Despite its precarious financial situation, the tradition of the DMJ was renewed when a much delayed Issue 23 was published in November of 1995. The DMJ has been a semiannual publication since, and this academic term marks the 10th anniversary of the re-emergence of the journal.

In honour of this milestone, the DMJ executive have come together to establish a number of new strategies to improve the quality of the publication. In making changes, we hope to reinforce the traditional role of the journal as an opportunity for medical students to publish their work. We also hope to provide an even better forum for the development of student research and involvement in medical literature.

Of note, this year we created a new online edition of the journal located at www. eDMJ.ca. This improved web version of the DMJ contains links to previous issues of the journal as well as a number of other features. These include a forum for discussion of issues relevant to medical students and medicine in Canada. Suggested topics of discussion will be posted, although comments about any aspect of health in Canada will be welcomed. All are encouraged to participate in this forum.

The DMJ is committed to a broad approach to medical literature which celebrates the diversity of medicine. As such, this issue incorporates articles relevant to a variety of disciplines. Clinical topics include psychiatry and general surgery, while basic science, public health, and political and economic influences on Canada's health care system are also addressed. Finally, as a tribute to the emphasis on the humanities in medicine at Dalhousie Medical School, a selection of poetry has been included. We hope you enjoy the read.
