A PROPOSED INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTE ON GENDER AND HIV/AIDS (IIGH/A)

Materials on GBA and gender mainstreaming often lack uptake strategies

Recognition of the need for a knowledge transfer mechanism and training in GBA and gender mainstreaming for HIV/AIDS policy makers and programmers

<u>GENDER-BASED ANALYSIS (GBA)</u>

GENDER is not synonymous with SEX

Gender = socially constructed norms, i.e. behaviours, expectations, roles, beliefs, characteristics, etc. based on biological sex

GBA takes into account the various social & economic differences between men & women through evaluating & interpreting the impact of gender in policy and program development

GBA PRINCIPLES

Recognition of the different impact of norms or measures on women & men according to diverse life situations

An integral part of the substantive analytical process & must be applied at each stage of the process

Focuses not only on results but also on concepts, arguments & language used in the work process

GBA must lead to remedies for inequality

VISION FOR THE IIGH/A

Changing attitudes, changing policies: Working together for a world without HIV/AIDS"

THE IIGH/A MAY PROVIDE:

HIV is a women's health issue

Globally, women have less access to and control over income, land, credit, and education

Economics of HIV/AIDS - Poverty is clearly linked to women's vulnerability to HIV

Unequal balance of power in sexual relationships Stigma, discrimination, violence and denial increase women's vulnerability to HIV

Lack of GBA training and uptake in HIV/AIDS policies and programmes

- Possible satellite events in other countries
- International faculty and international participants
- Practical training in GBA of HIV/AIDS policies and programmes
- Collaboration on gender-based action research
- An international network of alumni and experts in gender-based research, policy and programming
