In Memoriam



J. Stanley Bagnall

D.D.S. (Dal.), F.D.S.R.C.S. (England), F.D.S. (Edin.), F.I.C.D.


Dr. John Stanley Bagnall, Dean of the Faculty of Dentistry at Dalhousie University from 1947 to 1954, died last January at the age of 73. A native of Charlottetown, P.E.I., Dr. Bagnall came to Dalhousie in 1911 and interrupted his studies to serve with the artillery in World War I, completing his dental course in 1921.

He joined the teaching staff at Dalhousie the same year, and was promoted to professorial rank in 1929. He succeeded Dr. W. W. Woodbury as Dean of Dentistry in 1947.

Dr. Bagnall was the first Canadian to be made a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons of England. He retired from active duty as Dean in 1954, and was succeeded by Dr. J. D. McLean. The following year he was appointed Dean Emeritus of the Dental Faculty of Dalhousie.

At the 1960 spring convocation, Dalhousie again honoured Dr. Bagnall for his "distinguished service to his profession, his community, and to the university."

Dalhousie is indeed unfortunate in the loss of a man so devoted to his work and so respected by both his colleagues and his students.

The President's Message

I am glad to avail myself of this opportunity to send greetings to the members of the graduating class. I assure them on behalf of my colleagues and fellow alumni as well as myself personally, that we wish them every blessing — a word that has a far richer connotation than success as commonly understood — in the life for which their work in the University has been preparatory.

The student body in Dalhousie has trebled in size since the end of the Second World War, and relevant population statistics indicate that it will probably double again in the decade that now lies ahead. The expansion to date has made it necessary for the University administration to devote a great deal of time in the past year to the formulation of long-term policies for increases in staff, physical facilities and financial resources. The 1961-62 session may very well be significant in the story of Dalhousie for decisions of far-reaching effect on the development of the University and the direction of its movement in the next five or ten years.

I trust that the students who are now finishing their courses will continue their cordial interest as alumni in the welfare of their alma mater.






Where Are They Now

In this new section the Editors of the Pharos have looked into the activities at Dalhousie University in 1936-1937 and have herein presented several of the students active on campus at that time with a brief note on their contributions to Dalhousie, and their progress since Graduation. In addition, there is a general outline of the campus business of the year.

There are two reasons for presenting the following pages: Firstly, to point out that there is an everlasting connection between the Dalhousie Alumni and the students attending the University. Dalhousie's old graduates retain a feeling of interest with their Alma Mater, and we hope that they remember with pleasure the years spent here, "the best years of one's life." Secondly, we feel that the students presently attending Dalhousie would be interested in learning about the activities which took place in past years, activities which really have not changed radically, despite the fact that the campus and student body are ever altering. This interest, which we hope does prevail, should be stimulated by the fact that the sons and daughters of many of the members of the class of '37 are now attending this university.


The Editors of Pharos sincerely hope that they will not be accused of favouritism in picking the year 1936-37 as representative in this section above other years which may have been equally as prominent in Dalhousie history. 1937 just happened to be a quarter century from 1962.



A New Constitution

By 1937 it was felt that the constitution of Dalhousie University was inadequate, and so some major changes were made, initiated chiefly by Dr. Hugh Bell and Gordon Lea, president of the student council that year. A clear statement was made concerning the jurisdiction and the relationship between the various student body organizations. A great number of alterations were made; firstly, the name of the legislative and administrative body for the Student Body of Dalhousie University was officially to be the "Council of Students." The privileges of a Student Council card were definitely stated and the executive officers of the Council were designated as President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer. The Council of Students' Fund, collected by the business office, was placed under direct control of the Council, which it might allot as approved.

The Council was to be the only recognized medium between the student body and university authorities or the general public. No organization was to be constituted in the university without sanction of the Council. The duties of various necessary committees were stated. There was to be at least one regular meeting of the Council per month, all meetings to be conducted under parliamentary procedure. With presidential consent any student might appear before Council. Voting on business was to be conducted by majority vote, the President to hold his vote in case of a tie. Amendments required the vote of two-thirds of the members present at a meeting of the student body. Election procedures have since changed radically, but basically the constitution retains the changes made in 1937.

