




The Dalhousie Hymn

The President's Message . . .


To the Class of 1957:

When I considered what the most appropriate message from me as President might be, I could not help thinking of the impressive Oration that I heard the Right Honourable Lord MacMillan, an honourary alumnus of Dalhousie, deliver at the celebration of the Fifth Centenary of the University of Glasgow six years ago. Along with hundreds of others who were present, I felt most grateful to Lord MacMillan for concluding with a quotation from an address that Her Majesty the Queen had quite recently given at the University of Cape Town, and I avail myself of this opportunity to pass it on to you, the graduates of 1957. "The four cardinal virtues of academic life," Her Majesty said, "are honesty, courage, justice and resolve, the whole sustained upon these simplicities and profundities of faith." This statement cannot be altered or abbreviated. No single word of it can be deleted or changed without destroying a perfect delineation of an ideal not only for academic ilfe, but for the lives of all men and women who ever enjoyed extraordinary academic privileges. I want you to encounter it whenever you open your **Pharos** so that you will always remember what it means to be a son or daughter of Dalhousie.


All of us who have had the honour ofknowing you, the members of this graduating class, and of participating in any way in your education, wish you God-speed as you go forth on life's adventure.







BETTE ANN BANKS Toronto, Ont.


"Blessings on he who invented sleep But curses on he who started early rising."

CAROLINE LOUISE BENNET Halifax, N. S.








RON CLARKE Halifax, N. S.


Tomorrow to fresh woods and pastures new."


"Somewhere over the rainbow."






JOYCE MacDONALD Yarmouth, N. S.

Sandy came to Dalhousie in the year of 1953, as an Arts student. While here his interests have been scholastically in the field of languages, mainly French. His future is not yet known.




CAROL MacGILLIVRAY




DOROTHY ELIZABETH McINTOSH




MARY ELIZABETH WHITESIDE

Edmonds, Wash., U.S.A.




The usual activity programme was carried out with a few administrative changes and some new ideas but most activities being carried out as usual.




