Dalhousie University

Dalhousie University is a non-denominational co-educational university. Founded in 1818, the University is a member of the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada and the Association of Commonwealth Universities.

With more than 9,000 students, full-time and part-time, in a wide variety of undergraduate, professional and graduate programs, Dalhousie occupies more than 60 acres in a residential area of the city of Halifax. University facilities include buildings for teaching and research, libraries, residential housing for students, a Student Union Building, an Arts Centre for music, theatre and an art gallery, and facilities for physical recreation. The Nova Scotia Archives Building, the Atlantic Regional Laboratory of the National Research Council, major provincial hospitals and the Nova Scotia Pathology Institute are located in close proximity to the University. Dalhousie benefits from a variety of arrangements for teaching and research collaboration with hospitals and federal and provincial research laboratories. The University of King's College, situated on part of the Dalhousie campus, is an affiliated institution and its students in Arts and Sciences receive Dalhousie degrees authorized in the name of both institutions. By agreement with Mount Saint Vincent University there is co-operation in access for students to various courses and services, and by agreement with Technical University of Nova Scotia there are co-operative arrangements for engineering studies.

Under the University's statutes the Board of Governors is responsible for the operation of the University. The Board consists of representatives named by the Government of Nova Scotia, by the alumni and by students' associations. Internal regulation of the University is the primary concern of the Senate, subject to approval of the Board of Governors. Senate consists of the professors, Deans and academic department heads, twenty-seven other members of the academic staff elected from and by each faculty, and six students elected or nominated by the Student Union.

Gifts and Bequests in Aid of Students of Dalhousie University

Dalhousie community gratefully acknowledges the voluntary support and generosity of our benefactors. Their support has played an essential role in the development of awards and aids for students of the University.

All sizes of gifts and bequests serve a wide variety of practical educational purposes for Dalhousie students. Through benefactors, who provide scholarships or fellowships, prizes or medals, or bursaries or loans, many students of great promise are encouraged and enabled to pursue their educational goals.

Here are suggested forms for Bequests to Dalhousie University:

(a) Restricted to founding scholarships or bursaries.

I give and bequeath the sum of ■■ dollars (or portion of estate or designated property) to the Board of Governors of Dalhousie College and University for the purpose of establishing in the said College and University one or more awards to be known as ■■ Scholarship(s) or Bursary(ies), the net annual income from this fund to be awarded in such amounts, under such conditions and to such recipients as may from time to time be determined in accordance with the directions of the Board of Governors of said College and University.

(b) Restricted to funding loans for students.

I give and bequeath the sum of ■■ dollars to the Board of Governors of Dalhousie College and University for the purpose of providing a revolving loan fund from which loans are to be made to such students and under such conditions as the said College and University may from time to time direct.

A — Undergraduate Scholarships

Note: Scholarship information for students in dentistry, law or medicine is to be found in the appropriate section later in this booklet.

1. General Undergraduate Scholarship Policy

1.1 Full Class Load

(a) Entering students to whom an entrance scholarship is awarded must undertake a full class load for the academic year immediately following the award in a designated degree or diploma program at Dalhousie University proper. A full class load for most such designated programs consists of not less than five full classes (or the equivalent), i.e. 30 credit hours distributed equally between the two terms, unless the standard credit hour load, as prescribed by the appropriate faculty, should be otherwise.

(b) Continuing (regular) students are asked to note: To be considered for an in-course scholarship, a student must have carried in the preceding year a full class load (five whole classes or the equivalent, i.e., 30 credit hours, or that stipulated by the designated requirements of your program).

(c) Continuing Co-operative Program students will be considered as are the regular students except that the prescribed period may be either a term or an academic year depending upon where a given Co-op student is within that program at the time.

1.2 Where Scholarships Are Tenable

Scholarships which are funded from Dalhousie funds (endowments, sponsorships or operating accounts) are tenable at Dalhousie University proper, unless the Will or Trust Deed should otherwise allow. (The University of King's College has its own scholarship program.)

1.3 Portability of Undergraduate Scholarships

Note to students who are entering Dalhousie University for the first time. Studies in the medical and dental professions are *not* carried out in the Faculty of Health Professions, but are organized as the Faculties of Medicine and Dentistry respectively.

1.4 When Tenable

(a) Undergraduate scholarships to regular full time students (as defined above) are tenable in the academic year immediately following their award unless the Undergraduate Scholarship Committee upon consideration of a written request from the student and upon circumstances the Committee deems are exceptional, may in writing permit a scholarship to be deferred for one year.

(b) Similarly, undergraduate scholarships to Co-op students are to be taken up in the academic term or year immediately following their award.

1.5 Scholarship Payments and Rebates

(a) **Payments:** It is University policy (based on legal requirements) that scholarships provided from Dalhousie funds (as designated above) are to be credited towards students' accounts for tuition and prescribed fees.

(b) **Rebates:** The portion of such scholarship money in excess of the aforementioned charges will be refunded to the student in one portion. The normal refund time is mid-October, and the refunds are made by the Student Accounts Office in accordance with their governing regulations. Students should not expect the advancement of a rebate for book purchases or other needs. Scholars, however, will be considered for temporary loans to assist with purchases of books in September. (See also Item 1.6 (b) below.)

1.6 When Scholarships Are Paid and Posted

(a) **Fee Cards Credited:** (1) Virtually all scholarships are paid to students' accounts at the beginning of the academic year immediately following the award. A very few scholarships are restricted to graduands, and these scholarships will be paid in cheque form as soon after

convocation as is practical, unless such scholarship is designated for study elsewhere.

(2) In this latter case the Awards Office will arrange for the payment to another university via the student's fee account there. Any rebate would be in accordance with that university's policy. It is incumbent upon the student to apprise the Awards Office in ample time of his/her selection in order that the cheque can be sent early enough for receipt during September.

(b) **Posting:** Although this is an internal procedure, it sometimes affects the rebating process. Since the University permits students to switch programs immediately prior to and during September registration, a scholar can register for a course other than the one in which he/she was enrolled at the time of the selections. (See item 1.3 above.) This may require the substitution of one or more other scholarships in order to fund the scholar's award in the new program.

1.7 Scholarship Duration

Undergraduate scholarships are tenable for one year only.

1.8 Second Degree Scholarship Consideration

Dalhousie students who, having been graduated with one degree, intend to return the immediately following year for a second degree and wish to be considered for an in-course scholarship, must apprise the Awards Office of their intention (since the computer program automatically eliminates graduands' records from consideration). The degrees referred to herein are those which are so designated for scholarship purposes.

1.9 Delinquent Accounts Affect Scholarship Consideration

Continuing students are to note that their academic records *may be excluded* from scholarship consideration if they should have *accounts outstanding* at the time the computer print-out is processed. The Awards Office will *not* delay the ordering of its worklists for the Undergraduate Scholarship Committee *nor* will it calculate averages manually in order to accommodate such delinquencies.

1.10 Eligible Classes

The Undergraduate Scholarship Committee considers only those classes which are taken for credit in a designated degree/diploma program during the regular academic year (or term in the Co-op program). Summer session classes are not considered for scholarship purposes.

1.11 Excess Class Load Counted

Those students who (regardless of the reason) carry in excess of the minimum "normal" full class load will be assessed on all classes.

1.12 Weighted Average

The computer program which calculates the numerical average, based on defined numerical equivalents in the conversion scale, takes into account whether the class is a whole, half or one-third credit.

1.13 Delayed Marks/Mark Changes

The Awards Office will manually re-calculate averages caused by delayed marks (if not caused by the student) or mark changes (when available through the Registrar's Office) and consider or re-consider the student for an in-course scholarship.

1.14 Reduced Class Load and Retention of Scholarship

To be eligible to hold an in-course scholarship in one of the eligible programs, a student *must* maintain registration in 3.5 whole classes or the equivalent (i.e. 21 credit hours).

1.15 Integration of Multiple Scholarships

In the application of funds to provide a student's total scholarship amount, it is University policy that the scholarships be integrated rather than summed. For example, the U.S.C. may award a given student an in-course scholarship of \$2,000. Department A may recommend that same student for \$500. The composition of this student's scholarship award of \$2,000 would consist of the Department A scholarship together with one or two other scholarships until the prescribed total was reached.

Occasionally recommendations for certain scholarships may be late in coming. Rather than delay an entire group within the in-course scholarship plan, letters of scholarship are issued in due course, with any necessary revisions being made as soon as the requisite information is received. This may necessitate the altering of a scholar's award composition.

1.16 Order of Application of Funds

In the funding of a simple or compound scholarship the order in which funds are applied is (a) endowments, (b) sponsorships and (c) operating accounts.

1.17 Substitution of Funds

The Awards Office as Cost Centre retains the right to re-assign the composition of a student's scholarship (the total amount would not be reduced) as circumstances may warrant.

1.18 Coding for Record Annotation

Scholarships are coded in order that students' academic records can be annotated. Since scholarships are ordinarily paid to fees, scholarships must be coded for the academic year during which they will be paid out. This is the year following the one during which the students' marks were used in qualifying. There are, however, exceptions. Some scholarships are restricted to graduands and since such students will not be here the next year, the scholarships to these students are coded for the academic year on which the students qualified to receive them.

These exceptions are: (a) The Ralph and Frances Lewis Jeffrey Scholarship, (b) The John R. Kaye Memorial Scholarship, and (c) The Archibald MacMechan Chapter/IODE Scholarship in English (unless the student should commence graduate study in English at Dalhousie University).

The coding process also makes possible the payment to fees and the preparation of information for T4A form generation.

2. Entrance Scholarships

2.1 General Statement for the Faculty of Arts and Science, Faculty of Health Professions, School of Dental Hygiene, and School of Business Administration:

In the spring Dalhousie University expects to offer scholarships, the values of which range from \$500 to \$4,000 to students who are admitted directly from high school to the first year of study. The awards are tenable for the first year. Scholarships for subsequent years are available and they are described under "In-Course Scholarships."

The total number of entrance scholarships is much smaller than the number of entering students which means that a relatively small fraction of those admitted should expect to receive one.

The ranks which students have achieved in the Grade XI and Grade XII classes are very important criteria, and the Undergraduate Scholarship Committee must rely upon teachers and counsellors to supply this and other relevant data. Teachers are encouraged to determine rank in grade by weighing special classes in any way they deem to be wise. If the total number of students is fewer than 20, the school official is urged to compare the student with other students in

former years at a comparable stage of their careers.

No special application forms are required (for general University scholarships, but see below) as all students who have been admitted to studies in the aforesaid courses are automatically considered for a scholarship. Students should, however, bear in mind that the awards will have been allotted by **March**, so it is important that applications for admission be sent to the Admissions Office by **1st March**.

Students who are not coming directly from high school may, however, still be considered for an entrance scholarship by making a written request to the Director of Awards. Please note that applicants having college/university experience are excluded from entrance scholarship consideration, since they are transfer students.

With the offer of an entrance scholarship there is a small card on which the student is requested to indicate acceptance/decline of the scholarship, which card is then to be returned within the prescribed time period. Students who declined entrance scholarships and then changed their minds cannot expect the offers to be revalidated.

Even though an entering student might not receive an entrance scholarship, that student will be considered in subsequent years for an in-course scholarship. (See policy item 1.1 (b).)

Designated application forms are required for the following:

Lockward Memorial Scholarships (via Nova Scotia high schools, to be received at the University by 15 March). See below.

2.2 The Lockward Memorial Scholarships

These scholarships have been established from an endowment by the late Reginald and Anne T. Lockward of Liverpool, N.S. A number of such scholarships, each valued at \$4,000, will be awarded annually; they are tenable for one year.

Candidates for Lockward Memorial Scholarships must be attending, or be graduates of, a high school in Nova Scotia and be eligible for admission to the first year of an undergraduate course of study leading to a first degree at Dalhousie University. They must also intend to pursue a program of full-time studies at Dalhousie.

Candidates must be nominated by the principal of their high school.

Preference will be given to students in Queen's County, but each high school in Nova Scotia may recommend one student for consideration by the Undergraduate Scholarship Committee of Dalhousie.

Students will be selected to receive Lockward Memorial Scholarships on the basis of academic standing, character and financial need.

A student may not hold both a Lockward and another University scholarship simultaneously.

Recipients of Lockward Memorial Scholarships must begin their studies at Dalhousie in the academic year immediately following the date of notification of their awards.

Nomination forms, accompanied by letters of reference, should be completed by the high school principal or his/her delegate.

Two letters of reference from members of the community who are familiar with the student's character and activities, should be included.

The **deadline** for receipt of nominations will normally be **15 March**.

Nomination forms and letters of reference should be sent to: The Awards Office, Arts and Administration Building, Dalhousie University, Halifax, Nova Scotia B3H 4H6.

The Undergraduate Scholarship Committee will make the selection of awardees.

2.3 Named Dalhousie Entrance Scholarships

Robert Bruce Scholarships: The University is a beneficiary of a bequest from the late Robert Bruce of Quebec whereby a portion of the annual income is to be used for entrance and in-course scholarships, and for bursaries. Scholarships are fixed at the value of \$100.

The Courtenay Drug Entrance Scholarships: Two scholarships, valued at \$300 each, are available to students entering the College of Pharmacy from the Maritime provinces. These scholarships are awarded on the basis of previous academic achievement. All students entering the College of Pharmacy are considered for these scholarships; no further application is necessary.

Dalhousie Alumni Association Scholarship: With a gift of \$20,000 in September 1968 the Dalhousie Alumni Association established an endowment from which the net annual income would provide two major scholarships valued at \$1,600 each to students of particular merit. These scholarships are open to students entering the University for the first time directly from high school into a course of study leading to an undergraduate degree or diploma. The Selection Committee shall consist of the Director of Awards, the Chairman of the Undergraduate Scholarship Committee and the President of the Alumni Association, or their nominees. Each year the Director of Awards shall forward the academic qualifications and personal background of the recipients to the board of directors of the Dalhousie Alumni Association.

James and Abbie Campbell Memorial Scholarships: A bequest from the late Elsie Alma MacAloney of Halifax made provision for the establishment of the James and Abbie Campbell Memorial Fund. The purpose of this fund is to promote the University's music program through scholarships in music. Scholastically healthy students who have demonstrated competency in music will be nominated by the Department. Other music students will be selected on the basis of their overall academic standing by the Undergraduate Scholarship Committee.

The 1983 Dalhousie Scholarship: An anonymous Nova Scotia company has established an entrance scholarship in the amount of \$1,000, to assist a student in attending Dalhousie. There is a financial need component in this scholarship.

The Dalhousie Club of New York Scholarships: A fund for this purpose, established by the Dalhousie Club of New York and placed in the hands of the Board of Governors of the University, endows several scholarships open to students entering the University in the Faculty of Arts & Science from high school. The terms have been revised such that, effective with the 1984-85 year, financial need of the candidates will also be considered.

The Frank R. Davis Memorial Scholarships: These scholarships are made possible by a fund established by Mrs. Davis in memory of her late husband, the Hon. Frank R. Davis, Minister of Public Health in the government of Nova Scotia and a graduate of this University. The scholarship will be awarded by the University to deserving graduates of the Bridgewater High School, on the nomination of the Supervisor of Schools and the Senior High School staff. In selecting candidates, the governing considerations will be scholastic standing, unselfishness of purpose, and interest in the common good. The fund may also be used for bursaries.

Earl of Dalhousie Scholarships: A limited number of these scholarships are awarded to students from Africa by the Board of Governors of Dalhousie University on the recommendation of the President. These scholarships are equivalent in value to the tuition fees of the faculty in which the student is studying. Continuance of these scholarships is dependent on satisfactory performance at the University and subject to annual review. *Important: Note that these tuition scholarships are awarded after arrival in Canada.*

E. Ross Faulkner Scholarships: The University received from the Estate of Julia L. Faulkner a bequest to provide scholarships in memory of her husband, Dr. Ebenezer Ross Faulkner.

E. John Jordan Scholarship: Under the Will of the late E. John Jordan a bequest was left to the University for the purpose of funding entrance and in-course scholarships.

The A. Murray MacKay Scholarship: The North British Society has established an annual scholarship of \$500 which is open to a student entering Dalhousie from Queen Elizabeth High School. The Selection Committee will consider candidates on the criteria of scholastic ability, financial need and leadership. The criteria are weighted equally. The late Dr. MacKay was chairman of the School Board at the time when the Queen Elizabeth High School was constructed.

Frederick A. MacMillen Scholarships: The late Frederick A. MacMillen bequeathed to Dalhousie University a sum of money, the net income therefrom to be used for scholarships. This fund has been designated for entrance scholarships.

The Hector McInnes Memorial Scholarship Fund: During the last year of his life, the late Hector McInnes was given \$10,000 by an anonymous donor to whom he had been describing Dalhousie Entrance Scholarships. The money was to be used for that purpose. In December, 1937, after Mr. McInnes' death, the same anonymous donor gave the University \$50,000 as a memorial to Mr. McInnes. The \$50,000 was invested as an endowment for this purpose, as was also the unexpended balance of the original \$10,000. This fund provides undergraduate scholarships.

Silvanus A. Morton Memorial Scholarship: The Silvanus A. Morton Scholarship Fund was established in 1972 to endow one or more awards totalling approximately \$800. The awards are in memory of Silvanus A. Morton, Principal of the old Halifax Academy, predecessor of the Queen Elizabeth High School. The scholarship is to be awarded each year, beginning in 1974, on the recommendation of the principal, to one or more graduates of Queen Elizabeth High School upon entrance to Dalhousie University in the Faculty of Arts & Science.

In the event that a satisfactory candidate should not be forthcoming, the University may disburse the award money in the form of bursaries to Queen Elizabeth High School graduates who are in first year in the Faculty of Arts & Science.

The W.M. Nelson Scholarship: Under the Will of the late Mr. W.M. Nelson, of Tatamagouche, funds have been made available to provide a scholarship to Dalhousie University open to students attending North Colchester High School (formerly the Tatamagouche Rural High School). (In the event that a student of sufficient calibre does not attend, the money may then be used as a bursary to a capable student from North Colchester High who requires financial assistance.)

Harold Oxley Scholarship: A bequest under the late Mr. Oxley's Will makes possible the funding of a scholarship, which has been allotted to the entrance scholarship plan.

Arthur S. Payzant Scholarship: Under the Will of the late Reverend Arthur Silver Payzant a bequest was established for scholarship purposes. The University has allotted this award to the entrance scholarship plan.

Pictou Academy Scholarship: In recognition of the common origin and close relation existing between Dalhousie University and Pictou Academy, the University in 1917 on the occasion of the hundredth

anniversary of the academy established a scholarship of the value of \$100. On the occasion of the 150th anniversary of the academy the value of the scholarship was increased to the sum of \$300. The scholarship is to be held during the first year of attendance at this University.

Dr. David M. Soloan Scholarship: Under the Will of the late Dr. David M. Soloan the University received a sum of money. The Board of Governors decided that Dr. Soloan's gift be used to establish one or more entrance scholarships in the Faculty of Arts & Science.

Alexander Sinclair Scholarship: Under the Will of the late Evangeline Marion Winn, the University received an endowment for the purpose of providing scholarship awards to qualifying students from St. Mary's Municipality in the County of Guysborough, Nova Scotia. Candidates are recommended by the St. Mary's Rural High School in consultation with the Awards Office.

The I.C. Stewart Trust Fund: From the Estate of Georgie M. Stewart came a trust fund, the annual income from which is to be used for I.C. Stewart Scholarships to qualifying students from St. Mary's District in the County of Guysborough, Nova Scotia. Candidates are recommended by St. Mary's Rural High School in consultation with the Awards Office.

Joseph Duncan Stewart Endowment Fund: A bequest under the Will of the late Joseph Duncan Stewart has made possible the funding of undergraduate scholarships. He had designated the University as beneficiary "... in appreciation of financial assistance which I received in the form of a scholarship which made possible my attending and receiving my education at the University ..."

The J. Douglas Vair Scholarship: This scholarship is available to students entering the University for the first time from Pictou County, Queen's County, and rural Halifax County, and, failing a candidate from these areas, to a student from other areas of the Province of Nova Scotia at the discretion of the Scholarship Committee. The award shall be based on scholarship and need, making it possible for a promising student to obtain a university education. The scholarship may be continued beyond the first year to students from the three preferred areas if standing is maintained, but only if there is no first-year student eligible for the award.

The Women's Division of the Dalhousie Alumni Association Scholarships: Money from various fund raising projects was set aside over several years and in 1967 when the goal of \$10,000 was achieved, the Women's Division presented this sum to the University. Part of the income was used for scholarships while the fund was allowed to grow. Now, thanks to the considerable hard work and generosity of the Women's Division, this fund is able to provide from the annual income to qualifying new students two scholarships of \$1,000 each. One Scholarship is named the **Margaret Florence Newcombe Scholarship**, which commemorates the 100th anniversary of the graduation of the first woman graduate of Dalhousie University in 1885. The new scholarship includes a financial need component and consideration of extra curricular activities, in addition to the attainment of high academic standing. The second scholarship is named the **Ruth Skaling Murray Scholarship**, in memory of a dedicated alumna of the Dalhousie Women's Division.

Through a separate fund the Women's Division of the Dalhousie Alumni Association also provide for the **Isabel Brown Scholarship** (see separate entry).

2.4 External Entrance Scholarships

Imperial Oil Higher Education Awards: Imperial Oil Limited offers

annually free tuition and other compulsory fees to the children of employees and annuitants who proceed to higher education courses. Initial awards, or renewal of awards, are restricted to students under twenty-five years of age on the date of registration for any undergraduate year.

To qualify, a student must attain an average mark of 70% or higher in the appropriate secondary school examinations in the subjects required for admittance to the approved institution, or must have attained an average of 70% or more in a college year upon which application is based.

Courses may be taken at any Canadian university or other approved institution of higher learning, and awards are tenable for a maximum of four academic years, or the equivalent, at the undergraduate or bachelor degree level. The four levels of academic years are measured from the first year of entering a post-secondary institution.

Further information and application forms may be obtained from The Secretary, Contributions/Higher Education Awards, Imperial Oil Limited, 111 St. Clair Avenue West, Toronto, Ontario, M5W 1K3.

The Margie Ann O'Hara Memorial Scholarship Fund: Beginning in June 1971, a scholarship in the amount of \$100 will be awarded at the high school closing exercises each year. The scholarship is open to the students of Moncton City area high schools who plan to attend any university, and also to students of any high school in the Atlantic Provinces who plan to attend Dalhousie University. The Margie Ann O'Hara Memorial Scholarship Committee will award the Scholarship to the best all-around needy student, preferably from a large family. Scholarship applications will be distributed to the Moncton City area high schools, but they may also be obtained from The Margie Ann O'Hara Memorial Scholarship Committee, 117 Dickson Boulevard, Moncton, New Brunswick, E1E 2P7.

Anne B. Rafuse Scholarship: The Anne B. Rafuse Memorial Scholarship Trust was organized as a memorial for the late Anne B. Rafuse, whose passing occurred while a student at Dalhousie University. An entrance scholarship in the amount of at least \$450 is available at Dalhousie University for a student graduating from the town of Bridgewater, N.S. school system.

In awarding scholarships the recommendation of the high school principal shall be reviewed and the following factors shall be considered as guidelines:

- (a) Qualities of leadership and contribution to the life of the school and the community;
- (b) Character; and
- (c) Scholastic standing.

The Scholarship may be renewed for a further year if, in the opinion of the trustees:

- (a) there is financial need;
- (b) there are no suitable applicants and;
- (c) the previous recipient's scholastic record is satisfactory.

The Donald E. Curren Scholarships: Four scholarships of \$1,000 each and four scholarships of \$500 each are open to mobility impaired students who have been accepted by a university in the Atlantic Provinces with a preference to paraplegics and quadriplegics. The scholarships will be awarded on merit and upon such other criteria as the Selection Committee may determine. Recipients must be Canadian citizens or landed immigrants, and they must be domiciled in one of the Atlantic Provinces. There is no restriction as to the field of study. Application forms may be obtained from, and upon completion are to be

returned by 15 July to, The Donald E. Curren Scholarship Fund, c/o Canadian Paraplegic Association, NS Division, 5599 Fenwick Street, Halifax, Nova Scotia, B3H 1R2.

3. In-course Scholarships

3.1 General Statement for scholarships in the Faculty of Arts & Science, Faculty of Health Professions, School of Dental Hygiene and School of Business Administration

In the summer we expect to offer scholarships ranging in value from \$500 to \$3000. All students in eligible programs in the participating faculties who have successfully completed a normal full class load will automatically be considered for scholarships. The normal full class load will depend upon the requirements of specific faculties and schools. The Undergraduate Scholarship Committee assesses students on achievements in their actual class load, the minimum being the normal full class load. For example, in arts, commerce, or science the normal full class load is 30 credit hours. For a person who carries 36 credit hours, the Committee will assess the student on the basis of six classes. (Read 1.1(b) and 1.14 again).

All scholarships are administered by the Director of Awards. Any questions concerning the conditions for holding a scholarship or the method of payment should be directed to his Office.

The Undergraduate Scholarship Committee decides the awardees and the amounts of money. The amount of money authorized for a scholar may be met wholly or partially by either a Dalhousie University Scholarship or one of the named scholarships as described in the following sections.

Please note that transfer students are ineligible for scholarships in the year of their transfer, with two exceptions. Because of the nature of the programs, Occupational Therapy and Physiotherapy students who have completed the first year elsewhere will be considered for scholarships on the basis of Dalhousie mid-session examinations.

3.2 General Scholarship Endowments

The Isabel Brown Scholarship: Isabel Murray (Shaw) Brown received her BA from Dalhousie University in 1922. She taught in the Halifax City Schools before marrying Rev. C.N. Brown, a United Church minister. She served with her husband at churches in the Maritimes until his death in Sydney in 1949. She returned to teaching there and later in Halifax. Following her retirement in 1966 she established the Rotatory Centennial Pre-school in Mulgrave Park. She was involved with the Dalhousie Women's Alumnae.

The scholarship was established in 1982 by her family, Elizabeth, Douglas C.S. and John D. Brown, in the form of an endowment. The interest will be used to provide an annual scholarship ordinarily to a student entering the final undergraduate year. Note, however, that this scholarship is portable to programs outside the list of designated undergraduate programs listed earlier. Candidates will be considered on the basis of good academic standing.

