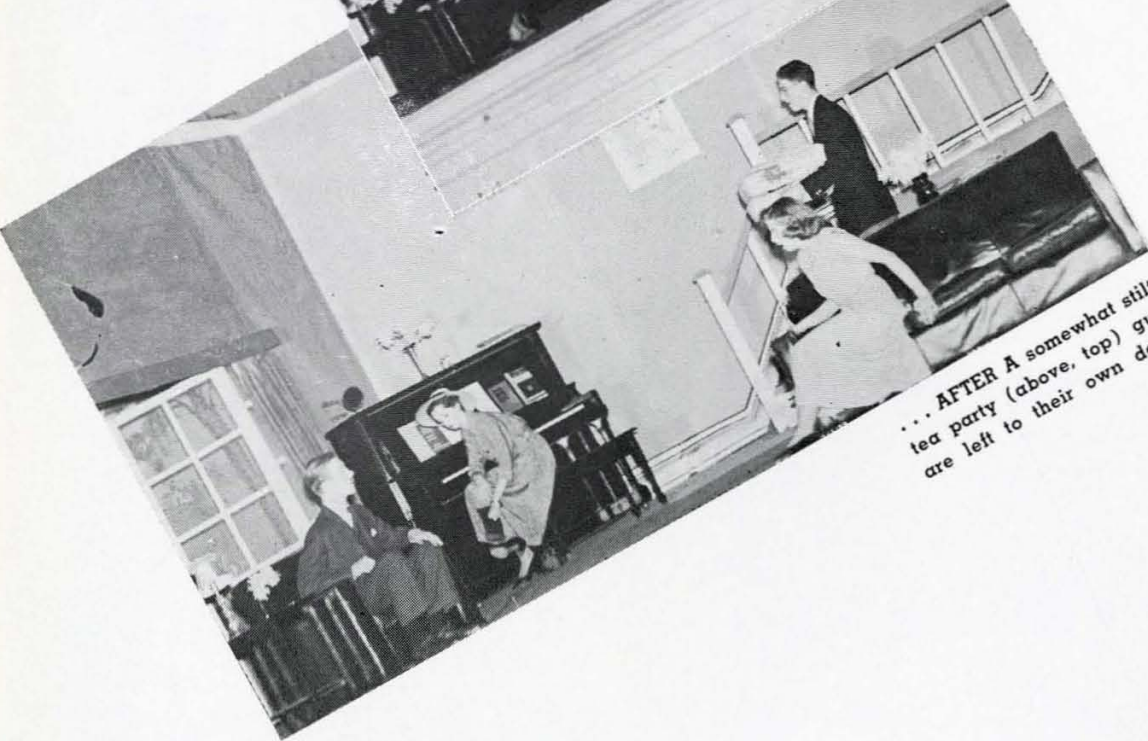

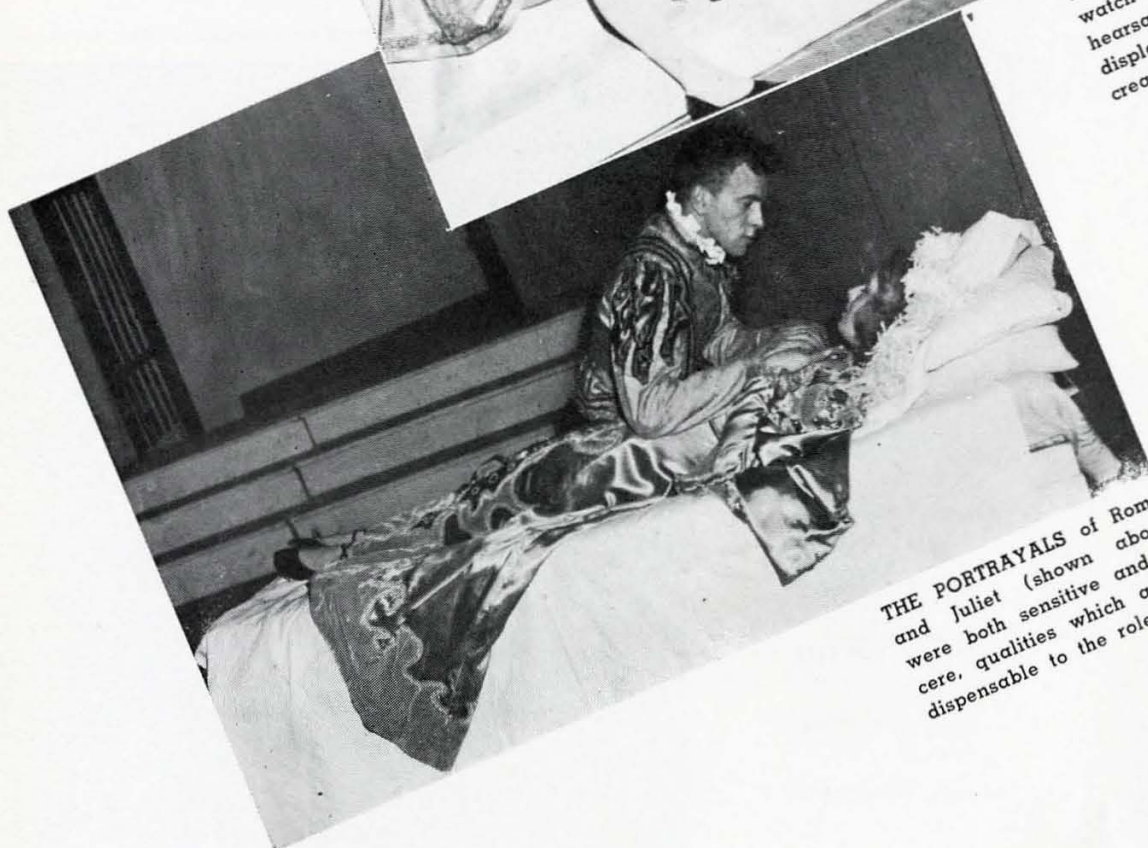

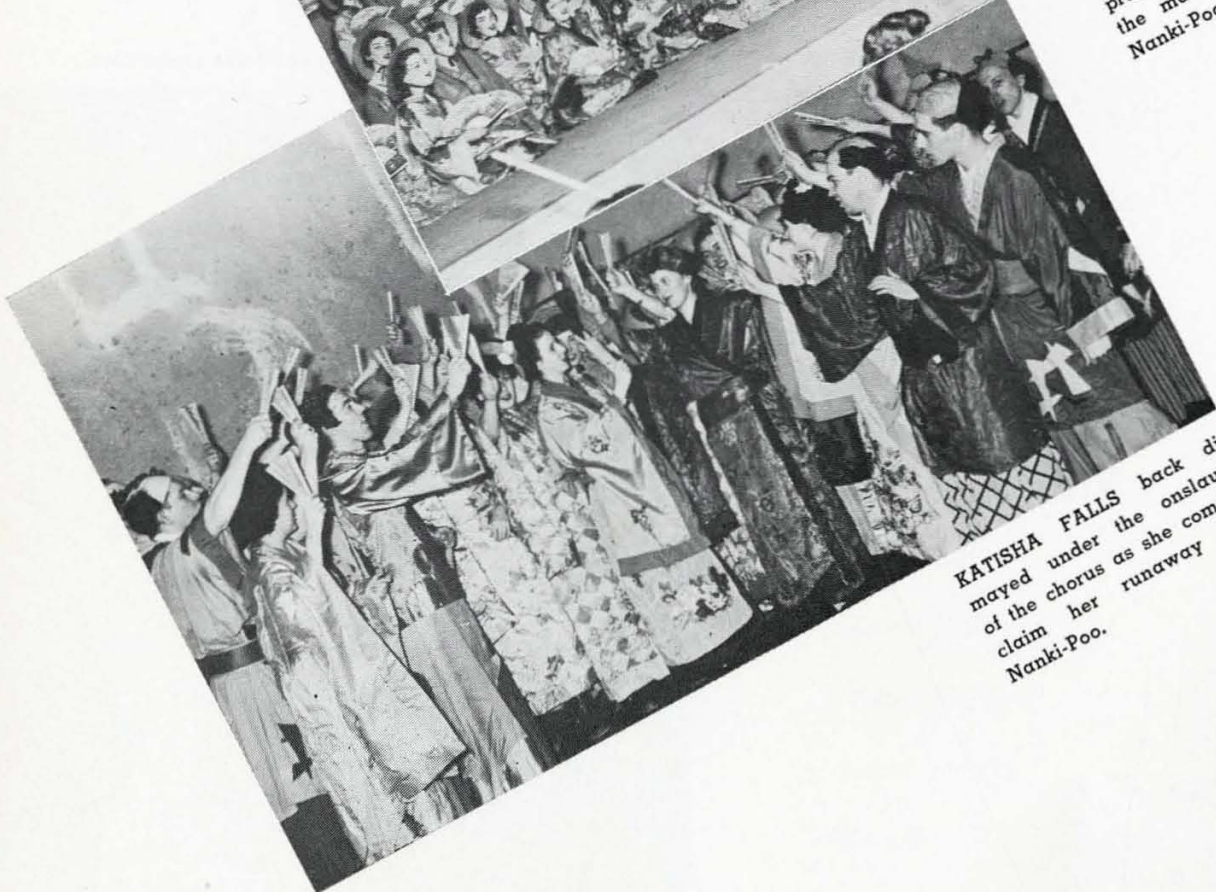

