

EDITORIAL

Each year Dalhousie University presents a distinguished lecture series in memory of one of the university's most notable benefactors, Dorothy J. Killam. An arrangement with *Dalhousie Review* enables us to publish these lectures, and we have done so from time to time when the subject matter falls within our mandate (see vol. 64 no. 4 and vol. 68 no. 1/2).

In 1993, the theme of the lecture series was war and peace, its topicality indicated by the title of the series, "Keeping Peace or Controlling Wars." The lecturers were an historian, a journalist and a soldier. The historical context was provided by Professor Sir Michael Howard, and his lecture was followed by two which relied very greatly on personal experience, by the journalist Ann Medina and Major-General Lewis MacKenzie.
