
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

### Construction of Animal Science Bldg. Started





On October 9, the Hon. Roger Bacon turned the sod to mark the beginning of construction of the new Animal Science Building. The contractor Erskin Construction moved on site and work began immediately. The planned completion date is December 31, 1986.

The 70,000 square foot Animal Science Building will be constructed by Erskine Building Limited at a cost \$6.752 million. Construction will commence immediately with completion by December 31, 1986. The building, with two floors, will provide offices, classrooms, laboratories for research and teaching and an auditorium type classroom designed to accommodate industry meetings.

Eleven faculty members along with instructors, stenographic and technical support staff will have modern offices, classrooms and laboratories. The Animal Science Department is multi-disciplinary with specialists in Genetics, Nutrition, Physiology, Livestock Management, Animal Behavior and Animal Products. In addition, the Farm Manager supervises a 180 hectare multi-specie livestock farm used by the entire College and Department of Agriculture and Marketing.

The Animal Science Department has major programs in all three College teaching efforts, Vocational, Technical and Degree. The new building will enchance these programs through laboratories and other facilities equal to any institution in Canada. These teaching and research laboratories will include a nutrition complex with complete chemical analysis, physiology including a surgery room and modern computerized genetics laboratory. There will also be an animal products and processing section. Modern laboratory animal care facilities will be provided in the next phase of the Animal Science facilities development.

### **Vo-Tech Agreement Renewed**

In 1966 the four Atlantic provinces signnew agreement reassures all of the wisdom ed an agreement to co-operate in Agricultural education. Nova Scotia agreed to expand the Agricultural College with significant capital improvements, and all four provinces agreed to share in the operating cost for Vocational and Technical students. This agreement provided the basis of the expansion program during the sixties which resulted in several new buildings and courses. Enrollment expanded and N.S.A.C. became a leader in Technical education for the agricultural and food industry.

This agreement was reviewed and renegotiated in 1985. The provinces are again committing themselves to co-operate and jointly share in the costs of Vocational and Technical courses. The willingness of provincial leaders to pursue interprovincial co-operation and the college to adapt programes to suit the whole Atlantic region, is a good example for other diciplines. ## Department of Economics and Business expands

The department of Economics and Business has been heavily involved in the recent expansion, along with the other departments of the College. The addition of an Agricultural Economics option in the B.Sc. program has necessitated a doubling of the professional staff.

The department has continued its responsibility for the Farming Technology and the Agricultural Business Technician Programs

The addition of staff and the expanded degree program has led to expanded facilities with complete renovations to the old Physics lab area in Cox Institute creating a new reception area, seven offices, a computer room and a reading room.

The addition of faculty has allowed the department to place an increased emphasis on research. Faculty members have research interests in the following areas:

1. Farm Management area, including farm planning, risk, accounting, tax management, and micro computer applications.

2. Applied Econometrics, with emphasis on demand and supply analysis and policy applications relating to Agriculture and

3. Applied Operations Research with special interests in Farm and Regional Planning Models.

Teaching continues to be the department's main concern, with increased emphasis on student involvement in case work and micro computer applications.





### **New Staff**

**Dr. Nigel Firth** joined the Animal science Faculty in August, 1985 with a responsibility for the Animal Products area. He had just completed his Ph. D. at Cornell where he specialized in Nutrition and Physiology.

Dr. Firth lived with his parents on the Orkney Islands off Scotland before attending Edinburgh University where he obtained his B. Sc. in Agriculture in 1963. Two years later he received his M. Sc. in Animal Science from Purdue University. He and his brother then operated a beef and sheep farm in Northern Scotland where he was an active participant in local politics and the local agricultural society.

In addition to his research techniques, his teaching skills and his practical farming experience, he brings new skills to the Animal Science Department in playing the piano, organ and accordian and barber shop singing. His enthusiasm for all agriculture and his interest in students makes him an appreciated instructor.

E. G. (Ernie) Maynard has returned to Nova Scotia after six years with Alberta Agriculture. He is now the N.S.A.C. Farm Manager and a Faculty member in Animal

Mr. Maynard is a Nova Scotian by birth and went through N.S.A.C. enroute to his Animal Husbandry degree from the University of Toronto (OAC). He was employed by the Livestock Services Branch (N.S. Dept. of Agr. & Mktg.) from 1961 to 1979. In that time, he worked in numerous capacities, with sheep and dairy cattle and as Livestock Superintendent. During this period he acquired a B. Ed. from Mt. Allison and M. Sc. in Animal Breeding from the University of Guelph.

