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

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STDs Still a Threat to Student Bodies

Last week, The Gazette sent two writers on the honorable all Dalhousie Residence Advisors general STD information decisions while out with friends, at a party or even with a quest of discovering the "truth" about safe sex. While on their journey, Elizabeth Hallett and Josh Visser interviewed many Dalhousie students, cited Health Canada, spoke with Dalhousie Health Centre staff and even explored the fascinating online world of custom-made condoms. STD awareness, they found, is still a very murky issue amongst students.

"I've slept with 43 chicks, and I only used a condom with like three or four of them, and I haven't gotten anything," says Adam, a fourth-year arts student. This is a shocking statement considering the amount of resources the Canadian Public Education system has put into sex education in schools, not to mention that any fan of Degrassi Junior High knows the dangers of unprotected sexual activity thanks to Spike.

Adam is not, however, an isolated case: many other Dalhousie students have admitted to rarely using condoms during sex. Samantha, a first-year commerce student says she doesn't always have protected sex. "I'm not really sure how to bring it up, and if he doesn't pull out a condom, I don't say anything," she says. "I do get tested, though."

This idea that many students practice unsafe sex but still feel safe because they get tested once a year-a reactive rather then a preventative method of STD control—is a grim scenario to contemplate.

It is safe to say that Adam and Samantha represent a lucky minority when it comes to emerging from unprotected sexual adventures unscathed. Consider the case of Sarah, a fourthyear science student who found out she had chlamydia despite only having had two partners.

University students are a unique demographic of the Canadian population. While amongst the most privileged and highly educated ranks of Canadian society, youth pursuing postsecondary education continue to act ignorantly and fail to protect themselves when having sexual relations. According to Health Canada, students ranging from the ages of 19 to 24 in Canada are among the largest percentage of infected individuals in Canada as compared with all other age groupings.

Several surveys done by Health Canada paint a shocking portrait of STD incurrence in university students across the country. For example, one in every 10 females between 19 and 24 years of age has contracted the genital form of chlamydia a percentage that works out to over 1,300 women just here at Dalhousie. That's the equivalent of all the first-year students taking Psychology at Dalhousie.

Chlamydia is curable, but it can lead to permanent damage to the reproductive system, potentially decreasing ones ability to have children later in life.

And although it is one of the least harmful of all sexually transmitted infections, chlamydia is only one of many diseases that university health centers been trying to prevent over the years. The Dalhousie University Health Centre says it receives a large number of students each and every year who feel they may have contracted, or given, an STD to their partner or someone they have recently had intercourse with. Derrick Enslow, the Health Centre's Health Educator, says there is no better prevention against STDs than abstinence, reflecting sentiments expressed by high school and public school health educators all across North America. But when a student does choose to have sex, he says, one can never be too careful.

To combat the apparent lack of STD knowledge amongst university students, Enslow says the Health Centre teaches

so they can give brief and educational lectures on safe sex practices and condom usage direction to first-year students. Any students who remember disgusting pictures of diseases such as gonorrhea and syphilis shown in first year have seen the Health Centre's work first hand. The purpose of those graphic representations is to literally scare students into using

Attendance at these meetings is voluntary, however, so few students often actually show up. Enslow says that information on STDs is available from the Health Centre upon request, and that that his department is working on creating monthly educational seminars for the greater Dalhousie community when specific sexuality issues are raised. A group of students in the School of Health and Human Performance are even currently working on a needs assessment and programming plan for sex education that would be student focused and based on a peer education model.

But as important as all of these programs are, students may still be too embarrassed to bring up the issue of sexual health with potential partners.

So how can students educate themselves without suffering the embarrassment of picking up pamphlets or asking their doctors?

One solution is the Internet: cyberspace carries a large number of websites that are dedicated to education on prevention of transmission and promotion of safe sex. Case in point: www.sexualityandu.ca, a youth-oriented website that contains a wealth of information pertaining to prevention and promotion of sexual health. There are also several amusing virtual scenarios that can help guide you when making sexual

As far as STD prevention is concerned, Enslow says that students not abstaining from sex should definitely use condoms for intercourse, whether it is vaginal or anal. For students who cite condom sizes, shapes and textures as excuses not to use protection, www.condomania.com offers a "condom wizard" that can help students find condoms just right for them and their loved (for tonight anyway) ones. Categories on the wizard include condom sensitivity, texture, flavour and shape.

