SIR ROBERT HOLLAND, of Victoria, B. C., has contributed to *The Dalhousie Review* on several occasions. He spent thirty years in India as a member of the Indian Civil Service and three years in Siam as Judicial Adviser to the Siamese Government. He has travelled extensively in Malaya, Indo-China, and Japan, and has also visited Hong Kong, Shanghai, Peking, Mukden, Seoul, and Formosa. He has been heard frequently in C.B.C. broadcasts.