Minnie F. Burbidge Scholarships: In her Will the late Minnie F. Burbidge bequeathed the residue of her estate to Dalhousie University. Upon settlement of her estate in 1945 the University received the sum of \$16,000. This was endowed and the net annual income has been applied to scholarships.

Marjorie F. Ellis Scholarships: The late Marjorie F. Ellis bequeathed one-half of the remainder of her estate to Dalhousie University for scholarships to worthy students.

Mackenzie Trust Scholarships: According to the Estate of Thomas George Mackenzie a Trust Fund was established for Archibald F.

Mackenzie, and later bequeathed to Dalhousie University to provide (in-course) scholarships.

The Hector McInnes Memorial Scholarship Fund: During the last year of his life, the late Hector McInnes was given \$10,000 by an anonymous donor to whom he had been describing Dalhousie Entrance Scholarships. The money was to be used for that purpose. In December 1937 after Mr. McInnes' death, the same anonymous donor gave the University \$50,000 as a memorial to Mr. McInnes. The \$50,000 was invested as an endowment for this purpose, as was also the unexpended balance of the original \$10,000.

Joseph Duncan Stewart Endowment Fund: A bequest under the Will of the late Joseph Duncan Stewart has made possible the funding of undergraduate scholarships. He had designated the University as beneficiary "... in appreciation of financial assistance which I received in the form of a scholarship which made possible my attending and receiving my education at the University ..."

The John L. and Glenna E. Towse Scholarships: A bequest to the University provides for the funding of a number of in-course scholarships.

Sir William Young Scholarship: This fund was left by Sir William Young for the purpose of endowing scholarships.

3.3 Arts and Science

(a) Specified as to Year

First-Year In-Course Scholarships

Robert Bruce Scholarship: Robert Bruce of Banlieue, Quebec, made a bequest to the University to establish bursaries and scholarships. Three quarters of the annual income from the Fund are to be allocated to scholarships for entering/or in-course students in a program of study in arts or science. The amount of each scholarship is \$100.

Dr. Frederick J. Gaudet Scholarship: Dr. Gaudet bequeathed to the University in 1978 a sum of money to provide for a full-tuition scholarship in Arts.

George H. Campbell Memorial Scholarship: In 1917 Mr. and Mrs. G.S. Campbell established the George H. Campbell Scholarship Fund to provide annual scholarships in memory of their late son, George Henderson Campbell, who had been graduated in 1915 with a Bachelor of Arts degree. Their son lost his life during World War I whilst serving with the Canadian Expeditionary Force, 40th Battalion.

The Mr. and Mrs. S.H. Solomon Scholarship in Engineering: This scholarship of the value of \$750 is made possible through the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. S.H. Solomon of Dartmouth, N.S. It is to be awarded annually to a student entering the second year of Engineering who has completed his/her first year with scholarship standing. The award is based on scholastic attainment, but emphasis will also be placed on financial need.

The Charles and Cecelia Zwerling Scholarship Fund: This fund was created by members of the Zwerling family in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Zwerling. Scholarships will be awarded to students with high standing in Arts or Science who are returning for further study at the undergraduate level.

Second-Year In-Course Scholarships

The Alan Pollok Scholarship: This scholarship was established by the North British Society in Halifax in memory of the Rev. Dr. Alan Pollok. It

is of the value of \$750 and is awarded annually without restriction as to sex, age or nationality. The awardee will be the student, in second year in the Faculty of Arts and Science at Dalhousie University, who stood highest in a course load of at least five full classes (or equivalent). This scholarship cannot be held along with the North British Society Centennial Bursary nor the Jotham Blanchard Bursary. The Alan Pollok Scholarship is tenable in third year.

The Constance MacFarlane Scholarship: An endowment fund has been established to provide a scholarship to a deserving student in the second year of the marine biology program.

The C.W. Stairs Memorial Scholarship: This scholarship of the amount of up to \$2000 is the income of an endowment of \$10,000 donated by William Stairs, Son & Morrow Limited of Halifax, on the occasion of commemorating the 150th anniversary (1810-1960) of the firm. It is to be awarded by the Faculty of Arts and Science on the recommendation of the Undergraduate Scholarship Committee to a student of high standing in Engineering, or in related subjects, who is entering the third year of the course and who, in the opinion of the Committee, is likely after graduation to contribute to the industrial development of Canada.

Third-Year In-Course Scholarships

The Khaki University Scholarships: From the Khaki University of Canada and the Young Men's Christian Association Memorial Scholarship Fund, the trustees of Khaki University made a gift to Dalhousie University in 1921 of \$6,500. This sum was invested, and over the years has grown such that beginning in 1976 the University increased its offerings both in number and amount.

Third- and Fourth-Year In-Course Scholarships

Hugh P. Bell Scholarship in Biology: In 1968 the Class of 1928 established the H.P. Bell Fund; the income therefrom was to provide one or more annual scholarships. The Biology Department each year will select the most promising honours biology student who is in Third year and that student shall hold the Hugh P. Bell Scholarship in the fourth year of the honours program. In the event that no worthy candidate should be found, the amount of the scholarship will for that year be invested to increase the value at some later time.

The Belle Crowe Scholarship in Chemistry: A bequest by the late Belle Chisholm Crowe, formerly of Truro, and a student at the University in 1885-86, enables a number of scholarships to be offered annually by the Department of Chemistry to Honours students. These awards are made on the recommendation of the Department and are normally offered to the most promising students of scholarship standing entering the third and fourth years of the Honours course in Chemistry.

The William Mushkat Scholarship in Political Science: An endowment from the Estate of William Mushkat makes possible each year the award of a \$600. scholarship to a student entering the fourth year of a concentrated Honours program in Political Science. The award is made on the recommendation of the Department, and is normally offered to the most promising student among those who have registered for an Honours program or certificate by the end of their third year. (Proposed)

The Physics Scholarship Fund: An anonymous donor has established a fund to be used to provide scholarships for advanced students in Physics. The awards will be made on recommendation of the Chairman of the Department of Physics. The number and size of the scholarships may vary from year to year at the discretion of the Department of Physics.

(b) Unspecified as to Year

Nathan T. Ashkins Scholarship: Each year the Nathan T. Ashkins fund provides for a scholarship to a student in Arts & Science who is beyond first year.

Beta Sigma Phi Scholarship to Dalhousie University: The Halifax-Dartmouth City Council of Beta Sigma Phi sorority has established an endowment of \$2,000 whereby the annual income will provide for a scholarship to a student studying towards a degree full-time or part-time at either the undergraduate or graduate level. The successful candidate will be selected from the following categories, listed preferentially: first, an active Member; secondly, a daughter, son or husband of an active Member; and thirdly, some other student chosen by the Undergraduate Scholarship Committee. NOTE: this scholarship requires a designated application form which must be submitted to the Awards Office by the May deadline.

Allan and Lura Bevan Memorial Scholarship: Colleagues and friends of the late Allan Bevan have established a memorial scholarship fund. The scholarship selection in the first place is to be made by the Department of English to a student majoring in English either at Dalhousie or King's. In the absence of a suitable candidate from English, the selection will be made by the Department of Music.

George Burris Scholarship: Under the will of the late Mary Burris of Massachusetts a sum of money was bequeathed to the University to fund an annual scholarship in memory of her father. The scholarship is open to men and women who wish to undertake study in England.

The L.A. DeWolfe Memorial Scholarship: A fund has been established under the Will of the late Dr. L.A. DeWolfe to provide undergraduate scholarships in Mathematics or Science. One or more scholarships, with a total value of up to \$1,000, will be awarded each year.

The Percy Bertram Jollota Scholarships: From the Estate of Jean Minerva Jollota came a bequest, the annual income of which is to be used to provide scholarships in memory of her late husband, Percy Bertram Jollota. The awardees must be engaged in studies in engineering or engineering-physics.

The James L. Hall Scholarship in Geology: This scholarship was created by the widow of James L. Hall in memory of her late husband, who was a student in the University from 1919 to 1921, and by Dr. Elizabeth L. Hall, his sister. It is awarded by the Undergraduate Scholarship Committee, on the joint recommendation of the Chairman of the Departments of Engineering and Geology, to a student who has completed his/her first year of residence in the University, with high academic standing and who is planning on a career in Engineering or Geology. Preference will be given to students whose interests lie chiefly in the field of Mining Geology.

W.L. Harper Scholarship: From the Estate of Arta Falconer Harper a bequest to the University makes possible the provision for one or more awards of the W.L. Harper Scholarship from the annual income.

The Hyman I. Jacobson Scholarship: Under the will of the late Hyman Isaac Jacobson a bequest of \$5,000 was given to the University to benefit the Humanities and Social Sciences. The Board has designated this fund for scholarship purposes.

The Sarah M. Lawson Scholarships in Botany: At the discretion of the Chairman of the Department of Biology, the University may offer

scholarships to students who have shown special ability in botany. This award is open to students at Dalhousie University or the University of King's College, and is given to support summer research projects in botany at either the undergraduate or graduate level.

The Carl Mushkat Memorial Scholarships: The Carl Mushkat Memorial Fund was established at Dalhousie University in 1979 as a bequest under the Will of the late Carl Mushkat, a former graduate of the University. The Carl Mushkat Memorial Scholarships shall be awarded annually by the Undergraduate Scholarship Committee from the income of this fund to one or more promising students in Mathematics or Science.

The Ross Stewart Smith Scholarships: A bequest by the late Mrs. Eliza Cochran Smith, in furtherance of the wishes of herself and her late husband, Dr. James Ross Smith, as a memorial to their son, Ross Stewart Smith, enables the University to offer scholarships annually to students registered for a course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science. Under the terms of the bequest, the scholarship will be awarded to such students as the President, on the recommendation of the Senate, may think will best promote scientific education and research in the Province of Nova Scotia. In normal circumstances, one scholarship will be offered to a properly qualified student entering the second year; one scholarship to a student entering the third year; and one to a student entering the fourth year of a course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science. To be eligible for an award students must have shown outstanding ability in Biology, Chemistry, Geology, Physics, or Mathematics during their previous course at Dalhousie University and intend to specialize in their chosen science. In the case of students entering third and fourth years, preference will be given to those who are entering or have entered an honours course. The present fund consists of the original gift which provided one annual science scholarship, and a subsequent bequest which greatly enhanced the capital in order to provide several scholarships from the annual income.

The E. Walter Todd Scholarship in Chemistry: In 1958 the late Mabel V. Todd inaugurated this scholarship with a bequest of \$4,500. With the scholarship will be given a suitable, bound, inscribed volume in memory of her brother, the late E. Walter Todd, for many years a member of the Department of Chemistry of Dalhousie University.

The George E. Wilson Memorial Scholarship: On the occasion of the 50th Anniversary of the graduation of the Class of 1930, a representative announced that a fund to endow a memorial scholarship was being established. The scholarship is to be open to a history student, and honours the memory of Professor Wilson, a distinguished teacher of history at this University.

(c) Music Scholarships

The James and Abbie Campbell Memorial Scholarships: See entry under Entrance Scholarships.

The Honourable L.D. Currie Memorial Scholarship in Music: The Honourable Lauchlin D. Currie was born at North Sydney, Nova Scotia and attended school at Glace Bay. He obtained a BA degree from St. Francis Xavier University and was also awarded the Governor-General's Gold Medal. He graduated from Dalhousie University Law School in 1922 and practised law in Glace Bay. He was Town Solicitor for ten years. Elected to the Nova Scotia Legislature in 1933 as a Member for Glace Bay, he held the following Cabinet Portfolios: Mines, Labour, Health, Welfare and Attorney General. In 1949 he was elevated to the Bench of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. He became Chief Justice of Nova Scotia on 16 February 1967.

Chief Justice Currie was the recipient of Honourary Degrees from St.

Francis Xavier University, St. Mary's University, Dalhousie University, St. Thomas University and the University of New Brunswick.

He was President of the North British Society of Halifax during its 200th Anniversary Year of 1968. He was President of the Nova Scotia Opera Association; former Musical Director of St. Anne's Choir, Glace Bay and the Canadian Martyrs' Choir, Halifax; and Honourary President of the Halifax Symphony Society. He was actively involved in numerous other community and humanitarian projects.

The North British Society established this scholarship in memory of the Honourable Lauchlin D. Currie in 1971.

An annual scholarship in the amount of \$750 is available to a male or female Canadian in any year of Music in the Department of Music at Dalhousie University. The successful student, to be selected by the Chairman of the Department, will have demonstrated competence in vocal or instrumental performance.

Halifax Ladies Morning Music Club Scholarship: The Halifax Ladies Morning Music Club sponsors an annual scholarship of \$100 for a first-year student in Music at Dalhousie. The candidate is selected by the Department.

Elisabeth Meyerhof Scholarship in Music: An endowment has been established to provide for an annual scholarship in memory of Elisabeth Meyerhof. The scholarship is open to the most promising honours undergraduate student entering the fourth year in the area of Classical (including Renaissance) Music at this University. The selection of the awardee is to be made by the Department of Music.

The Effie May Ross Scholarships in Music: An endowment fund of \$25,000 was established under the Will of the late Effie May Ross. The income is to be used to establish yearly scholarships to (a) the most promising vocalist student from the Maritime Provinces or Newfoundland who requires financial assistance; and (b) on recommendation of the Senate of Dalhousie University to the most promising Maritime or Newfoundland student in the playing of the Piano, Organ, Violin or Cello who is in need of financial assistance. Scholarships range in value and in number.

The Don Wright Scholarships in Music Education: The Don Wright Charitable Foundation of Toronto began its annual sponsorship of two scholarships in music at Dalhousie University in 1979 with a gift of \$1,000. From 1981 until 1984 the Sponsor provided \$1,200 annually for the two scholarships. The Don Wright Charitable Foundation then donated the sum of \$14,000 to establish an endowment with which to fund these \$600 scholarships commencing in 1985. Recipients will be selected by a committee of the music education faculty, Department of Music, together with the Departmental Chairman.

One scholarship is allocated to Classroom Vocal Music. Recipients of this award must fulfill the following criteria:

- a) be enrolled in the classes in classroom teaching methods and field experience at either the elementary or secondary level;
- b) be studying voice; and
- c) have shown outstanding teaching skills and choral techniques in the Class, Music 4460A, and in choral practice in the classroom setting, Grades Five to Nine inclusive.

A second scholarship is allocated to Instrumental Music. Recipients of this award must fulfill the following criteria:

- a) be enrolled in classes in instrumental technique, teaching methods and field experience as well as classroom teaching methods and field experience at either the elementary or secondary level;

- b) be studying a band or orchestral instrument; and
- c) have shown outstanding achievement in the above classes.

(d) Graduation Scholarships

The Ralph and Frances Lewis Jeffery Scholarship: From the Estate of Frances E. Jeffery came a bequest in 1979 to endow a scholarship which is to be awarded to a student in completing the final year of an honours course in Mathematics, and who has maintained at least a second-class standing during the first three years of the course.

John R. Kaye Memorial Scholarship: The Founder of this scholarship gave a benefaction of \$10,000 to be invested. From the annual income therefrom, one (later more) scholarship may be awarded to a suitably well qualified Dalhousie graduate who is continuing studies in an accredited program in engineering at the Technical University of Nova Scotia. The holder shall be a resident, native-born Nova Scotian who has completed the requirements for the Diploma in Engineering. The Selection Committee shall consider good marks, motivation, diligence, capability for making a contribution to the profession, and financial need. The amount of each scholarship shall approximate tuition fees (maximum \$1,000) in the program the awardee is to pursue. The scholarship will be paid upon presentation of proof of registration at TUNS.

The Archibald MacMechan Chapter/IODE Scholarship in English: In 1939 the Archibald MacMechan Chapter of the IODE offered the University a scholarship from the interest on funds contributed by former students in memory of Dr. Archibald MacMechan (1862-1933), Head of the Department of English from 1889-1932. A capital sum was placed in the hands of the University in December 1948, to endow the scholarship which is intended for students who have shown special ability in English and who are looking forward to further study in the field. Provided that suitable candidates apply, preference will be given to graduates who intend to study for a Master's Degree in English. Application should be made to the Chairman of the Department of English not later than 31 March.

3.4 Health Professions

(a) College of Pharmacy

The Burroughs Wellcome Scholarship: This scholarship of \$350 is available to an undergraduate student of outstanding merit in the second-year class.

The Ralph H. Jenkins Memorial Pharmacy Scholarship (External): This scholarship of \$200 is awarded by the Prince Edward Island Pharmaceutical Association to a student from Prince Edward Island who has achieved a high academic standing.

The Jack Kidd/ANCA Scholarship: This Scholarship was established in 1982 to recognize 43 years of service of Mr. Jack Kidd, a pharmaceutical sales representative, with Anca Inc. It is awarded to a student from New Brunswick or Prince Edward Island who has successfully completed one or more years of the course leading to a degree in pharmacy and who is enrolled in pharmacy at the University for the ensuing year. The student must have a good academic standing and show promise of making future contributions to the profession of Pharmacy. The financial need of the student will also be considered.

The Col. J.D.B.F. MacKenzie Scholarship (External): This scholarship of \$300 is awarded by the New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Society to a student from New Brunswick who obtains the highest academic standing in the first-year classes of the Pharmacy course.

The Dr. Jessie I. MacKnight Scholarship (External): This scholarship

of \$300 is awarded by the New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Society to the student from New Brunswick who obtains the highest standing in the second-year classes of the Pharmacy course.

The New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Society Scholarship

(External): This scholarship of \$300 is awarded by the New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Society to the student from New Brunswick who obtains the highest standing in the third-year classes of the Pharmacy course.

Searle Summer Research Scholarship: This scholarship in an amount of \$1,650 is made possible by funds from G.D. Searle & Co. of Canada, Limited and is to provide financial support for one undergraduate pharmacy student to take research training during the summer months under the supervision of a faculty member of the College of Pharmacy.

The Upjohn Company of Canada Scholarship: This scholarship of \$300 is provided by the Upjohn Company of Canada to a student in the first-year class.

(b) School of Nursing

Scholarships for Registered Nurses (External): The Registered Nurses Association of Nova Scotia offers scholarships to students in the baccalaureate program. See the entry in the Fellowship section for further details.

Walter C. Teagle Nursing Scholarship (External): The Teagle Foundation offers a number of special scholarships which are tenable at accredited schools of nursing in Canada, including Dalhousie University. They are open to qualifying children of employees of Imperial Oil Limited or its wholly-owned subsidiaries. The provisions that govern these awards are set entirely by the Teagle Foundation. However, information and application forms can be obtained by writing to: Secretary, Contributions/Higher Education Awards, Imperial Oil Limited, 111 St. Clair Avenue West, Toronto, Ontario, M5W 1K3.

(c) School of Occupational Therapy

(d) School of Physiotherapy

Isabel M. Jackson Scholarships: Miss Ida P. Jackson of Middleboro, Massachusetts, established this fund in memory of her sister, Isabel M. Jackson, in 1967 for the purpose of benefiting students with bursaries or scholarships. The fund's current use is the provision of scholarships to those students who have been accepted into the first physiotherapy core year from other universities. Assessment is based on the students' mid-session examinations at Dalhousie.

The David Magee Sports Medicine Scholarship (External): The Sports Medicine Division of the Canadian Physiotherapy Association sponsors this annual scholarship to a student who submits the best publishable paper in Sports Medicine. The scholarship includes a cash award, a journal subscription and a commemorative certificate in addition to publication of the paper. Submissions are to be received by the Association on or before 1 March. Further information may be obtained at the Awards Office.

(e) School of Recreation, Physical and Health Education

The Freda N. Wales Memorial Scholarship: This is an in-course award given to a student entering the third or fourth year of study. The student must have a commitment to pursuing a program specializing in outdoor leadership at Dalhousie University. Selection will be based on academic achievement and professional ability.

Note: A special application form, available from the Awards Office, is required.

The VIIth Pan American Wheelchair Games Scholarship: This is an in-course award given to a student entering the third or fourth year of study in the School of Recreation, Physical and Health Education. The student must be committed to pursuing study in the area of recreation and leisure for the disabled. Selection is based on academic and professional capability.

(f) School of Social Work Bachelor of Social Work

The M. Caroline Prince Scholarship: Under the Will of the late M. Caroline Prince the sum of \$5,000 was bequeathed to the University for endowment purposes to benefit the Maritime School of Social Work. The Faculty have decided that the endowment should fund one or more scholarships to students who are engaged either in full-time or part-time study leading to the baccalaureate degree.

3.5 Management Studies School of Business Administration Bachelor of Commerce Program

The Wilfred Berman Scholarship: A scholarship is offered to the student in Commerce who at the end of the second year has attained the highest average mark in Commerce 1101, 1102, 2111. The endowment for this scholarship was provided by friends and co-religionists of the late Professor Berman.

Certified General Accountants Association (Atlantic Region) Scholarship (External): A scholarship of \$150 will be awarded to a student with a major in Accounting who is entering the final year of studies. The award will be based upon financial need and academic excellence.

Clarkson, Gordon & Co. Scholarship: A scholarship of \$100 will be awarded to a third-year student in Commerce who has obtained a high standing on the basis of his/her average marks for a full year's course, of which one class must be in accounting.

Stewart Lockie Gibson Scholarship in Commerce: Several scholarships of varying amounts will be awarded annually to third- and fourth-year students of scholarship standing and good character who are proceeding to a degree in Commerce.

Samuel S. Jacobson Scholarship: Beginning in 1975 the Samuel S. Jacobson Fund has provided one or more scholarships or bursaries as determined by the selection committee. Preference is to be given to Nova Scotian students who are proceeding towards the Bachelor of Commerce degree.

The Harry Margolian Scholarships in Commerce: A bequest of the late Harry Margolian, of Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, enables one or two scholarships per year to be awarded to students working towards degrees in Commerce. These will normally be awarded to students in their third or fourth years.

Maritime Life Actuarial Scholarship (External): This scholarship is awarded competitively to one or several Dalhousie students who have passed examination number 1 in the Society of Actuaries examination syllabus. Each scholarship is in the amount of \$1000 and may be renewable upon successful completion of additional actuarial examinations. Summer employment at Maritime Life Assurance Company would normally be available to scholarship winners. Students should submit applications to Maritime Life Assurance Company or to the Chairman, Department of Mathematics, Statistics and Computing Science at Dalhousie, as soon as they are notified of the passing of

examination number 1, or higher level examinations. Scholarships may sometimes be awarded twice in a calendar year: in late winter and in late summer.

McCurdy Printing and Typesetting Limited Scholarship: The Halifax firm of McCurdy Printing and Typesetting Limited established an endowment in 1985 to provide annually for a scholarship in the School of Business Administration. The Scholarship is open to a student, beyond first year, who has distinguished himself or herself scholastically during the preceding year(s) of study in the Bachelor of Commerce program.

Phillips Cables Scholarship: Commencing with the 1983 academic year Phillips Cables Limited Education Foundation is sponsoring a scholarship to that student entering either the penultimate or final year of studies who has the highest proficiency for the previous year.

Ronald G. Smith Scholarship: In 1981 the Nova Scotia Power Corporation established this scholarship in recognition of the distinguished service rendered by Ronald G. Smith as a member of the Power Corporation's Board of Directors from 1959 to 1981. An amount

of \$400 will be awarded to a Nova Scotia student entering the fourth year of the Bachelor of Commerce program based upon academic achievement, leadership ability and qualities of personality and character. The award will be made by the Undergraduate Scholarship Committee on the recommendation of the Director of the School of Business Administration.

Touche, Ross and Company Scholarship: A scholarship of \$400 will be awarded annually to a second-year student in Commerce obtaining a high standing in the course and who plans to enter articles with a practising firm of Chartered Accountants.

Woolco-Woolworth Scholarship: The F.W. Woolworth Company Limited sponsors a scholarship of \$750 to the student (or students) who is (are) entering the final year of study and who has (have) demonstrated scholarship standing, leadership qualities and interest in retailing.

3.6 School of Dental Hygiene

The Undergraduate Scholarship Committee considers dental hygiene students for scholarships from general funds.



B — Graduate Scholarships and Fellowships

1. Internal Awards

C.L. Bennet Memorial Scholarship: The Department of English has designated that one University scholarship in the amount of \$500 be awarded annually as a memorial to the late Professor C.L. Bennet.

Dalhousie Graduate Fellowships: Dalhousie graduate fellowships are offered in the various fields of graduate level study at Dalhousie. Applications for fellowships must be made on the form "Application for Admission" obtainable from the Associate Registrar. Graduate fellowships are awarded only to students pursuing a degree program on a full-time basis. In general, the Dalhousie graduate fellowship will be paid to the student in regular monthly payments on the 27th of each month, after University fees have been deducted. **Cheques are available from the Awards Office upon presentation of a current valid Dalhousie Student identification card.** Stipend cheques will be available at the Awards Office for only five days, after which the cheques may be obtained at the Payroll Office. Students who are in receipt of an award but are pursuing some part of their program off campus at the request of their department must apply to their department for permission to have award payments sent to their off-campus address. A change of address should be reported immediately. Some assistance with the work of the departments may be required of fellowship holders. The amount of work will vary among departments. Applicants for graduate fellowships should write the head of the department concerned, in addition to making their official application to the Associate Registrar. Very well qualified scholars who receive awards from federal agencies may receive Dalhousie supplements within the limits set down by the agencies offering the awards.

The Sir James Dunn Post-Graduate Scholarship: This scholarship, valued at \$1,000, may be awarded annually by the Faculty of Law to a student who is a candidate for the degree of the Master of Laws. Applications should be addressed to the Secretary of the Faculty not later than 31 March. The application should be accompanied by the applicant's record and testimonials.

Margaret Ferguson Education Fund: The above Fund was established in 1981 to provide an award to a nurse (or nurses) in the Grace Maternity Hospital who has demonstrated need and merit as determined by the Selection Committee. An award need not be made each year. The promotion and encouragement of post-graduate education of nurses are among the objectives of the Trust.

Goldberg-Schulich Fellowship for Entrepreneurship: The Nevada Capital Corporation in 1984 donated the sum of \$29,000 to endow a fellowship in memory of Meyer Goldberg of Halifax. The fellowship is available to a student entering the second year of Dalhousie University's MBA program.