The College Farm is a multi-enterprise operation with 18 permanent staff and about five summer students. Each of the units is essentially a laboratory and most of the staff has some direct involvement with teaching and research. The challenge to Mr. Maynard is to coordinate the varied interests of the many functions of the farm and at the same time maintain commercial level production standards.

The gardens are located east of the library building and directly behind the DeWolfe House off College Road. The library parking lot will lead directly to the main entrance of the Gardens.

Progress to date includes the following: 1. Construction of the gravel walkways within the garden area.

2. Preparation of perennial bed areas and one-third perennials planted.

3. Identification of perennial plant material using plastic labels
4. General maintenances - lawn mow-

ing, weeding, mulching, pruning, shrub and tree removal.

This is a long term project and the Alum-

ni funding will be required for a number of years to aid in its' completion.



# The W. H. Brittain Memorial Fund

On the 28 July 1984, the A.D. Pickett Entomological Museum and Research Laboratory was officially opened at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College. That day, Dr. Pickett blessed us by his presence and humbly accepted that the College gave his name to its permanent entomological collection initiated several years ago by the efforts of many contributors.

Dr. Pickett experienced a most varied and distinguished career. It all started by ten full years of service to his Alma Mater, N.S.A.C. From 1929 to 1939, he was employed as entomologist for the province of Nova Scotia, spending the winters as professor of zoology and genetics at the College. During the summers, he worked as extension entomologist. From then on, he transferred to the Dominion Entomologial Laboratory at Annapolis Royal, Nova Scotia, became head of this unit in 1950 when it moved to Kentville, and led the entomological research programme until 1962. In 1963, he was appointed visiting lecturer at the University of California, and when he retired from Agriculture Canada in 1965, he became head of the International Capsid Research Team at the Cocoa Research Institute in Ghana until 1968.

A. D. Pickett thus gained international recognition for his leadership in the integration of the biological and chemical control of insect and mite pests of tree fruits. His work was original and extremely significant. As a testimony, a large number of recent textbooks on Integrated Pest Management (IPM) published in America, Canada, and abroad are still referring to the classical "Nova Scotia Experiment". This has clearly established Pickett as a true pioneer of this in vogue theory of pest management along with other famous entomologists such as Metcalf, Huffaker, De Bach and van den Bosch.

Dr. Pickett, however, wanting to acknowledge the support and inspiration he received from W.H. Brittain, has recently asked N.S.A.C. to establish the W.H. Brittain Memorial Fund. To do so, he donated a substantial sum of money, the interest to be earmarked to subsidize

On the 28 July 1984, the A.D. Pickett Museum projects dealing with two economically important insect families, aboratory was officially opened at the i.e., the cicadellidae and the miridae.

When one compares biograhical notes on these two great Nova Scotia scientists, one is not surprised by this latest gesture of Dr. Pickett. Not only did Brittain hold earlier the same positions as Pickett did later, both were Provincial Entomologists and Professors of Zoology and Entomology at N.S.A.C., but it seems as if Pickett was following him as well at various other locations. This perhaps less known aspect of their relationship is particularly interesting and is as follows.

Brittain was professor at N.S.A.C. from 1913 to 1926. Pickett was a student here from 1923 to 1925. Then Brittain became head of the Department of Entomology at Macdonald College of McGill University from 1926 to 1933. Again Pickett followed and was a student there from 1927 until 1929, when he received the B.Sc. (Agr.) degree with honors in entomology. Later on, Brittain became Dean and Vice-Principal at Macdonald College from 1934 to 1955, during which period he was also chairman of the Department of Zoology and would see the world renowned Canadian Institute of Parasitology initiated. In 1936 Pickett was granted the M.Sc. degree from McGill, his thesis work being on the apple maggot. Lastly, both these scientists were granted D.Sc. (Hon.) degrees, Brittain by the University of British Columbia in 1949, and Pickett by McGill University in 1959. I do not wish to use the word mentor, only eleven years separate these two men, but rather the words colleague, collaborator and most certainly friend of

It is therefore with great pleasure, and a feeling of privilege, that I take this opportunity to publicly acknowledge and thank on behalf of the Museum and the College, Dr. A.D. Pickett, for having been so kind and generous to us. We wish him many more years of a fulfilling life.

