This issue of Alumni News reports some interesting developments in the Association.

The Registrars report draws attention to the third year of the degree program. Applications are being received from students at other Universities who wish to transfer into the degree program at N.S.A.C. That certainly is an interesting development.

The meeting of the Ottawa Alumni, which I had the pleasure of attending, was

both enjoyable and encouraging. We hope to have more alumni meetings on a regional basis

The Association has been able to assist in the establishment of the C.A. Douglas Extension Award and is now involved witht the Noel Erman Memorial Award. Both of these projects have provided a service which has been most worthwhile.

I must again draw your attention to the Membership application form on the back page. The Annual Meeting approved an increase in the annual membership from \$5.00 to \$10.00. This charge is now in force. The Life Membership remains at \$50.00. The response to these memberships has been most encouraging with 54 new life members reported in this issue. That brings the total to date at 326. But there are still some 3,000 grads who don't support the association in a financial way. Let's hear from you.

We have a good quantity of Personals for this issue. Some have been mailed in which is most encouraging. Keep the news coming and we'll pass it on. Alumni Day, 1983 provided an opportunity to open "The Agricola Collections". The Principal, Dr. H.F. MacRae, chaired the event assisted by Alumni Vice-President, Sherry Porter, Dr. John Bubar, and two graduates of the class of 1918. Ernest Eaton and Stanley Wood - 56 year graduates of the college.

An outline of events leading up to the development of this facility of the college follows:

In 1980, the Nova Scotia Agricultural College celebrated its seventy-fifth anniversary. Throughout the year, it became apparent that among the College's faculty, students, alumni and friends there has always been a profound interest in Atlantic agricultural history. Quickly, this interest defined itself as a determination to begin a small collection of old agricultural implements and to develop the College Library's archives.

A faculty Historic Collections Committee, under the chairmanship of Professor Peter Sanger, was set up. Providentially its formation coincided with the decision to build a new College Library. The N.S.A.C. Executive Committee and the Library Committee agreed that the new building had to contain a separate archival area, built to proper standards of environmental control, with adequate area for storage,

display and work.

Money to develop the historic collections and archival holdings came and continues to come from various sources. The Humanities Department has used its library budget allocation extensively, for example,


The Grads came from Ottawa and an area about 30-40 miles around the city. The event proved so popular that already there is talk of having another in about two years time.

Principal's Message

This issue of the Alumni News provides an opportunity to send best wishes and greetings for the New Year to Alumni and friends of N.S.A.C.

The year 1983 was a busy and exciting year on campus. We began the year with final hectic planning for the AIC '83 Conference held on Campus July 10-14. By all accounts, the Conference was a resounding success, our facilities proved completely adequate for hosting in excess of 1100 registrants and we saw a significant number of former graduates. In addition, Reunion Weekend, July 30th attracted another large group of graduates to campus.

In September, we began the first new third year of the degree program with forty-seven students enrolled in the third year.

Construction on the extension to Cox Institute is now in full-swing following a summer of labor problems which delayed completion of the building by 3-4 months. We are now hopeful the building will be completed by April, equipped and ready for use by September, 1984.

Plans are nearing the final stage for a new animal science building to be constructed directly opposite the Central Heating Plant and the Hancock Veterinary Building. The plans call for a two-story (58,000 sq. ft.) building with both floors accessible from ground level. In addition to office and classroom space, the building will provide specialized laboratories for physiology, genetics and breeding, nutrition, animal product technology, animal surgery and a large lecture theatre. It is hoped that construction will begin in early summer and that the building will be available for September 1985. The present Boulden Building will be renovated to accommodate a small laboratory animal facility and ancillary services.

We are very gratified by the number and value of new scholarships which have been offered for students at N.S.A.C. These scholarships are provided by interested individuals, agricultural organizations, agribusiness firms, trusts, etc., Scholarships are becoming an increasingly important factor in making it possible for worthy students to continue their education.

Our sincere thanks for the interest shown by the Alumni Association in all our activities. I had the great pleasure along with your Secretary Ed Shuh, to attend an Ottawa Branch get-together of Alumni in October organized by Don Grant and others. It was a great affair with good attendance and it might have set an example for other areas to plan similar events.

to buy old agricultural, scientific and rare Maritime books, as well as new complete sets of the works of writers such as Charles Darwin, Thoreau, John Burroughs, Audubon, and W.H. Hudson.

However, the bulk of acquisitions funding has come from two grants, of \$3,000 each, by the N.S.A.C. Alumni Association. These grant have been used to purchase books and to buy old agricultural implements, which are now on permanent display in the Library's main entrance area and in the Archives.

There have also been a number of private donations of books and material to the Archives during the last two years, in particular three very generous ones by Professor Emeritus A.E. Roland, by Dr. E.I. Hancock, and by the late Alex Palmer.

At the suggestion of the Alumni Association's Executive Committee, the archival area has been named The Agricola Collec-

tions. "Agricola" was the pen-name used by John Young (1737 - 1837) in a series of letters published in the Halifax "Acadian Recorder" in 1818. In his letters, Young analyzed the state of Nova Scotian agriculture and forcefully recommended improved practices of cultivation, technology and agricultural organization. The justice and accuracy of Young's letters led directly to profound changes in Nova Scotian agriculture.

