1. The Agenda was adopted without changes
2. Approval of minutes of June 19, 2012
 - a. Approved with corrections in spelling.
3. Dominic spoke to and moved that the Research Advisory Committee be created. Seconded by Michael Moosberger. Move to amend revision to 4.2 on all Committee Terms of Reference by Michael Moosberger. Seconded by Dominic Silvio. **Motions carried.**
4. Marlo spoke about the Human Library Project proposed by The Office of Human Rights, Equity & Harassment Prevention. Proposed date: some time around March 21 during Diversity Week. Anyone interested in helping to organize this event should contact her.
5. Linda Bedwell moved for the creation of the User Experience and Assessment Committee. Seconded by Sandy Dwyer. After discussion and some wording changes the motion was put to a vote. **Motion carried.**
6. Donna gave an Operational Review Update and indicated that they are on schedule and the draft report is with SMT. They will review it for factual errors and then distribute it to staff. Connex and SMT will consider recommendations and will help with implementation. A special meeting of Library Council will be called to discuss the report when it is released.

7. Short Snappers

- 7.1 Ian reported on possible changes to our Refworks subscription. Bear in mind that this does not necessarily signal the end of RefWorks, only that OCUL is looking at alternatives. Dalhousie subscribes to RefWorks via OCUL's Scholar's Portal service.

Excerpt from July 12 letter from OCUL to CAUL: "Over the past five months, as part of a regular review of OCUL services, OCUL has conducted a broad consultation with its membership about future provision of a consortia-based citation management system to OCUL members. Although RefWorks is acknowledged as a leader, the market place for these systems has matured considerably since OCUL first implemented RefWorks in 2004. Over the period of two contract renewals with RefWorks-COS, several competing commercial products have appeared as well as open source solutions. Given this market maturity and continued strong interest in OCUL to leverage our collective buying power to keep costs low and the need for due diligence with respect to providing best value for our OCUL users, the OCUL member libraries feel it is appropriate at this time to initiate an RFP process for an online citation management system. Working with the University of Toronto Libraries, OCUL will be preparing an RFP to be issued later this year."

- 7.2 Ian updated on developments around copyright and fair dealing: Canada's recently amended copyright law (Bill C11: The Copyright Modernization Act) is pending proclamation later this year and contains beneficial reforms. It will expand Fair Dealing exceptions for educational use, communicating and reproducing publicly available material on the Internet, displaying material for the purpose of education or training and permitting digital inter-library loan of works acquired by the Library.

Recent Supreme Court decisions are also helpful because they limit the definition of ***copy*** by excluding online links to digital material and expand the definition of ***fair dealing*** for which no license is required. Fair dealing refers to the use of copyrighted materials for research, private study, criticism and news reporting. The Supreme Court of Canada issued decisions on July 12, 2012 reaffirming that fair dealing is a user's right which: 1) must be interpreted in a broad and liberal manner, 2) is flexible and technology neutral and 3) expands the scope of making and distributing copies for a teaching purpose under the ***private study*** and ***research*** Fair Dealing exceptions. This means that a teacher can make copies on behalf of students and fall within these Fair Dealing exceptions.

- 7.3 Geoff reported on his faculty outreach project for DalSpace Profile Pages. Donna will be sending out a letter to key groups to promote this capability (it will include information about OA, IRs in the context of other tools like LinkedIn). If this catches on the Library In-

terns and Circulation Staff could set these up for faculty. These profiles could act as a university research directory similar to Experts@Dal.

7.4 Donna reported the CLA Institutional Membership fees were going up significantly this year (\$5000.00). It would no longer include individual memberships but individual membership would be at the institutional rate.

8. University Librarian's Moment

- a. The budget is now balanced and a three year projected budget will be developed by SMT. This will be shared with Library Council.
- b. Donna is on a 1st year seminar working group who are developing a mandatory course including study and research skills, time management, information literacy, ethical use of information, how to conduct oneself in a gender neutral manner, being a global citizen, that will have to be taken by all students in all faculties. There may be opportunities for librarians to team teach this. A draft will be ready for December and the proposal taken to Senate.
- c. A database is being created to manage the process for all Senate reviews of programs and departments; Donna is on the development committee.
- d. Donna is Co-Chair of the university United-way Campaign – please consider participating, any donation greatly appreciated.
- e. The University Librarian has developed goals for her position for the year, and will share those with SMT and Library Council once they have been approved by the Academic VP.
- f. As is the practice with other faculties, University Libraries Annual Report will be written and each year it will be posted on the website in August.