And if the man in your life claims he is just "far too big" to fit into a jimmy, Condomania's personal sizing kits allow users to order tailor made condoms to fit exact measurements.

Other tips Enslow has for sexually active students: when participating in oral sex, he says, "the guy should definitely wear a condom, and for the vagina, women and men should invest in a dental dam." When it comes to digital stimulationand this is not referring to cyber sex-Enslow recommends surgical gloves.

After all, Brad Pitt looked sexy in a pair of rubber gloves, didn't

Enslow says that while safety measures such as surgical gloves for masturbation may seem a bit drastic, they are necessary in today's sexual playing field.

Many Dalhousie students say being persistent in asking your partner to be tested is the best way to be sure of an STDfree relationship. One night (or 30 seconds) of raging passion is obviously not worth a lifetime of misery and discoloured genitals. And as Ezekiel, a second-year management student, so eloquently put it, "by this age, you have to be a fucking moron not to practice safe sex."





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Understanding Ecstasy

Over the last 10 years or so, ecstasy—also known as MDMA—has become an increasingly popular recreational drug. While public interest and media attention regarding ecstasy has been abundant—mainly due to the drug's rapid emergence and increase in use among youth, typically at raves—scientific study and understanding of the drug's effects have lagged behind. Without a solid understanding of ecstasy's potential negative effects, media portrayal of the drug has been mostly speculative: the drug has even been likened to the "reefer madness" of the mid-20th century, when marijuana was stigmatized without scientific backing.


HOW IT WORKS

Ecstasy increases levels of seratonin—the same neurotransmitter increased by anti-depressants such as Prozac—in the brain. Whereas anti-depressants seek to return serotonin levels to normal and reestablish emotional balance in depression, ecstasy works the brain machinery overtime to produce abnormally high serotonin levels and feelings of euphoria, confidence and enhanced sensory perception. Ecstasy also produces its effects, in part, by increasing levels of dopamine, the transmitter involved in the effects of cocaine.

EFFECTS OF USAGE

In the short term, ecstasy users experience a crash, or "midweek blues" period after the positive effects wear off, often leading to lowered mood or depression as the overworked serotonin system recovers from being strained. In the long term, there is abundant evidence that moderate to heavy use of ecstasy can cause long-lasting damage to serotonin systems and result in decreased serotonin production. But whether this damage is permanent or can be somewhat reversed still remains unclear.

In addition, moderate to heavy ecstasy use has been linked to persistent depression (unsurprising, given long-lasting damage to serotonin systems) and deficits in memory and other cognitive functions. Anxiety, aggression and many



other behaviours are also regulated by serotonin and may be affected, but this is not yet clear. Research into such psychological effects are complicated by issues such as multiple drug use and causality (i.e. did ecstasy use lead to depression, or vice versa?).

ECSTASY IN THE MEDIA

One of the highest profile studies on ecstasy's effects appeared in the prestigious journal Science in 2002. The authors reported that primates given recreational doses of ecstasy (that is, amounts similar to those taken by the typical human user over the course of a night) suffered severe dopaminergic neurotoxicity—death of dopamine neurons. They concluded from this that ecstasy users are at risk to develop Parkinson's disease later in life (Parkinson's results from the death of dopamine neurons).

Amazingly, the study was retracted a year later, the researchers having mixed up bottles and given most of the animals the wrong drug. This resulted in attention-grabbing headlines, such as "Your Brain on Bad Science" (L.A. Weekly) and "'Killer' Drug Claim was False" (BBC). While this specific report was shown to have no merit, it would be unwise to assume from

one botched study—and the media's reaction to it—that the drug is perfectly safe. After all, the most significant effect, damage to serotonin neurons, is well documented and may be permanent.

BUT IS IT SAFE TO USE?