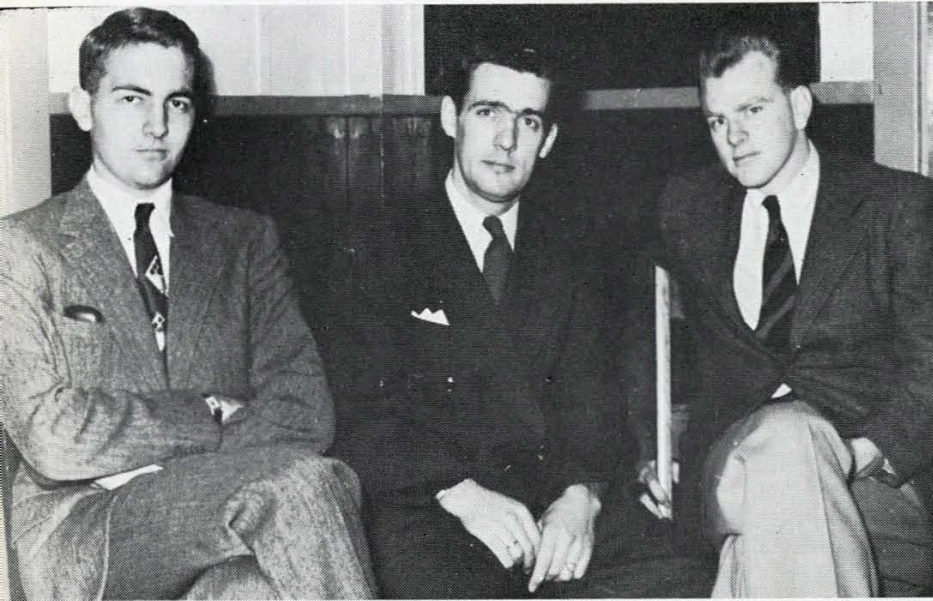
Sodales

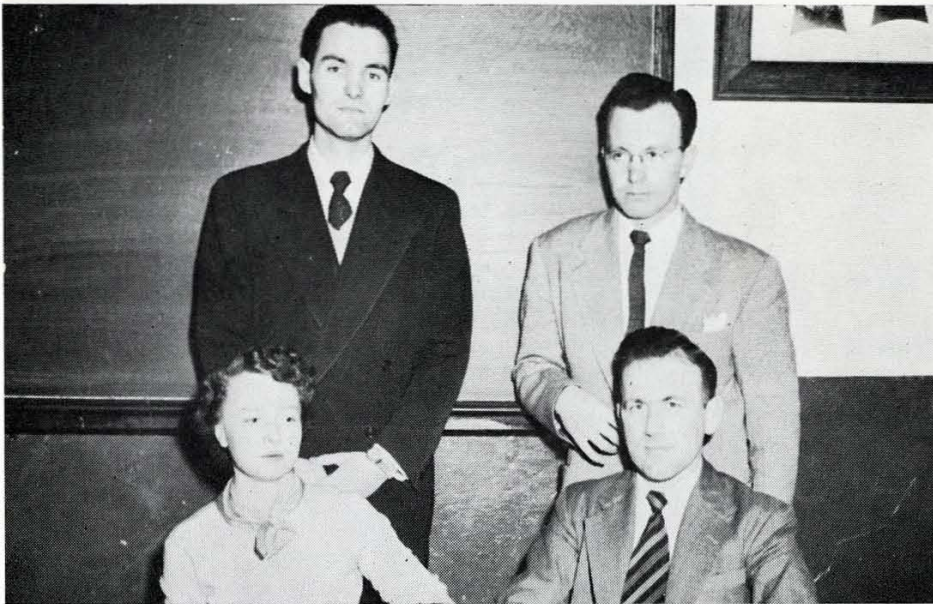
Law Society

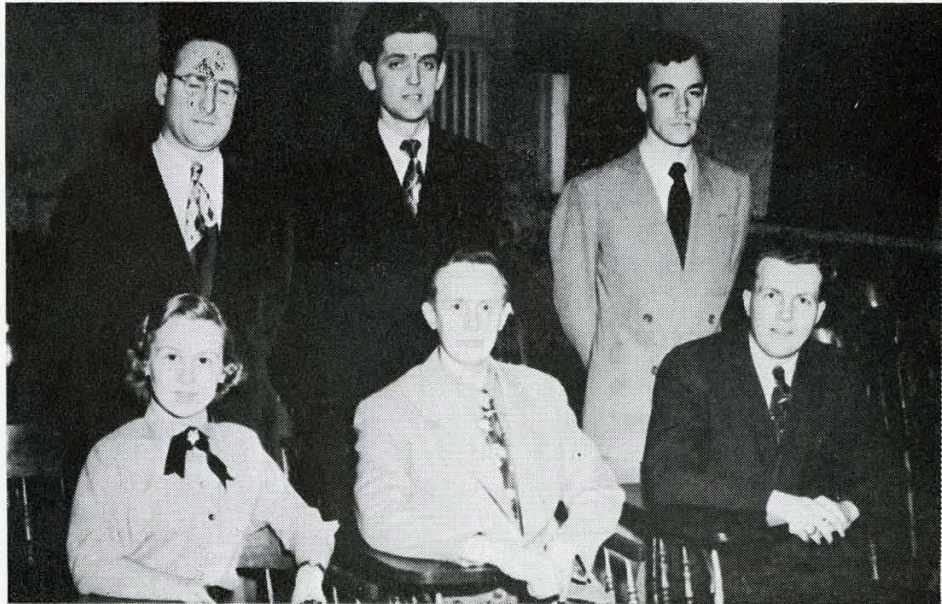