Among them

was the development of the tradition of agricultural research, innovation and education of which N.S.A.C. has been a part since 1905.

Fittingly, among the volumes on display today, is a copy of the first edition of Young's collected Letters of Agricola, published in Halifax in 1822. This copy was purchased with the aid of an Alumni Association grant and represents symbolically N.S.A.C.'s continuity with the past and commitment to the best in the future of agriculture.

A note from the Registrar's Office

It is much too early (January 2, 1984) to make any predictions about enrolment for 1984-85. Only a few applications are received before January 1 in any year. This year the number received so far is even less than usual and probably no indication of what is to happen to application numbers between now and June 1.

The addition of the final two years of the B.Sc. (Agr.) program will, of course, change our student body in both numbers and maturity. It will also make other differences. More students will transfer to NSAC from other colleges and universities. This trend started last year and is likely to be more significant in 1984-85. With the present tight enemployment situation, little hope for career opportunities for graduates of pure science and education programs, and the apparently better possibilities of employment for graduates of applied science programs like Agricultural Science, there are likely to be applications to transfer to NSAC from students who are now in first and second years of programs at other institutions. These students, except for those who transfer from other faculties of Agriculture, will be admitted to the second or third years of the B.Sc. (Agr.) program at NSAC but will pick up the Agricultural science subjects missed in the early years.

Our student body this year is about 96% from the Atlantic provinces. The proportion from Nova Scotia is a little higher than in recent years at 55%. About 25% originate in New Brunswick and 13% from Prince Edward Island. Between 3 and 4 percent are from Newfoundland and the remaining 4% from other provinces of Canada, the U.S. and other foreign coun-

are in the first three years of the four year Bachelor of Science in Agriculture B.Sc. (Agr.) degree course. The students who are successful in this program will graduate with their degree in one of the four options: Agricultural Economics, Animal Science, Plant Protection, and Plant Science. A smaller number of students are taking the Agricultural Engineering degree course. Some of the students in the first year of the B.Sc. (Agr.) course will, as usual, transfer to the University of Guelph to take the Doctor of Veterinary Medicine

About half of the students at NSAC are taking the two or three year Technician and Technology courses in such diciplines as Agricultural Business, Agricultural Mechanization, Animal Science, Plant Science, Farm Equipment, Landscape Horticulture, Farming Technology, Agricultural Technology, or Laboratory Technology courses in Biology or Chemistry.

One of the changes coming to all universities and colleges in the Maritime provinces is a centralized application system. Students in their final year of high school are applying for admission to several rather than one or two institutions. As a result, the total number of applications received by universities and colleges in the region, far exceeds the number of applicants. The number of students a university or college accepts, therefore, can and usually does far exceed the number who will finally register.

The centralized application system now being established by the Atlantic Association of Universities will put an end to this problem as it has already done very successfully in Ontario.

Mr. Greg Bishop was appointed Assistant Professor in the Department of Mathematics and Physics in February, 1983. Professor Bishop is Manager of Computer Services for both N.S.A.C., and the Department of Agriculture and Marketing, and will be responsible for managing the N.S.A.C. Computer Center, and teaching Computer Science.

New logo designed for letterheads, signs

N.S.A.C. now has a new logo which is being used as part of a letterhead design. The design depicting an open book as a symbol of learning and a plow symbolic of agriculture will also be used on brochures and new college entrance signs.

The logo does not replace the official seal of the college which will continue to be used on graduation documents and other official uses. The crest regularly used by the Alumni Association, by student publications and on souveniors will continue to be used. The logo will probably be used mainly for quick identification in cases

where a less detail design seems most desirable.

The move to establish a new logo was first undertaken by the Public Relations Committee of faculty. The design process which involved assistance from an external designer took several months and the collection of faculty reaction on five different occasions. A wide range of views were considered and a greater acceptance developed as the design was simplified.

A.C. Neish scholarship

The A.C. Neish Memorial Trust will award a \$1,000 scholarship annually to a student of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College who has satisfactorily completed the third year of study. The award shall be tenable at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College for a fourth year of study in the B.Sc. (Agr.) program.

The award will be made on the basis of high academic standing and exhibition of qualities of leadership as evidenced by participation and achievements in non-academic activities in College as well as elsewhere.

The Trust was established by friends, admirers, and colleagues of the late ARTHUR CHARLES NEISH, O.C., F.R.S.C., F.R.S., former Director, Atlantic Research Laboratory, and Distinguished Research Scientist, National Research Council of Canada.

Dr. Neish (1916-1973) was an under-

graduate student at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, Truro, where he had his first contact with science and where he won the Governor General's Medal and a Macdonald College (Quebec) scholarship. His work on fermentation, bacterial and plant metabolism and the biosynthesis of plant polysaccharides and lignins received international acclaim. He was a Fellow of the Chemical Institute of Canada, of the Royal Society of Canada and the Royal Society of London.