The best advice possible might be to think critically about reports in the popular media and, when possible, look beyond them to the science itself. The risks, as much as they are known, should be assessed carefully. According to Jennifer Stamp, a professor in the psychology department, "What strikes me is not that people are uninformed about the neurotoxic effects of ecstasy, rather that they choose to disregard it."

No one knows the complete story of ecstasy's long-term effects, simply because the drug hasn't been commonly used long enough. Scientists will only begin to answer these questions with certainty as recent and current ecstasy users age. Therefore, only one thing can be said for certain regarding ecstasy use and long-term consequences: those that use ecstasy now are doing no less than participating in the most important long-term ecstasy study of all.

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Dal Smoking Ban Not Being Enforced Examining Week 20 of Canada's first campus-wide ban

Aaron Clarke smokes a du Maurier king-size cigarette as he leans against a bike rack outside the front doors of the FASS building. Dozens of blackened butts are smeared and scattered below his feet. "I have always smoked on campus," he said, taking a drag of his cigarette.

As of September 2003, Dalhousie has strictly prohibited smoking on all university-owned property and grounds, in student residences and in all university vehicles. But Clarke doesn't think this ban is a reality. "I have yet to have anyone really enforce the ban," said Clarke. "Once, I saw a person say, 'would you mind stepping three steps this way onto municipal property?' And that's all it is, about three steps."

But William Louch, director of Dalhousie's Environmental Health and Safety committee, says he thinks students are adhering to smoking rules. Louch's committee was responsible for performing a survey last January that asked students, faculty and staff if a property-wide smoking ban would be desirable. 82 per cent of 1,036 respondents were in favour of the ban. Louch also sat on the implementation committee, which identified various application issues, such as enforcement of the smoking ban.

Louch says Dal's safety office, on behalf of the Environmental

Health and Safety Committee, performed a survey last November that found 80 per cent of smokers were complying with the ban, proving students took it seriously. He also says the implementation committee has petitioned Dal security to ask remaining violators to smoke off campus as they go about their duties. Dal security was unavailable for comment.

But DSU President Kevin Wasko disagrees, saying the committee "rushed" into implementing the ban. "Enforcement has been pretty slack," he said. "It is especially a concern with students in residence. There have been people from Howe hall who had to go out into the street [to smoke], and that caused some noise problems there."

"The ban will turn into a farce if people feel that they can smoke and never receive a penalty for violating it," he said.

Aaron Clarke, meanwhile, says he thinks the nook outside the FASS should be a designated smoking area. "I'm not blocking the flow of traffic in between classes," he said, "and when I'm smoking, the smoke is not going directly into everybody's face."

But making the FASS entrance a designated smoking area would conflict with the Halifax Regional Municipality's 1999

decision to outlaw smoking within five meters of building entrances—a decision that applies to all buildings in the city, not just those on university campuses.

The University of King's College allows students to smoke on campus but adheres to HRM 's law. King's president William Baker says the city's law is difficult to enforce, even though the university allows on-campus smoking. "We're starting to have to shoo people away, and the smokers will go elsewhere temporarily and then they'll come back again," he said.

Benjamin Woodford, a Dal political science student, says Dalhousie should be doing a better job in enforcing the ban. "We need some kind of system in place to let people know that the school is not going to tolerate disrespect for the rules," he said. "It's a little hypocritical to boast about being a smokefree university but at the same time have people smoking all over campus."

But some students say smokers, not the school, should be responsible for keeping smoking off campus. "Smokers should follow the rules that the school has put in place," said Emily MacGowan, a first-year Bachelor of Science student. "And those that aren't are being disrespectful."

Dalhousie Supports Day of Action

This Day of Action, being held February 4, is meant to raise community awareness about tuition fees in Nova Scotia, which have increased by \$2,513 in the last 10 years. But in contrast to previous years, this year's Day of Action will be characterized by a quiet march from the SUB to the legislature downtown supporting tuition reduction, not tuition freezes.

Students unaware of the day's importance or the politics behind Dalhousie's decision to support the march this year may have nevertheless seen Day of Action posters put up around campus. The Day is promoted by the Canadian Federation of Students, a federal tuition lobby group of which the Dalhousie Student Union is not a member.

