

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE


APPRECIATE the opportunity, afforded by the publication of this Year Book, of sending greetings to the students, and of thanking them for their unfailing co-operation in the session now drawing to a close.

I repeat what I have said on more than one occasion, that in all her splendid past Dalhousie has never had a finer student-body than she is able to show today. My own impression in this respect is confirmed by statements made to me by some of the senior professors. We are proud of the quality of the men and women at present in the University and trust that their researches will open to them unsuspected stores of knowledge and of wisdom.

My colleagues and I confidently hope that those who are finishing their course this year will be true to the best ideals of the past, and we could ask nothing more than this from them. A novelist of the last century tells a story of an old tutor who came to the end of his part of the education of the son of a very distinguished family. As we say Godspeed to the members of the graduating classes, our last word to them is an appeal to reproduce in their own lives the spirit of their predecessors who gave Dalhousie her far-reaching reputation, and in the days to come to think of their Alma Mater with ever deepening filial regard.



Help us to search diligently for truth in the fertile places of an Open Mind, and may we direct our Thoughts, our Works and our Acts only toward Good."




THE YEAR IN REVIEW





The Orchestra and Chorus made their second full-dress appearance of the year with an able group of soloists. Of the soloists, the best were Lloyd Soper as the Judge, and Jean Parker as the Plaintiff. Mr. Soper displayed his usual excellent stage presence, and also made known the fact that besides being an actor of no mean talent, he could also sing. Miss Parker, appearing as a soloist for the second time that term, sang beautifully and made a very attractive Plaintiff. Among the other soloists who were all of a high calibre, were Roy DeYoung, Bob Smith, and Maynard Taylor. The production was the first of its kind that Dalhousie has had in a long time, and we hope it is here to stay.

Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night" was easily the outstanding success of the year, and probably of many years, a feat of which the Glee Club should feel very proud. This can be attributed not only to the invaluable services of Mr. H. Leslie Pigot, but also to the work of the really good cast Mr. Pigot chose. The production played for three nights, each one of which drew a capacity crowd.

The ablest performer, and the one who really took advantage of her lines, was Gene Machum as Viola; the part is not only the most important one in the play, but also the most difficult, and it is a great credit to the Glee Club to have so able an actress. The performance of Frank Flemming as Sir Toby, Gerry MacKay as Sir Andrew and Don Harris as Malvolio were also excellent.








The Year in Review

In athletics Dalhousie sent powerful teams in almost all branches of competition. In tennis we reached the Dominion finals, but lost to McGill at Montreal. In basketball the Tigers reached the finals in the city league, and played several intercollegiate matches. At the moment Dal teams are competing in boxing and badminton, and there are high hopes of their winning most of their fixtures. The football team did well at the beginning of the year; there has been some talk about the possibility of Canadian football being introduced next year as well as Rugby.

The D.G.A.C. has had up to date a very successful year. Girls' teams have been in successful competition in hockey, badminton, tennis and basketball. This year has seen also, under the able direction of Physical Director John MacCormack, immense improvements in the inter-faculty system.

The Glee Club has completed one of its most successful years in the memory of the students here at present. The two plays, particularly "Twelfth Night," made one realize exactly how lucky we are to have a man like Mr. H. Leslie Pigot around to direct them. The two musical shows owed a considerable debt to the hard work of Geoff Payzant with the Chorus and Frank Padmore with the Orchestra. Our congratulations go to President Gordie Hart and his executive.

The Gazette in a New and Improved eight page form contributed the customary twenty issues to the year. Editor Lomas' editorials were somewhat shorter than his predecessor's, which is a step in what historians call The Right Direction. Sports Editor Harris' attacks upon all and sundry aspects of the status quo were becoming an accepted feature, and
















even the Glee Club managed to survive the "criticisms" handed out. The Gazette, malgre lui, has become a receptacle for political arguments of a truly formidable nature, which is only one sign of the interest in things political which seems to have swept the Campus.

