By Design: Moose Jaw's Resident Architects, 1882-1942 by Gordon W. Fulton and House Roots: Discovering Your Old House in Moose Jaw by Gordon Fulton, (Grand Valley Press, Moose Jaw, 1985) ISBN 0-9692-023-0-X.

These recent publications by Gordon Fulton provide additional background research into the growing area of residential restoration. By Design summarizes the lives and architectural careers of more than two dozen Moose Jaw gentlemen who between 1882 and 1942 practiced house design in that city. The use of primary references has been exhaustive with particularly well documented findings for R.G. Bunyard, H. Hargreaves and H. Stewart. Fulton's compilation of data is a novel source which might well be replicated by other communities of Moose Jaw's size.

The second booklet, House Roots provides a step by step process for the amateur and academic researcher to identify and locate the relevant documents concerning old buildings. Other intended aims for this publication are, to assist in the expansion of existing inventories of heritage sites and to act as a model for other communities to encourage the retrieval of building records in their own areas. Sources examined include Henderson's Directories, Assessment Rolls, Building Permits, Land Titles Office, Fire Insurance Maps, Newspapers, Architectural Drawings and Museums.
