What better market place for books than *Architecture Canada* we thought?


The books have been grouped into four major sections: Design, Technical, Cities and General. At the end of each section there are additional listings of books that architects should know about.

Genius and the Mobocracy Frank Lloyd Wright; Horizon Press (in Canada Smithers & Bonellie Publishers Ltd.), 1971, 246 pp., illus., \$23.50.

This enlarged edition of Genius and the Mobocracy makes available one of the rarest of Frank Lloyd Wright's works. In it, the master architect reveals his relationship with Louis Sullivan, rebel and prophet of American architecture, with whom he began his career. There are 58 drawings and sketches by Louis Sullivan, three by Frank Lloyd Wright and 56 photographs of Sullivan's ornament and buildings. There is also a separate section containing two essays written by Sullivan on Frank Lloyd Wright and the Imperial Hotel in Japan.



The Prairie School: Frank Lloyd Wright and his Midwest Contemporaries H. Allen Brooks; University of Toronto Press, 1972, 396 pp., illus., \$25.00.

The prairie school movement derived from Louis Sullivan and was given prominence by the achievement of Frank Lloyd Wright. In tracing and assessing the professional careers of the some 20 architects who composed the school, Professor Brooks draws on much unpublished material and original documentation as well as on interviews with many of the architects — all of whom are now dead. The book is illustrated with 247 photographs, drawings, plans and diagrams.

Exterior Design in Architecture Yoshinobu Ashihara; Van Nostrand Reinhold Ltd., 1970, 144 pp., illus., \$14.50. A complete handbook by Yoshinobu Ashihara, Professor of Architecture at Hosei University, Japan, for students and professional architects on the subject of exterior design. Both the theory and practice of designing exterior space – the city plaza, the exterior of and setting for a building or group of buildings, the garden, the courtyard – are discussed. The imaginative use of illustrations and visual image examples help the reader to gain a clear picture of the field.

Buckminster Fuller, Ideas and Integrities: A Spontaneous Autobiographical Disclosure edited by Robert W. Marks; Prentice-Hall of Canada Ltd., 1963, 318 pp., illus., \$13.25. Canadians associate Buckminster Fuller with the geodesic dome he designed for Expo 67 or his recommendations to Ontario's Premier Davis for the Spadina Expressway. Now in this "spontaneous autobiographical disclosure" he reveals his most incisive ideas and his most intimate personal testaments. He describes his life, his innovative creations and his designs for the world of the future. Considered an authentic twentieth century genius, "Bucky" Fuller's vision of the world to come is sweeping, vivid, enlightening and hopeful. Illustrated with black and white photographs.

Cities

Pergamon Press is introducing a major new series of books on urban and regional planning. For nearly 40 years, Architectural Graphic Standards has been the source to which architects, builders, and draftsmen have turned for necessary information. This new edition is the result of six years of collaboration by the American Institute of Architects, 94 architectural and engineering firms, and hundreds of professionals in the building industry.



New Techniques of Architectural Rendering Helmut Jacoby; Thames and Hudson (in Canada Oxford University Press), 1971, 143 pp., 132 illus., \$20.00. In this book, which is invaluable for both the professional practitioner and the student, Helmut Jacoby displays the achievements of major architects and freelance specialists from all over the world in the field of modern architectural drawing technique. In the United States in particular, new standards were set by Frank Lloyd Wright, Mies van der Rohe and Richard Neutra. Drawings by these masters are included among the examples reproduced in the book, which ranges from the skilfully handled presentations of Otto Wagner in Vienna at the end of the last century to the ink drawings of Paul Rudolph.







Irish Houses and Castles
Desmond Guinness & William
Ryan; Thames and Hudson (in

This handsome volume will be a revelation to anyone who is unaware of the beauty and variety of Irish architecture and of its strongly individual character. The principal houses and castles are here fully described ranging in time from Beaulieu (1660) to Glenveagh (1870) and including the masterpieces of the classic period (1725-50), such as Castletown, Powerscourt, Russborough and Carton, as well as the striking castles of the Gothic revival. The photographs include fascinating illustrations of interiors, gardens, parks and follies, together with reproductions of paintings and architectural drawings.



The Victorian Country House Mark Girouard; Oxford University Press, 1971, 200 pp., 160 plates, 5 text-figures, 30 maps and plans, \$41.00.


The combination of a prosperous upper class with huge numbers of nouveaux riches made the Victorian age a boom period for country house building. The results are fascinating because of the houses' social context, their often enormous size, their technological equipment, their incredibly complex and stratified planning, and the variety of their architecture. Among much that is eccentric or unloveable are numerous houses of the highest quality. This book consists of a long introduction dealing with the social, technological, and architectural background, chapters on individual buildings and a catalogue of country houses.



The Pattern of English Building Alec Clifton-Taylor; Faber and Faber (in Canada Oxford University Press), 1971, 466 pp., 190 illus., 10 line drawings, 3 pages of maps, \$37.00 cloth, \$12.00 paper.

Alec Clifton-Taylor gives a comprehensive picture of the pattern of building over the whole of England and its distinctive regional characteristics, giving most attention to domestic rather than to ecclesiastical architecture. He concerns himself with the materials used, for example stone, slate, flint, brick, wood, plaster and other surface materials and he relates them to the geology and geography of the country. The book is lavishly illustrated with photographs and filled as well with fascinating historical detail not only on the building materials, but also on the periods and types of housing they dominated.

A History of Ottoman Architecture

Godfrey Goodwin; Thames and Hudson (in Canada Oxford University Press), 1971, 511 pp., 525 illus. including 4 colour plates, 81 plans, \$38.00.

This is the first comprehensive survey of Ottoman architecture in English. The author treats his subject chronologically and in its historical perspective, with the necessary references to Byzantine, Persian and Selçuk examples. Not only are mosques described, but also layout and functions of the schools, baths, hostels, kitchens, fountains, mausoleums and shops. Fortifications, waterworks and bridges are also considered. The final chapter is concerned with domestic architecture and the Ottoman concept of the town. Every surviving Ottoman architectural site in Turkey is illus-



Encyclopedia of Modern Architecture

edited by Gerd Hatje, introduction by Wolfgang Pehnt; Prentice-Hall of Canada Ltd., 1964, 336 pp., illus., \$7.75 paper.

Thirty-one distinguished architectural writers from 16 countries have combined to produce this unique encyclopedia of modern architecture. A lucid introduction to the birth of the modern movement prefaces the alphabetically-arranged articles. The reader can turn in a moment to concise, authoritative expositions on the basic or secondary materials used in modern construction. Contributions to modern architecture can be examined by school, country or individual architects. The great masters, Le Corbusier, Gropius, Mies van der Rohe and Wright, are the subjects of lengthy appraisals.