While Editor-in-Chief of the Pharos in 1937, I. ROY GOLD was interning at the Victoria General Hospital. After spending a couple of years as a resident in Pathology at the Jewish Hospital of Brooklyn, of which he is now Associate Attending Surgeon in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Dr. Gold did wartime service as a major in the United States Army Medical Corps and as Commanding Officer of the 5th Army Medical Lab. An interesting duty during this time was an operation performed on General Hideki Tojo, when he attempted suicide, and also involvement in the Army study of the atomic blast effects at Nagasaki, for which he received the United States Army Commendation Medal.

Dr. Gold is now in a teaching capacity with the New York Downstate Medical School, and is a Medical Director of the Metropolitan Diagnostic Institute. In 1952 he was one of the founders of the National Medical Veterans Society, and is now the National Vice-President.

HAROLD CONNOR graduated from the Dalhousie Law School in 1937, a top-notch football player, a participant in interfaculty sports, and the winner of the Smith Shield for debating, a versatile person indeed. During the war Mr. Connor spent considerable time on the North Atlantic Run on destroyers and retired from the Navy as Lieutenant. Since that time he has been very active in business rather than law, and is presently manager of Sea-Seald Division, National Sea Products Limited, president of the Eastern Canada Savings and Loan Company and vice-president of the Acadia Insurance Company. In addition, Mr. Connor was active as president of the Halifax-Dartmouth United Appeal and built it up to \$430,000 by adding a large number of charities and always exceeding the desired objective.





While at Dalhousie CLEM EGAN was very active in the Dental Society, becoming its energetic president in 1937. Now, twenty-five years later, he is still active in dental work in Fort William, Ontario, and is soon to become a grandfather! During the war Mr. Egan served in the Canadian Dental Corps in Sicily and Italy. Following the war he carried on in militia and received his E.D. Presently he is director of dentistry for Fort William and has numerous interests outside his daily occupation, including the fluoridation of communal water supplies and encouraging more students into dentistry.

SHEILA STEWART (Mrs. A. G. Gornall) was surely one of the most active girls on campus in 1937. She was president of Delta Gamma and of the girls' fraternity, Alpha Gamma Delta. She participated in sports, being on both the basketball and swimming teams for the university. Finally, she was voted life vice-president of the class of '37.

After graduating from Dalhousie with a B.A., Miss Stewart went to Toronto and studied music, obtaining an A.T.C.M. Degree in organ in 1941. The same year she married Dr. Alan G. Gornall and they now live in Toronto, where he is a professor at the University of Toronto. Raising a lively family of four has been Mrs. Gornall's main activity along with the enjoyment of her favourite hobby, figure skating.

Sports

There was in 1937 a great variety of sports for both men and women. Perhaps the major difference was found in football, for only the English rugger game was played at that time. As far as this major fall sport was concerned, it was an extremely successful season which resulted in Dalhousie's capture of the city championship. The Intermediate team also did well, reaching a play-off berth with the championship Navy team.

The basketball and hockey records were not spectacular in 1937, but the sportsmanship was always good. However, the Junior Hockey Team did succeed in capturing the Intercollegiate Halifax League title.

Two sports for men which are no longer found at Dalhousie were wrestling and boxing on the intercollegiate level.

Men and women combined in tennis to capture both the Provincial and Maritime Intercollegiate championships. As to the other racquet game, badminton, it had a busy season as well.

Girls' sports consisted of ground hockey and basketball. Ground hockey at that time was not an intercollegiate sport, games being played only against the Halifax Ladies' College and Edgehill. Against both, the 1937 team lost by small margins. There was only an intercollegiate team in the women's basketball, but for the Dalhousie girls 1937 was a successful year.



Along with GORDON THOMPSON'S graduation picture in the 1937 "Pharos" was a lengthy summary of his activities on campus. Perhaps once again it is best to sum up his work with the reasons why he was chosen for the Pharos "Hall of Fame": "because he had a major part in putting life into the new band—because he is Life President of the Senior Class—because he is President-elect of the D.A.A.C.—because he was N.F.C.U.S. representative—because he is entering law—because he won Dalhousie's most coveted award, The Malcolm Honour Prize—because he deserves it."


In 1937 Mr. Thompson graduated with a Bachelor of Commerce Degree and in 1940 left the "Hallowed Halls" of the Law Building with his LL.B. and is still a member of the Nova Scotia Bar Society. Besides being the Safety and Terminal Director and a director of Acadian Lines Limited, Mr. Thompson is connected with the Children's Aid Society of Halifax, the Maritime School of Social Work, the Welfare Council of Halifax, and is the Transportation Officer of Civil Defence for the City of Halifax, with the additional position as Second Vice-President and Chairman of the Budget Committee of the Halifax-Dartmouth United Appeal. Mr. Thompson is indeed a busy man.