Medical Society

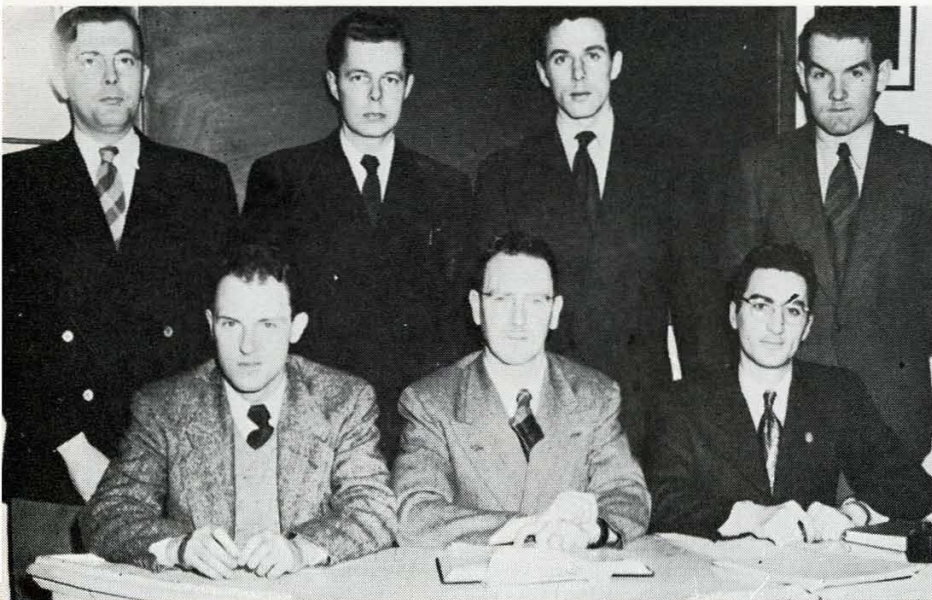
Pharmacy Society

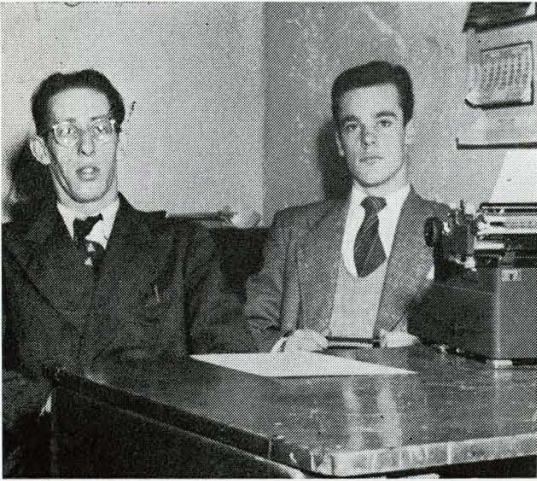