The Dr. Mabel E. Goudge Scholarship in Psychology: In her Will the

late Dr. Mabel Goudge bequeathed a sum of money with which to endow scholarships to qualifying graduate psychology and undergraduate medical students at Dalhousie. The income is to be shared equally between the two disciplines. The scholarship in graduate studies is restricted to experimental or clinical psychology. In any year when there is no qualifying candidate in psychology, the portion of the income allocated to this award is to be added to the capital of the Trust.

Nathan Green Scholarship: The Nathan Green, Q.C., Memorial Fund has been established to provide funds towards research and a scholarship in criminal and/or labour law.

The Professor F. Ronald Hayes International Scholarship: This scholarship fund was established in memory of Professor F. Ronald Hayes, founder and first director of the Institute of Oceanography of Dalhousie University, and in commemoration of the Joint Oceanographic Assembly which was held at Dalhousie during August 1982. The purpose of the scholarship is to provide financial support for a new graduate student in the first year of an MSc or PhD program in the Department of Oceanography. The recipient must be from a developing country, as stipulated in the terms, and will be nominated through the normal screening process by the Departmental Graduate Admission Committee.

The Percy Hermant Fellowship in Ophthalmology: The Imperial Optical Company sponsors an annual fellowship of \$1,000 for post-graduate training in ophthalmology. Candidates are usually to be graduates in medicine of Canadian universities who intend to practise this speciality in Canada.

Roy A. Jodrey Scholarship in Law: From the Estate of the late Roy A. Jodrey came a bequest which endowed an annual scholarship in law upon such terms and conditions as the University from time to time may prescribe. The scholarship is assigned to graduate studies in Law.

Law Graduate Teaching Fellowships: The Faculty of Law may award graduate teaching fellowships, valued at \$2,500 or more, to graduate students in Law. In addition to completing requirements for the LL.M. degree, awardees will be expected to assist in the teaching program at the Law School, particularly in directing research and writings by undergraduate students.

The William Leiper Memorial Scholarship: An endowment has been established to provide an annual scholarship to a deserving graduate student in physics.

Eddy Resident Fellowship for Women: Each year the University may offer to a qualifying woman graduate of Dalhousie the Eddy Resident Fellowship for Women of the value of \$500.

The Izaak Walton Killam Memorial Scholarships: The Killam Scholarship Committee each year offers Izaak Walton Killam Memorial Scholarships, valued at \$12,600 (1985-86), for qualifying students in a Master's or Doctoral program in the natural science, social sciences and humanities at Dalhousie University. The scholarships may be renewed annually upon evidence of satisfactory performance in the program. No remission of the fees accompanies the scholarships, but additional funds to assist with transportation to the University are available. Scholars may perform instructional or demonstrational duties at the discretion of the department, for which duties additional remuneration is given. Eligibility is based on a First Class undergraduate degree in the field of study which the student wishes to pursue.

Candidates do not apply for these Scholarships. On the basis of the information in a completed application the graduate department

concerned may nominate the student to the selection committee. Applications for admission to the University for Graduate Studies are available from the Registrar, Dalhousie University, Halifax, Nova Scotia, B3H 4H6.

The Izaak Walton Killam Postdoctoral Fellowships: The Izaak Walton Killam Fund for Advanced Study at Dalhousie University was founded by Mrs. Dorothy J. Killam in memory of her husband, Izaak Walton Killam. From this Fund each year Dalhousie University offers a number of Fellowships valued at \$22,500 (1985-86), plus travel allowances, which awards are tenable for one year at Dalhousie University in most fields of study. Applications for extensions may be considered. Qualifying applicants should have recently completed a PhD degree at a recognized university, or expect to obtain a degree before taking up the award. Fellows may engage in teaching or other similar duties in the University. Application is to be made on forms available from The Office of the Dean, Faculty of Graduate Studies, Dalhousie University, Halifax, Nova Scotia, B3H 4H6, and returned thereto by **15 December**.

Killam Postgraduate Medical Scholarships: These scholarships were established by the late Mrs. Dorothy J. Killam. They are awarded to postgraduate students in the third, fourth, or fifth year of training in a clinical department of the Faculty of Medicine at Dalhousie or elsewhere. Selection by the Faculty Awards Committee is based on the recommendation of the department head that the candidate is likely to contribute to the advancement of learning or to win distinction in his/her speciality and could be recommended for appointment to the faculty of a medical school upon completion of such training.

Sarah M. Lawson Scholarship in Botany: At the discretion of the Chairman of the Department of Biology, the University may offer a scholarship to a student who has shown special ability in botany. The award is open to students at Dalhousie University or the University of King's College, and is given to support summer research projects in botany at either the undergraduate or graduate level.

The James Gordon MacGregor Memorial Teaching Fellowship in Physics: One fellowship of the value of \$2,500 is offered to graduates of this or other universities each year. To be eligible, the candidate must have the necessary qualifications for admission to the Master's course in Physics. The holder of this fellowship is expected to give instruction in the laboratory for six hours per week during the academic session and to devote the summer months to a research project.

The Dr. A. Stanley MacKenzie Teaching Fellowship in Physics: One fellowship of the value of \$600 is offered to a graduate of this or another university. Candidates must have the necessary qualifications for admission to the Master's course in Physics. The holder will be required to demonstrate for two periods per week.

The Archibald MacMechan Chapter/IODE Scholarship in English: This scholarship was presented to Dalhousie University as an endowment by the Archibald MacMechan Chapter, Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire. It is awarded to students of special ability in English, and preference will be given to graduates who intend to study for a Master's degree in English. Applications should be made to the Chairman of the Department of English not later than 31 March. (Arrangements for the paying of this scholarship are made by the Awards Office.)

The Novapharm Pharmacy Research Fellowship: Novapharm Limited sponsors an annual fellowship of \$500 to a graduate student in the College of Pharmacy who demonstrates superior research achievements in biopharmaceutics or drug metabolism.

The Ross Stewart Smith Memorial Fellowship in Medical Research: Under the original Deed of Gift the Donor provided for the establishment of undergraduate scholarships, one in each of medicine and science. A subsequent legacy greatly enhanced the Donor's original gift and the University as empowered under the aforementioned indenture could cause further scholarships to be granted. During 1970-71 the University established a fellowship which is open to students of exceptional ability who commit themselves to either clinical research or the basic medical sciences following their graduation from Dalhousie University's Faculty of Medicine. Application is to be made to the Scholarships and Awards Committee of the Faculty of Medicine.

The James W. Tupper Graduate Fellowship in English: This fellowship, of an annual value of approximately \$6,000 is awarded by the faculty of the English Department to a student who proposes to do graduate work in English at a university approved by the faculty. It need not be held at Dalhousie. (If the awardee intends to study elsewhere, arrangements for payment need to be made with the Awards Office.)

The Parke, Davis Pharmacy Research Fellowship: Parke, Davis Canada Inc. annually sponsors a fellowship of \$2,000 to a graduate student in the College of Pharmacy.

Xerox Canada Fellowship: Each year Xerox Canada, Inc. sponsors a fellowship of \$2,000 value, tenable at Dalhousie University for advanced studies in the School of Business Administration.

The H.W. Wilson Scholarship: Sponsored by the H.W. Wilson Foundation, the scholarship is intended to attract exceptional young men and women who would not otherwise be able to make librarianship the choice for a career. Apply to the Director, School of Library Service, Dalhousie University.

2. External Awards

Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada Grants: The Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council offers fellowships and grants in the social sciences and humanities and a variety of assistance to professional artists.

Among Council programs of aid are: MA scholarships, Doctoral fellowships, Postdoctoral fellowships, Arts awards, and Arts bursaries.

The MA scholarship deadline is 1 October; that for the doctoral (for submission to Graduate Studies) is 1 December.

Brochures giving detailed information, including deadlines for annual competitions, on these and other Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council programs of aid are available on campus from the Dean of Graduate Studies, or off campus from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council, 255 Albert Street, PO Box 1610, Ottawa, Ontario, K1P 6G4

Canadian Foundation for the Advancement of Pharmacy Fellowships:

1. Graduate Fellowships in Hospital Pharmacy: The Canadian Foundation for the Advancement of Pharmacy offers three \$500 fellowships on a national competitive basis to Canadian pharmacy graduates who have been accepted into a pharmacy residency program. Applications must be submitted to the Canadian Foundation for the Advancement of Pharmacy, 175 College Street, Toronto, Ontario, M5T 1P8, before 1 June.

2. Fellowships in Professional Practice: The Canadian Foundation for the Advancement of Pharmacy offers four \$500 fellowships to Canadian pharmacy graduates on a national competitive basis to applicants presenting study programs in any professional area; i.e., research,

clinical pharmacy, drug information services, etc. Applications must be submitted to the Canadian Foundation for the Advancement of Pharmacy, 175 College Street, Toronto, Ontario, M5T 1P8, before 1 June.

Canadian Social Sciences Research Council Predoctoral

Fellowships: The Canadian Social Sciences Research Council offers a number of predoctoral fellowships. The value of these will normally range from \$750 to \$2,000. The conditions of award are similar to the conditions for the award of Humanities Research Council predoctoral fellowship. Applications should be made to the Secretary, Canadian Social Science Research Council, 151 Slater Street, Ottawa, Ontario, K1P 5N1.

Canadian Wildlife Service Scholarships: The Canadian Wildlife Service offers to Canadian citizens scholarships of \$1,200 to promote postgraduate training in terrestrial wildlife biology. Additional information is available in the Awards Office. The closing date is 1 April. Applications containing the required information and accompanied by supporting documents are to be addressed to: Director, Canadian Wildlife Service, 400 Laurier Avenue West, Ottawa, Ontario, K1A 0W1.

Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation Fellowships: The Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation sponsors over 100 CMHC Fellowships which are tenable at Dalhousie and other Canadian universities for advanced studies in urban and regional affairs. Appropriate fields of study include urban ecological studies, urban administration and finance, law of planning and development, urban demography, real estate management, urban economics, local government, urban history and philosophy, housing and urban transportation. Completed application forms are to be submitted to the sponsoring university's relevant department by 1 March. Further information and application forms are available from: Administration Officer, Fellowship Committee, Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation, Ottawa, Ontario, K1A 0P7.

Duff-Rinfret Scholarships: To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the founding of the Supreme Court of Canada, celebrated in 1975, the Department of Justice is offering seven Master's program scholarships to qualified students in Canadian law schools. These scholarships are designated as the Duff-Rinfret Scholarships in honour of two former Chief Justices of the Supreme Court of Canada who were distinguished representatives of this country's two legal systems. The goal of this program is to promote legal research in Canadian law schools in areas within the jurisdiction of the federal government. Any person who is in the final year of an LLB program at a Canadian law school or who already has obtained an LLB degree granted from a Canadian university may submit an application, provided that he/she intends to follow a course of study or research in an area of law under federal jurisdiction; and that he/she enrolls in a master's program offered by a Canadian law school. Each applicant will have to establish that he/she has been rated as a superior student in his/her class at law school. Financial assistance is provided in the form of a scholarship valued at \$9,000, tuition fees, travel allowance and a thesis allowance of \$800. Further information may be obtained from the Placement Office, Faculty of Law, Dalhousie University.

Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan: The Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan aims at providing opportunities for Commonwealth students to pursue advanced courses in other Commonwealth countries. The scholarships are intended for men and women of high intellectual promise who may be expected to make a significant contribution to their own countries on their return from study abroad. At present, graduate scholarships are available for study

in the United Kingdom, Australia, New Zealand, Hong Kong, Malaya, Zimbabwe, Malawi, Malta, India, Sri Lanka, and Nigeria. The Canadian Government offers scholarships for other Commonwealth students to study in Canada. The latter are tenable at Dalhousie. Awards will normally be made for a period of two academic years, and will cover return transportation, tuition fees, a personal maintenance allowance and a grant for incidental expenses. Deadline dates for receipt of applications vary according to each country. Full information and application forms may be obtained from Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada, 151 Slater Street, Ottawa, Ontario, K1P 5N1.

Imperial Oil Fellowships: Imperial Oil Limited established, in 1946, Graduate Research Fellowships for annual competition. These fellowships now number six, and have a potential value of \$21,000 (\$7,000 per annum for a maximum of three years). No restriction is placed on the amount of similar assistance held concurrently. Successful applicants may attend any approved university. The fellowships are open to any Canadian citizen who is a graduate of any approved university, or a prospective graduate in the year of competition, for research leading to a doctor's degree in the fields of pure and applied natural and/or exact sciences (three fellowships) and social sciences and humanities (three fellowships). Nominations for the fellowships are made by the university from which the candidate graduated or expects to be graduated in the year of competition. Nominations are to be received by: Coordinator, Graduate Research Fellowships, Imperial Oil Limited, 111 St. Clair Avenue West, Toronto, Ontario, M5W 1K3.

IODE War Memorial Scholarships: The IODE provides approximately eight memorial scholarships each year for study towards a graduate degree in Canada or overseas within the Commonwealth. Candidates must be Canadian citizens and must hold a first degree from a recognized university. At the time of applying, a candidate's studies for a master's degree must have been completed or be in progress. Further information is available at the Awards Office.

The Doctor Jean C. Nelson Memorial Award: The Foundation's purpose in sponsoring this scholarship of at least \$3,000 is to assist the awardee in pursuing graduate study related to community health particularly in fields related to services for children. Although the annual award is tenable at any recognized university, the Foundation's intent is to further the quality of community health services in Alberta. Walter C. Sumner Memorial Fellowships: Fellowships of \$4,000 to \$5,000 are available in each academic year for male or female doctoral candidates in the fields of chemistry, physics, or electronics.

The Fellowships are available to candidates in full-time attendance at Dalhousie University, University of Toronto, McGill University, University of Saskatchewan, University of British Columbia or Queen's University and may be held for up to two years. An applicant must hold a degree from a recognized Canadian university other than the university where doctoral studies and research will be carried on, must be a Canadian citizen and must be domiciled in one of the Provinces of Canada. Preference will be given to qualified applicants domiciled in Nova Scotia. Preference will be given to applicants from the other Atlantic Provinces, from provinces outside the Atlantic region, and to applicants to whom an award had previously been given. Applications are to be made to the Walter C. Sumner Foundation through the Office of the Dean of Graduate Studies, Dalhousie University by 15 March. Further details and

application forms may be obtained at the Office of the Director of Awards or from any other of the participating universities.

W.B. Saunders Nursing Fellowship: The W.B. Saunders Company provides a fellowship of \$1,000 for graduate study in Nursing. Open to Students in Selected Faculties

Dalhousie Leadership Scholarships: A limited number of scholarships are awarded annually to students who exhibit the qualities of leadership. Other factors used as guidelines for selection are financial need, potential for contribution to the life of the University and the community, character and scholastic standing. Nova Scotia Teachers' College Scholarship: A scholarship of the value of \$500 annually is available for award to a graduate of the Nova Scotia Teachers' College recommended by the principal.

D — Dentistry

School of Dental Hygiene

1.1 Scholarships

Entrance Scholarships

The Undergraduate Scholarship Committee, as described earlier in this booklet, considers entering students in Dental Hygiene for entrance scholarships.

In-Course Scholarships

The Undergraduate Scholarship Committee, as described earlier in this booklet, considers continuing students in Dental Hygiene for in-course scholarships.

1.2 Prizes and Medals

First-year Students

The Alice Hartlen Memorial Prize: An annual cash prize is available to the dental hygiene student who has demonstrated the greatest originality and creativity in community projects in the Health Education class.

The Katie Lubetzki Memorial Prize: This is a prize of \$50 cash for the student who has attained the highest grade in all subjects.

The Nova Scotia Dental Association Prize: The Association sponsors a \$50 cash prize to the student who demonstrates the greatest proficiency in Pre-Clinical Dental Hygiene. The prize is paid directly to the student by the Association.

The Lisa VanAlphen Memorial Prize: An annual prize is available to the dental hygiene student who in the opinion of the selecting committee best combines sound academic standing, professional excellence and character.

Second-Year Students

The Katie Lubetzki Memorial Prize: This is a prize of \$50 cash for the student who has attained the highest grade in all subjects.

Nova Scotia Dental Hygienist Association Prize: The Association sponsors an annual prize of \$50 to the student who has attained the second highest grade in all subjects. The prize is paid directly to the student by the Association.

The Columbia Dentoform Prize: A prize consisting of a Columbia Dentoform Model is awarded to the student who has attained the highest standing in patient management and patient education.

The Nova Scotia Dental Hygienists Association Prizes: The Association sponsors prizes for the best and second best Table Clinic presentations which prizes are in the amount of \$60 and \$40 respectively (or \$30 and \$20 to each student in the case of two students working together). The association pays the prizes directly to the awardees.

Anne Rafuse Memorial Prize: This prize was established in memory of Anne B. Rafuse, a student of Dalhousie University. The recipient is selected by the director of the School of Dental Hygiene. The prize consists of books to the approximate value of \$50.

Johnson and Johnson Prize: This prize in the amount of \$100 is open to a student who in the opinion of the Faculty has demonstrated proficiency and interest in Community Dentistry.

1.3 Bursaries

University Bursaries: The University has limited general funds which may be used to provide bursary assistance to qualifying students.

Jennifer Wright Memorial Bursary: An endowment has been established to provide for an annual bursary to a Second-Year student who in the opinion of the selection committee has demonstrated financial need.

2. School of Dentistry

2.1 Scholarships

Entrance Scholarships

Students in the DDS program are considered for scholarships by either of two committees.

The Dental Admissions Committee assesses entering students for entrance scholarships. Scholarship applications are not required for entrance scholarship consideration. A supplementary application, however, will be required of those candidates whom the Committee will consider for the McGuigan scholarship, which has a financial need component.

The Academic Awards Committee considers continuing students for in-course scholarships which are tenable upon entering Second, Third or Fourth Year. No special application is required.

Dalhousie Entrance Dental Scholarship: A scholarship of \$1,000 will be awarded to the student entering the first year of Dentistry who has the highest scholastic standing. This achievement is to be in the imperative university courses which are required for admission into the Faculty of Dentistry. Dalhousie University standards are such that the successful candidate will have an academic record with an overall average of not less than 75% with no subject below 50% in his/her university experience.

The Dr. James P.M. McGuigan Memorial Scholarship: This fund was established in 1983 to provide for an annual entrance scholarship to an academically accomplished student who is a resident of the Atlantic provinces and who shows evidence of actual financial need. A supplementary financial application will be sent by the Dental Admissions Committee to those who are to be given further consideration.

In-Course Scholarships

Dalhousie University Dental Scholarships: A scholarship of \$1,000 will be awarded to the student entering the **second year** of Dentistry who attained the highest scholastic standing in the first year of Dentistry at Dalhousie provided that his/her grade point average was not less than 3.0 with no subject below a grade of C. A scholarship of \$1,000 will be awarded to the student entering the **third year** of Dentistry who attained the highest scholastic standing in the second year of Dentistry at Dalhousie provided that his/her grade point average was not less than 3.0 with no subject below a grade of C. A **further \$1000** is available as either one scholarship or two (at \$500 each) to be awarded at the discretion of the Academic Awards Committee to one or two academically meritorious students entering Second, Third or Fourth Year.

The Dr. I.K. Lubetsky Scholarship: An endowment has been established to fund the I.K. Lubetsky Scholarship of \$500 to the student in third year who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in the

practice of Clinical Oral Surgery, provided an overall grade point average of 3.0 has been achieved in that year. The scholarship is tenable in the fourth year.

2.2 Prizes and Medals

Students with advanced standing who have had the benefit of postgraduate study are ineligible for undergraduate prizes and awards in the Faculty of Dentistry.

Fourth-Year Students

Academy of Dentistry for the Handicapped Award: This is an award available to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in a project concerned with the handicapped dental patient. The award consists of an associate membership in the Academy, a subscription to the Academy's journal, and a certificate. Applications and further information are available from the Academic Awards Committee.

The American Academy of Dental Radiology Prize: In recognition of exceptional interest and accomplishment in Dental Radiology the Academy sponsors an annual prize consisting of a membership and a one-year subscription to the *Triple O Journal*.

The American Academy of Gold Foil Operators Prize: This prize is awarded in recognition of outstanding qualities as a scholar and clinician in Operative Dentistry, with proficiency in accomplishing direct gold restorations. The award is a one-year subscription to the *Journal of Operative Dentistry*.

The American Academy of Oral Medicine Prize: This prize, given for the greatest proficiency in Clinical Oral Pathology, consists of a certificate, one-year membership and subscription.

The American Association of Endodontists Prize: For exceptional ability in Endodontics the Association sponsors an annual prize consisting of one-year subscription to *Oral Surgery, Oral Medicine and Oral Pathology* and a one-year Student Membership in the American Association of Endodontists.

The American Society of Dentistry for Children Prize: A membership in the Society and a one-year subscription to the *ASDC Journal of Dentistry for Children* constitute the annual prize which the Society sponsors to recognize an outstanding student in Dentistry for Children.

The Canadian Associated Laboratories Limited Prize: Awarded in the final year, this prize is a book selected by the donor and given to the student who demonstrates the greatest proficiency in Clinical Fixed Prosthodontics.

The Canadian Society of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons Prize: The Society sponsors a prize, consisting of one or more books, to the student who has achieved the highest standing in Oral Surgery on the aggregate of the person's third and fourth year marks.

The Dr. John W. Dobson Memorial Prize: This prize is awarded to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in Periodontics. The prize may be a cash award of \$50 or one or more books to that approximate value.

The Faculty Book Prize: A prize in the form of a book (or books) to the approximate value of \$50 is awarded to the student who has attained the highest marks in Oral Diagnosis.

Johnson and Johnson Prize: A prize in the amount of \$100 is open to

a student for proficiency and interest in Practice Management.

The Modern Dental Laboratory Prize: A prize in the form of a book (or books) to the approximate value of \$50 is awarded to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in Removable Prosthodontics.

The Quintessence Award: In recognition of a student's demonstrated excellence in Clinical Achievement in Periodontics, the Company sponsors an award consisting of a one-year subscription to the *International Journal of Periodontics and Restorative Dentistry*.

The Quintessence Book Prize: This prize, consisting of a book or books to the approximate value of \$50, is awarded to the student who has attained the highest marks in Oral Diagnosis.

University Medal in Dentistry: This medal will be awarded on graduation to the student who has a grade point average of 3.0 or over in the final year and a grade point average of not less than 2.5 in the entire professional course, or who in the opinion of the faculty merits this award. A failure in any year will make a student ineligible. Only one medal will be awarded in any year, and other students reaching the medal standard will receive "honourable mention" in order of merit.

The Dr. Frank Woodbury Memorial Prize: This prize, consisting of books to the approximate value of \$100, is awarded to the student who has attained the *highest* grade point average.

The Dr. Frank Woodbury Memorial Prize: A prize, consisting of a book or books to the approximate value of \$50, is awarded to the student who has attained the *second highest* grade point average.

The Dr. Frank Woodbury Memorial Prize: In recognition of a student's demonstrating the greatest proficiency in *Clinical Practice*, a prize consisting of a book or books to the approximate value of \$50 is awarded.

The Dr. William W. Woodbury Memorial Prize: In recognition of a student's demonstrating the greatest proficiency in Orthodontics, a prize consisting of a book or books to the approximate value of \$50 is awarded.

Third-Year Students

Atlantic Orthodontic Society Prize: The Society sponsors a book prize of approximately \$50 in value to be awarded to the student who has shown the greatest proficiency in theoretical and clinical orthodontics.

The Dr. J. Stanley Bagnall Memorial Prize: This prize, in the form of books to an approximate value of \$100, is awarded to the student who has achieved the highest grade point average in all subjects.

The Dr. W.H.H. Beckwith Prize: This prize, in the form of a book or books to the approximate value of \$50, is awarded to the student who has achieved the greatest proficiency in Operative Dentistry.

The Canadian Academy of Periodontology Prize: This prize, in the form of books to the approximate value of \$50, is awarded to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in Periodontics.

The Faculty Book Prize: This prize, in the form of one or more books to an approximate value of \$50, is awarded to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in Removable Prosthodontics.

The Dr. F.A. Godsoe Oral Pathology Prize: The College of Dental Surgeons of New Brunswick (formerly New Brunswick Dental Society)

sponsors this cash award of \$150 which is awarded to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in Systemic and Oral Pathology.

The Halifax County Dental Society Awards: These awards are made for the best, second best and third best presentations in Table Clinic. The purses of these awards are in the amounts of \$75, \$50 and \$25 respectively.

The International College of Dentists (Canadian Section) Award: The College sponsors a cash award of \$350 to the student who best combines scholastic achievement, general character and participation in extra-curricular activities during the third year. The College pays the award directly to the student.

The Johnson and Johnson Prize: To recognize proficiency and interest in Dental Public Health the Johnson and Johnson Company sponsors a prize of \$100.

The C.V. Mosby Book Prize: This prize, in the form of one or more books to the approximate value of \$50, is awarded to the student who has attained the highest marks in Fixed Partial Denture Technique.

Nova Scotia Dental Association Prizes: The Association sponsors three prizes, each consisting of books to the approximate value of \$50, for achievement as follows:

- (a) For the second highest grade point average in all subjects;
- (b) for the greatest proficiency in Removable Prosthodontics; and
- (c) for the greatest proficiency in Dental Auxiliary Utilization.

Table Clinic Fourth Prize: A cash award of \$25 is given to the student who makes the fourth best presentation in Table Clinic.

Third-Year Clinical Practice Prize: For the greatest proficiency in clinical practice in the third year, a prize is awarded in the form of either \$50 cash or books to that approximate value.

The W.B. Saunders Prize (Dentistry): A one-year subscription to *Dental Clinics of North America* is awarded for the most significant improvement in third year.

The Dr. D.E. Williams Prize: This prize, consisting of books to the approximate value of \$50, is awarded for the greatest proficiency in Clinical and Didactic Pedodontics.

Second-Year Students

The Charles Bell Memorial Prize*: This prize, in the form of one or more books to the approximate value of \$100, is awarded to the student who has attained the *highest* grade point average in all subjects.

The Charles Bell Memorial Prize*: This prize, in the form of one or more books to the approximate value of \$50, is awarded to the student who has attained the *second highest* grade point average in all subjects.

The Canadian Associated Dental Laboratories Prize: Books to the approximate value of \$50 constitute this prize which is awarded for the greatest proficiency in Removable Prosthodontics.

The Dr. H.M. Eaton Memorial Prize*: This prize is awarded to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in Radiology. The prize is in the form of one or more books of the approximate value of \$50.