# Canadian Expertise to Eight Countries

The production and use of high quality Canadian Seed Potatoes has been the theme of a six month program at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College. Staff at the college have been assisted by researchers and inspectors with Agriculture Canada, Provincial Extension specialists in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, as well as growers and shippers. The graduation on September 24 represented the end of a unique program where ten students from the Dominican Republic, Costa Rica, Uruguay, Mexico, Argentina, Morocco, Nicaragua, and Lebanon studied and lived together since April.

Professor Tom Haliburton, co-ordinator of the study group, reminded the audience that over the past six years potato industry specialists from twenty-five countries have attended these courses to learn about the Canadian Seed Potato system. The mix of cultures, languages, and agricultural traditions makes an interesting mosaic and provides an abundance of cross cultural learnings. While at the college, the students, all of whom have formal agricultural degrees or diplomas from their home countries, study such topics as plant physiology, potato disease identification and control, breeding systems, quality control, extension education and research methods.

During the course they visit research laboratories in Fredericton and Charlot-

tetown, Elite Seed Farms at Fox Island and Bon Accord, and the Canadian Seed Potato Certification school in Ridgetown, Ontario. A special week is spent with a Canadian farm family where seed potatoes are grown. Some of the farm families attended the graduation to extend farewell greetings to the students.

This year one student was given a more specialized program in Tissue Culture as applied to seed potato systems. Professor Jerzy Nowak designed and supervised this sequence with industry laboratories in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island cooperataing with this project.

At the graduation, guest speaker, D.K. Kirkland, from Agriculture Canada in Ottawa, provided a good overview of the reputation of Canadian knowledge and expertise as viewed by other countries.

The course is sponsored each year by Potatoes Canada and the Canadian International Development Agency. Representatives of both were present, together with several guests from industry to celebrate the graduation. The Advisory Committee from Potatoes Canada is already reviewing applicants from several countries for another such course beginning next April.

The presentation has a double-edge. With its primary audience to be senior high school students who are uncertain about their future career or are considering one in agriculture, it will also be a vehicle that will increase the College's profile throughout the Atlantic Provinces. It will be of special interest to schools on their Career Days, as well as part of the N.S.A.C. display at certain exhibition and county fairs.

The show entitled "Nova Scotia Agricultural College - The College with a Future", emphasises the co-educational, career-oriented programs that are available, and the innovative approach the College takes to teaching the numerous, and often highly technical agricultural

disciplines. It also makes the viewer aware that the College's graduates, and those who receive diplomas have a better than average chance of finding employment once they have left the College because of their specialization in a particular field of study.

The show's conslusion displays the various modern facilities that are available to students, with emphasis on the learning and camaraderie that exists between students themselves, and with faculty and staff. The show should certainly pique the curiousity of any student who has ever entertained the idea of becoming enrolled in the N.S.A.C.'s programme, and may even prompt those who have never considered such a career before.

### **NSAC** Lectureship

"Foods of animal origin, cholesterol and health" will be the topic at the first annual lecture under a special Nova Scotia Agricultural College Class of 1944 lectureship fund. The paper will be delivered by Dr. Germain J. Brisson who is at present a professor of nutrition at Laval University, and is also a Director of the Ph. D. programme in nutrition.

The scope of Dr. Brisson's talk will be whether the intake of cholesterol in foods is really a threat to the average healthy person. His research has led him to believe that the present cholesterol scare of increasing the chances of such illness as arteriosclerosis of the heart in the average person lacks credibility, or at least requires further analysis.

The relatively common view among many researchers and medical scientists that polyunsaturated fatty acids are better to consume than saturated fatty acids is open to question, he said. He feels strongly against any moves on the part of the federal government to make it mandatory for cholesterol levels to be printed on food item labels in an effort to influence the

Dr. Brisson strongly advocates that foods of animal origin are essential for a well-balanced diet, as long as such foods are included with a variety of other foods.

Dr. Brisson has almost 100 scientific publications to his credit, as well as being the author of two recent textbooks on human nutrition. Among his many distinctions, he has been honoured with Prix Lhermite in 1983 given by the Academie Nationale de Medecine in Paris.

Dr. H.F. MacRae, Principal of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College in Truro said, "We are fortunate to have such a distinguished and renowned scholar as Dr. Brisson as the first guest lecturer in what will hopefully become a highly anticipated annual event at the Agricultural College. Dr. brisson's comments are sure to produce some serious thinking on the subject of cholesterol consumption among those who attend the lecture.

The date of the lecture is Tuesday, February 11th, 1986 at the College's Alumni Theatre in Cumming Hall at 8:00 p.m. All are welcome
