TO THE CLASS OF 1967:

The Editor of Pharos has given me this opportunity, as President of the University, to greet you on behalf of the Board of Governors and the Faculty.

It will be especially easy for you to recall the year of your graduation, coming as it does on the hundredth anniversary of the birth of our nation. Much has happened to Dalhousie in those one hundred years.

In the spring of 1867 the Very Reverend Principal James Ross, five professors and a "tutor" looked with pride on their nine graduates. There were twenty-three undergraduates besides and another thirty-three students taking courses parttime in the building where City Hall now stands. The year before, when the first graduates of Dalhousie received their degrees, the University had operated on a budget of just under \$5,000 (with a deficit of \$34.04!). It is significant for us today, with the formal opening of our new Medical Building this summer, that the Hon. Charles Tupper, M.D., then Provincial Secretary, was a member of the Board of Governors. The Hon. Joseph Howe was another Governor.

It is a temptation to me to compare our size and budget today with that of one hundred years ago but I should not clutter up this letter of greeting with further statistics. Suffice to say our budget in 1967 is about two thousand times our budget of one hundred years ago!

Let me close this letter by expressing the hope that you will find that your experience at Dalhousie has prepared you well for the career you are planning. I also venture to hope that you will be proud of the fact that you are a Dalhousian. Finally, we look forward to you wanting to come back to visit your Alma Mater after you have become established in the world. We shall always be pleased to see you.



WHAT WAS DALHOUSIE LIKE

In this centennial year of 1967, Canadians are looking back and reviewing their progress as a nation in the last hundred years. Dalhousieans, in keeping with this spirit, now turn back for a glimpse of our university as it was in 1867.


Though originally founded as Dalhousie College in 1818 this university did not become a degree granting institution until 1863. At this time, by act of legislature Dalhousie College

was reorganized. Henceforth, representation on the Board of Governors would be granted to "any body of Christians which should provide an income of twelve hundred dollars per annum in support of a chair in the new institution." This, it was hoped, would produce a strong, well-endowed, non-denominative university. Consequently, in 1863 a new Board of Governors was incorporated, with three chairs being endowed by the Presbyterian Church.

The Chairman of the Board in 1867 was William Young, Chief Justice of Nova Scotia, and its members included Charles Tupper and Joseph Howe.

The first work of the new Board of Governors was to assemble a competent teaching staff. They succeeded admirably in this regard, attracting to Halifax some of the leading men of letters in the country. There were only six professors and they were headed by the Very Rev. Principal James Ross, D.D.

Students at Dalhousie could proceed to a B.A. and with suitable research and thesis to an M.A. The B.A. program was either three or four years in duration, depending on the student's background. Entrance exams were written for admission into the university, whether at the first or second year level. The academic year was divided into two sessions, the Winter Session lasting from October 24 to April 24 and the Summer Session from April 29 to June 24.

What did a B.A. consist of in 1867? The following is an outline taken from the calendar of that year.

WINTER SESSION:

First Year:

Classics, Mathematics, Rhetoric

Second Year:

Classics, Mathematics, Logic, Psychology

Third Year:

Classics, Metaphysics, Modern Languages, Philosophy, Chemistry, Mathematics

Fourth Year:

Ethics, Political Economy, History, Modern Languages, Philosophy, Classics or Mathematics

SUMMER SESSION:

Classes were opened for instruction in most subjects. However, failure in more than two subjects meant loss of the year.

Tuition for the first to fourth years respectively was \$20, \$24, \$12 and \$6. Scholarship aid was not freely given, with three awards of four years free tuition being offered for competition in each of Pictou Academy, Yarmouth Academy, and the Halifax Schools.


Enrollment at Dalhousie in 1867 reached a grand total of 64: 9 in fourth year, 5 in third year, 7 in the second, and II in the first, with

the remainder being "General Students", taking courses in subjects of their own choice without being eligible for a degree.

Finally, it should be noted that 1867 marks the establishment of two of the most important departments of Dalhousie University. Through negotiations started in that year between the university and the Medical Society, the Faculty of Medicine was eventually established, with the first lecture being given in 1868.