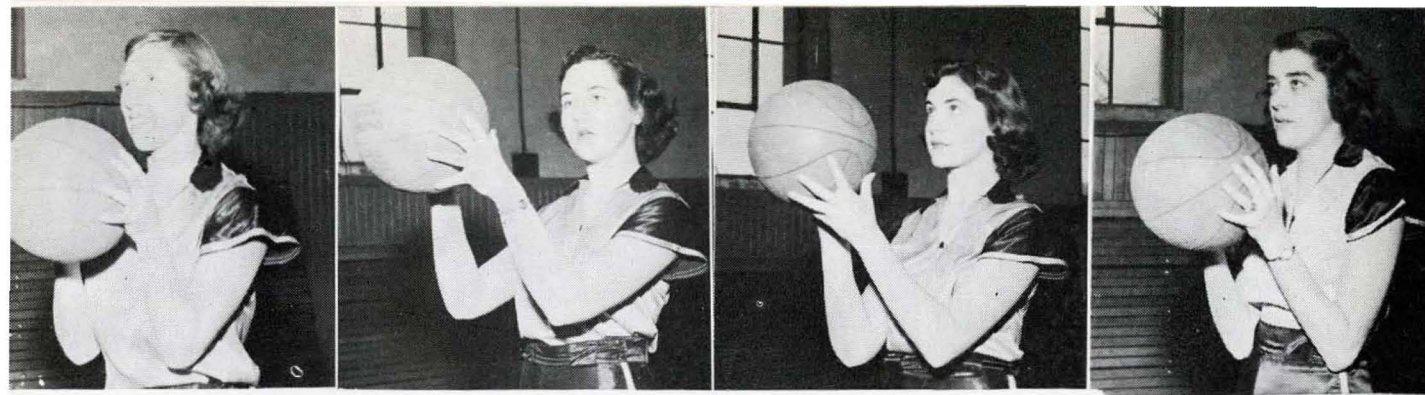
Earlier in the season an exhibition game was held with St. Francis Xavier University in which Dal was victorious.