The University now contains at least three identified political clubs, and forums of sorts have been held between them which were very successful. The Dalhousie Mock Parliament was revived after a wartime suspension. Sodales under Jim Saunders held a very successful year; winning most of their intercollegiate debates. Dal debaters also had one of the most successful Bennett Shield series since the award's inception. The Citizens' Forum Group held a very successful year under the genial direction of Dr. Richter. The Cercle Francais has profited from the increased enrollment; more members have attended the meetings, held under the direction of Professor LaFeuille, than in former years, with Arthur Moreira bearing the "executive burdens" as President. The Cercle is indebted to Mr. and Mrs. Christie for their kind reception of the members during the second term.

Music is playing a prominent part in the Campus life; besides the concert and operetta presented by the Glee Club, the Music Club was revived under the direction of Tony Bidwell and Doug Ferguson, and held weekly meetings at Shirreff Hall. Don Warner and his Collegians have become, if anything, even better than last year; besides their regular appearances at the better dances on and off the Campus, they appeared in two Glee Club productions, and made several trips. They have become an invaluable part of the college.

A new feature towards the end of the year was the I.S.S. appeal for funds, which, Chairman Lew Miller tells us, has been highly successful. The drive featured a dance, a boys-girls hockey match, various stunts and the Campus King competition, won by Russ Lownds who was sponsored by Alexandra Hall. The drive ended with a tag day; the drive has collected at least thirteen hundred dollars, and Lew Miller is to be highly congratulated for the successful result of his hard work and good organization for such an excellent cause.

The year ended with a Munro Day unsurpassed for crowds; at least fifteen hundred students and guests assembled in the Gym for the celebrations which culminated in the crowning of the Munro Day Queen for 1947, Gene Machum. The Glee Club Show was the usual mad farce, which owes its success to the able work of Director Frank Flemming.

All things considered, the year was a very successful one. The elections showed disappointing student interest, since only about nine hundred cast ballots, but in other activities student support has been gratifying. Next year, we hope, will be at least as successful.














Health Service




Sadie Hawkin's Dance







Students' Veteran Association

The Association was formed in December, 1945, when the Students' Council called a meeting under the chairmanship of Dick Currie, to consider the advisability of forming a committee to represent Dalhousie at a National Conference of Student Veterans to be held during the Christmas Holidays of that year, in Montreal. It was decided at this time to form a permanent organization, and the following slate of officers were elected:

President—Alex H. Hart. Member-at-Large—D. Noiles. Secretary-Treasurer—T. A. Giles.

These three men represented Dalhousie Veterans at the first National Conference at which time Alex Hart became a representative of the National Executive.

A re-organization was carried out at the next meeting where it was decided that the Member-at-Large should become the Vice-President, and that three (3) standing committees should be set up. These were Housing, Finance, and General Duties. T. A. Giles resigned as Secretary-Treasurer to take over the chairmanship of the Housing Committee. N. Sinclair headed the Finance Committee, and C. Henderson Smith directed General Duties. Miss Helen Beveridge became the new Secretary-Treasurer.

At the Spring elections, 1946, this slate was re-elected with the exception of N. Sinclair who stated that he would be unable to continue. Rollie Frazee then became Finance Chairman.

Much could be written of the activities of the Housing and General Duties Committees. Through the Housing Committee, the Housing problems of many Student Veterans were solved by the acquisition of Mulgrave Park for married men and their families, and Cathedral Barracks as a residence for single men.

The General Duties Committee, besides its duties within the organization was tremendously active in securing summer employment for the members of the Association. Through the efforts of this committee, several hundred Student Veterans were assured jobs.

At the beginning of the present term Bob Mitchell was elected Vice-President, the vacancy having been created by D. Noiles' departure for Queens. At this time Miss Helen Beveridge, Bob Mitchell, and Leo MacIntyre were chosen to represent Dalhousie-Kings veterans at the Second National Conference at Montreal. Mr. MacIntyre was elected by the National Committee to succeed Mr. Hart as National Executive Member.

Most of the original executive have recently retired. In doing so they have posted a challenge. Under the leadership of T. A. Giles, the new executive will endeavour to maintain the high standard set by Alex Hart and his colleagues in their administration to the affairs and problems of Student Veterans.




























One Last Word