Dal instead lends its financial and moral support to the Canadian Alliance of Students Association (CASA), a lobby group similar to CFS. Dal's allegiance to CASA, often seen as a competitor to CFS, has not stopped the DSU from supporting the Day of Action in the past.

Traditionally, the Day of Action is focused on lobbying for tuition freezes, but this year's mandate concerns tuition reduction rather than freezing. The CFS says a freeze at the current level of tuition would not accomplish anything, because it is too high.

Each year, the DSU council hold a vote deciding whether the union will support the Day of Action. But the DSU doesn't

support tuition freezes, said DSU president Kevin Wasko.

Two years ago, the DSU supported the march, and a group of students occupied the Royal Bank, hassled the staff about student loans and held up business. In turn, Dalhousie revoked its support for the march last year because it felt the sit in delivered the wrong message.

"The DSU does not support a tuition freeze or reduction because it puts the university in a difficult situation when setting the budget. Their costs will increase due to inflation and other factors," Wasko said. "If they were unable to increase tuition, this would result in a poorer quality of education."


"Tuition fees are inevitable, but not at such an alarming rate," he said.

The pragmatic approach of CASA, the Dal supported association, means it is somewhat less confrontational than CFS, which often stages demonstrations and marches. CASA promotes diplomatic lobbying, meetings with councilors and quieter protests. If there is a rally promoting a tuition freeze, the DSU will not support it.

Only one DSU councilor opposed supporting the

Day of Action at this year's vote. The councilor cited the same reasons given last year when it came to not supporting the Day: if the march gets out of hand, it could send the wrong message.

According to CFS, 70 per cent of Nova Scotian students who did not pursue post-secondary education did so because of financial constraints.







The Sexual Divide

I have always shied away from directly applying something I've learned at school to my writing at this paper. To me, it always felt like cheating by trying to kill two birds-schoolwork and extracurricular work—with one stone. But recent news stories have made me apply my scholarly knowledge to reality.

I spent a good deal of time this past term studying the notion of the separate spheres. The separate spheres ideology rests on the idea that men should inhabit the public sphere of society (business, government etc.), while women should only inhabit the private sphere (the household, the domestic front etc.). During Victorian times and through much of the last century this notion was front and centre. But this made me wonder: to what extent does the separate spheres ideology still exist today? And, in the past 150 years, has the division of labour between men and women really fundamentally changed?

This connection between past and present was sparked with the recent announcement that Belinda Stronach will compete for the leadership of the newly merged Conservative Party of Canada. Stronach, the young and attractive former CEO, has entered the race against Stephen Harper with a formidable weapon—daddy's inheritance money. But the road ahead will be difficult for Stronach as she enters further into one of the last boy's clubs in our society—federal politics.

Despite major progression by women in all other facets of public life, national politics are still very much a realm dominated by old, white men. In many ways, the parliament buildings are like a "boys only" tree house. And similarly, our federal political system confirms the idea of separate spheres for men and women.

Of course, there are many prominent women within the federal government. However, only 21 per cent of the MPs in Ottawa are women. Furthermore, the opportunity for mobility to the highest governmental post-prime minister-is very slim. Kim Campbell may have held the office briefly, but her party, not the general public, voted her in.

Sheila Copps may have run against Paul Martin for the Liberal leadership and the position of PM in recent months, but she was never remotely in the race. (Though in terms of Shelia Copps, her not getting elected had nothing to do with the fact that she was a woman-it had only to do with her natural ability to fritter away public money.) And let's not forget that it was only in 1989 that Audrey McLaughlin became the first female leader of a federal party with the NDP.

Stronach, who has gained more headlines because of her good looks than her suggestions for policy reform, is approaching similar territory. She may grab the party leadership position, but her chances of overthrowing the political force known as Paul Martin are measured with negative numbers.

But why is this? Firstly, Paul Martin has been preparing for this election for the better part of a decade and therefore provides a formidable foe. Secondly, in the case of Stronach, her not getting elected will have as much to do with her strong competition as it will with her being of the opposite gender of those who dominate the scene.

