- E. CARL ABBOTT is Associate Professor of Medicine at Dalhousie University. He obtained his MD from Dalhousie in 1969 and after two years of general practice began a Residency in Internal Medicine in Halifax and Toronto. He obtained his Fellowship (FRCP[C]) in 1965.
