Sod turned for new library

The sod turning reremony for the new N.S.A.C. Library was held in connection with Autumn Assembly. The sod was officially turned by Hon. Roger Bacon, Minister of Agriculture and Marketing for Nova Scotia.

The new library building is situated near centre campus in the area commonly referred to as the Agronomy Garden. It is a three story structure. The bottom two stories are allocated for library services. The top floor will be used by the Extension Services Branch including the Farm Management Division and the Nova Scotia Farm Loan Board. Approximately 28,000

square feet of floor area will be devoted to library services. This is nearly ten times the space used by our present library.

Considerable increase in science journals, reference materials and popular agricultural magazines is planned. A special effort is also being made to secure historical documents and rare books. These will be kept in a special archival room and provide an excellent place for the reference records on agricultural history.

Construction is proceeding on schedule. Occupancy is anticipated in late fall of this year.

The four year Degree program at N.S.A.C. is now in place and all signals are "Go". The one hundred and twenty-two students who registered in the Degree program in September 1981 are the first group of students who will graduate with a four year degree from the Nova Scotia Agricultural College.

Construction work on new academic facilities are well under way on campus. The Library is scheduled for completion in the fall of 1982 and plans for an addition to Cox Institute and the Boulden Building are almost finalized. Third year students will register for the first time in September 1983.

This three-storey extension will provide additional classrooms, teaching and research laboratories and offices for the Department of Plant Science, Economics, Chemistry, Biology, Mathematics and Physics. We are hopeful that this extension will be under construction by summer. The remaining phase of the physical expansion is the extension to the Boulden Building which should follow.

During the past year we began the process of adding new staff to meet the needs of the third and fourth year curriculum. Over the next two years we hope to add the remaining required staff.

The Annual Meeting of the Association was held on July 25 in the Alumni Theatre, Cumming Hall, with President, George MacKenzie, in the chair. The agenda as printed was circulated and

President's Report - The first item on the agenda was the President's Report. President MacKenzie reported as follows: Director's Meeting - The Directors met on October 1980 and elected President, George MacKenzie, Vice-President, Don Himmelman.

Alumni Scholarship Report - The Secretary reported that Donna Hansen of Yarmouth and Linda Hamilton of Onslow were the 1980-81 Alumni Association Scholarship recipients. The scholarship program was discussed and the Directors were unanimous in the thought that these should be maintained as the top scholar-ships offered by the College. To further explore this matter a three member study committee was appointed with Clyde Rogers as Chairman. This committee will be reporting at this meeting.

Ken MacRae Letter - The Directors dealt with a letter from Ken MacRae, Class '57, voicing concern about the access that paraplegics have to campus buildings. Principal MacRae was contacted and he advised that the College plans to label entrances that are presently accessible to paraplegics and will continue to press the Department of Public Works to plan for wheelchair access to all buildings on

Finance Report - Finances continue to be a topic of concern for the Directors. At present about ten per cent financially support the Association. It is gratifying to note that to date eighty-eight Alumni have taken out Life Memberships.

Alumni News - Two issues of the Alumni News were prepared and published during the year. Our thanks to editor Dale Ells and his associates who spent considerable time and effort putting the paper together.

Alumni Scholarship Study Committee -This committee met at Amherst in June and a report from that committee will be presented to this meeting.

Library and Resource Centre - A new library and resource centre will be constructed on campus with construction to start this fall. One area of this structure will be designated for collections of historic artifacts and books relating to early agricultural history in the Atlantic area. Alumni are encouraged to make donations of artifacts and books to this

Minutes of 1980 Meeting - Eric Meek moved, seconded by Dick Huggard that the minutes of the 1980 meeting be approved as circulated.

Financial Statement - It was moved by J.E. Shuh and seconded by Don Morrison that the financial statement be accepted as presented. Carried. A copy of this statement is attached to the minutes showing total receipts of \$3,837.01, total expenditures of \$3,882.79 and a balance on hand at the beginning of the year of \$1,160.54 with a balance in the bank June 30, 1981 of \$1,116.51. The Life Memberships account on June 30, 1981 had eighty-eight members and a total of \$4,450 on deposit.

Wir Langille Portrait - Prof. Winston Murray Langille retired from the College staff on June 30, 1981. In recognition of Prof. Langille's service to the College his portrait was presented to the College by the Alumni Association. The portrait was accepted by Dr. MacRae and both Dr. MacRae and Prof. Langille made appropriate remarks.

Campus Enrichment Fund - The statement of the Campus Enrichment Fund was presented by Mr. C.A. Douglas. This fund shows donations of \$122,635 66 and interest of \$20,708.12 for a total receipts of \$143,343.78, expenditures of \$123986.68 leaving a balance in the bank June 1, 1981 of \$19,351.10. This report was moved by C.A. Douglas and seconded by Reg Gilbert and carried.

Trustees Report - Presented by the Secretary, it was moved by J.E. Shuh and seconded by Byron Beeler that the report be accepted, with the recommendation that the Executive deal with the scholarship increases as recommended in this report. Carried.

Scholarship Study Committee - This report was the result of a committee that was appointed to make recommendations on updating the present Alumni Scholarship program. The report of the committee is as follows:

That the Scholarship Committee recommend to the Executive that a Scholarship Campaign be instituted.

Emphasis is to be placed on the fact that the campaign ties in with the start of the four-year program.

The last compaign for Alumni Scholarship Funds was in 1964-65 - more than fifteen

Inflation has down-graded the value of the present Scholarships.

The amount of the campaign was left

Campaign to be conducted by a mail-out of a well-prepared letter.

It was moved by Clyde Rogers and seconded by Mac Neary that the report be accepted. Carried.

Principal's Report - Principal MacRae thanked the Alumni for their support in various projects at the College. The 75th Anniversary Year was an exciting year with the announcement that the four-year degree program is to be instituted as soon as possible. Present plans are that students entering in the fall of 1981 will be completing their degrees at the N.S.A.C. Dr. MacRae also announced that plans have been approved for the construction of a new library building to contain 28,000 square feet of floor space, which is ten times the present space available for the library. He also made mention of the space allocated for the collection of archives and historic collections and asked for the co-operation of the Alumni with these collections. He also advised that planning is taking place for increased space in Cox Institute and an extension to the Boulden Building for space for the Animal Science program. It is planned that the following programs will be presented to the first students registered in the four-year

degree program: Plant Science Animal Science Plant Protection Agricultural Economics Agricultural Chemistry/Soils