The University Library also received its start in 1867. At Spring Convocation, Rev. G. M. Grant of the Board of Governors made a strong plea for a library and started a subscription list for the purpose of raising funds, marked by his own \$200 donation and the \$400 gift of the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia.






Sir William Young, Kt.
Chairman of the Board of Governors. 1848-1885.





IN DEDICATION TO

DR. AND MRS. I. W. KILLAM



DR. I. W. KILLAM

We, the staff of Pharos deem it a privilege to dedicate this volume to the memory of Dalhousie's greatest benefactors, Dr. and Mrs. Izaak Walton Killam. Termed by Dr. H. E. Read as "one of the most philanthropic wills ever probated in Canada", the Killams bequeathed ten millions to our university.

The bequest was made from the inheritance left to Dorothy Killam by her late husband who died in August of 1955. "Izaak Killam, born in Yarmouth in 1885, educated at the Acacia Villa School in his native town, began his business life in the Union Bank in Halifax and from there he passed into the field of investment banking. Although best known as President of the Royal Securities Corporation and of various power companies, Nova Scotians ought perhaps to be most grateful for the work he did in establishing the Mersey Paper Company at Liverpool, one of the leading industries in this province." In conferring upon Mr. Killam the degree of Doctor of Laws, honoris causa, in May 1946, Pres. Dr. Kerr stated "that he was a man who had displayed the same courage and skill as was shown by his ancestors in the previous century".

Mrs. D. Killam, a native of St. Louis, Missouri, died in August 1965. Large bequests were also made for the establishment of a new Children's Hospital in Halifax, to the Montreal Neurological Institute, to the Canada Council, and to the Universities of Alberta and British Columbia. The Izaak Walton Killam Memorial Scholarships for advanced studies was set up with a fund of seven million-two hundred thousand dollars.

Present and future generations of Dalhousie students owe him a debt which they can never repay. Although the Killam's have passed away the effects of their "magnificent gifts" will be reflected in many of the future graduates of this university. As the New York Times put it:


THE IZAAK WALTON KILLAM MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Shortly before her death in midsummer, 1965, Mrs. Dorothy J. Killam set aside a substantial portion of her estate for the purpose of founding The Izaak Walton Killam Fund for Advanced Studies at Dalhousie University. Her purpose in so doing was not only to establish a perpetual memorial in his native province to her late husband, Izaak Walton Killam, industrialist and financier, but also "to help in the building of Canada's future by encouraging advanced study". At the same time, it was her hope that she might thereby in some measure "develop and expand the work of Canadian universities, and promote sympathetic understanding between Canadians and the people of other countries".

It is in accordance with Mrs. Killam's wishes that Dalhousie University now offers the first of the Izaak Walton Killam Memorial Scholarships. Approximately thirty Killam Scholars, in all fields of graduate research at Dalhousie, will be selected for 1967-68.

The scholarships, which may be renewed annually upon evidence of satisfactory completion of work leading towards the Master's or Doctoral degree, range in value from \$3,000 to \$5,000. No remission of fees accompanies the scholarships, but additional funds to cover transportation to Halifax will be supplied. Killam Scholars will not be required to perform instructing or demonstrating duties.

Those chosen as Killam Scholars by the trustees will be selected on the basis of their likelihood "to contribute to the advancement of learning or to win distinction in a profession"; a Killam Scholar, however, "should not be a one-sided person and each scholar's special distinction of intellect should be founded upon sound character and good manners". Killam Scholarships are open both to Canadians and non-Canadians.














MARITIME RUGBY CHAMPS ... LAST YEAR!


DGDS presents "THE LESSON"

The Tigerbelles, although small in number, made up for their lack of depth with excellent quality performances.



DR. JOHN RIPLEY

He has extended his interest and enthusiasm far beyond Dalhousie, working with zeal to foster the understanding of theatre in Halifax and indeed throughout the rest of Canada.

Next year (1967) he goes to the University of Saskatchewan as Visiting Associate Professor of Drama. Dalhousie owes him a great deal, and we wish him well.

In the giving of thanks there is always the danger of overlooking the worthy, so that I content myself with thanking the staff as a whole for their work; for the excellencies of the book they are responsible while I alone answer for the faults which have slipped into

print.
