- 1. How did the Walt Whitman Archive project team integrate Encoded Archival Description (EAD) archival descriptions with Text Encoding Initiative (TEI) transcriptions of Whitman's poetry?
- 2. How did the Walt Whitman Archive team overcome the challenge of untitled manuscripts?
- 3. How does the Walt Whitman Archive integrate digital objects into the descriptions?
- 4. What would you do differently if you were going to "rebuild" the Walt Whitman Archive? How would you "migrate" the site to a new platform?
- 5. How has the "Social Networks and Archival Context" (SNAC) Project "set the stage" for a sustainable international cooperative program for maintaining names of creators of archival material?
- 6. What standards are used in the SNAC Project? How did the SNAC team extract name information from existing EAD files?
- 7. What are some of the challenges associated with maintaining an international standards-based bank of names?
- 8. What tools do archivists create to "map" elements from descriptive standards to XML standards that are used to disseminate and exchange descriptive information?
- 9. How can the "History Research Tool" be used to support archival reference and research services? What improvements would you make?
- 10. What are some of the new approaches to archival description that Geoffrey Yeo describes? What are the advantages and disadvantages of each approach?
- 11. Can you think of other approaches to help archivists describe digital records?