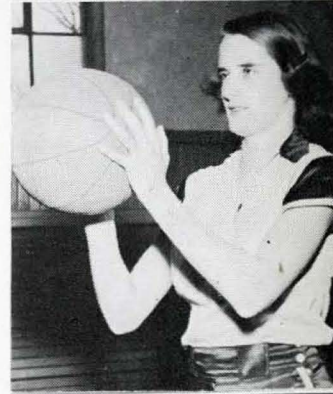
Girls' Intermediate Basketball

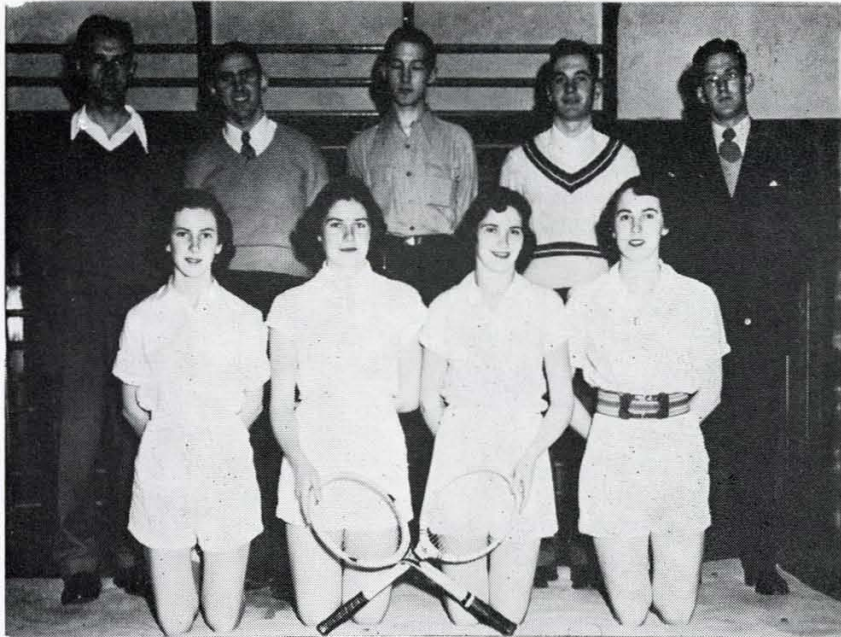
