
The department advises that students who encounter Chim-Chim call authorities and their friends, then approach him with caution.



Dal fighting debt with alchemy

In response to tuition freezes, a global economic crisis and a shrinking endowment, Dalhousie University has announced a new, comprehensive plan to increase university revenues.

"Alchemy is back, baby!" declared a disturbingly enthusiastic university President Tom Traves at a recent meeting of the Dal board of governors.

The new plan calls for an interdisciplinary alchemy programme to be divided between the chemistry department and the Master's of Business Administration (MBA) programme.

able compared to some other Nova Scotia universities' financial refurbishing plans.

"Saint Mary's is harvesting organs for God's sake," he says.

As controversial as it may be, the alchemy program represents a new beginning for Dal. It allows the MBA programme to move away from the wildly unsuccessful "Straight to the Juicy" recruitment strategy, while simultaneously allowing the chemistry department to distance themselves

from their "Radium for All" campaign.

Whether or not the program proves to yield positive results, the announcement of its inclusion in the curriculum has already created a jump in revenue. In response, Dal has received increased donor support from the Flat Earth Society, the North American Warlock Council, The Royal Society for the Preservation of the Arcane Arts and a private donation from prominent Canadian author Margaret Atwood.

MBAs plan bleak future for students

Dal pres describes move as 'excellent'

As a final project this year, Dalhousie's Master's of Business Administration (MBA) students sold away all Dal students' futures. The stated goal of the project was to "sap the colour from students dreams, leaving them cold and grey," a paradigm in education that has been building for several years.

The project, a joint venture with the Faculty of Management, Dalhousie's administration and the Dalhousie Student Union, was developed so that the students could understand how to sell away people's futures when they begin working for banks, oil companies and the government. The project was designed as a think-tank scheme for breaking down the wills of students, and was documented in a group report entitled "Futures Without Borders: So We Can Go In and Usurp Them."


"We thought it was really the best way for them to get a handle on what it means to crush the lives and dreams of people slowly, which is really the best way to do it," said Donald Goldharp, the faculty member in charge of overseeing the project, told reporters.

"It's the sort of process where you plant seeds and watch the pain and misery grow slowly, like a winter orchid. We believe in sustainability, and crushed dreams are very sustainable." As part of this project, MBA students worked with the university on decisions like the sale of Fenwick towers, so that students could no longer rely on stable and reasonably priced housing. This would force students out to the city and into ghetto housing projects, allowing rent prices in the city to rise to choking levels.

"We felt that this would really demoralize them — and also help to abuse the rents of other people who aren't even in school — this is the type of effective future-destroying synergy we were looking trying to create," the report indicated. The report did acknowledge that Fenwick was already being used to crush student's spirits with its lackluster accommodations that it said was "similar to a slum in 1950s Communist Ukraine"

The report also discussed how exclusivity contracts with Pepsi, Sodexo and Aramark would train students not to get used to change. "People are too rewarded by food options," said Dalhousie president Tom Traves. "Normally competition is good in a market, but at this stage in their lives — becoming adults — the students need to have their wills broken down," he cackled evilly. "This is preparatory work for their careers as subservient drones. This is an excellent move."


The university so far has been supporting many of the MBA students' recommendations.

Local environmentalists get behind seal hunt

Halifax environmental advocates representing the Western Hemisphere Institute for Neutral Environmental Resources (WHINER) have made a dramatic policy shift this week concerning the annual seal hunt.

Halifax WHINER representatives are now taking a distinctly pro-hunt stance, following a report published by the Centre for Useful Natural Technology (CUNT). The report, the final product of a six-year survey conducted by leading CUNT scientists, concluded that baby seals are responsible for 41 per cent of all Arctic green house gas emissions. The final recommendation of the report suggested that a baby seal cull could significantly reduce the rate at which the ice caps appear to be melting.

"Needless to say, I was shocked," says WHINER President Ray Finckle. "Not having a job, I've had a lot of time to consider the findings of the report, and they are sound as a pound."

Finckle's commentary reflects the reaction of the environmental community as a whole. "At first we were against the hunt, really for

no other reason than seals are cute," Halifax WHINER member Chep Felting says. "But now that we find out that those little fucks are shitting on our environment, I want to go out and nullify one of those seals right now."

The link between baby seals and the total destruction of the human metascape revolves around the animal's waste. Lead CUNT scientist Dr. Jay-Jay Anderson explains.

With their support firmly behind the seal hunt, Halifax WHINERs say they will now focus their attention to more urgent environmental issues, such as extinguishing the harbour fire and cleaning Dartmouth.

Engineering campus to move

Students will be more isolated but unable to complain

After years of complaints from engineering students that Sexton campus has been too far from the main campus, Dalhousie has decided to do something: move it into the harbour.

Dal administration, along with the student union, officially announced April 1 that they will be moving the engineering buildings on Sexton campus onto Georges Island in Halifax harbour.

"While we think the students will be just as unhappy, if not more so, at least we won't have to hear them bitching," says DSU president Mortey Barkin.

While the island will remain a historical

site, the engineering buildings are old enough to qualify as historical structures. This will also get the university off the hook to create new buildings or update aging buildings.

University President Timmy Travis is

"It's a win-win situation," Travis says.

But some engineering students oppose

"With the current co-op placements, being on the island for just one term at a time isn't feasible," says Puke Filson, Dal engineering rep. "First, we have to swim through the dirty harbour, then survive by eating the grass and voles on the island for only four months at a time. This is something arts students with two consecutive terms could do

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but it's just not feasible for engineers."

The move will also displace architecture students, but Dal is planning to move those classes into Fenwick Tower, assuming the school is unable to sell it.

"Putting the architects in Fenwick is a great idea," says Travis. "People learn from mistakes, so how could architecture students not learn when they're literally surrounded by mistakes? It's a very exciting concept."

Helicopters will move the Sexton buildings onto Georges Island and crews will re-assemble it there. Dal is hoping to have the project done by December 2011, if the Canadian military has a helicopter surplus the school can take advan-

Dal to launch unsustainable college

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

Dal to remove drinking fountains on campus

Dalhousie University has decided to enforce the use of bottled water by starting its own bottled water company.

"Discover Dal" is the only bottled water brand allowed on campus because all other bottled water has been banned.

This initiative is recognized as the most brilliant marketing scheme in campus history.

In efforts to popularize the water, Dal maintenance staff will be removing all drinking fountains on campus and replacing them with vending machines that come fully stocked with the Discover Dal water.

The water will only be available through purchase on students' Dal cards. Students will not receive five per cent back on their cards on the purchase of Discover Dal water.

Discover Dal water will be available in the coming weeks.



Highmoor is the creator of student group

So far, 21 students have joined the organization's Facebook group.

Scott Marshall Jr. joined the TWIT group

after recognizing the need for students to pay more money for their education.

"I'm sick of people looking at students as poor and unable to afford university," he said while sipping Jost White Wine in his penthouse condominium on Dresden Row.

"We need to show them that we can pay exorbitant rates without having to resort to

Marshall plans to have a TWIT protest outside Province House to end tuition freezes.

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
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Losing the celluloid

Milk