He was the first person to be awarded the Gold Medal of the Canadian Society of Plant Physiologists, and was awarded an honorary doctorate by Mount Allison University and an honorary Doctor of Science degree by McGill.

In 1972 he was appointed a "Distinguished Research Scientist" by the National Research Council of Canada. The following year he became an Officer of the Order of Canada.

The N.S.A.C. seal

This is the seal of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College. It appears on the cover of formal Assembly programmes and other official papers of the College. It also appears very subtly indented in the red seal which is affixed to the lower left-hand corner of College diplomas and Certifi-

The inner circle of the seal shows a crown over a shield. The shield depicts three thistles, two above and one below an emaciated fish.

ORIGIN

We consulted several officials of the College, past and present, as to the seal's origin. Many thought they knew, but were "not sure". One, absolutely didn't know. We found the latter to be the most accurate

It was with the help of our College Librarian that the plot began to thicken. His sources revealed that it was designed by the College of Heralds in England in 1868, at which time seals were designed for all four Provinces of the newly formed Dominion of Canada.

This dovetails with information supplied by former College Registrar, and history buff, W.J. MacLeod. To the best of his recall, a seal was assigned to Nova Scotia by the College of heralds in Scotland as early as the 17th century. At Confederation, a rhubarb developed over seals between Nova Scotia and Ontario. Apparently the two Provinces had identical or similar seals. We can only speculate that the designs issued in 1868 were done to appease the situation.

John A. Stewart, F.S.A. Scot. in his "Arms of Nova Scotia" viewed this replacement by a modern arms with some emotion as he writes"... it is difficult to understand how a modern coat-of-arms came to be foisted upon the Province in 1868. Were the Authorities at that period unaware of the priceless heritage Nova Scotia possessed in the ancient, and indeed royal arms, and did some busybodies in London suggest a brand new coat? The reason may not be known, but a blunder worse than a crime was committed when the ancient and lawful arms were surplanted, in the official mind at least, by a new and rather commonplace design of a salmon and thistles".

Mr. Stewart's depiction of the "modern arms of Nova Scotia" shows our fish or salmon pointed in the opposite direction and appears to be freshly caught. The three thistles also appear to be in a much healthier condition than they now appear on the College seal.





SEAL GRANTEL

This modern design did not go down wen with the people of Nova Scotia. Correspondence between Queen Victoria and the Nova Scotia government on this issue was lengthy through the late 1800's.

By 1907 nothing was settled officially. At that time, the College seal was granted by Order-in-Council on May 22, 1907, and all they had of an official nature was the "salmon" seal. So that's what the College got, along with "Nova Scotia Agricultural College" around the perimeter.

COAT-OF-ARMS ANNULLED

But to conclude the Provincial seal and coat-of-arms issue, the whole thing was nailed down by an edict from King George V, dated January 19, 1929, in which he officially scrubbed the seal of 1868 and authorized the following which is a derivative of the original arms of 1625:

Mr. MacLeod also recalled an interesting anecdote in the College's search for identity. Sometime during the 1950's, the idea was conceived to create a new seal. A person knowledgeable in heraldry and design was charged with the task. What he came up with was a design featuring a pair of fighting cocks. Whether he thought this would appeal to the then principal, Dr. Ken, is problematical. Anyway, though the relationship with the poultry industry could be argued, it was immediately thrown out fearing heat from more placid poultryfanciers and, although the sport of cockfighting is avidly followed in small pockets of Cape Breton, it is, indeed, illegal. On that note, Mr. MacLeod recalled, the search was abandoned.

C.A. Douglas Extension Award guidlines set

The following guidelines were discussed and established for the C.A. Douglas Memorial Fund.

The Name: The award would be called the C.A. Douglas Extension Award. It would be awarded on an annual basis to an outstanding Agriculture Extension worker in Nova Scotia.

The fund has grown to the point that \$600.00 can be presented in the Spring of 1984 at the time of the Annual Meeting of the Nova Scotia Institute of Agrologists. A certificate would accompany the presenta-

This fund would be used for some self improvement program or special research project either to further the development of the individual and/or Agriculture Extension in Nova Scotia. This would allow the individual to do future studies at a summer or winter Extension School such as courses offered at the University of Guelph or Arizona State University, or conduct a special research program here in the

The Director of Extension for the N.S. Department of Agriculture and Marketing

would be responsible for the administration of the award. He would appoint a selection committee and obtain and review applications annually.

Selection Criteria for Award: The applicant must presently be involved in some phase of Agriculture Extension work. Agriculture Extension will apply to the broadest connotation, such as: Agrobusiness, Extension, Research, Broadcasting, innovative skills and teaching. The selection committee would determine the eligibility of the applicant.

Applicants will be considered for both a single achievement or a lifelong dedication to Agriculture Extension.

Applicants must clearly state the intent or purpose for the award. The selection committee will place a great deal of emphasis on how the applicant has considered their future self improvement, both personal and in the field of Extension. This award is to be used for some plan of self improvement.

Applicants would be considered annually and must apply on a special application form to the Director of Extension on, or before, April 1st of the current year.