One Tory, as quoted by

Don Martin, has gone as far to say that, "she reminds me of a primitive tribesperson who has been recently converted to Christianity. She sings all the hymns, but doesn't know the meaning of the words." Ouch. But is this criticism justified because of her political inexperience, or is it unfairly based on. Stronach's gender?

A recent story from Ottawa would suggest the latter. Last week, flyers were distributed around parliament hill advertising Stronach as "Parliament Hill Barbie." Apparently, a doll of her likeness is sold with "a Rolex, Daddy's Chequebook and Policy (Sold Separately) and featured campaign slogans such as "Can I, like, fire voters?" Such harsh and unnecessary attacks leave little doubt that the very idea of Stronach in power makes some very uncomfortable. Smart, powerful, wealthy and a woman-this is far more than many backward Canadians will be able to tolerate.


In short, Belinda Stronach's reception within the federal political realm indicates that although women have broken down many, or most, walls, some of the biggest and most important still lay ahead.

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Velvet's Empire

Last month, I had the pleasure of speaking with Velvet Steel. Velvet is warm and welcoming, and with a background like hers, there was plenty to discuss.

I was first exposed to Velvet several years ago through Showcase's documentary series Kink. Produced by Paperny Films, Kink is a 13-part series that looks at some of the racier aspects of human sexuality. With a uniquely Canadian focus, Kink has explored fetish communities in Vancouver and Toronto, with a third season in Montreal slated for release. Velvet was a regular subject during the first season, when the Vancouver scene was explored.

But who is Velvet Steel? Velvet's titles are numerous. Velvet is a post-operative, male-to-female (MTF) transsexual. She is married and currently lives in Vancouver. Apart from her home life, Velvet is an accomplished and successful woman. She is a professional hairstylist and co-owner of the Gastown Hair Shoppe in Vancouver. Active in the fetish community, Velvet works as a professional dominatrix and organizer for BDSM events. Finally, Velvet acts as an advocate and educator in both the fetish and non-fetish communities.

As mentioned, Velvet appeared in the series Kink. Acting as a vessel of understanding between her community and the Canadian public, Velvet allowed cameras to follow her at work, at home and at fetish events around town. Not only were many Canadians exposed to a transsexual individual for the first time, they also were exposed to the fetish community as a whole. Her experiences on television allowed interested individuals to find their way to the fetish community, and reassured them that they were not alone.

Velvet earned the right to be on Kink because of her tremendous popularity in the Vancouver scene. Velvet organizes one of Vancouver's largest fetish balls, the Body Perve Social Club. As Velvet describes it, "it is a venue where people can come in, have a drink. Play is encouraged, and a strict dress code is enforced." The dress code prescribes everything from latex nurse's uniforms, to leather chaps, to slaves in collars with their leather clad masters. Although it is an area for fetish play, specific legislation defines what play means. According to Velvet "we can't have exposed genitals, no penetration of any kind." Velvet also tells me that they have a special area for body piercing related fetishes.

Velvet is also an entrepreneur. She co-operates a salon with Rosamond Scott-Crawford, another Vancouver area MTF transsexual. One of the things that Velvet made very clear was that she has never depended on social programs. She has relied on her own resources. Velvet says that "transsexuals use their transsexuality as a clutch for social programs. They say how difficult their life is, but it doesn't have to be that way. My salon affords me security, but I have to work for it just like everybody else. I have to get up in the morning, get ready, exercise, go to work, just like any average person."

Velvet's endeavors as a professional dominatrix bring her a wide range of clients. Velvet says that as a dominatrix she has learned a great deal from men about male sexuality and social gender roles. Domination and submission enter a unique

> area of the human experience, an arena of physiological and some of the most carnal forms of human expression. We argue that our society is male dominated, and women are inferior. Velvet's experiences allow her to see things

in completely the opposite manner.

Finally, Velvet is an educator and advocate. After being physically attacked in September 2002, Velvet co-founded West Enders Against Violence Everywhere (WEAVE). The group started after several victims of violence sought positive results from their own experiences. Not only were people fed up with the violence, but they also felt that they were not being taken seriously by local police forces, and that their complaints were being ignored.