The Dr. David Manuel Memorial Prize*: One or more books to the approximate value of \$50 constitute this prize. It is awarded to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in Clinical Preventive Dentistry.

The C.V. Mosby Book Prize: This prize, consisting of one or more books to the approximate value of \$50, is awarded to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in Microbiology.

Nova Scotia Dental Association Prize: The Association sponsors a prize to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in *Orthodontics*. The prize consists of a book or books to the approximate value of \$50.

Nova Scotia Dental Association Prize: The Association sponsors a prize to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in *Pharmacology*. The prize consists of a purse of \$50.

The Quintessence Publishing Company Prize: The company sponsors a prize for demonstrated proficiency and interest in Preventive Dentistry, which prize consists of one or more books to the approximate value of \$50.

First-Year Students

The Charles Bell Memorial Prize*: This prize, in the form of one or more books to the approximate value of \$100, is awarded to the student who has attained the *highest* grade point average in all subjects.

The Charles Bell Memorial Prize*: This prize, in the form of one or more books to the approximate value of \$50, is awarded to the student who has attained the *second highest* grade point average in all subjects.

The Dr. F.A. Godsoe Dental Anatomy Prize: The College of Dental Surgeons of New Brunswick sponsors a cash award of \$150 for the student who has shown the greatest proficiency in Dental Anatomy.

The Dr. F.A. Godsoe Operative Dentistry Prize: This prize of \$150 in cash is awarded to the student who has shown the greatest proficiency in Operative Dentistry. The College of Dental Surgeons of New Brunswick sponsors this prize.

The C.V. Mosby Book Prize: This prize, consisting of a book or books to the approximate value of \$50, is awarded to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in *Biochemistry*.

Nova Scotia Dental Association Prize: This prize, consisting of a book or books to the approximate value of \$50, is awarded to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in *Anatomy*.

Nova Scotia Dental Association Prize: The Association sponsors a prize consisting of books to the approximate value of \$50 to the student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in *Correlative Craniofacial Embryology and Histology*.

Nova Scotia Dental Association Prize: The Association sponsors an annual prize for the greatest proficiency in *Dental Biomaterials*, which prize consists of a book or books to the approximate value of \$50.

The Saint John Dental Society Prize: To recognize a student's demonstrating the greatest proficiency in Physiology, the Society sponsors an annual prize consisting of a book or books to the approximate value of \$50.

**Note:* These prizes have been supplemented from funds provided through the annual contribution of the Nova Scotia Dental Association.

2.3 Bursaries

This subsection should be read with reference to the bursary portion of the Financial Aid section.

The Sidney D. Campbell Memorial Bursary: Out of the income from this fund a bursary will be awarded annually to the third-year dental student who has demonstrated financial need and who, by scholarship and character, appears deserving of this assistance.

The Dr. D. Brendan MacNeil Bursary: From the family of the late Dr. Donald Brendan MacNeil the sum of \$1,000 was given to the University to provide an annual memorial bursary to a fourth-year student in the School of Dentistry.

Arrabelle MacKenzie McCallum Bursary: Under the Will of the late Emelyn L. MacKenzie the University has been given a bequest to provide bursaries in Arts and Science, Dentistry, and Law. One-third of

the net income is allotted to the Faculty of Dentistry for the purpose of funding a bursary to one or more students. The recipient must be a bona fide resident of and domiciled in the County of Victoria (as defined by the boundaries then extant in AD 1900), Nova Scotia. Character and need are the main criteria.

The Dr. F.L. Miller Memorial Bursary: The Fredericton Dental Society in 1979 endowed funds in memory of this distinguished graduate of Dalhousie who contributed so much to the community. A bursary from the annual income of the fund is to be awarded to a second-year dental student who has demonstrated financial need. Preference will be given to, but will not strictly be limited to, a New Brunswick student.

University Bursaries: Other bursaries may be available to assist students with the funding of their dental education. Application for financial assistance should be made via the Awards Office.

2.4 Loans

Refer to the loans portion of the section on Financial Aid.



E — Law

1. Scholarships

The Student Awards Committee is responsible for the selection of scholars in the Bachelor of Laws program and the combined MBA/LLB program (Law portion). Application for the pure scholarships is not required, except for those of the Law Foundation of Nova Scotia. (Application for the hybrid scholarship-bursary awards is required, and this form is available from the Awards Office. See also the law bursary section in this booklet.)

1.1 Entrance Scholarships

Cape Breton Barristers' Society Scholarship: In 1965 the Cape Breton Barristers' Society instituted a scholarship in the amount of \$200 to be awarded at the discretion of the Dean to a student or students from Cape Breton County, on a combined basis of academic performance and need. (For accounting and coding purposes this hybrid award is classed with bursaries.)

Ellorient, Donald & Hugh Fraser Memorial Scholarship: A memorial Fund was established in 1985 in the form of an endowment. The annual income from the Fund is to provide a scholarship to the most capable Dalhousie law student from Yarmouth County. In any year that the selecting committee determines that there is no appropriate student from Yarmouth County, the annual income is to be added to the capital of the Fund.

The Law Foundation of Nova Scotia Scholarships: The Foundation sponsors three scholarships, each in the amount of \$5,000, which are open to exceptionally capable students who are applying to the first year of the Bachelor of Laws degree at Dalhousie. Application literature may be obtained from either the Awards office or the Law Admissions Office. The L.F.N.S. Scholarships application must be sent to the Dean, Faculty of Law, Dalhousie University, Halifax, Nova Scotia, B3H 4H9, postmarked no later than 31 March.

Grace Wambolt Scholarship: This scholarship is open to native Nova Scotians to assist one or more to attend first-year LLB studies. Assessment is to be made on the basis of academic achievement and financial need. A winner may be reconsidered in subsequent years. (For accounting and coding purposes this hybrid award is classed with bursaries.)

1.2 In-course Scholarships

The Frederick P. Bligh Scholarship: A scholarship will be awarded to the student of the first year who, having made a high scholastic average, in the opinion of the Faculty, shows the most promise of achieving high standards of professional and public service.

The Honourable Alistair Fraser Scholarships: The Honourable Alistair Fraser Fund was established in 1968 through the generosity of Mrs. Alistair Fraser and the executors of the Estate of the late Hon. Alistair Fraser, MC, QC, LL.D. The Fund commemorates a distinguished graduate of the Law School who served his Province and Canada with distinction as a soldier in the First World War, in business and as Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia from 1952-1958. The Fund provides scholarships to assist students of superior academic ability who are likely to make a significant contribution to the legal profession.

Prince Edward Island Law Foundation Scholarship: The PEI Law Foundation in 1985 donated the sum of \$20,000 to establish an endowment from which the annual income will provide a major scholarship. This scholarship is tenable by a student who is entering Second Year of study in law, who is ordinarily a resident of Prince Edward Island, and who has achieved a good academic record in the Law School. By an additional gift the PEI Law Foundation has made possible for the inaugural award to apply to the 1985-86 academic year.

The George Isaac Smith Memorial Scholarship: The partners of Patterson, Smith, Matthews & Grant have established a scholarship to honour the memory of their partner, the late G.I. Smith. A native of Stewiacke, Ike Smith was an avid photographer and noted sportsman during his high school and university years. He started his law career in 1932. During the Second World War he served as a Colonel of the North Nova Scotia Highlanders. He was first elected an MLA in 1949, and remained such until 1974. G.I. Smith served as Premier of Nova Scotia from 1967 to 1970. He was appointed to the Senate in 1975. The scholarship is open to the student who has shown academic excellence and who demonstrates, in the opinion of faculty, the promise of achieving exemplary standards of professional and public service.

2. Prizes and Medals

The Eunice W. Beeson Memorial Prize: A prize to be awarded, at the discretion of the Faculty, to the qualifying student in the Law School who seems worthy on the basis of her academic performance in the School, qualities of personality and character, and economic need. The prize was established by Mrs. Mary Beeson Mobley and friends in memory of Miss Eunice W. Beeson, the first professional Librarian in the Law School, Sir James Dunn Law Librarian and Associate Professor, 1959-66.

The G.O. Forsyth Prize: The prize of \$180 will be awarded to the student of the Law School whom the Faculty deems to be the most deserving in the sense of combining the qualities of scholarship, character, and economic need.

The Leonard A. Kitz, Q.C. Prize: A book prize donated by Leonard A. Kitz, Q.C., will be awarded annually for skill in oral legal argument, in moot courts or as otherwise determined by the faculty.

The R. Graham Murray Prize: The Class of 1954 established an endowment in honour of Professor R. Graham Murray, Q.C., a distinguished teacher at the Law School. One purpose of the endowment is the provision of a prize to a meritorious student in a subject to be designated by the Faculty.

Nova Scotia Barristers' Society Prizes: A prize for high standing in a year's work is awarded to one student in each year of the LLB course, from the fund annually donated by the Nova Scotia Barristers' Society.

Third-Year Students

Robert E. Bamford Memorial Prize: The friends, colleagues and classmates of the late Robert E. Bamford, a graduate of the Class of 1975, have established this memorial prize in his honour. Robert Bamford was formerly the treasurer and president of the Dalhousie Law Students' Society and, at the time of his death, was a doctoral student in law at the University of Edinburgh. The prize is awarded to the third-year student who best combines academic excellence with a commitment to the Law School community.

Canada Law Book Company Prize in Conflict of Laws: A prize of \$50 worth of text books will be awarded to the student who makes the highest mark in Conflict of Laws.

Carswell Prize: Books to the value of \$100 will be awarded to the student who makes the highest average in the third year examinations.

The A.S. Pattillo Prize: The Toronto law firm of Blake, Cassels & Graydon sponsors the A.S. Pattillo Prize for Advocacy in Moot Court.

The Henry B. Rhude Memorial Prize: In 1985 the law firm of Stewart, MacKeen & Covert established this memorial prize, which is to be awarded to the student who attains the highest mark in the class, Taxation III.

University Medal in Law: This medal may be awarded on graduation to the student standing highest among those taking the full regular third-year curriculum, who has attained a very high standard of excellence, and obtains First Class distinction in at least all but three of the subjects of examination.

Second- or Third-Year Students

Robert Batt Memorial Award: Friends and associates of the late Robert John Batt (Law Class of 1936) contributed to the establishment of a fund from which an annual memorial prize would be granted for scholastic achievement in advanced Constitutional Law.

Blake, Cassels and Graydon Corporation Law Book Prize: A prize of \$250 is awarded annually to the student who achieves the highest standing in Business Associations.

Canada Permanent Mortgage Corporation Prize: A prize of \$100 annually will be awarded to the student making the second highest mark in Property Law II.

Canada Permanent Trust Company Prize: A prize of \$100 will be awarded to the student making the highest mark in Equity and Trusts.

Canadian Bar Association Maritime Law Prize: The Maritime Law Section of the Canadian Bar Association (Nova Scotia Branch) will award annually to a student or students of high standing in the subject of Maritime Law, a prize to commemorate the successful re-establishment of the Section under the chairmanship of Frank Metcalf, Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, 1975-79.

The Central Trust Company Prize: This prize in Property II of \$200 is to be awarded to the student who achieves the highest mark in Property II.

The Richard deBoo Limited Prize: This prize is awarded to the student achieving the highest mark in Taxation I. At the student's option the prize may be either a one-year subscription to the deBoo Taxation Service or \$150 worth of books of the student's choice.

The Robert T. Donald Memorial Prize: A prize will be provided out of a fund established by former students, colleagues and friends of the late Robert T. Donald, a teacher at the Law School and Dean from 1969 until his death in 1971. The prize is awarded to the student who achieved the highest standing in Corporate Finance.

Robert T. Donald Prize in Insurance: The Carswell Company Limited and colleagues of the late Professor Robert T. Donald have established a fund, the income therefrom which will provide an annual memorial prize for the student with the highest standing in the class in Insurance.

The J. Gordon Fogo Prize: This prize is to be awarded to the student with the highest standing in Commercial Law.

The H. Carl Goldenberg, Q.C. Prize: A prize of \$100 worth of books will be awarded by H. Carl Goldenberg, OBE, QC, LL.D., to the student who attains high standing in Public Law subjects designated by the Faculty.

Stuart Clarke Lane Memorial Prize: A prize of \$1,000 will be awarded to the student making the highest mark in Administrative Law. This prize was donated by the Class of 1940 in memory of their classmate killed in action. In 1978 the fund was supplemented by a generous bequest from the Estate of Pauline H. Lane in memory of her son.

Ronald St. John Macdonald Prize in Public International Law: This is a prize awarded to the student who makes the highest mark in Public International Law.

Maritime Law Book Limited Prizes: Maritime Law Book Limited sponsors two annual prizes which are open to students in the legal ethics course, Problems in Profession Practice. A First Prize of \$200 will be awarded to the student who achieves the highest standing. A Second Prize of \$100 will be awarded to the student who places second. The sponsor will pay the cash award directly to the winners.

Osler, Hoskin & Harcourt Prize: This prize in the amount of \$300 is open to the student who obtains the highest mark in Debtor & Creditor Rights.

The Elkanah Rafuse Prize in Admiralty Law: In 1976 a fund was established in memory of the late Elkanah Rafuse of Halifax for the purpose of providing a prize for a student or students of high standing in the subject of Admiralty Law.

The Horace E. Read Legislation Prize: A prize will be awarded to the student making the highest mark in Legislation.

Robert A. Samek Memorial Prize: A fund has been established by the family, relatives and friends of the late Robert A. Samek to endow an annual memorial prize. The prize is available to the student who attains the highest standing in jurisprudence and/or legal philosophy in Year II or Year III as determined by Faculty.

Second-Year Students

Canada Law Book Company Procedure Prize: A prize of \$50 worth of text books will be awarded to the student who makes the highest mark in the course in Procedure.

Carswell Prize: Books to the value of \$50 will be awarded to the student who makes the highest average in second-year examinations.

The Honourable Richard B. Hanson Prize: The income from a fund of \$5,000, presented by Mrs. R.B. Hanson, will be awarded to the student making the highest mark in Constitutional Law. The prize is in memory of the late Honourable Richard B. Hanson, a distinguished graduate of the law school, lawyer and public servant.

Mr. Justice Vincent C. MacDonald Prize: A prize of \$50 will be awarded to the student of the second year, who, in the opinion of the Faculty, has shown the most satisfactory progress during that year and has attained at least second-class standing.

First- or Second-Year Students

The John V. O'Dea Prize: A prize of \$150 is to be awarded annually from the gift of John V. O'Dea, a graduate of 1981, to a student who was admitted as a special status or a mature applicant. The prize is to be awarded after the student has completed either first or second year on

the combined basis of good academic standing and contribution to the life of the Dalhousie Law School.

First-Year Students

Canada Law Book Company Prize in Family Law: A prize of \$50 worth of text books will be awarded to the student who makes the highest mark in the first-year class in Family Law.

Carswell Prize: Books to the value of \$50 will be awarded to the student who makes the highest average in first-year examinations.

CCH Canadian Limited Prize in Legal Research and Writing: A prize of \$100 made available by CCH Canadian Limited of Toronto, will be awarded to the student of the first year who makes the highest mark in the legal research and writing program.

Class of 1958 Prize: A prize of the net income of a fund established by the Class of 1958 will be awarded to the student making the highest mark in Criminal Law and Procedure.

The G.O. Forsyth Essay Prize: A prize of \$180 will be awarded to the student in first year who submits the best essay on a legal topic, if the essay meets an approved standard of excellence.

Goodfellow MacKenzie Prize: The Calgary law firm of Goodfellow, MacKenzie has donated a prize of \$200 to be awarded to the student who achieves the second highest average in the first-year class.

Honourable Angus L. Macdonald Prize: This prize is awarded to the student who has attained the highest mark in the class, Tort Law and Damage Compensation.

The Clyde W. Sperry Prize: In 1975 the Donor gave the University \$2,000 to endow an annual prize in memory of Clyde W. Sperry, a graduate of the Law School. The cash prize is awarded to the student who has attained the highest mark in the first-year class in Property in its Historical Perspective.

3. Bursaries

This subsection should be read with reference to the bursary portion of the Financial Aid section.

The Ray Anderson Bursary: An annual bursary has been established in memory of Ray Anderson, a former deputy minister of labour. The bursary will be awarded to the student who has demonstrated interest in labour relations, who is, in the opinion of the Student Finances Subcommittee, in need of financial assistance, and who has completed Second Year Law with good standing. (This bursary has an autumn application deadline.)

The Blake, Cassels & Graydon Scholarship: The law firm of Blake, Cassels & Graydon has established this award for the student (or two students) among first year applicants who have shown academic proficiency and who have demonstrated financial need.

Cape Breton Barristers' Society Scholarship: In 1965 the Cape Breton Barristers' Society instituted a scholarship in the amount of \$200 to be awarded at the discretion of the Dean to a student or students from Cape Breton County, on a combined basis of academic performance and need.

The Mary Cleyle Bursary Fund: The Mary Cleyle Bursary Fund was established in 1976 in memory of the late Mary C. Cleyle, BA LLB '72,

by her family, friends, colleagues and classmates (Dalhousie Law School 1972). The accrued interest from the fund is to be used as a bursary to assist students in their second or third year of studies at Dalhousie Law School who are in need of financial assistance.

R.T. Donald Memorial Bursary: This bursary was established in memory of Robert T. Donald, who was Dean of the Faculty of Law from 1969 to 1971.

The George O. Forsyth Entrance Bursaries: Students who are academically sound and engaged in first-year studies at the Dalhousie Law School may be considered for financial assistance.

The Hon. Alistair Fraser Bursaries: A generous bequest from the Estate of the Honourable Alistair Fraser established a fund for scholarships and bursaries. That portion of the income not used for scholarships may be used to assist Dalhousie Law students on the basis of financial need provided such applicants have a satisfactory level of academic standing.

Reg Hamm Memorial Bursary: The Reg Hamm Memorial Fund provides an annual bursary to a qualifying Law student in need of financial assistance.

Law Special Bursary: In 1982 an Anonymous Donor established an endowment with a gift of \$10,000 for the purpose of providing bursaries out of the annual income. The Anonymous Donor has given further gifts to bring the capital of the fund to \$36,000.

The Honourable Vincent C. MacDonald Bursary Fund: The sons of the late Honourable V.C. MacDonald, Dean of the Law School from 1934 to 1950, established in 1964 a bursary fund in memory of their father. The fund may be available to students in the Faculty of Law as directed by the Dean. Awards will be based on the financial need, character, and academic performance in the Law School of any interested student.

Emelyn L. MacKenzie Bursary: Under the Will of the late Emelyn L. MacKenzie the University has been given a bequest to provide bursaries in Arts and Science, Dentistry and Law. One-third of the net income is allotted to the Faculty of Law for the purpose of funding a bursary to one or more students. The recipient must be a bona fide resident of and domiciled in the County of Victoria (as defined by the boundaries extant in AD 1900), Nova Scotia. Character and need are the main criteria.

R. Graham Murray Bursary: The Law Class of 1954 has established a fund, the annual income of which is to provide a bursary (and a prize).

Nova Scotia Barristers' Society Bursaries: Each year the Nova Scotia Barristers' Society sponsors a generous grant to provide bursaries and prizes to students in any year of Law.

Nova Scotia Barristers' Society Centennial Bursary Fund: To commemorate the centennial of the founding of the Dalhousie Law School, the Nova Scotia Barristers' Society in 1983 established an endowment with a gift of \$5,000 for the purpose of providing one or more bursaries from the annual income.

Jack and Barbara Rafuse Bursary: The income generated from a gift of \$10,000 may be awarded annually to one or more needy students, normally resident in the Province of Nova Scotia, who have been accepted into and have registered for the first year of the Bachelor of Laws course, and who otherwise fulfill the terms of the deed of gift. Holders are eligible to apply annually for renewed assistance, upon the

demonstration of continuing need, during the remainder of their courses of study.

Gordon S. and Mary C. Walker Memorial Bursary: An endowment fund has been established to provide financial assistance from the net annual income to one or more students. The fund is a gift from the Estates of Gordon S. and Mary C. Walker. The late Mr. Walker was the owner of Walker Financial Company, the last privately owned bank in Canada, situated in Port Hawkesbury, Nova Scotia.

The Grace Wambolt Scholarship: This scholarship is open to native Nova Scotians to assist one or more to attend the first year of the Bachelor of Laws course. Assessment is to be made on the basis of academic achievement and financial need. A winner may be reconsidered in subsequent years.

University Bursaries: Other bursaries may be available to assist students with their law studies. Application for supplementary financial assistance from the Faculty should be made via the Awards Office.

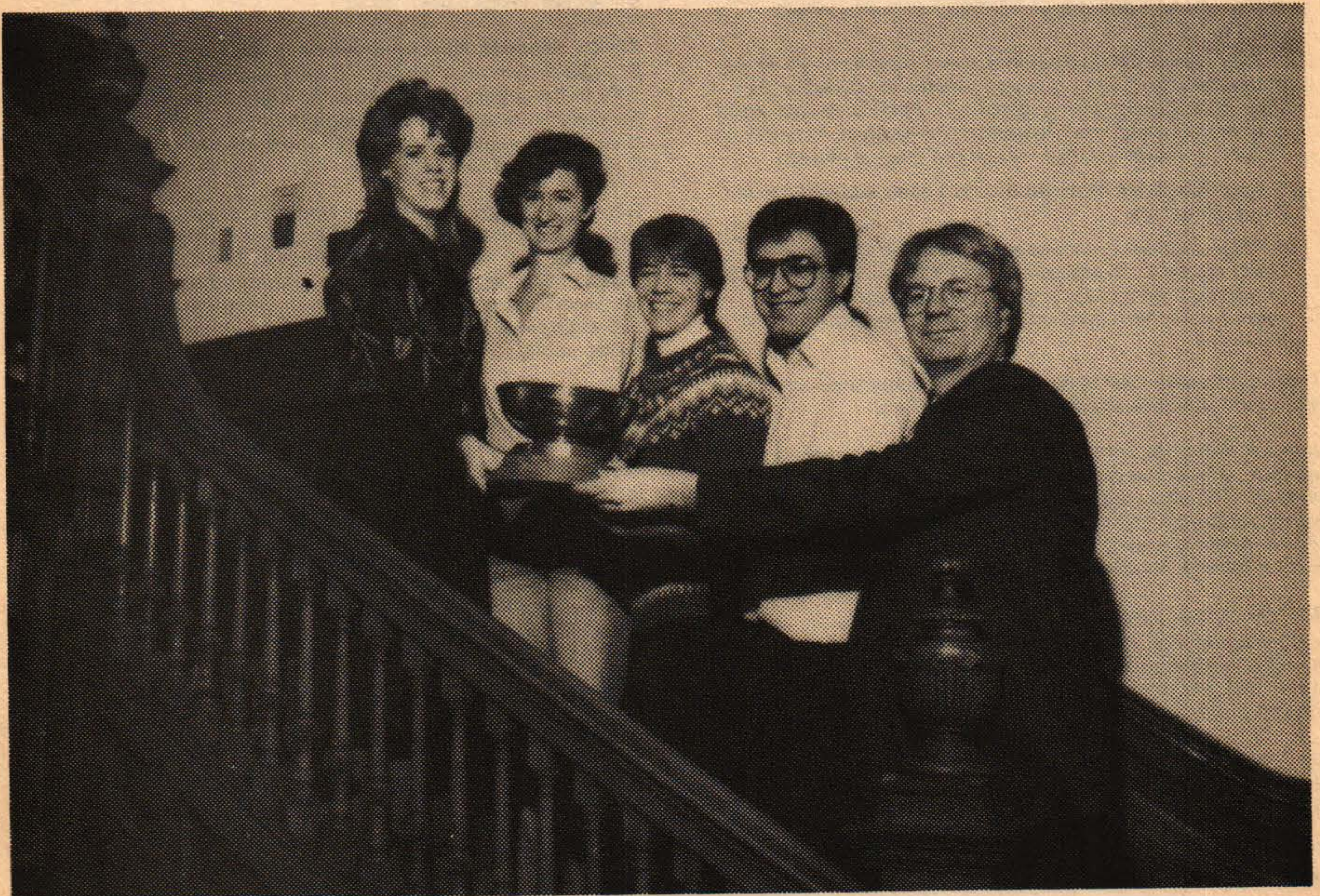

Supplemental Listing

Canadian Bar Association (NS Branch) Scholarship: The Nova Scotia Branch of the Canadian Bar Association has established a scholarship to encourage and recognize both scholastic achievement and a pursuit of the goals and principles upon which the Association is based. An annual scholarship of \$500 is to be awarded after completion of Second Year to the student who has attained a high scholastic average and who demonstrates in the opinion of the Faculty, the most promise of achieving the objects of the Association.

Dalhousie University Law Scholarship: The Faculty has at its disposal the sum of \$1,000 to award as one or two scholarships to a student who is entering Second-Year or Third-Year who in the opinion of the Student Awards Committee merit such an award.



F — Medicine

1. Scholarships

The Medical Admissions Committee is responsible for the selection of entering scholars. The prescribed application form is available from the Dean of Medicine.

The Scholarships and Awards Committee is responsible for the selection of in-course scholarships. No application is required.

1.1 Entrance Scholarships

A number of scholarships (and bursaries) are offered to students on admission who satisfy the following conditions:

1. They must be bona fide residents of one of the three Maritime Provinces.
2. They must have completed the academic and other admission requirements or be engaged in work which will complete these requirements at the end of the academic year.
3. While selection will depend primarily upon scholastic ability, the Admission Committee may go beyond this in making bursary awards.
4. They must file their application on a form provided by the Faculty of Medicine, part of which is to be completed and signed by the Dean of the Faculty they are attending, or of the Faculty from which a degree has already been received by the applicant. A completed bursary information form is a required part of any application.
5. Applications will be received up to 1 June, addressed to the Dean of Medicine.
6. The awards will be made as soon as possible after the end of March, subject to the acceptance of the applicant by the University for admission to the first year of the medical course in the year of award and his/her registration as a student at the regular date in September.

Ordinarily, the **Dalhousie Entrance Medical Scholarships** are funded from the William Isaac Macdougall Scholarship Fund.

James A. Wardrope Entrance Scholarship: This scholarship is the net income of an endowment given by the late Dr. M.J. Wardrope in memory of his son. The scholarship is to be awarded to a student of high standing entering first-year Medicine at Dalhousie University. (Applications will be made under the same regulations as for Dalhousie Medical Entrance Scholarships above, deleting the first paragraph.)