J. C. ARNELL was, in 1937, one of the Associate editors of "Pharos" at Dalhousie, where he obtained his M.Sc. In 1942 Mr. Arnell was awarded a Ph.D. in physical chemistry from McGill. Following this he joined the Chemical Warfare Laboratories and also the Army for the duration of the war. Mr. Arnell, for five years, starting in 1949, was superintendent of the Defence Research Chemical Laboratories. During the first ten years after the war he was successful in research in the field of surface chemistry, which resulted in the publication of about fifteen papers. These, in turn, resulted in international recognition for Mr. Arnell, particularly in Great Britain and Europe. In 1958 Mr. Arnell was seconded to the Royal Canadian Air Force as Scientific Advisor to the Chief of the Air Staff, a position which he still holds.




After graduating from Law School in 1938, LEONARD A. KITZ worked his passage to Europe and there spent six months as a newspaper correspondent. He practised law for a year and then joined the army, having been in Italy for a lengthy period and finished as an officer on a Brigade staff.

After the war Mr. Kitz practised law and has done so to the present time. He has been Mayor of the City of Halifax for three years and ran for the Federal House.



ELWYN O. HUGHES was in 1937 president of the Dalhousie Arts and Science Society and a staff member of "Pharos." He has since obtained his M.A. (University of Western Ontario) and his Ph.D. (Ohio State). During the war he was a captain in R.C.A.M.C. He has worked for the National Research Council and was also connected with the Scientific Administration for the Atomic Energy of Canada Limited, Chalk River, Ontario. Of special interest, we think, is the fact that in 1955 Mr. Hughes was the Scientific Secretary for the first International Conference on Peaceful Uses of Atomic Energy. Then in 1958 he was secretary of the Canadian Delegation to the second U.N. Conference on Peaceful Uses of Atomic Energy. Presently Mr. Hughes is in Washington as Scientific Attaché at the Canadian Embassy and Canadian Scientific Liaison Officer at the British Commonwealth Scientific Office.

He was nominated to Dalhousie's "Hall of Fame": "because we made a mistake — because he plays hockey — because he is chairman of the Student Gymnasium Committee and because the students never had a chance to use the gym — because he is Editor-elect of the "Pharos" — because he has a smile for everyone — because he is a swell guy."

Since that time John Carroll has among other things received two M.A.'s, one in History from Dalhousie, the other in Education from Harvard.

Besides belonging to a number of worthy organizations, he is President of the Nova Scotia Headmasters and is principal of St. Patrick's High School. A very prominent and active Haligonian indeed!

HENRY B. ROSS obtained his B.Sc. from Dalhousie in 1937. During the year he was president of first year medicine, a member of the Students' Council, life Treasurer of the Class of '37, a member of the Senior Football team and also a participant in track and field. In 1942 Dr. Ross left the Forrest Campus with his M.D. and ended up in the Navy during World War II. Post-graduate work in Pediatrics took him to the Montreal Children's Hospital. Now residing in Halifax, Dr. Ross is practising as pediatrician and also has the role of associate professor of Pediatrics in Dalhousie's Faculty of Medicine.

Quoting from the Dalhousie Gazette of March 15, 1937: "Last but far from least among the students which the Gazette introduces to its readers this year is that very popular girl—MABEL MACKENZIE. A Cape Bretoner in origin and a Haligonian by adoption, Mabel combines the best characteristics of both types and made a real contribution to Dalhousie Student life." During her stay at Dalhousie, Miss MacKenzie took as prominent a part as it was possible for a girl to take in all phases of student life. She was a member of the executive of the Class of '38, a member of Students' Council, vice-president of Pi Beta Phi girls' Fraternity and Arts and Science Society vice-president. Miss MacKenzie graduated in 1937, receiving her B.Sc. and "the best wishes of her many friends at Dalhousie" went out to her.

After her marriage, Mrs. Hugh A. Chisholm moved to Vancouver, B.C., where her husband practises medicine. Besides being on the Board of Governors of Crofton House School, Mrs. Chisholm is vice-president of the W.A. to C.A.R.S. and is undoubtedly busy raising her three daughters.