The group has administered surveys and collected reports from individuals that have been assaulted and/or battered in the local area. The mission of WEAVE is to present this issue to the local community, and draw attention from police forces and city politicians. This mobilization of people has caused the situation to improve and be taken more seriously by city authorities. In addition to WEAVE, Velvet is also a speaker at university campuses. She speaks to human sexuality classes about her experiences to offer a first-hand look at the life of a MTF transsexual.

Velvet also took the time to share some issues that are facing the transsexual community. A growing problem has been the treatment of transsexuals trying to cross the border. According to Velvet, customs authorities have been informed to look for terrorists that may disguise themselves as transsexuals. This has made it even more difficult to travel internationally as a transsexual individual. However, Velvet notes that the scene in Canada is comparable to that in Europe. Together, they are ahead of the United States in terms of social progress towards accepting transgender lifestyles.

Velvet leads her life the way she wants to. She is unapologetic about her character. If people don't have anything kind to say, she does not want them to be a part of her experience. Velvet is a beacon for both the transsexual and BDSM community. Here's to you, Mistress Steel!



It's widely accepted that red wine is a key ingredient for romantic nights because it induces relaxation and euphoria. It may simply be intoxication, but a commonly-held belief is that wine is one of many aphrodisiacs.



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








Finding Calm at the Centre of Things

Labyrinths are also tools for meditation in ancient religious practices. Dalhousie United Church Chaplain Martha Martin has recently set up a walking labyrinth on campus at the Edward Street Chaplaincy for students, faculty and community members alike.

When I arrived at the Chaplaincy, two women had just finished walking the labyrinth. They were in a bit of a hurry for an interview, but said they wanted to go on the record as being "satisfied customers."

The labyrinth is printed up on two blue tarps, which fill the length of the Chaplaincy's prayer and mediation room. The labyrinth circuit is traced out in black, and has a smooth shape like a scallop-shell. It's modeled on the labyrinth of Chartres Cathedral in France. Candles stand on each corner of the labyrinth and in the center; the blinds in the room are drawn, and only a sliver of midday light glares off of the tarpaulin labyrinth. A stereo set up in the corner plays calming ambient sounds-

The difference between mazes and labyrinths is that in a maze you can get lost. A labyrinth only has one path which leads-in long twists and loops-to the middle.

"A maze tickles the logical mind," says Martin "with a labyrinth, however, the only decision required is to step inside."

This is the third labyrinth Chaplain Martin has constructed. The first, and most prototypical was made at the St. Johns United Parish. The second was at Mount St. Vincent, where Martin also serves as university Chaplain. Though it has only been around for a few weeks, people are already starting to take interest in the labyrinth, and Martin hopes students will take advantage of the resource. 


"We've played well the last three games. I've told the guys we're going in the right direction. Tonight we got the bounces, and a few guys who weren't scoring found the back of the net."

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

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

Canada's official summer sport is lacrosse. That's right, it's not baseball or soccer, not any other sport that one might associate with being a Canuck, but lacrosse. Just what the heck is this funny game where they run around with balls and sticks and whack each other? Read on.

Lacrosse, or lax, as it is called by those in the know, is very old—older than your great great-great-great-great-grandma. It dates back to the 1400's when it was played by native North Americans. Teams had up to 500 people and goals that could be a mile wide, so you would have to be in great shape just to make one save. Can you imagine running half a click only to let the ball go through your five hole? Not only that, but games would last from sunrise to sunset, often for two or three days. Things changed in 1867, when W. George Beers (yes that is his real last name) came up with the rules we know today.

Goals are scored by throwing the ball past the goalie into a four-foot-high net, but the trick is there is a 30-second shot clock. A major change is that you are allowed to whack the player's stick or his gloves as much as you want. You can also cross-check other players' bodies as long as you do not use "excessive force." Athletes Of The Week




Jennifer Payne, Track & Field

 3. Soccer moms. Their husbands neglect them, but they love horseback riding... bareback...possibly leading to equestrian fellatio.



Anyway people, be considerate—if you start blowing a horse, don't stop till he's done. That's just plain manners.