1.2 In-course Scholarships

Harold Barnett Scholarship: The Dalhousie Medical Alumni Association on behalf of the Donors has established a fund to provide a scholarship to the student in second-year who has attained the highest standing in respiratory physiology.

Dr. Joan M. Crosby Scholarship (External): This scholarship is to be awarded to a deserving second-year student who shows the qualities of exceptional dedication and compassion, and financial need.

Dalhousie University Medical Scholarships: The Faculty of Medicine awards scholarships to students for the highest academic standing in

First, Second and Third Year. These scholarships are tenable in the following year of medical studies.

Charles E. Frosst Scholarship (External): A sum of \$500, contributed by Charles E. Frosst and Company of Montreal, is awarded annually at the completion of the third year to a student entering the fourth year who has shown general proficiency throughout the course.

The Dr. Mabel E. Goudge Medical Scholarship: Dr. Mabel E. Goudge provided in her Will for a scholarship fund which would be open to qualifying undergraduate Medical and graduate Psychology students at this University. The annual income is to be shared equally. In Medicine the scholarship is to be awarded to the qualifying students who achieved the highest standing, one each from first, second and third year.

William Isaac Macdougall Scholarships: From the Estate of Andrena Frances Macdougall came a bequest, the income therefrom to provide scholarships upon terms and conditions as the University may from time to time prescribe. This fund may also provide entrance scholarships.

The J. Randolph Murchison Scholarship: A bequest from the Estate of Olga M. Murchison established an endowment from which the net annual income is to be used for a scholarship to a needy medical student from Prince Edward Island.

The Dr. Robert M. Pendrigh Scholarship: The Dr. R.M. Pendrigh Scholarship Committee of the City of Saint John established this Fund in 1979 for the purpose of endowing a memorial scholarship. It is to be awarded from time to time to a student who in the opinion of the University has demonstrated need and merit, and who otherwise fulfils the terms of the Trust Deed.

R.S. Smith Medical Scholarships: One of the benefits established by the original Deed of Gift was the provision of an undergraduate medical scholarship as a memorial to Ross Stewart Smith, the only child of James Ross Smith and Eliza Cochran Smith, who died in his early manhood. Subsequent bequests greatly enhanced the fund, and following a period of development the fund can now provide both undergraduate scholarships and graduate fellowships in medicine.

Teagle Foundation Medical Scholarship (External): The Teagle Foundation, Inc., founded in 1944, was endowed by Mr. Walter C. Teagle, president of Imperial Oil Limited from 1914 to 1918. The Foundation awards a number of scholarships to accepted students of accredited schools of medicine in Canada, including Dalhousie University. Applicants must be or have been employees or children of employees of Imperial Oil Limited or its wholly owned subsidiaries. The provisions that govern these awards are set entirely by the Teagle Foundation. Application forms and literature, however, may be obtained by writing to: Secretary, Contributions/Higher Education Awards, Imperial Oil Limited, 111 St. Clair Avenue West, Toronto, Ontario, M5W 1K3.

The A.B. Wiswell Scholarship: This scholarship of approximately \$800 established by the late Dr. A.B. Wiswell of Halifax, is to be awarded to a student completing the first year of the regular medical course. Character and financial need are to be considered, but the standing of the candidate in his/her class is the primary consideration.

The Wood-Stonehouse Memorial Scholarship (External): The Wood-Stonehouse Memorial Scholarship is awarded each year to a medical student in his/her third year. It will be presented to one who has

not only demonstrated satisfactory performance in his/her studies but also, in the opinion of his/her peers, possesses other distinguishing qualities. The recipient should be outgoing, prominent in class and in social and administrative procedures, but at the same time be active outside of the school. Most important of all, this student should be someone who is energetic in the promotion of class spirit and comradeship, but who also is willing to put aside some of his/her own time for the assistance of others. The student chosen will receive the scholarship at the Dalhousie Medical Students' Society Banquet held during his/her third year.

2. Prizes and Medals

John F. Black Prize: This prize, being the net income of a bequest by the late Dr. John B. Black, a former Professor of Surgery, is awarded at the completion of the fourth year to the student who reaches the highest standing in Surgery.

Bristol Laboratories Prize: Bristol Laboratories of Canada has made available to a third year student an annual prize of \$100 for the purchase of books. Both need and academic performance are to be considered in the award. The fields of therapy and pharmacology are to be covered in the selection of the books.

Professor John Cameron Prize in Anatomy: This prize, being the net income on an endowment given by the late Dr. John Cameron, former Professor of Anatomy, is awarded to the student who makes the highest marks in Anatomy.

CARS Prize: The Nova Scotia Division of the Canadian Arthritis and Rheumatism Society offers an annual prize of \$100 to a fourth year student for the best essay on a subject dealing with disorder of the locomotor system.

Canadian Foundation for Ileitis and Colitis Award: This prize is awarded to the student in second-year Medicine who stands highest in the Gastrointestinal System.

CIBA Collection Award: A set of five volumes of the Netter Medical Illustrations, the annual gift of the CIBA Company Limited is awarded to the student who has the second highest standing in Anatomy.

Andrew James Cowie, MD, Memorial Medal: This medal, founded by the late Miss Florence J. Cowie in memory of her father, is awarded each year to the member of the fourth year class having the highest standing in Obstetrics, provided his/her standing in other subjects is sufficiently high to merit an award.

Dalhousie Medical Students' Society Prizes: Four prizes of books to the value of \$25 are awarded annually to students of the second, third, and fourth years in Medicine on application to the Dalhousie Medical Students' Society; financial need, academic standing, and activity in student affairs are considered.

Department of Surgery Essay Prize: A prize with a value of approximately \$100 will be awarded at the end of fourth year for the best essay written on a subject related to surgery. A number of suggested topics will be made known to the students in fourth year.

Department of Surgery Intern Prize: A prize with a value of approximately \$100 will be awarded to the intern who has received the best report for his work during his training in general surgery.

Department of Surgery Prize: A prize with a value of approximately

\$100 will be awarded to the student in the third year with the highest standing in the final examination in Surgery.

Burke Fullerton Award: An award provided by the Nova Scotia Chapter of CFPC in the amount of \$100 to the student who shows the greatest promise in Family Medicine in fourth year.

General Electric X-Ray Corporation Prize: An annual award of \$100 to a fourth year student who has taken an elective in Radiology and who, following submission of a short paper summarizing this elective experience, is judged by that Department most suitable to receive the award on the basis of evaluation while in the elective program.

Dr. W. Sidney Gilchrist Prize in Preventive Medicine: A prize of \$100 presented annually by the Dalhousie Medical Alumni Association in memory of Dr. W. Sidney Gilchrist, a graduate of this Faculty who was, for many years, a medical missionary in Angola. The award, to a third year student, will be based on the academic standing in Preventive Medicine over the prior three years and on overall performance in the Comprehensive Health Care Project.

Morris and Sarah Gold Award: This award of approximately \$500 is to be presented to an undergraduate medical student who most distinguishes himself/herself in the field of medical literature.

The Dr. Norman H. Gosse Prizes: Under the Will of the late Dr. N.H. Gosse a bequest was given to the University, the income therefrom to be used for the encouragement of medical students concerning the cultural aspects of their education.

Dr. J.V. Graham Prize: A prize consisting of the net income of a bequest by the late Dr. J.V. Graham, will be awarded to a student in the fourth year who has achieved high standing in the course in Applied Anatomy, consideration being given to the student's record in the Anatomy classes of the previous years.

The Dr. L.M. Green Memorial Award: This prize, established by an endowment, is awarded to a student in Obstetrics and Gynaecology.

Halifax Infirmary Award: A prize is awarded each year to the intern having the best record at the hospital.

Halifax Infirmary Medical Advisory Committee Award: An award of \$100 is made to a fourth year medical student who has written the best published paper in a recognized journal based on work done at the Halifax Infirmary.

Dr. Kenneth Hall Memorial Psychiatry Prize: This prize, in memory of Dr. Kenneth Hall, is to be awarded to a student in third year with the highest mark in psychiatry.

Doctor W.H. Hattie Prize in Medicine: A prize of \$100 initiated anonymously by the late Dr. Hattie when he was Assistant Dean, and perpetuated in his memory by Dr. Carl K. Pearlman of California, who was a recipient of the award in 1937, will be awarded at the completion of fourth year to the student who reaches the highest standing in Medicine.

The Dr. Morris Jacobson Memorial Prize: This prize is to be presented to an undergraduate medical student who, having an interest in Family Medicine, has achieved scholastic standing in this field.

The Mary Koncovy Prize: The Koncovy family have established a fund under the direction of the Dalhousie Medical Alumni Association for

the purchase of books for the library. The books will be deposited in the name of the student who was selected. (Details are incomplete at press time.)

Lange Book Awards: Lange Medical Publications offers book awards to two students with high standing in each of the underclasses in Medicine.

Dr. Frank G. Mack Prize in Urology: An annual prize of \$150, this is presented in memory of the late Frank G. Mack, Professor of Urology (1922-1950). The prize is to be awarded by the Department of Urology to the fourth year student showing excellence in Urology.

Merck, Sharp & Dohme Medicine Award: Each year Merck, Sharp & Dohme Canada Limited will sponsor a prize for accomplishment in Therapeutics.

Dr. John W. Merritt Prize: A prize of \$100 presented by Mrs. Merritt in memory of her husband, Dr. John W. Merritt, Associate Professor of Surgery. This prize will be awarded in the fourth year for the best essay on a subject relating to cardio-thoracic surgery or on work carried out by a student in the Department of Surgery during the summer period following second or third year. Students selected by the Professor of Surgery because of their knowledge of cardio-pulmonary diseases in third year or because of their participation in summer research projects will be eligible to compete by preparing an essay on the subject during the fourth year.

Dr. A.F. Miller Prize: A prize of \$150 presented by the late Dr. A.F. Miller of Kentville, will be awarded in the fourth year for the best essay on a subject relating to the cardio-pulmonary systems. Students, selected by the Professor of Medicine because of their knowledge of cardio-pulmonary diseases in the third year, will be eligible to compete by preparing an essay on the subject during the fourth year.

C.V. Mosby Company Prizes: The C.V. Mosby Company offers five prizes of books valued at \$20, to be awarded annually to the two students with the highest standing in the final examinations of the second year and to the three students with highest standing in the final examinations of the third year.

Roberta Bond Nichols Memorial Prize: This prize of \$100 represents the interest in a fund initiated by the Nova Scotia Branch of the Federation of Medical Women of Canada as a memorial to Dr. Roberta Bond Nichols, and is awarded annually to the medical student having the highest standing in Anatomy and who otherwise meets the conditions of the award.

Dr. Clara Olding Prize: This prize, paid from the income of an endowment of \$5,000, as a memorial to Mary Clara Olding, MDCM 1896, wife of Arthur Morrison Hebb, MDCM 1902, who practised medicine together at Chester, is awarded annually, at the discretion of the University, to the student making the highest aggregate in the examinations of the fourth year, character and previous scholarship being taken into consideration.

Dr. Carl K. Pearlman Prize in Urology: This cash prize (approximately \$100) is awarded to the student in the third year who has attained the highest academic standing in Urology as determined by the Department of Urology.

Poulenc Prize: A prize being the net interest on an endowment given by Poulenc Limited, will be awarded to the student standing highest in the final examination in Psychiatry in the fourth year.

Dr. Harry Poulos Prize: A Fund has been established to provide from the annual income a prize to the Second Year student in the Faculty of Medicine who has achieved the highest standing in psychiatry. The name of the winner is to be inscribed on a suitable plaque located in the Nova Scotia Hospital, under whose initiative the Fund was established.

Prize in Medicine: A prize is awarded to the student at the completion of fourth year who has had the highest standing in all examinations in Medicine in second, third and fourth Years.

Dr. Albert A. Schwartz Prize: This prize will be awarded at the end of fourth year to the student who has written the best essay on a subject related to Orthopaedics.

Senator C.V. Emerson Award: A prize is awarded to the intern at the Saint John General Hospital who demonstrates the highest practical knowledge and best record of service to the hospital, to its patients, and to the medical profession.

Dr. C.B. Stewart Gold Medal in Medicine: Awarded annually, on graduation, to the student standing highest in the regular medical course provided that he or she has reached the high standard set by the Faculty for that purpose.

University Prizes: A total of \$2,300 will be awarded in prizes in each of the first, second and third years of the regular medical course. The prizes will be based on academic standing in the final examinations. In each year they may vary in number from four to seven and in amounts from \$100 to as high as \$1,000.

Upjohn Company Award: This prize is awarded to the student in second-year Medicine who has attained the highest standing in Infectious Diseases.

Victoria General Hospital Prize: A prize is awarded each year to the intern having the best record at that hospital.

Dr. Gordon B. Wiswell Prize: An annual prize of \$100 presented by the Department of Paediatrics in memory of Dr. Gordon B. Wiswell, Professor of Paediatrics from 1942-1958. The prize is to be awarded to the fourth year student showing the greatest distinction in paediatric studies.

3. Bursaries

Dalhousie Medical Entrance Bursaries

A number of scholarships and bursaries are offered to students on admission who satisfy the following conditions:

1. They must be bona fide residents of one of the three Maritime Provinces.
2. They must have completed the academic and other admission requirements or be engaged in work which will complete these requirements at the end of the academic year.
3. While selection will depend primarily upon scholastic ability, the Admission Committee may go beyond this in making bursary awards.
4. They must file their application on a form provided by the Faculty of Medicine, part of which is to be completed and signed by the Dean of the Faculty they are attending, or of the Faculty from which a degree has already been received by the applicant. A completed bursary information form is a required part of any application.
5. Applications will be received up to 1 June addressed to the Dean of Medicine.
6. The awards will be made as soon as possible after the end of March, subject to the acceptance of the applicant by the University for admission to the first year of the medical course in the year of award

and his/her registration as a student at the regular date in September.

Note: The remainder of this subsection should be read with reference to the bursary portion of the Financial Aid section.

Charles J.W. Hinman Memorial Bursary: From the net annual income, one or more bursaries may be awarded to assist undergraduate medical students who demonstrated satisfactory academic progress and who provide to the Faculty clear evidence of the need for financial assistance.

The IODE John Stewart Chapter Bursary: Over the years the John Stewart Chapter of the IODE has sponsored an annual bursary to be awarded to the student who at the completion of his/her second year shows proper academic standing and need of financial assistance. The Chapter has thoughtfully established an endowment, the annual income from which can provide one or more bursaries to deserving medical students.

The John George and Emily MacDougall Bursaries: Under the terms of the will of the late Doctor John George MacDougall, formerly a senior surgeon of the Faculty of Medicine and at the Victoria General Hospital, a perpetual trust fund was established, the income from which is to be used for "such deserving persons who being ... undergraduates of the Medical School of Dalhousie University are ... most entitled to assistance on the grounds of worth and necessity."

Order of the Eastern Star, Halifax Chapter 7, Medical Student Bursary: This Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star donated to the University in 1985 the sum of \$15,000 to establish an endowment. From the annual income one or more bursaries will be awarded upon conditions yet to be formulated.

The Dr. Hector J. Pothier Bursary: This is a bursary donated in memory of the late Dr. Hector J. Pothier of Beaver River, Nova Scotia, to be given to a needy student in medicine who has expressed an interest in spending time as a family physician in a rural community.

Etta and Frederick Ross Memorial Bursary: A fund has been established by Dr. James F. Ross in memory of his parents, the income of which is to be used to enable a deserving student to attend the Faculty of Medicine at Dalhousie University.

Marion E. and Frank A. Seaman Bursary: This bursary in memory of the late Marion E. and Frank A. Seaman is to be awarded to a student who has completed the first year of Medicine. The primary considerations are to be need and scholastic standing.

The Merle Smith Bursary: From the Estate of A.R. Merle Smith came a bequest of \$50,000 in 1979 to endow a bursary fund. The annual income therefrom may be used to provide one or more bursaries to a student (or students) who is (are) enrolled in the Dalhousie Medical School beyond first year. The fund is restricted to matriculants of Bathurst High School, Bathurst, N.B.

Dr. Walter Templeman Bursary: The Estate of Dorothy A. Templeman gave a bequest of \$5,000 to establish an endowment to benefit medical students. The University is authorized to use the income at its discretion for scholarships or bursaries upon conditions it from time to time may determine. The fund had been allocated to providing one or more bursaries.

The Dr. Elizabeth Catherine Weld Memorial Bursaries: Family and friends collected a sum of money and in 1985 donated this to Dalhousie

University to establish an endowment to fund bursaries in memory of Dr. Elizabeth Catherine Weld. A member of the Medical Class of 1981, she undertook three locum-tenens in Nova Scotia and Labrador, following her internship in Halifax. Dr. Weld then became a travelling physician with the Grenfell Mission, based at Melville Hospital in Goose Bay, Labrador. The net annual income is to be awarded as bursaries, each of approximately \$1,000, to needy medical students as determined by the selecting committee.

University Bursaries: Other bursaries may be available to assist students with their medical studies. Application for supplementary financial assistance from the Faculty should be made via the Awards office.

4. Loans

Refer to the loans portion of the section on Financial Aid.



G — Prizes and Medals

This section concerns prizes and medals in the undergraduate and graduate programs. For prizes and medals in dentistry, law and medicine, refer to the appropriate subsections under those main headings.

1. Note about Monetary Prizes

1.1 Unless there is a notation to the contrary in the entry, applications for prizes are not required.

1.2 With the exceptions noted hereunder, most monetary prizes are paid by cheque from the Awards Office as soon following receipt of notification from the selecting committee as is practical.

1.3 The exceptions are:

(a) Those which are paid via credits to students' fee accounts in September:

- i) all monetary prizes in the College of Pharmacy;
- ii) the Beaver Foods Awards in the School of Recreation, Physical and Health Education; and
- iii) the Campbell Incentive Awards in the Department of Music.

(b) Those which are paid by the Faculty of Dentistry (but see below).

(c) Those which, although "Dalhousie" prizes, are paid directly from the Sponsors:

- i) The Chemical Institute of Canada Prize;
- ii) The International College of Dentists (Canadian Section) Award;
- iii) The Maritime Law Book Limited Prizes; and
- iv) The Donald R. MacLeod Prize.

1.4 Coding: Students' academic records are annotated to reflect the prizes they have won. Prizes are coded for that academic year during which they were earned, except those listed in Item 1.3 (a) above. These exceptions are coded for the following academic session (in order to be credited to fees).

2. General

The Annie L. Beer Prize: This prize is the interest on a legacy to Dalhousie University, under the will of the late Mrs. Thomas (Annie L. Beer) of Charlottetown and is to be awarded to the youngest students from Prince Edward Island who enters this University in each year.

The Honourable W.H. Dennis Memorial Prizes for Literary Compositons in English: Two Prizes known as the Joseph Howe Prizes are offered each year, a first prize of \$200 and a second prize of \$100, for a poem or collection of poems of any length greater than about one hundred lines.

Two prizes known as the James DeMille Prizes are offered each year,

one of \$150 for an essay, the other of \$150 for a prose short story.

The attention of candidates for these prizes is drawn to the following regulations adopted by the Senate to govern the awards:

1. Candidates for these prizes must be registered full-time undergraduate or graduate students at Dalhousie University.

2. (a) Three copies of each composition must be sent in by the competitor.

(b) These compositions must be typewritten, double spaced and on one side of the paper only.

(c) A pseudonym is to be typed at the end of each typescript and after the pseudonym a statement as to whether or not a first or second or no prize has been previously awarded to the writer.

(d) Compositions are to be accompanied by a sealed envelope bearing the same pseudonym in typewriting to the Jury of Award for the Joseph Howe Prize or for the James DeMille Prize, as the case may be.

(e) The envelope shall contain in typewriting the pseudonym, the titles of the entries and the candidate's full name and address.

(f) Candidates submitting more than one prose entry must use the same pseudonym for each; different pseudonyms may be used for prose and poetry.

3. Candidates for the DeMille Prize may submit one entry in each of the essay and short story sections.

4. The winner of a prize in the poetry contest is not debarred from competing in the prose contest, and vice versa.

5. In the poetry contest no winner of a first prize is eligible to compete again, and no winner of a second prize is eligible for a second prize in a subsequent year.

6. In the prose contest no winner of a first prize is eligible to compete again, and no winner of a second prize is eligible for a second prize in a subsequent year.

7. Entries must reach the Awards Office (or Department of English) on the designated January deadline.

8. Entries are adjudicated by panels of judges, each of which includes a professional writer. The decision of the judges is final.

9. No prize will be awarded for any composition that does not attain to a sufficiently high standard of merit.

10. The Dalhousie Review will be offered the first option to publish winning compositions. A copy of each winning composition is deposited in the University archives. Contestants retain ownership of copyright.

11. Contestants are urged to retain a carbon or photostat copy of their typescript(s) since the copies cannot be returned.

The Clare Murray Fooshee Poetry Prize: This prize will be awarded for the best poem, of any length, submitted by a Dalhousie undergraduate. It will consist of either the Clare Murray Fooshee poetry medal or books to the value of \$400, this being income from a fund established by friends in memory of the poetess Mrs. Clare Murray Fooshee, BA (1924). A copy of the winning poem will be lodged in the Clare Murray Fooshee poetry archive in the Library of Shirreff Hall. Up to five poems may be submitted by each writer. Previous winners are ineligible. Entries will be judged by a committee appointed by the Department of English. No award will be made unless a poem submitted is deemed to be of sufficient merit. Entries should reach the Chairman of the Department of English by 1 March.

Procter & Gamble Award of Excellence: This \$1,000 Award is provided by Procter & Gamble Inc. to a student in the penultimate year of either an undergraduate or graduate program. The winner will have demonstrated academic excellence in his/her area of study and will have an impressive record of accomplishment and leadership in extracurricular activities. The deadline for receipt of applications will be in March. Further information is available at the Awards Office.

3. Arts and Science

3.1 Departmental Awards

Biochemistry

University Medal in Biochemistry: The Department of Biochemistry offers to the top First Class Honours graduate in the Biochemistry program medal. The awardee will be the one who has fulfilled the high scholastic standard as set by the Department.

Kilmer MacMillan Memorial Book Prize: This prize is awarded annually to the student who attains the highest aggregate mark for the three half-classes, Biochemistry 3200, 3300 and 3400.

Biology

The Aldous Prize: On the occasion of the retirement of Dr. John G. Aldous, friends, colleagues and students established an endowment to provide for an annual prize to be awarded for the best achievement in Biology 4401.

B'nai B'rith Prize: Two prizes of \$25 each, one for the student standing highest in Biology 1000 and one for the student standing highest in Biology 2000, provided that the student is recommended by the Department.

David Durward Memorial Prize: This prize is to be awarded to the best student in the Physiology of Marine Animals (Biology 3071) on the recommendation of the Departmental Chairman. The prize is awarded in memory of Robert David Durward who was an accomplished postgraduate student at this University.

University Medal in Biology: The Department of Biology offers the top First Class Honours graduate in the biology program a medal in recognition of superior achievement in Biology.

University Medal in Marine Biology: The Department established this medal in 1983-84 to be awarded, where appropriate, to the student who stands highest among the First Class Honours graduates in the Marine Biology program.

Chemistry

The John Hamilton Barrett Prize: This is the gift of his widow, Mrs. Marjorie Barrett. It is offered annually at the end of the fourth year of the course to a student who has shown exceptional ability in Chemistry or some other science.

The Chemical Institute of Canada Prize: A silver medal and a cheque for \$25 will be awarded to a student entering the fourth year who is recommended by the Department of Chemistry. The Chemical Institute of Canada pays the purse of the prize directly to the awardee.

The Hugh Graeme Fraser Memorial Prize in Advanced Chemistry: This award was founded by members of the Class of 1931 upon their graduation, both as their graduation gift to the University and in order to perpetuate the memory of their brilliant, highly respected and loved classmate, who lost his life while engaged in laboratory work in the final year of his course. The net interest on a sum of money, presented by his Class for this purpose, will be awarded annually to the student who, at the end of his/her third year, has, in the opinion of the Department, shown such aptitude for Chemistry as to merit the award, which is tenable in the final year of the undergraduate course.

The Society of Chemical Industry, Canadian Section, Merit Award: This award (of an engraved gold key and a subscription to *Chemistry*

and *Industry*) may be made to the Honours graduate in Chemistry with the highest standing. A minimum average of 75% is required.

Undergraduate Award in Analytical Chemistry: The Division of Analytical Chemistry of the American Chemical Society offers a number of gift subscriptions to *Analytical Chemistry*. These awards are intended to recognize students who have completed the third undergraduate year and who display "interest in and aptitude for a career in analytical chemistry." One of these annual awards is allocated to Dalhousie University.

University Medal in Chemistry: The Department of Chemistry offers to the top First Class Honours graduate a medal in recognition of superior achievement in Chemistry.

Classics

The Howard Murray Prize in Classics: This prize is of the value of \$250 and is awarded to the student with the highest standing who is admitted to an Honours course in the Department of Classics at the commencement of the regular third year.

University Medal in Classics: The Department of Classics offers to the top First Class Honours graduate in the classics program a medal in recognition of superior achievement in Classics.

Economics

The Anonymous Economics Prize: This prize, consisting of a book (or books) and a sum of money, is open to the Dalhousie undergraduate who is not in the final year of study and who has shown through an essay during the second year of study of economics, the best promise of successfully applying economics to the solution of human problems as determined by the selection committee.

University Medal in Economics: The Department of Economics offers to the top First Class Honours graduate a medal in recognition of superior achievement in Economics.

Education

Eric Stanley Hillis Memorial Prize: The annual net income from a bequest to the University provides a prize in memory of Eric Stanley Hillis to a student in Education as selected by the Chairman of the Department of Education. The prize may consist either of one or more books chosen by the student in consultation with the Departmental Chairman or of a sum of money.

The Mowat Prize: A Fund has been established to perpetuate the memory of Alexander S. Mowat who, as O. E. Smith Professor of Education, served for 30 years as chairman of the University's Department of Education. The purpose of the prize is to recognize outstanding achievement by graduate students in Education who are working at the Master's Degree level. Further information is available from the Department.