No Picture Available HENRY D. HICKS is now Vice-President and Dean of Arts and Science of the University which he once attended, and from where he graduated in 1937 with a B.Sc., having previously received a B.A. in 1936 from Mount Allison. During the year 1937 he was active in intercollegiate debates and received the highest academic award, a Rhodes Scholarship to Oxford, which was put to excellent use in gaining a B.A. (Juris prudence), B.Cl. and an M.A. While there as war-time president of the Oxford University Boat Club, Mr. Hicks arranged the first wartime Oxford-Cambridge Boat Race.

A variety of careers followed Oxford, among them law, teaching and politics. It is for politics that Dean Hicks is undoubtedly best known to Nova Scotians, as he was at one time Premier of Nova Scotia.




MR. R. GRAHAM MURRAY is another Dalhousie graduate who has returned here. In 1937 he was active as debating secretary and valedictorian of the graduating class. After finishing at our Law School, he continued studies at Harvard University until 1941, gaining an LL.M. During the war, Mr. Murray joined the R.C.A.F. as an airman and still retains force connections here instructing Officer Cadets from across Canada each season in Air Force Law. After the war, he had his own Law firm in Halifax. Later, he became very active in community planning, and is also interested in politics. Mr. Murray joined the staff of the Dalhousie Law School in 1950.



After receiving an M.A. in History in 1949 from Dalhousie, MISS GENE MORISON continued graduate work in Education at Harvard Summer School. During the time between 1956-58 Miss Morison was the first woman President of Nova Scotia Teachers Union, and then in 1958 she became President of the Canadian Teachers Federation, which she represented first in 1957 at Frankfurt, and in 1960 at Amsterdam, at the World Conference of the Teaching Profession. Again of interest is the fact that Miss Morison was one of a three-member delegation on a study tour of the Soviet Educational System, as guests of the Union of Educational and Scientific Workers of the Soviet Union. Presently, Miss Morison is History teacher at Queen Elizabeth High School in Halifax, and a member of the Advisory Council on Teacher Education.



N.F.C.U.S.

The main objective of the Dalhousie N.F.C.U.S. Committee this year was to try and make the students more aware of their federation. For this reason a great deal of publicity was given to the activities that N.F.C.U.S. sponsors, such as scholarship plans, national and regional seminars, travel services, the student discount service, student life insurance, and many other activities.

Three Dalhousie students attended the twenty-fifth National Congress at Queen's University, and we had five delegates at the Fourth National Seminar at McMaster University.

The annual Dalhousie Model Parliament took place on the evenings of March 6, 7, with Dr. J. H. Aitchison presiding as Speaker.

The Speech from the Throne was read by the Governor-General, Dr. Henry D. Hicks.

The Progressive Conservative Party, led by Paul Murphy, formed the government and held twenty-five seats, while the New Democratic Party with eighteen seats and the Liberals with seventeen seats formed the opposition.

The only legislation to pass the House was a Liberal resolution calling for Canada's entry into the European Common Market. Other legislation dealing with Nuclear Arms and an Economic Planning Board was defeated.

The New Democratic Party replaced the government during the second session, only to suffer a similar fate before dissolution.



University Naval Training Division

The University Naval Training Division (Halifax Universities and Colleges) is one of twenty-four such divisions across Canada. The local contingent consists of Dalhousie, Kings, Saint Mary's and the Nova Scotia Technical College, under the capable command of Lt. R. L. Vatcher, R.C.N.(R.), an engineering professor at Dalhousie.

During the academic year, training is carried out one night a week at *H.M.C.S. Scotian*, *Stadacona*. The real training, however, is during the summer for a period of three or four months on one of the two coasts, where the cadets are given a comprehensive program covering training in leadership, navigation, seamanship, engineering, supply and accounting, and communications. The high point of the year is a month at sea, which takes the cadets to such places as Bermuda, Puerto Rica, Jamaica, eastern U.S. ports, Iceland, Green-

land, places of interest on the Great Lakes as well as similar ports of call on the West Coast.

Regular Officer Training Plan cadets who train with U.N.T.D. cadets during the winter months visit places like Hawaii, China and Japan during the summer months.

During the academic year, cadets receive half a day's pay for each drill attended, and the full-time pay each summer is \$225.00 a month, with room and board, uniforms, medical and dental treatment, and other benefits.

Service as a cadet continues for three years, at which time there is a promotion to the rank of acting Sub-Lieutenant. Confirmation of this rank is when a degree is obtained or at a level three years after senior matriculation.

University Reserve Training Plan

The Royal Canadian Air Force has two training plans for university students. R.O.T.P. is a career plan featuring complete subsidization of the student's university degree for those who have plans to stay in the service. U.R.T.P. is a form of summer employment and training for students who do not plan to make the Air Force their career.