Engineering

The Association of Professional Engineers of Nova Scotia Award: The Association of Professional Engineers of Nova Scotia provides an award which is presented each year to that student graduating in Engineering who best demonstrates promise of using outstanding abilities to serve society in an ethical manner as a Professional Engineer. The award winner will be selected by students of the graduating class in consultation with the Engineering Faculty members. The award will consist of an engraved certificate.

The APENS Prize (External): The Association of Professional Engineers

of Nova Scotia selects one prize winner each year from among the graduating Engineering students at the universities associated with Technical University of Nova Scotia. Candidates for the prize are the APENS award winners at each of the Associated Universities. The prize consists of an engraved certificate and a scholarship valued at \$500 tenable for one year in an accredited engineering program at Technical University of Nova Scotia.

The Walter P. Copp Memorial Prize: The Halifax South Civic Improvement Association in 1946 gave \$150 to the University in appreciation of their use of the Engineers' Common Room for meetings during the previous season. Professor H.R. Theakston, Head of Engineering, suggested that the money be used to establish a prize of \$50 in memory of Walter Percy Copp, Professor of Civil Engineering and long serving former Head of the Department. After the original money was exhausted, various individuals and the Department itself provided money for the prize. In 1979 an Anonymous Donor gave the University the sum of \$2,500 to establish an endowment for the purpose of funding this prize. It is awarded annually to the student graduating with the Diploma in Engineering with the highest average in Engineering classes.

The Kenneth F. Marginson Award: This prize is awarded annually to the student who achieves the highest standing in the first year of the Diploma in Engineering program. Only students who are enrolled in University for the first time are eligible to receive this award. Presentation of the award takes place when the student enrolls in the second year of the Diploma in Engineering course. This prize is funded from an endowment of \$2,500 which has been established by an Anonymous Donor. The award honours Professor Kenneth F. Marginson, who retired in 1981, as Head of the Department.

English

Paul McIsaac Memorial Prize: A memorial gift provides for an annual prize for an undergraduate student, who shows an enquiring and original mind, in the second or third year of study in the Honours or Major program in English.

Margaret Nicoll Pond Memorial Prize in English: A prize in English has been endowed by Mr. F.H. Pond of Halifax in memory of his wife, the late Margaret Nicoll Pond, a gifted teacher of English and a devoted alumna and governor of the University. The prize will be awarded, on recommendation of the Chairman of the Department, to a woman graduate of Dalhousie University who leads her class in English.

The University Medal in English: Each year the Department of English offers a medal to the top First Class Honours graduate in recognition of superior achievement in the program.

French

Prix du Consulat de France: The French Consul Prize will be made upon recommendation of the Department of French, to a student graduating with Honours in French.

Prix de l'Ambassadeur de France: A prize in books, offered by the French Embassy in Ottawa, is awarded annually to the student standing highest in the advanced French class.

Prix de l'Ambassadeur de Suisse au Canada: A prize of books, the gift of the Ambassador of Switzerland in Canada, is awarded to university students who have won distinction by their work in the French language.

University Medal in French: The Department of French offers to the top First Class Honours graduate a medal in recognition of superior

achievement.

Geology

The David Barlow Memorial Award: The family, friends and classmates of David Barlow established in 1984 an endowment fund from which to provide an annual prize in his memory. The Dawson Geology Club in consultation with the Departmental Chairman will select a student in Second-Year Geology who has demonstrated both a good academic record and the qualities of leadership as determined by the selecting committee.

Canadian Society of Petroleum Geologists Award: The Society sponsors an annual award consisting of a certificate and a one-year student membership to an undergraduate student who has demonstrated outstanding competence in petroleum geology or closely related fields.

G.V. Douglas Memorial Prize in Geology: In 1958-59, friends and former students of the late Professor G.V. Douglas, (Head of the Department of Geology, 1931-57) established a memorial fund from which the net interest would provide a prize to be awarded, on the recommendation of the Chairman of the Department, to an outstanding student in first-year geology.

University Medal in Geology: The Department of Geology offers to the top First Class Honours graduate a medal in recognition of superior achievement.

German

Janet Gwendolyn Coade-Dessauer Memorial Prize: A prize, consisting of one or more books, will be offered to a deserving honours or graduate student in recognition of achievement in German language studies.

Prize of the Ambassador of Austria in Canada, Prize of the Ambassador of Switzerland in Canada, and the Prize of the Ambassador of Federal Republic of Germany in Canada: The Austrian, German and Swiss embassies in Canada regularly offer German language books to the Department to be awarded to Dalhousie students whose achievement in German is outstanding. Awards are made at various levels of proficiency.

University Medal in German: The Department of German offers a medal to the top First Class Honours graduate in recognition of superior achievement.

History

The Edith and Rose Goodman Prize in History: The late Mrs. Jeanette Goodman left a bequest to the University to fund a prize (or two prizes) for the highest (or the highest and second highest) standing in the class in Canadian History. The prize is awarded on the recommendation of the Department of History.

The Dr. George E. Wilson Prize in History: A prize was established in 1967 by the Class of '27, to be awarded annually to the freshman student standing highest in History 1990.

University Medal in History: The Department offers to the top First Class Honours graduate a medal in recognition of superior achievement.

Mathematics, Statistics and Computing Science

Bernoulli Prize: The Bernoulli Prize will be awarded annually to the student registered in the Co-op Mathematics Program who has the best

cumulative academic record, subject to the restrictions that the prize can be awarded only once to a given individual and that the winner must have performed acceptably in all work term assignments.

The Katherine M. Buttenshaw Prize: This prize, being the net interest of an endowment of \$1,000 for the purpose, will be awarded annually to the student standing highest in the advanced Mathematics classes.

Digital Equipment of Canada Limited Award of Merit: Under the Annual Awards Program of Digital Equipment of Canada Limited an award consisting of a Certificate of Merit and \$200 cash is offered annually. The intent of this award is to promote and recognize excellence in Computing Science and related studies at Dalhousie University and more than 60 other institutions across Canada. The award is open to the best graduating student in Computing Science as determined by the Departmental Selection Committee.

The Ellen McCaughin McFarlane Prize: A Fund has been established in memory of Ellen McCaughin McFarlane, Class of 1927. Initially, the Fund is to provide an annual prize to an honours mathematics student who at the end of his/her first year* in the honours program has achieved the highest standing. *(Normally, this would be upon the completion of the second year at Dalhousie).

Mobil Oil Canada Award: This is an award to the student enrolled in the Computing Science major or Honours Program, who shows the best performance in the two third-year core half-courses CS 3690 and CS 3700. The recipient will be chosen on the basis of final grades and on the recommendations of the instructors in the courses and of the Director of Computing Science. Mobil Oil Canada Limited gave the University a gift of \$1,000 to endow this annual prize.

The Waverly Prize: This prize, being the net interest of an endowment of \$1,000 for the purpose, will be awarded annually to student standing highest in Mathematics 1010.

The Sir William Young Gold Medal: Founded by the bequest of the late Sir William Young, this medal will be awarded on graduation to the student who stands first among those taking First Class Honours in Mathematics.

University Medal in Computing Science: In 1983-84 the Department established this medal to be awarded, where appropriate, to the student who stands highest among the First Class Honours graduates in the Computing Science program.

University Medal in Statistics: The Department established this medal to be awarded to the student who stands highest among the First Class Honours graduates in the Statistics program.

Medieval Studies

University Medal in Medieval Studies: The Faculty of Arts and Science in 1983-84 established this medal which is to be awarded, where appropriate, to the top First Class Honours graduate in the interdisciplinary Medieval Studies program.

Music

James and Abbie Campbell Prize, Campbell Incentive Award: The Department of Music may from time to time award prizes to outstanding students from the James and Abbie Campbell Memorial Fund. The Campbell Incentive Award may on occasion be awarded under special circumstances.

University Medal in Music: The Department of Music offers to the top

First Class Honours graduate a medal in recognition of superior achievement.

Philosophy

University Medal in Philosophy: The Department of Philosophy offers to the top First Class Honours graduate a medal in recognition of superior achievement.

Physics

The Dr. William J. Archibald Prize in Physics: This is a prize of \$100 and will be awarded annually. The recipient will be a student who, having completed the first year, is considered by the Physics Department to be the most promising of those entering the Honours Physics program.

The Dr. E.W. Guptill Memorial Prize: This is to be awarded to the undergraduate student who best exemplifies the qualities of Dr. E.W. Guptill in showing initiative, experimental skill, leadership and enthusiasm for Physics, thereby making an outstanding contribution to Physics in this University. This prize will not necessarily be awarded every year.

The Dr. George Henderson Prizes in Physics: These prizes, totalling approximately \$200, are intended for students who have shown special aptitude in Physics.

The James Gordon MacGregor Memorial Prizes: Relatives of the late Dr. J.G. MacGregor contributed to the James Gordon MacGregor Memorial Fund which now provides awards to both undergraduates and graduates in the study of Physics. The undergraduate awards are in the form of prizes ranging in value from \$50 to \$200, and are awarded to students in Physics at the discretion of the Department.

The Dr. A. Stanley MacKenzie Prizes in Physics: These prizes will be awarded by the Department of Physics to the most promising students in the first two years of the Honours Physics program.

The Burgess McKittrick Prizes in Physics: Four prizes of \$100 each will be awarded to undergraduate students achieving the highest standing in each of the four classes, Physics 1000, 1100, 1300, and Physics 2110 and 2120 combined. No student may receive more than one such prize in any one year. The funds for these prizes come from the estate of F.J.A. McKittrick who graduated in 1894 with Honours in Mathematics and Mathematical Physics. He was the first Dalhousie graduate to receive the 1851 Exhibition Scholarship. The prizes are in memory of his brother, Burgess McKittrick, who graduated in 1877.

The University Medal in Physics: The Department of Physics offers to the top First Class Honours graduate a medal in recognition of superior achievement in the Physics course.

Political Science

The James H. Aitchison Award: In 1979 colleagues of Dr. J.H. Aitchison established a fund from which an annual prize would be awarded in recognition of the best undergraduate honours essay.

The Doris Boyle Prize: This is awarded to the Political Science graduate student adjudged to have written the best essay among those submitted to graduate-level Political Science classes in the fields of International Relations, Foreign Policy, Defence Policy or Strategic Studies. The adjudication is held annually, although in some years the Departmental adjudication committee may decide not to make an award.

The Eric Dennis Gold Medal: Founded by Senator William Dennis and

Mrs. Dennis, this medal will be awarded on graduation to the student who stands first among those taking First Class Honours in Government and Political Science.

The H.B. McCulloch Memorial Prize in Political Science: This prize in the amount of \$100 will be awarded annually to the student who, among all the first and second year students registered in introductory classes in Political Science, is judged to have written the best essay in the second term.

Psychology

Brimer Memorial Prize in Psychology: In 1971 the Charles J. Brimer Memorial Fund was established in memory of the late Dr. Brimer, Acting Chairman of the Department of Psychology. The income from this fund is awarded annually as the Brimer Memorial Prize. Third-year Honours students who are entering the fourth year of the Honours Psychology program are eligible to apply for this prize. Students enrolling for the Honours certificate in Psychology in the year equivalent to the fourth year of the Honours Psychology program are also eligible to apply. The Brimer Memorial Prize is restricted to Dalhousie Honours Psychology students and is not open to Joint Honours students from other departments or other universities. The selection of a prize winner will be made by the Undergraduate Program Committee of the Department of Psychology, who will award the prize to the student who, in the assessment of the Committee, shows outstanding potential as a researcher in experimental psychology.

University Medal in Psychology: The Department of Psychology offers to the top First Class Honours graduate a medal in recognition of superior achievement.

Sociology and Social Anthropology

The Rev. S.H. Prince Prize in Sociology: This prize was made available by a bequest of \$1,000 under the will of the late Dr. S.H. Prince for annual award to both Dalhousie and King's students.

University Medal in Sociology: The Department of Sociology and Anthropology offers a medal to the top First Class Honours graduate in the Sociology program in recognition of superior achievement.

Spanish

The de Carteret Memorial Prize: The de Carteret Memorial Prize is payable from the net annual income of a fund which was provided as a gift in the memory of the late Norman S. and Helier S. de Carteret and their sister, Phyllis de Carteret Nielsen. The prize is to be awarded on the recommendation of the departmental chairman to an outstanding student in the Department of Spanish.

University Medal in Spanish: The Department of Spanish offers a medal to the top First Class Honours graduate in recognition of superior achievement in the Spanish program.

Theatre

University Medal in Theatre: The Department of Theatre offers to the top First Class Honours graduate a medal in recognition of superior achievement.

3.2 Faculty Awards

Mushkat Memorial Essay Prize: From the interest on a bequest of \$1,000 provided by the will of the late Mr. William Mushkat of Halifax, a prize will be awarded annually to a student registered in the Faculty of Arts and Science. The subject of the essay and the conditions of award will be announced during the session. (Under review)

The Avery Prize: This prize, being the net interest on the sum of \$500 bequeathed for this purpose by J.F. Avery, MD, will be awarded on graduation to the student standing highest among those graduating in the general course.

The Governor-General's Gold Medal: Offered by his Excellency the Governor-General of Canada, it will be awarded to the student who is judged to be the leading First Class Honours graduate of the year.

The University Silver Medal: This medal is awarded to the student who is judged to be the leading First Class Honours graduate of the year in either the arts or the sciences, in whichever field the Governor-General's Gold Medal was not presented.

4. Health Professions

4.1 College of Pharmacy

The Dean George A. Burbridge Memorial Award (External): This award of \$700 is awarded by the Nova Scotia Pharmaceutical Society to a student from Nova Scotia, for outstanding qualities of character and pharmaceutical ability at the College of Pharmacy.

Bristol-Myers Limited Award: A copy of a pharmacy textbook is presented annually to the student with the highest standing in the second-year classes.

The F.R. Clayden Prize: This prize, in the form of a book, is presented in memory of Mr. F.R. Clayden (Class of 1912) to a deserving student completing the first-year classes of the pharmacy course.

The Courtenay Drug Pharmacy Awards: Six awards, each having a value of \$300, are made available by the Courtenay Drug Company to students from the Maritime provinces who have completed at least one year at the College of Pharmacy. Two awards are made to students who have attained a satisfactory academic standing and who show promise of making future contributions to the profession of pharmacy, entering each of the second, third and final year of the pharmacy course.

Clinical Pharmacy Award: This award of \$100 is presented to a graduating student who has demonstrated academic excellence in the therapeutics classes. The student must have an aptitude for clinical pharmacy practice and must have achieved a high level of performance during the clinical clerkship.

Robert C. Dickison Memorial Award: This award of \$300 is presented to a student from New Brunswick on the basis of academic achievement, financial need and participation in student activities at the College of Pharmacy. The Award is made available through a bequest of the late Mr. Charles D. Dickison.

The Dalhousie Student Pharmacy Society Book Award: A trust fund from various donations has been established in the name of the Dalhousie Student Pharmacy Society. The interest accrued each year is used to purchase a suitable book for presentation to a student completing the first year at the College of Pharmacy. The first-year students are asked to select who has contributed in an exceptional way to the life and spirit of their class. The main factors for consideration are active participation in student affairs and a keen interest in the profession of Pharmacy. The award is normally presented at the Pharmacy Awards Banquet.

Drug Information Award: This award, in the form of a reference book or professional journal subscription, is to be awarded to a worthy student in *The Drug Information Class*, Pharmacy 4900B.

J.G. Duff Pharmacy Award: This award, in the form of a medal, was established by Dr. Duff's former students and associates in recognition of his contribution and devotion to pharmaceutical education in the Maritimes. The award will be presented to a student entering the senior year for outstanding leadership and satisfactory scholastic attainment. A Senior Stick, bearing the names of the recipients, will be kept in trust by the Dalhousie Student Pharmacy Society. The recipient of the award will be selected by the student body.

Martha M. Dykeman Memorial Pharmacy Award: The Award, consisting of a book or a subscription to a pharmacy journal, is to be awarded to a member of the graduating class who shows promise of making future contributions to the profession of pharmacy and who has maintained a satisfactory academic standing whilst at the College of Pharmacy.

The Dean J. Esmonde Cooke Award: This award of \$500 is to be given annually to a student who has successfully completed one or more years of the course leading to a degree in pharmacy and who is enrolled in pharmacy at the University for the coming year. Candidates must have attained a good academic standing and must show promise of making future contributions to the profession of pharmacy. The student must be a graduate of high school in Nova Scotia and should not be the recipient of other concurrent awards. The financial need of the candidate may also be considered by the Selection Committee. This award is sponsored by the Pharmacy Association of Nova Scotia.

The Charles E. Frosst Award: This award of \$500 is presented by the Charles E. Frosst Company to an undergraduate student of outstanding merit in the third-year class.

The Charles E. Frosst Medal: This medal is presented by the Charles E. Frosst Company to the student who achieves the highest academic standing in the third-year class.

Home Prescription Services Prize: This prize of \$150 is awarded annually to the student who obtains the highest standing in Physiology 201R. To be eligible for this prize a student must have at least a "B" grade.

The Frank W. Horner Medal: This medal is awarded to the pharmacy student who has attained the highest standing in the third year dispensing class.

The Honourable John J. Kinley Pharmacy Award: This award has been established by Mrs. John J. Kinley of Lunenburg in memory of her husband. The Honourable John J. Kinley was a pharmacist and a former senator who served the people of Canada with distinction.

In order to be considered for the award, candidates must have satisfactory academic standing and show promise of contributing to the profession. The financial need of the applicant may also be considered by the Selection Committee.

The net income from an established fund will be used to provide a monetary award as well as a book.

Eli Lilly Book Award: The firm of Eli Lilly Canada Inc. provides an award for a deserving student in either first or second year pharmacy. The award consists of the current edition of *Martindale's Extra Pharmacopoeia* and the sum of \$100.

The Donald R. MacLeod Prize: This prize of \$50, offered in memory of Mr. Donald R. MacLeod, a former pharmacist of New Glasgow, Nova Scotia (Class of 1930), is awarded to the student of the first year who attains the highest academic standing in the first-year classes of the

Pharmacy course. The purse of the prize is paid directly from the sponsor.

The Helen Corston Marshall Award in Pharmacy: This award in pharmacy has been established in memory of Helen Corston Marshall, a former student of the Maritime College of Pharmacy, by her mother, Mrs. H.H. Marshall of Halifax and is continued by members of her immediate family. This award is to be given annually to a student (or students) who has successfully completed one or more years of the course leading to a degree in pharmacy and who is enrolled in pharmacy at the University for the ensuing year. Candidates must have attained a satisfactory academic standing and must show promise of making future contributions to the profession of pharmacy. Financial need may be considered. The income from an established fund will be used to purchase a book. The book will be inscribed with the name of the award, the recipient's name and the year when it was awarded.

Merck, Sharp and Dohme Pharmacy Award: This award, consisting of \$500 and the books, *The Merck Index* and *The Merck Manual*, is presented to the student entering the final year who has attained the highest standing in the pharmaceutical chemistry classes.

The National Drug and Chemical Company Medal: This medal is awarded annually to the student on graduation who has obtained an outstanding academic standing in the pharmacy program provided that she or he has met the high standard set by the Faculty. It is provided by Eastern Drug Services.

New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Society Centennial Medal: In conjunction with its 100th anniversary of incorporation, the Society has established this commemorative medal to be presented annually to the New Brunswick student who has attained the highest aggregate mark during his/her four years at the College of Pharmacy.

The Nova Scotia Association of Certified Dispensers Prize: This prize, in the form of a book, will be awarded annually to the top student in the first year dispensing laboratory. The prize was established in 1984 with the gift of funds to provide the initial award and to set up an endowment to provide subsequent awards.

The Nova Scotia Pharmaceutical Society Centennial Awards: In conjunction with its 100th anniversary of incorporation, the Society has established two awards. Candidates will have a satisfactory academic standing and show aptitude for the profession. The financial need of the student may be considered in selecting recipients for the awards, each of which is \$250.

Nova Scotia Pharmaceutical Society Memorial Award: The Society has established this award in memory of past members and friends of the Society. It is available to a qualifying student who possesses good academic standing and aptitude for the profession. The financial need of the student may be considered in selecting the recipient for the award of \$200.

The Parke, Davis and Company Book Prize: Copies of *Great Moments in Pharmacy* and *Great Moments in Medicine* are presented annually to the student with the highest standing in the history portion of Pharmacy 1700B.

Parke-Davis Self-Medication Award: An award of \$500 is presented by Parke-Davis Canada Inc., to recognize the pharmacy student who achieves the highest standing in course work related to over-the-counter drug products.

Pharmacy's Canada Centennial Award (External): This award consists of travel expenses to enable a student who is completing the third year to participate in the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association Conference and to visit governmental and industrial institutions. The award is based on acceptable academic achievement, participation and leadership in student activities. The award is sponsored by the Canadian Pharmaceutical Association, Shoppers Drug Mart and the Maritime provincial pharmaceutical societies and association.

Practical Training Program Prize: A prize is presented to a student completing the College of Pharmacy Practical Training Program who has achieved a high level of performance during the program. Assessment will be based primarily on submitted assignments.

The B. Trevoy Pugsley Memorial Pharmacy Award: This award was established by a bequest from the Estate of B. Trevoy Pugsley for an undergraduate student who has completed one or more years of the pharmacy course. The criteria for the selection of the recipient are based on academic standing, aptitude for pharmacy and qualities of character. Financial need may also be considered.

The Mrs. Vera B. Pugsley Award: This award of \$500 will be presented annually to a student who has successfully completed one or more years of the course leading to a degree in pharmacy and who is enrolled in pharmacy at the University for the ensuing year. Candidates must have attained a satisfactory academic standing and must show promise of making future contributions to the profession of pharmacy.

Dr. Samar B. Singh Prize in Anatomy: An endowment fund has been established for the purpose of providing from the net annual income a prize to the highest standing student in Anatomy 101 among Nursing and Pharmacy enrollees. The prize, consisting of a book or books to the approximate value of \$100, is a memorial to Dr. Singh, a long-time member of the Department of Anatomy. The awardee will be selected by the Head of the Department.

The Sister Frances dePaul Award: This award, consisting of a subscription to *The American Journal of Hospital Pharmacy*, is offered annually by the Nova Scotia Branch of the Canadian Society of Hospital Pharmacists and is presented to the student who attains the highest standing in the hospital pharmacy class. To be eligible for this award a student must have at least a B grade.

Smith, Kline & French Canada Limited Award: Two awards of \$300 each will be presented annually to a student from Nova Scotia and a student from either New Brunswick or Prince Edward Island who have successfully completed one or more years of the course leading to a degree in pharmacy and who are enrolled in pharmacy at the University for the ensuing year. Candidates must have attained a satisfactory academic standing and must show promise of making future contributions to the profession of pharmacy.

The University Medal in Pharmacy: This medal is awarded annually to the graduate who has obtained the highest academic standing in the pharmacy program provided that she or he meets the requirements as set by the Faculty.

4.2 School of Nursing

Dalhousie Basic Degree Certificate and Dalhousie Post-RN Degree Certificate: Information concerning these certificates may be obtained from the School of Nursing.

Final-Year Degree Award: A prize is awarded to the student in the graduating class who has achieved the highest academic standing. (On

account of computer space limitations the older name has been retained on the code directory. In the School of Nursing this award is known as *Prize for the Highest Academic Achievement in the Undergraduate Degree Program*.)

Halifax Children's Hospital Alumnae Prize: This prize is given by the Izaak Walton Killam Hospital for Children to the student who meets the approval of the criteria as established by the School of Nursing and the Izaak Walton Killam Hospital for Children for their work in the paediatric sector of the community.

The Lenta G. Hall Memorial Award: An award of \$100 is offered annually by the Registered Nurses' Association of Nova Scotia to a student in the School of Nursing under the terms to be determined by the Director of the School.

R.M. MacDonald and R.C. Dickson Prize in Outpost Nursing: A prize is awarded for the student achieving the highest academic record in the graduating class of Outpost Nursing students.

NAMATH Leadership in Nursing Practice Award: This prize is given by the Nursing Administrators of the Metro Area Teaching Hospitals to the graduating Post RN degree student who fulfills the approved criteria as established by the School of Nursing and the Nursing Administrators of the Metro Area for innovative approaches to nursing concerns. (On account of space limitations the code directory lists this prize as Nursing Practice Award.)

Recognition Award for the Undergraduate Degree Program: This prize is awarded by H.L. Recognition Services (Harlo Recognition Ltd.) to the graduating student who demonstrates continued improvement and progress during the years of study. The criteria are to be determined by the School of Nursing. (On account of space limitations the code directory lists this prize as Recognition Award-Nurs.)

Anna Trenholm Memorial Prize: A cash award has been donated by the family of the late Anna Trenholm (Diploma in Outpost Nursing, 1970; BN 1976). The prize is to be awarded annually to the student graduating from the Outpost Nursing Program whose achievement in clinical practice has been outstanding.

W.B. Saunders Award (Nursing): This prize is presented to the student in the graduating class who has demonstrated progressive academic achievement and general proficiency. It is a one-year subscription to *Nursing Clinics of North America*.

Dr. Samar B. Singh Prize in Anatomy: An endowment fund has been established for the purpose of providing from the net annual income a prize to the highest standing student in Anatomy 101 among Nursing and Pharmacy enrollees. The prize, consisting of a book or books to the approximately value of \$100, is a memorial to Dr. Singh, a long-time member of the Department of Anatomy. The awardee will be selected by the Head of the Department.

University Medal in Nursing: This medal is awarded annually to the graduate who has obtained the highest academic standing in the Nursing program provided that she (or he) meets the requirements as set by the Faculty.

4.3 School of Occupational Therapy

The Canadian Association of Occupational Therapists Book Prize: This prize is awarded annually to the graduating student with the highest academic standing in the theory of occupational therapy.

Class of '85 Award: This prize is awarded annually to a graduating student (as chosen by the members of the graduating class) who has made an outstanding contribution to activities of the class, school, University and community.

Dalhousie Women's Alumni Medal: This medal is presented annually to the graduating student with the highest cumulative grade point average over the three-year Occupational Therapy program.

C.V. Mosby Book Prize: This prize is awarded annually to the graduating student with the second highest standing in the final year of the Occupational Therapy program.

New Brunswick Society of Occupational Therapists Award: This prize is awarded annually to the graduating student with outstanding fieldwork performance ratings and high academic achievement in clinical practice courses (OT 2220C and OT 3320R).

Newfoundland and Labrador Association of Occupational Therapists Book Prize: This prize is awarded annually to the student entering fourth year who achieved the highest standing in third year Therapeutic Procedures classes (OT 3305A, OT 3306A, OT 3307C and OT 3308C).

PEIOT and PEIAOT Award: This prize is awarded annually to the graduating student with outstanding academic achievement in the Community Occupational Therapy course (OT 4406A) as well as an interest and involvement in community practice.

The Sammons Award: This prize is awarded annually to the graduating student with the highest overall standing in statistics (Math 1060A), research methods (OT 4407A) and Independent Study (OT 4421R). An anonymous Donor gave the University a gift to be used at the discretion of the School, which decided to endow an award for a graduating student.

W.B. Saunders Book Prize: This prize is presented annually to the graduating student with the second highest cumulative grade point average over the three years of the Occupational Therapy program.

Nova Scotia Society of Occupational Therapists Book Prize: This prize is awarded annually to a student entering third year who has been nominated by classmates on the basis of extracurricular activities in both the School and the community, interpersonal skills and general scholarship proficiency.

University Medal in Occupational Therapy: This medal is awarded annually to the graduate who has obtained the highest academic standing in the occupational therapy program provided that she or he meets the requirements as set by Faculty.

Williams and Wilkins Book Prize: This prize is awarded annually to the graduating student with the highest academic standing in the final year of the program.

4.4 School of Physiotherapy

Canadian Physiotherapy Association Prize: This is a book prize, and is awarded annually to the physiotherapy student who has attained the highest standing in the full program on graduation.

Morris B. Kohler Award in Physiotherapy: This prize is awarded to the student in the graduating class who has demonstrated the greatest interest in the treatment of long-term rehabilitation patients, while attending the Nova Scotia Rehabilitation Centre.

Medelco Electrotherapy Prize: This prize is to be awarded annually to the student who has attained the highest standing in Electrical Energy in Physiotherapy.

Jean McAloney Memorial Prize: This prize is awarded annually to the student in the graduating class who has demonstrated the highest clinical standing. The prize is sponsored by the New Brunswick Association of Physiotherapists.

Newfoundland and Labrador College of Physiotherapists Prize: This prize is awarded to the physiotherapy student who has attained the highest standing in Orthopaedics. It is sponsored by the Newfoundland and Labrador College of Physiotherapists. The purse of this prize is \$75.

Newfoundland and Labrador Physiotherapy Association Prize: This prize is awarded to the member of the graduating class who has attained the highest standing in Neuroscience. It is sponsored by the Newfoundland and Labrador Physiotherapy Association.

Nova Scotia College of Physiotherapists Book Prize (External): The College sponsors an annual cash prize for books to the third-year physiotherapy student who has demonstrated the greatest degree of leadership within her/his class during the second and third years within the School of Physiotherapy.

Nova Scotia Lung Association Prize (External): This prize is awarded annually to the graduating student who has attained the highest standing in the physiotherapy of respiratory diseases.

Nova Scotia Neurosciences Section Book Prize: The Nova Scotia Section of the Neurosciences Division of the Canadian Physiotherapy Association established a prize of \$50, effective with the 1984-85 session. The prize will be presented to the fourth-year Physiotherapy student with the highest combined grade from (1) the practical exam in third-year neurology course and (2) the average grade of the third-year and fourth-year clinical neurology placement(s). The recipient will be selected by the Dalhousie Professor who is managing the neurology course.

Nova Scotia Physiotherapy Association Prize: This prize is awarded annually to the student who shows the greatest overall improvement during the third year of the BSc Physiotherapy program.

Prince Edward Island Physiotherapy Association Prize: This prize is awarded annually to the student who has attained the highest academic standing in Gross Anatomy.

The University Medal in Physiotherapy: This medal is awarded annually to the graduate who has attained the highest academic standing in the physiotherapy program, provided that he or she meets the requirements approved by the Senate of Dalhousie University.

4.5 School of Recreation, Physical and Health Education

Beaver Foods Awards: Under the sponsorship of Beaver Foods Limited the School of Recreation, Physical and Health Education is able to offer four \$500 entrance awards to students registering in this School for the first time. Winners will be selected from applicants who possess a strong background in academics, leadership activities and extra-curricular participation. Further information may be obtained from the Director, School of Recreation, Physical and Health Education, Dalhousie University.

The Dr. M.J. Ellis Award: This award was established to give recognition to a graduating student who demonstrated exceptional

interest and ability in research.

The Dr. Hugh A. Noble Award: This award, in the form of medal, is given to one graduating student in the School of Recreation, Physical and Health Education (undergraduate degree in Recreation, Physical Education or Health Education). The awarding is based on academic work, citizenship and leadership qualities.

The University Medal in Physical Education: This medal is awarded annually to the graduate who has obtained the highest academic standing in the physical education program provided that she or he meets the requirements as set by the Faculty.

The Women's Division of the Dalhousie Alumni Association RP & HE Medals: Three awards are available to students in the School of Recreation, Physical and Health Education. For the students who achieve the highest standing in each of the Bachelor of Physical Education, the Bachelor of Recreation and the Bachelor of Science in Health Education degree, the Women's Division sponsors of a medal.

5. Management Studies

5.1 School of Business Administration Commerce

The Wilfred Berman Memorial Prize: The Wilfred Berman Memorial Prize is payable from the income of a fund provided by former students of the late Professor Wilfred Berman to the student obtaining the highest mark in the class in first-year Accounting.

The Stewart Lockie Gibson Memorial Prize: The School of Business Administration offers a prize of \$100 to the highest standing student in the general Bachelor of Commerce program. This is the new name for the University Award in Commerce.

University Medal in Commerce: The School of Business Administration offers to the top First Class Honours graduate in the Bachelor of Commerce program a medal. The awardee will be one who has fulfilled the high scholastic standard for this award.

5.2 School of Library Service

Alberta Letts Travel Grant (Canadian Library Association): This grant is awarded annually to a member of the first-year class in the School of Library Service for attendance at the yearly summer conference of the Canadian Library Association.

Atlantic Provinces Library Association Prize (External): Each year the Atlantic Provinces Library Association makes an award of \$100 to the most promising student in the graduating class of Library Service.

The Lorna Inness Prize: This prize is to be awarded to the student with the highest standing in the course LS610, Collections Development. The prize consists of the sum of \$100 for the purchase of Canadian books at *A Pair of Trindles* bookstore.

The Special Libraries Association (Eastern Canada Chapter) Prize: This prize is to be awarded to the student in the graduating class in recognition of superior work in the area of special librarianship.

5.3 School of Public Administration

The Guy Henson Medal: The Guy Henson Medal is to be presented annually by the School of Public Administration in memory of Dr. Guy Henson, teacher, public servant and former Professor of Public Administration, to a graduate of the Master's in Public Administration program. The recipient will be chosen by faculty on the basis of those characteristics which Guy Henson manifested and which make for the highest standards of service to the public, mainly: a high degree of personal integrity, a well developed sense of social justice, demonstrated skills, and a mature sense of professionalism.

1.2 Selected CSL Regulations in Brief and Dalhousie University

1. Those Dalhousie University students who are enrolled in *full-time study which for CSL purposes only* is the carrying of not less than three whole classes for the whole academic year, or the equivalent in half-classes for the whole academic year, may (subject to other criteria) hold a CSL.

2. Students who plan to attend for one term only may (subject to other criteria) hold a CSL provided that the course load be not less than three half-classes.

3. Institutional endorsement of a Schedule I form is conditional upon *either* the student's having paid tuition & prescribed fees, and residence charges, *or* the student's consenting (see the box on the Schedule I "Instructions to bank) to the payment of said fees via the Schedule I duly signed by both the appropriate University officials and the student. (See Item 6.) In either case the Student Accounts Office must annotate the document before the Awards Office.

4. Students who are interns or doctors-in-residence are *not* eligible to hold a loan *nor* to hold interest-free status under the CSL Plan. Under the Quebec Student Loan Plan both such categories of students are

permitted either benefit. Governing provincial regulations prohibit our signing Form B (Alberta Student Loans) and Form R (Ontario Student Loans) concerning Dalhousie students who are interns or doctors-in-residence.

5. Students who present a Schedule II for endorsement *must* have paid not less than the stipulated minimum amount for registration as the financial condition of the University's endorsement of said form, subject to such other criteria as may apply. (See Item 7.) This change in policy became effective 25 September 1985.

6. Schedule I forms are not to be predated nor post-dated. The Awards Office is permitted to sign such forms on or after the disbursement date on the document, and may sign it any time up to and including the last work day of the month of the academic year (or term, if applicable) in which regular classes end. (See Item 3.)

7. Schedule II forms are not to be predated nor post-dated. This document may be signed on or after the designated September (or late August) registration date for the relevant program, and may be signed up to and including the last work day of the month of the academic year (or term, if applicable) in which regular classes end. (See Item 5.)

Note: The University is prohibited from backdating or otherwise signing a form for a previous period of study.

8. CSL documents for King's students must be endorsed by the appropriate officials of the University of King's College.

9. Graduate students are cautioned to check the academic year-end date on their Schedule II to ensure they are correct for their individual case (since the dates ordinarily used are those from a table, which is intended to cover most instances.) If a change is warranted, see this Office *prior* to the expiration date.

Note: The foregoing statements are presented as a guide only; they are not a substitute for the Canada Student Loan Act, the Administrative Criteria of the Canada Student Loans Directorate nor the University's Policy.

1.3 United States Guaranteed Loans Program

Citizens of the United States may be eligible for government-backed loans to assist the funding of their university studies at Dalhousie University. Information and/or application forms may be obtained from State educational assistance authorities in State capitals, or from many American banks and trust companies. A standard financial need analysis by such agencies as the College Scholarship Service (888 Seventh Avenue, New York, New York 10019) is usually an essential part of the process.

It is essential that prospective students have adequate funding (at least \$8,480) for their proposed academic year (eight months) at Dalhousie University.

Addresses for many State Guarantee Agencies are available at the Awards Office. For those U.S. citizens or permanent residents who require student loan applications to be notarized, they may avail themselves of this service (a fee may be charged) from the Consulate General of the United States of America, Cogswell Tower, Scotia Square, Halifax, Nova Scotia.

2. Dalhousie Bursaries

2.1 Note to all Applicants

Effective with the 1985-86 academic year the Awards Office will receive completed applications up to the designated deadlines. Applications will then be *batched* and *assessed on a comparative basis* for funds available. Applicants will be notified of the decision later. Applicants (unless they are in dentistry, law, or medicine — for which there is one assessment period) who are unsuccessful in the initial assessment period may file an application for the subsequent period.

This change in methodology has been made necessary because of

the greatly increased claims on bursary funds, which have remained nearly constant for a number of years.

2.2 General Information about Bursaries

It should be noted that Canada Student Loans (with or without bursaries) are expected by provincial authorities to meet the financial deficiencies of the students and that bursaries subsequently awarded by the University must be reported and are liable to be deducted (in part or in whole) from the amounts originally allocated under the Canada Student Loan Plan or provincial aid program.

The University has at its disposal some funds which are selectively awarded as bursaries to students who may unexpectedly find themselves in need of financial assistance. While these bursaries are awarded primarily on the basis of demonstrable need, satisfactory academic standing is also expected. Except under exceptional circumstances, bursaries will not be awarded to students who have not availed themselves of assistance under the federal/provincial student aid programs.

Registered Dalhousie University students who are seeking bursary assistance, must complete an Application for Financial Aid form, which is available from the Awards Office, Room 125, Arts & Administration Building. Students are also required to arrange for an interview.

In the event that the applicant may be eligible for a restricted bursary, he/she should draw this to the attention of the interviewing officer at the time.

The following guidelines apply to the granting of bursaries:

1. Students are expected to have obtained as much money as possible from all other sources before approaching the University for financial assistance.
2. If the student (according to CSLP criteria) is classified as financially dependent, he/she is required to have the Parents' Confidential Financial Statement section completed and signed by his/her parents (or legal guardians).
3. A financially independent student is expected to indicate during the interview what assistance (if none, why not) he/she can obtain from the family.
4. The University reserves the right to contact the applicant's sources of financial assistance when it deems it necessary.
5. Ordinarily, the applicant's academic standing is not relevant to the granting of a bursary. It may, however, be a factor (a) in the case of certain endowed bursaries which make "satisfactory" academic performance a condition, or (b) in the case where a student's performance is marginal or failing.
6. If the student has obviously little or no money we cannot grant a bursary.
7. The applicant is again reminded that the primary responsibility for the funding of his/her university education rests squarely with the student and his/her parents.

3. Arts & Science

3.1 Specified as to Year

George Boyd Bursary: The income from the George Boyd Trust will provide an entrance bursary. Preference is to be given to a needy student from the Sydney area.

The John Dunlop Memorial Bursary: John Dunlop attended the little red school house in Falmouth. Among his ambitions was that of becoming prime minister and he would test many a political speech upon family members. His ruling passion, however, was to have an education, and so with the help of others he became a Rhodes scholar and a graduate of this University. Upon his death in 1954 family and friends established an endowment to make possible for others the same

sort of assistance which had been given to John when he was a student.

IODE Provincial Chapter Bursaries (External): IODE Bursaries of \$100 to \$300, are awarded to entering students who show academic ability and financial need. Address applications to Provincial Education Secretary, Provincial Chapter, IODE, Room 505, The Roy Building, 1657 Barrington Street, Halifax, N.S. B3J 2A1. Applications open 1 March and close 1 May.

The Rev. Kenneth Mackenzie Bursary: Mrs. Harriet Mackenzie Morrison of Stornoway, Scotland, daughter of the Rev. Kenneth Mackenzie of Pictou County, bequeathed \$1,000 to the university in 1887 to be used as a bursary fund. Candidates of the name of Mackenzie, MacLean, or Fraser will be given preference.

Elizabeth McKenna Bursaries: The Elizabeth McKenna Scholarship Fund was established in 1928 for the purpose of providing what are known today as bursaries. Applicants must be *bona fide* residents of one of the Maritime Provinces and be entering the first year in the Faculty of Arts & Science.

North British Society Bursaries: Eight major bursaries are open to candidates from provincial high schools who have been accepted for full-time study in the Faculty of Arts and Science. The Selection Committee will assess candidates on the basis of the following criteria: academic achievement, extra-curricular participation and demonstrated financial need. Applicants may obtain the designated application form at the Awards Office, and are to return the *completed forms* to this office by the *May deadline*. The bursaries are provided by the North British Society which for many years has been dedicated to the preservation of the Scottish tradition in Nova Scotia. The association between the Society and Dalhousie University derives in particular from the role of Scots in the foundation and development of the University during its first sesquicentennial. The following bursaries each in the amount of \$500 are available: the Sir Joseph A. Chisholm Bursaries (two), the NBS Centennial 1868 Bursary (one), the NBS 1958 Bursary (one), the NBS 1963 Bursaries (two), and the NBS 1984 Bursaries (two).

Third Year

The Jotham Blanchard Bursary: In 1912 the New Glasgow Literary and Historical Society established this bursary in memory of Jotham Blanchard, an honoured name in the annals of Pictou County. It will be awarded to a student with meritorius standing in the sophomore year.

The Robert Bruce Bursaries: Several bursaries tenable in the third year of an Arts & Science course, will be awarded to students of promising abilities but of straitened circumstances.

3.2 Unspecified as to Year

Ernest Brehaut Memorial Bursaries: These bursaries were established by the gift of Mrs. Ernest Brehaut of Colorado Springs, USA, in memory of her husband, a distinguished graduate of Dalhousie, Harvard and Columbia. These bursaries are to be awarded by the Awards Office of the University, which will take into consideration any financial need of the applicant, to students from Prince Edward Island. Preference is to be given to relatives of the late Dr. Brehaut. The bursaries are to be continued throughout the students' courses if they maintain creditable academic standing and show genuine need. The income for any year in which no award is made may be used to pay for a memorial lecture by some distinguished scholar.

David Andrew Dougall Memorial Bursary: The intent of this award is to encourage and assist, on the recommendation of the Biology

Department, one or more students whose academic and financial status merit consideration.

Wilfred E. Hillis Bursary Fund: The late Mrs. Olga Munro Hillis made provision for the establishment of the Wilfred E. Hillis Bursary Fund. The income derived therefrom is to be used as bursaries for worthy Arts and Science students who are in need of financial assistance.

Annie S. MacKenzie Class of 1911 Bursary: Under the Will of the late Emelyn L. MacKenzie the University has been given a bequest to provide bursaries in Arts and Science, Dentistry and Law. One-third of the net income is allotted to the Faculty of Arts and Science for the purpose of funding a bursary to one or more students. The recipient must be a *bona fide* resident of and domiciled in the County of Victoria (as defined by the boundaries then extant in AD 1900), Nova Scotia. Character and financial need are the main criteria.

John David and Ellen Matheson Allen Endowment Fund: The bursaries to be known as John David and Ellen Matheson Allen bursaries, are in memory of John David Allen and his wife, Ellen Margaret Allen, both graduates of the Department of Education of the University, and both of whom died accidentally 3 December 1968. The bursaries are for students in the Arts and Science faculty of Dalhousie University. In the selection of the recipients of the bursaries, priority is to be given to Canadian Indians and Inuit, but where no such persons apply, the bursaries are to be given to other applicants as determined by the appropriate office of the University. This same office will determine the amount of each bursary.

The Kenneth and Lloyd McDonald Bursary: A gift of the McDonald family in 1976 makes possible the funding of an annual bursary to a deserving and needy student.

Reverend J.W.A. Nicholson Fund: This Fund was established in commemoration of the unselfish life of a distinguished Dalhousie graduate (BA 1897). One of his concerns was to help young people discover their talents. About half the annual income is used to assist Nova Scotia Blacks who are full-time students in the Faculty of Arts & Science at Dalhousie, and the balance is added to the fund's capital. Awards are made at the discretion of the Awards office.

3.3 Divinity Candidates

Dr. Alexander E. Kerr Bursary: The Alexander E. Kerr Foundation Fund was established to provide a biennial bursary of \$500 to qualifying students to continue their theological studies within three years of having been graduated from Atlantic School of Theology and Dalhousie University. A Committee on Awards shall select one person from the applicants who must have been accredited candidates for the Ministry of the United Church of Canada. Each bursary shall be for one academic year. Additional information is available at Atlantic School of Theology and the Awards Office at Dalhousie University. Applications must reach the Director of Awards at the Awards Office, Room 125, Arts & Administration Building, Dalhousie University, Halifax, N.S., B3H 4H6, by the first Monday in April.

Robert Archibald MacDonald Bursaries: Candidates must be properly qualified students taking the Arts course in Dalhousie with a definite intention of proceeding to Theology at the Atlantic School of Theology in preparation for a ministry in the United Church of Canada. The bursaries are awarded by a committee of Dalhousie and Pine Hill representatives. First preference will be given to students from Cape Breton and second to those from Pictou Presbytery.

R.B. and Annie J. MacLennan Bursaries: Candidates must be

registered as students at Dalhousie University and must be certified as intending to pursue their studies in Theology at the Atlantic School of Theology in preparation for a ministry in the United Church of Canada. Students awarded a bursary may be eligible for a renewal of the award in a succeeding year.

The Ross Millar Bursary: Under the will of Dr. Ross Millar the sum of \$10,000 was bequeathed to the Board of Governors in trust to set up a bursary to be awarded annually. It is stipulated that "Other things being equal the recipient shall be an undergraduate in Arts or Letters who is qualifying himself for the Ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada by taking the Arts or Letters degree at Dalhousie." The Synod of the Presbyterian Church in the Maritime Provinces will present the names of the candidates to the Awards Office, and the necessary scholastic requirements will be decided either at the matriculation examinations or by ability as shown by the sessional examinations.

4. Graduate Studies University Bursaries

All Dalhousie students who register for full-time studies and who can demonstrate financial need may be considered for possible financial aid from the University under terms applying to all such assistance. Since students from outside the country are required to have sufficient funds for a costly university education away from home, and since many graduate students are funded by merit awards, consideration will be given only to applicants who are in a straitened financial situation because of exceptional circumstances. Information may be obtained from the Awards Office.

5. Faculty of Health Professions

5.1 College of Pharmacy

Balcom-Chittick Limited Bursary: This bursary of \$500 is awarded to a second, third or fourth year student from the Maritimes, who has attained a satisfactory academic standing and who demonstrates financial need. Applications are available from the College of Pharmacy and must be submitted by 15 April.

Boehringer Ingelheim (Canada) Ltd. Bursary: A fund is to be established by Boehringer Ingelheim (Canada) to provide a bursary for a student at the College of Pharmacy.

The Bert and Betty Collins Bursary: A fund has been established to award an annual bursary to a deserving pharmacy student from New Brunswick who demonstrates financial need and who has attained a satisfactory academic standing.

Eastern Drug Services Limited Bursaries: Two bursaries of \$200 each are offered annually by Eastern Drug Services Limited to a second, third or fourth year student from the Maritimes, who has attained a satisfactory academic standing and who demonstrates financial need. Applications are available from the College of Pharmacy and must be submitted thereto by 15 April.

Eric Hill Bursary: This bursary of \$500 is awarded to a deserving pharmacy student, from the Maritime provinces, completing first or second year who shows financial need and whose academic achievement, promise and character are acceptable. Applications for the bursary are available from the College of Pharmacy and should be submitted by 15 April.

George MacDonald Bursary: This Bursary is awarded to a deserving pharmacy student, from the Atlantic Provinces who has satisfactorily completed at least one year of study at the College of Pharmacy and who demonstrates financial need.

Jessie MacKnight-Mona W. Fleming Bursary in Hospital Pharmacy: A bequest from the late Dr. Jessie I. MacKnight makes provision for a bursary fund to assist students in the College of Pharmacy.

New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Society Bursaries (External): The New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Society offers four bursaries to be awarded to the students from New Brunswick completing the first, second, and third years of the Pharmacy course. The amount of each bursary is \$300. The bursaries are awarded on the basis of need to those students whose academic achievement, promise, and character are acceptable. Applications are available from the College of Pharmacy and must be submitted by 15 April.

The Pfizer Bursary: This bursary of \$500 is awarded to a deserving student who demonstrates financial need and who has attained a satisfactory academic standing. Applications are available from the College of Pharmacy and must be submitted by 15 April.

Shoppers Drug Mart Community Pharmacy Bursaries: Shoppers Drug Mart will sponsor three bursaries of \$400 each to awardees selected by the College. The selection committee will consider candidates on the basis of financial need, student involvement, academic proficiency and potential for contributing to the pharmacy profession. Normally, successful applicants will have completed the first year. Applications are available from the College of Pharmacy and must be submitted by 15 April.

University Bursaries: The University has limited funds which may be used to provide bursary assistance to qualifying students. Information about the application for financial assistance from the University may be obtained from the Awards Office.

5.2 School of Health Services Administration

The Edward L. Roach Award (External Bursary): The Northwood Foundation has established an annual bursary of \$500. It is to be awarded to the Dalhousie student in Health Services Administration who has achieved satisfactory academic performance and has demonstrated particular interest in the field of Long Term Care. For application information contact the School.

5.3 School of Nursing Internal

University Bursaries: The University has limited funds which may be used to provide bursary assistance to qualifying students. Information about and application for financial assistance from the University may be obtained from the Awards Office.

External

Departments of Health of New Brunswick, Newfoundland, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island: Under the National Health Program, professional training grants have been made available for the preparation of professional personnel for health work. Graduate nurses interested in postgraduate study should apply to their Provincial Department of Health for details concerning the awarding of these Bursaries. In Nova Scotia, graduate nurses interested in teaching or headnurseship in hospitals should apply to their Directors of Nursing for details concerning the financial assistance available through the Nova Scotia Hospital Insurance Commission. Bursaries are also available to students in the third and fourth years of the Basic BN degree course.

Kidney Foundation of Canada Bursaries: The Foundation sponsors a number of bursaries of up to \$1,000 (for master's level) and \$1,500 (for doctoral level) for studies with the focus on some aspect of renal or urinary tract research. Applications are available from: Para-medical Kidney Foundation of Canada, 1650 Boulevard de Maisonneuve Ouest, St. 400, Montreal, P.Q., H3H 2P3. The deadline for the submission of applications is 1 April.

Victorian Order of Nurses for Canada: Bursaries of \$1,800 each are awarded by the Victorian Order of Nurses for Canada to assist graduate registered nurses in taking a certificate course in public health nursing at a Canadian university. Bursaries are also available to students in the final year of a basic degree course which includes preparation for public nursing.

Victorian Order of Nurses — Local Branches: Local Branches also offer bursaries. Apply to the Director of your local branch.

St. John Ambulance of Canada: The St. John Ambulance National Headquarters, Ottawa, offers annually: (1) Countess Mountbatten Bursaries of from \$200 to \$600 to student nurses in the basic and post-basic courses, (2) The Margaret MacLaren Memorial Fund consisting of one or more bursaries of \$1,000 which will be awarded annually to experienced Registered Nurses for study at the Master's level. This fund may also be used to serve the needs of student nurse applicants with the preference given to those with St. John Ambulance affiliation. Applications must reach National Headquarters not later than 1 May addressed to the Chairman of Bursary Funds, 321 Chapel Street, Ottawa, Ontario, K1N 7Z2.

Department of National Health and Welfare: Financial assistance for university education is available to members of the nursing staff of Medical Services Division for at least one calendar year for each academic year granted.

Northwest Territories: The terms of these bursaries are identical with those of the Department of National Health and Welfare. There is a stipulation that the recipients agree to work in the Northwest Territories for a period of one year following completion of the course.

Registered Nurses Association of Nova Scotia — Branch Bursaries: Many local branches offer bursaries to local members to assist in study at the baccalaureate and higher levels. Information is available from the local Branch President.

Royal Victoria Hospital School of Nursing Alumnae Association: Applications for a bursary of \$1,000 open to all graduates of the Royal Victoria Hospital School of Nursing, are accepted for an approved university program. Apply by 31 March to Alumnae Office, Nurses' Home, Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, Quebec.

The Agnes Campbell Neill Memorial Award: The Nursing Sisters' Association of Canada has established a bursary fund in memory of Agnes Campbell Neill, OBE, RRC, LLD, Colonel (Matron-in-Chief) in the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps. The fund provides an award every two years of \$550 for university study in nursing to a suitable candidate who meets the requirements set up by the Nursing Sisters' Association. Application forms may be obtained from the Canadian Nurses' Association, 50 The Driveway, Ottawa, Ontario, K2P 1E2.