The term of training generally consists of four winters and three summers. All cadets, except those R.O.T.P. cadets at service colleges, go to Station Centralia in Ontario for five weeks of basic training in drill, general service knowledge, weapons, current affairs, and other allied subjects. After basic training, cadets take training in their respective branches.

There are two types of branch training, contact and course. In general, non-technical cadets go on contact training. This consists of "learning the job on the job."

Course training consists of attending courses to learn the branch by formal training.

The branches open to cadets include Armament Engineering, Construction Engineering, Telecommunication, Administration, Food Services, Supply, Public Relations, Flying Control, and many others.

The winter syllabus is composed of lectures on a variety of subjects of general significance to future officers. There are several social functions, including the Tri-Service Ball held in conjunction with the Army and Navy.

The cadet training plans provide a two-fold advantage. While giving selected students a secure way of putting themselves through university, it produces trained reserve or career officers for future service in the Air Force.

Canadian Officers Training Corps

The Dal/Kings Canadian Officers Training Corps Contingent and the University Regular Officers Training Plan, numbering about thirty in all, experienced their most active year of theoretical training in recent Dalhousie history. University Support Officer, Captain G. Ruffee, remained, but the unit welcomed a new Commanding Officer, Captain G. C. Milligan, Dalhousie geology professor, and new Contingent Officers, Captain Bruce Irwin, Director of Alumni Affairs at Dalhousie, and Lieutenant Reid Morden.

Training by lecture and film has included courses on National Survival, army organization and principles of tactics. Officer cadets in the first two phases of training will proceed to the corps schools of their choice across Canada for their practical training in the summer. Second lieutenants in the third phase go to regular army units either in Canada or with the Fourth Canadian Infantry Brigade Group in Germany to complete their C.O.T.C. training this summer.

Varsity Hockey

Dalhousie hockey Tigers won their first hockey title in many a year, in 1961-62, when they captured the championship of the newly-formed Atlantic Hockey Conference. The league consisted of St. Mary's, Nova Scotia Tech, Stadacona, and Shearwater, and was formed in the fall of 1961. Dalhousie decided to go into the league and drop out of the M.I.A.U.-sanctioned N.S. Intercollegiate League for "personal" reasons.

After winning the championship, the Tigers took on the newly-crowned Maritime Intercollegiate champs, U.N.B. Red Devils, on Munro Day. The Red Devils were fresh from a close series with St. F.X. In this one, Dal played her best game of the year (excepting the A.H.C. title win) and won 7-5. This win was more satisfying to the fans who wondered all year how their charges would fare against the top Intercollegiate squad.

The Tiger roster was star-studded. Goaltender George MacDonald was the best puck-stopper in the A.H.C., allowing 3.12 goals a game. Bob Ferguson was the "Doug Harvey" of the Dal defensive corps, playing tirelessly in his regular turn, on power plays and in penalty-killing roles. Gene Scheibel, captain of this year's team, inspired his mates with his all-out play. Roy Velemirovich, Bullet Kelly, and Ernie Paige ably rounded out the defence, as did spot players Dave Gardner and Pete Corkum.

Coach DeWitt Dargie came up with three sets of offensive units at the start of the year. The first line of Bill Buntain, Vaughn Briggs and Frank Sim carried the burden of the scoring all season with the three finishing with a total of 34 points. Buntain and Sim were extremely effective in penalty-killing roles throughout the campaign, and Briggs consistently dug the puck out of the corner for his linemates.

The second line of Eric Parsons, Don Bauld and Wayne Keddy provided needed scoring punch in the late stages of the season. Parsons, a fighter all year, was third in the scoring race. Bauld, as is his custom, never stopped digging, and Keddy exhibited his old form around the net in the playoffs.

The third trio of John MacKeigan, Steve Brown and Dave Cameron were primarily a checking unit and gave the first two lines the breathers they needed.

To coach Dargie and his able managers, Jerry Blumenthal and Abe Bartlett, to minor officials Irv Sherman and Fred Chisholm, and to the fans the season was a satisfying one. This was the only major sport in which the Dal supporters had a chance to cheer. It showed that with a winning team, Dal fans weren't apathetic. Thanks to the hockey team for a bright spot in a long athletic year.





This year Dalhousie's basketball team played in two leagues: the City Senior "B" League and the Nova Scotia Intercollegiate League.