5.4 School of Occupational Therapy

Hospital Bursaries (External): Hospitals in the Atlantic Region may sponsor students during one or more years of study in return for a

stipulated number of years of service. Enquiries should be directed to the Executive Director of the specific institution.

New Brunswick Workers' Compensation Board Bursary Assistance Program (External): The Workers' Compensation Board is offering, to New Brunswick students, three bursaries valued at \$3,500 and \$500 transportation allowance yearly for each academic year. Successful applicants will agree to a two-year service commitment at the Board's Workers' Rehabilitation Centre in Grand Bay, New Brunswick. Candidates must be enrolled in Occupational Therapy at a recognized university in Canada. Application information may be obtained from: The Executive Director, Workers' Compensation Board, P.O. Box 160, Saint John, NB, E2L 3X9.

Phyllis Kennedy Memorial Bursaries: The Phyllis Aida Daly du Fresne Kennedy Memorial Bursary Fund was established in 1983 to provide from the annual income one or more bursaries to assist a student or students in Occupational Therapy in the fourth year. The applicants must show financial need as determined by the Awards Office, must have achieved a minimum GPO of 3.0 in each of the second and third years, and must demonstrate interest in their studies and the School. The Awards Office will assess applicants' needs and forward the name(s) of candidate(s) to the School's Committee on Studies for final selection. The decision will be announced through the Awards Office.

University Bursaries: The University has limited funds which may be used to provide bursary assistance to qualifying students. Information about and application for financial assistance from the University may be obtained from the Awards Office.

5.5 School of Physiotherapy

New Brunswick Workmen's Compensation Board Bursaries for Physiotherapy: The Workmen's Compensation Board is offering New Brunswick students three bursaries worth \$3,500 and \$500 transportation allowance, yearly, for each academic year. Successful applicants will agree to a two-year service commitment at the Board's Rehabilitation Centre in the Grand Bay area. Candidates must be enrolled in physiotherapy disciplines at a recognized university in Canada. Application literature may be obtained from The Executive Director, Workmen's Compensation Board, PO Box 160, Saint John, NB, E2L 3X9.

University Bursaries: The University has limited funds which may be used to provide bursary assistance to qualifying students. Information about and application for financial assistance from the University may be obtained from the Awards Office.

Provincial Government Bursaries (External): (a) Applicants may apply to the hospital of their choice as a candidate for Physiotherapy training. If a student applies to a Nova Scotia hospital for a bursary and is accepted by the hospital, the hospital then applies to the Professional Education Committee of the Health Services and Insurance Commission for approval and funds. In the other Atlantic provinces, the student should apply directly to the Deputy Minister of Public Health for information regarding the application procedure. (b) The applicant may apply to a voluntary organization, particularly the Canadian Arthritis and Rheumatism Society, which also sponsors some candidates. In such cases the sponsoring society makes its application to the Department of Public Health for approval and funds.

5.6 School of Recreation, Physical and Health Education

University Bursaries: The University has limited funds which may be used to provide bursary assistance to qualifying students. Information

about and application for financial assistance from the University may be obtained from the Awards Office.

5.7 School of Social Work

Hannah G. Matheson Bursaries: These bursaries were provided for in the will of the late Caroline E. Carmichael (LLD, Dal), to perpetuate the name and memory of her niece, Miss Hannah G. Matheson, who had devoted her life to social work. These bursaries are open to students enrolled in studies in the Maritime School of Social Work at either the undergraduate or graduate level.

Lloyd MacInnis Memorial Bursary: The Lloyd Y. MacInnis Memorial Award Fund was established to provide an annual bursary to a qualifying student who is continuing his or her studies at the School in the baccalaureate program beyond first year.

Jane Wisdom Memorial Bursary: When Jane Wisdom began her caring work in Halifax shortly before the Great Explosion of 1917, she was truly a pioneer in what has come to be known as Social Work. It is in recognition of her distinguished service that Anonymous Donors in 1977 established an endowment fund whereby one or more annual bursaries to one or more deserving students would be granted to students in the baccalaureate program of the Maritime School of Social Work at Dalhousie University.

University Bursaries: The University has limited funds which may be used to provide bursary assistance to qualifying students. Information about and application for financial assistance from the University may be obtained from the Awards Office.

6. Management Studies

6.1 School of Business Administration Bachelor of Commerce Program

Phillips Cables Bursary: Phillips Cables Limited Education Foundation sponsors an annual bursary of \$625. This bursary is open to the student who in either the penultimate or the final year in Commerce has attained satisfactory performance and who has demonstrated the greatest financial need.

University Bursaries: The University has limited funds which may be used to provide bursary assistance to qualifying students. Information about and application for financial assistance from the University may be obtained from the Awards Office.

Master of Business Administration Program

University Bursaries: All Dalhousie students who registered for full-time studies and who can demonstrate financial need may be considered for possible financial aid from the University under terms applying to all such assistance. Since students from outside the country are required to have sufficient funds for a costly university education away from home, and since many will be given only to applicants who are in a straitened financial situation because of exceptional circumstances. Information may be obtained from the Awards Office.

6.2 School of Library Service

University Bursaries: All Dalhousie students who register for full-time studies and who can demonstrate financial need may be considered for possible financial aid from the University under terms applying to all such assistance. Since students from outside the country are required to have sufficient funds for a costly university education away from home, and since many graduate students are funded by merit awards,

consideration will be given only to applicants who are in a straitened financial situation because of exceptional circumstances. Information may be obtained from the Awards Office.

6.3 School of Public Administration Certificate in Public Administration Program (Undergraduate)

University Bursaries: The University has limited funds which may be used to provide bursary assistance to qualifying students. Information about and application for financial assistance from the University may be obtained from the Awards Office.

Diploma in Public Administration and Master of Public Administration Programs (Graduate)

University Bursaries: All Dalhousie students who register for full-time studies and who can demonstrate financial need may be considered for possible financial aid from the University under terms applying to all such assistance. Since students from outside the country are required to have sufficient funds for a costly university education away from home, and since many graduate students are funded by merit awards, consideration will be given only to applicants who are in a straitened financial situation because of exceptional circumstances. Information may be obtained from the Awards Office.

7. Unspecified or Selected Faculties

The Eva and David Ashkins Memorial Bursary: The donors established this fund for the purpose of assisting pupils who have matriculated from selected high schools to enter Dalhousie. These high schools are (first) the North Queen's Rural High School of Bridgewater High School, and (secondly) other high schools in the province of Nova Scotia. The recipient may be considered in subsequent years for further assistance.

The Birks Family Foundation Bursaries: The Birks Family Foundation has established a plan of annual contributions to the Student Aid Fund of recognized Canadian universities for the creation of the Birks Family Foundation Bursaries. The Bursaries are awarded by the Foundation on the recommendation of the Awards Office and are not restricted to faculty or year and may be renewed. The number and amount of such awards may vary annually, depending upon the funds available for the purpose from the Foundation.

The Rebecca Cohn Bursary Fund: A gift of \$4,000 by the executors of the Estate of the late Rebecca Cohn provides an endowed bursary fund for needy students.

Lenore Smith Cumming Bursary: From the Estate of Charles Gordon Cumming came a bequest of US \$10,000 to endow a bursary fund to assist needy students. Mr. Cumming expressed a preference for matriculants from Naparima College in Trinidad should such students attend Dalhousie.

Dalhousie Grants for Overseas Good Works Service: Dalhousie University offers annually a limited number of grants of \$500 each to volunteers who have completed overseas good works service in the year immediately preceding registration at Dalhousie. These grants are to be credited towards fees. To be eligible the student (1) must have served overseas in one of the following organizations: Canadian Crossroads International, Canadian University Service Overseas, Dr. Jean Vanier of France, or the World University Service of Canada; and (2) must be registered for full-time study at this University. In order to be considered for one of these grants, a student should:

(1) Write to the Awards Office in the summer asking to be considered

for a grant for the forthcoming academic year; and (2) Arrange with the appropriate authority in the organization concerned for a letter to be sent to the Awards Office confirming completion of said overseas service to arrive at the Awards Office by mid-October.

Dalhousie Memorial Bursary Fund: From time to time at Dalhousie contributions have been made to the University as a memorial subscription in honour of some student or former student. Until now there has been no proper place into which these funds could be channelled. Because of these occurrences a Dalhousie Memorial Bursary Fund has been established.

The existence of the fund will be commemorated by a book of remembrance to be located in a prominent place in the Killam Library. Names of persons in whose memory contributions have been made by relatives, friends, individuals or groups, to the Memorial Fund will be recorded in the book, along with the date of their birth and death. The pages would be turned on a regular basis.

All money contributed to the Fund will be invested by the Board of Governors and only the investment income will be awarded. The award will be available to any full-time Dalhousie student, already registered and in attendance at classes, who can show a need for additional support.

A student in straightened financial circumstances may be considered for possible assistance by contacting the Awards Office in the Arts & Administration Building.

All contributions to the Memorial Fund will be directed through the Dalhousie Annual Fund. Anyone wishing further information should contact the Development Office, Dalhousie University.

The Frank R. Davis Memorial Bursaries: The terms of this fund have been revised in consultation with the donor's family, and now income from this fund may be awarded on the basis of financial need. One or more bursaries may be made in consultation with the Supervisor of Schools for Bridgewater, N.S.

Annie M. Harrison Bursary: The annual income from the bequest of \$5,000 from the Estate of Annie M. Harrison provides a number of bursaries.

Alice M. Haverstock Bursary: From the Estate of Gertrude H. Fox came a bequest to endow a bursary fund in the name of Alice M. Haverstock.

The Frances Havergal Grant Bursaries: An endowed bursary fund was established under the Will of the late Constance Patricia Hamilton in the amount of \$18,900, the income from which is to be used to assist students.

The Annette S. Hill Bursary Fund: An endowment received as a bequest under the will of the late Annette S. Hill, the income thereof to be used to assist needy students of Dalhousie University.

The Neil and Jessie Matheson Bursaries: Established under the Will of Miss Margaret J. Matheson, Truro, who bequeathed a portion of the estate to Dalhousie University, the income provides for several bursaries. Students from the rural districts of Pictou County are to be given preference. The awards are in memory of her father and mother.

The Warren Publicover Class '25 Memorial Bursary: The Warren Publicover Class '25 Memorial Fund was established in memory of Warren Publicover, a loyal and distinguished member of the class. The annual income from this Fund is to be awarded in the form of a bursary for an individual who has successfully completed one year of university work at Dalhousie and is continuing as a full time student at this

University. The bursary is to be awarded by the Awards Office on the basis of satisfactory academic performance and demonstrated financial need, without restriction as to faculty, and subject to renewal provided that the original requirements are maintained. It is a condition of the gift that applicants for this bursary need not have availed themselves of governmental funding as is usually required by the University.

3M Canada Bursary: 3M Canada, Inc. sponsors an entrance bursary of \$500 which award is open to an academically capable student who, because of lack of funds, might not be able to come to university.

University Bursaries: The University has limited funds which may be used to provide bursary assistance to qualifying students. Information about and application for financial assistance from the University may be obtained from the Awards Office.

8. Loan Funds

Note: The lack of assistance under the Canada Student Loan Plan (or Quebec Student Aid Program) may prejudice a student's chances for assistance from the University.

8.1 Long Term Loans

(a) Application for University Loans (Long Term)

Students must complete a Application for Financial Aid form which may be obtained from the Awards Office at which time the student should arrange for the required interview. The completed form is to be returned to the Awards Office at time of the interview. Once a loan has been approved, the student is required to obtain a co-signer who is satisfactory to the University. Additional information may be obtained from the Awards Office, Arts & Administration Building. Dental, Law and Medical students will automatically be considered for possible loan assistance on the basis of information given in the application for a bursary.

General Note: With the exception of the Dental, Law, Pharmacy and Medical loan funds, the loan funds are being placed in abeyance.

(b) Loan Funds Open to Students in Most Faculties

Dalhousie Student Loan Fund: Initiated by the gift of \$1,000 from the Chronicle Publishing Company Limited of Halifax in June, 1912, the loan fund has since been increased by interest and other gifts to about \$14,000.

Morris and Annie Green Perpetual Loan Fund: This fund was instituted in 1959 with a gift of \$2,500 by the sons and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Green in memory of their parents. Loans to a maximum of \$200 in any one year may be made from the fund to students in good academic standing who have successfully completed one year at Dalhousie University and who have not yet reached their final graduating year.

Oscar David Morrill Loan Fund: From the Estate of Oscar David Morrill the University was bequeathed the sum of \$5,000 in 1949 for the purposes of a loan fund. Applicants from Yarmouth, Digby and Shelburne Counties in Nova Scotia are of the first preference. In the absence of qualifying applicants from the aforementioned counties, students from other parts of the Maritime Provinces may then be considered.

(c) Loan Funds Restricted to Dentistry

The Dr. George A. Chudleigh Memorial Loan Fund: A sum of money was donated anonymously to establish a loan fund in the name of Dr. George A. Chudleigh, a highly respected practitioner of Dentistry in

Halifax and for many years a member of the teaching staff of the Faculty of Dentistry. The accumulated interest from the principal invested is to be used as a revolving loan fund for students in Dentistry under the terms of the general regulations governing all loans.

Dalhousie Dental Loan Fund: The Board of Governors appropriated a sum of money to be used as a loan fund for students enrolled in dentistry. This was the *Faculty of Dentistry Loan Fund*. In the mid-1940's the W.K. Kellogg Foundation gave the University a grant of \$10,000 for scholarships and loans in the Dental School. The loan portion was set aside as the *Kellogg Dental Loan Fund*, having an initial capital of \$400. These two funds were consolidated in May 1972 under the present name.

(d) Loan Funds Restricted to Health Professions College of Pharmacy

Natalie Rideout Foster Pharmacy Loan Fund: The Burroughs Wellcome Company has donated a sum of money to be used as a loan fund for students in the College of Pharmacy who are proceeding towards the baccalaureate degree in pharmacy. The fund bears the name of the person who nominated Dalhousie for a gift from the company's pharmacy education program.

School of Nursing

Canadian Nurses' Association Loan Fund (External): The Canadian Nurses' Association has established a loan fund for registered nurses. For details write to the Executive Director, Canadian Nurses' Association, 50 The Driveway, Ottawa, Ontario, K2P 1E2.

Registered Nurses' Associations Loan Funds (External): The Registered Nurses' Associations of many provinces have established a loan fund for the benefit of members registered in the respective provinces. For further details apply to the Executive Secretary of the province in which you are registered.

(e) Loan Funds Restricted to Law

Law Loan Fund: In the early 1950's the University set aside approximately \$5,000 to capitalize a revolving loan fund to assist students in any year of Law.

Law Reserve Loan Fund: In 1965 the University set aside the sum of \$1,000 to establish a revolving loan fund to assist students in Second Year. Over the years the University has removed other restrictions on the fund so that it is now governed by the standard policy. In fiscal 1983 the small residual capital of the *Law School Seventy-fifth Anniversary Loan Fund* was consolidated into the Law Reserve Loan Fund.

Harvey L. Webber Loan Fund: In 1959 Mr. Harvey L. Webber (Law Class of 1936) established a loan fund to assist law students in their final year. Over the years the Donor has made further contributions to the principal of the fund.

To Apply: Application for possible financial assistance from the Faculty is to be made via the Awards Office, which administers these loans under the University's policy on student loans. The Student Finances Subcommittee makes the actual selection.

Nova Scotia Barristers' Society Loan Fund (External): The Society has set aside a fund from which loans may be made to students enrolled in the Faculty of Law, upon terms contained in the regulations of the Society. For further information, contact the Office of the Dean of Law.

(f) Loan Funds Restricted to Medicine

Dr. J.V. Graham Memorial Loan Fund: This loan fund was established by the family of the late Dr. J.V. Graham to assist worthy medical students.

The Malcolm B. Dockerty, MD, Loan Fund: A fund of \$400 was established to help medical students, preferably one in Fourth Year who is a native of Prince Edward Island.

Dominion Stores Limited Loan Fund: In 1957 Dominion Stores Limited of Toronto generously contributed money for the purpose of assisting students in their graduate medical education in the Department of Medicine at Dalhousie. Loans from this fund are subject to the normal University regulations governing such aid. For information contact the Chairman, Department of Medicine.

Dalhousie Medical Loan Fund: The W.K. Kellogg Foundation in 1942 gave the University \$16,500 for the Faculty of Medicine to enable it to assist medical students with scholarships and loans. Approximately \$4,000 was designated for the *Kellogg Medical Loan Fund*. In 1956 Pfizer Canada donated \$5,000 to establish the *Pfizer (Canada) Medical Student Loan Fund*. Pfizer Canada, a division of Pfizer Corporation, donated a further \$2,500 in each of 1957 and 1959. The *Medical Alumni Loan Fund* was set up in 1958 with a capital of \$3,000. In 1969 a transfer from the *Estate of Andrenna F. MacDougall* provided \$7,000 for loans. These capitals were consolidated with other monies, which Dalhousie University had provided over the years in the original *Dalhousie Medical Loan Fund*, to establish the present fund. Dr. Carl S. Wellish donated \$1,000 in 1970 in the name of the *Dr. Samuel Barton Sklar Loan Fund*, which was incorporated into the consolidated fund.

To Apply: Application for possible financial assistance from the Faculty is to be made via the Awards Office.

8.2 Long Term Loans Regulations Loan Regulations

A brochure containing commonly requested information about University Student Loans is available from the Awards Office. (This brochure is not intended as a definitive statement of University Policy on its loans.)

8.3 Short Term Loans

Note: Effective September 1985 the University adopted the policy that borrowers whose loans had to be placed with a collection agency will be **refused** new loans.

Temporary Loan Account: The University has established an account upon which small temporary loans may be drawn to assist registered Dalhousie students with certain types of short-term financial difficulty. (Such loans are not made for fee payment, nor for a credit line concerning bookstore purchases, nor for advances until employment pay-cheques are received. This list is only illustrative.) These loans have a short interest-free period, after which interest will be charged. Short-term loans must be retired before registering for further study. Delinquent borrowers will be denied University services and, if the need arises, will have their accounts placed for collection. Application is to be made at the Awards Office; payments, however, are to be made at the Student Accounts Office.

The Sandford Educational Press Loan Fund: This loan fund was established by the Sandford Educational Press to provide emergency short-term loans to Engineering undergraduates. The loans are normally for \$100 to \$300, and are interest-free for up to 90 days. The Sandford Educational Press is the textbook publishing division of the Sandford Fleming Foundation, and the loan fund of \$2,000 was established from proceeds of sales of its textbooks.

Note: Policy on Overdue Accounts — Precis from board of Governors' Minutes, 21 February 1984.

Students who intend to be graduated in May will have their names removed from the list of graduating students if their University accounts (includes the repayment of short-term loans) are delinquent on 15 March or become delinquent thereafter.

I — Continuing Education

Students who are engaged in part-time studies for credit are eligible to be considered for the award and the various types of financial assistance. Each of these is described briefly below.

The Frederick Thomas Parker for Part-Time Studies: This award will provide an appropriate and flexible means of encouraging students intending to undertake or engage upon degree or diploma studies at Dalhousie on a part-time basis. The selection committee will take into account both academic performance and financial need, depending on circumstances.

The Selection Committee will consist of the Chairman of the Undergraduate Scholarship Committee, the Director of Awards, the Director of Part-Time Studies and Extension, and a member of the Alumnae. The Committee will establish and make known from time to time detailed criteria within the general mandate of the award. Further details are available at the Awards Office.

Canada Student Loan for Part-Time Students: This particular federal loan is intended to help students who have a small cash-flow problem at the beginning of their studies. In order to qualify on the basis of class load, a student must be planning to take not more than 2.5 classes. The application is available from Nova Scotia Student Aid Office, and is to be completed in part by both the Student Accounts and Awards Offices. Please note that repayment of the loan begins 30 days following the borrowing of the funds, and payment must be completed within 24 months.

Canada Student Loans Plan: Some students who are "part-time" by the University criterion are still eligible for the regular Canada Student Loan. The class-load criterion for this loan is to enroll and to maintain a class-load of not less than three whole classes or the equivalent. Repayment of the loan normally begins six months after the time one ceases to be a "full-time" student according to governing regulations. During the summer months application kits will be available at the Awards Office on a pick-up basis. (These kits are available for pick-up or mail-out directly from Student Aid throughout the CSL assistance period.) Interested individuals may seek further details from the Awards Office (telephone 424-2416).

Dalhousie University Bursaries: Students who are engaged in part-time studies for credit will be considered for bursaries. Application is to be made at the Awards Office.

Dalhousie Temporary Loans: Students who are engaged in part-time studies for credit will be considered for temporary loans. Such loans are intended for short-term needs, and repayment begins after the expiration of a pre-determined grace period. Application is to be made at the Awards Office.

J — Miscellaneous Awards

1. Academic Exchanges

Russian Language Studies at Pushkin Institute: The cultural agreement between the Canadian and Soviet Governments of November 1975 included provision for an Intensive Language Training Program in Russian. The agreement provides that the Pushkin Institute for the Study of the Russian Language in Moscow will receive and accommodate annually, ten Canadian undergraduate students for a term of up to four months. Dalhousie University will administer the Canadian portion of the program.

School of Recreation, Physical and Health Education Exchange Programs: This School has undertaken two exchange programs in the past. In 1972 (fall term) we began an exchange program with the State University of New York at Brockport, New York. In the 1974-75 academic year, we began a second exchange with Chelsea College of Physical Education, Brighton Polytechnic, at Eastbourne, England.

Both these programs have continued annually since their inception. Further exchange programs for men and women have been inaugurated with two other specialist physical education institutions in England. These are at Carnegie College, Leeds and Loughborough University, Loughborough. Finally, contact has been made with Frostburg State College, Maryland, to begin an exchange program some time in the near future.

For additional information contact the School of Recreation, Physical and Health Education.

Spanish Travel Award: (For details see the Department of Spanish.)

University of Stirling Exchange: An exchange between the University of Stirling in Scotland and Dalhousie University has been established for students in the Faculty of Arts & Science. Details are available at the Awards Office.

2. Lectureships

The Dr. Walter J. Chute Distinguished Lecture Series: Dalhousie University in the autumn of 1980 established a series of annual lectures, bearing his name, to honor Dr. Chute for his contributions to the University community. A native of Brooklyn Corner, King's County, N.S., he attended Acadia University where he received a BSc (Hons.) degree. In 1943 he was graduated from the University of Toronto with a PhD degree in Chemistry. Dr. Chute was appointed to Dalhousie later that year, and since that time has had a profound influence on the education of thousands of Dal students. From 1954 to 1969 he served as the sixth Head of the Department of Chemistry. Although he formally retired in 1979, Dr. Chute continues to teach part-time and to conduct research in the Department. Further information is available from the Department of Chemistry.

The Dr. Ernest W. Guptill Memorial Lectureship: A generous gift from the family in 1976 endowed the E.W. Guptill Memorial Lectureship. The annual lecture is directed at the undergraduate students in Physics as well as the science-oriented public. A native of Grand Harbour on Grand Mannan Island, N.B., Ernest Guptill completed his high schooling in Springhill, N.S. After a BSc degree from Acadia University and an MA degree from the University of Western Ontario, he attended McGill University from which he was graduated in 1946 with a PhD in Physics. He was instrumental in the development of a high resolution radar antenna. Dr. Guptill was appointed to Dalhousie in 1947 and later served as Head of the Department of Physics for ten years. An avid outdoorsman with a deep love of the sea, Professor Guptill inspired his students by his keen interest in them and his contagious enthusiasm for Physics. Further information may be obtained from the departmental Chairman.

The R.O. Jones Lecture Endowment Fund: The Robert O. Jones Lecture Endowment Fund was established in 1974 by the Alumni of the Psychiatry Residency Training Program at Dalhousie University. The Fund was founded in recognition of Dr. Jones' contribution to Psychiatry in the Atlantic Provinces whilst head of the Department and in commemoration of the 25th anniversary of the training program.

Donations to the University for this fund are invested and the annual income therefrom will be used to provide for a lectureship or other suitable award. Initially, there will be an annual lectureship to be known as the Robert O. Jones Lecture. The Dept. of Psychiatry will select a distinguished speaker to deliver this lecture in conjunction with the annual meeting of the psychiatrists of the Atlantic Provinces, where feasible.

At the discretion of the department the nature and terms of the award may be altered to ensure its relevance to current interest in psychiatry.

John MacConnachie Memorial Fund: The Faculty of Dentistry has designated this memorial Fund, established during 1981-82, for providing a lecture. Further information may be obtained from the Chairman, John MacConnachie Committee.

The Stewart Manchester Lectureship Endowment Fund: The Stewart Manchester Lectureship Endowment Fund was established in 1975 by the Alumni of the Radiological Residency Training Program, the Radiologists of Dalhousie University, and the Radiologists of the Maritime Provinces. The fund was founded in recognition of Doctor Manchester's contribution to radiology in the Atlantic Provinces during his tenureship as Professor which extended over a period of 20 years.

Donations to the University for this Fund will be invested as they accrue, and the income there from will be used to provide a lectureship. The Department of Radiology will select an outstanding speaker to deliver this lecture, or series of lectures, at the annual Radiological Refresher Course or at any other such time as is deemed appropriate by the Radiological Department of the University.

At the discretion of the Department, the nature and terms of the Lectureship may be modified to ensure its relevance to current interests in radiology.

The Horace E. Read Memorial Lecture Series: The lecture series was inaugurated in 1976 to honour the memory of the late Horace E. Read, QC, who was dean of the Law School from 1950 until 1964, in recognition of his contribution to legal education and legal scholarship. The memorial lectures deal serially with the three areas of law which were of principal interest to Dr. Read: legislation and the legislative process, conflict of laws, and legal education.

3. Miscellaneous Funding (External)

Canadian Armed Forces Subsidization Plans

The high professional ability required of present day military officers demands the best in education and training. The Department of National Defence therefore sponsors programs of university education and leadership training for selected young men and women who have the potential to become officers in the Canadian Armed Forces. The admission standards are high, but for those who qualify the way is open to a challenging and rewarding career. The programs sponsored are the Regular Officer Training Plan (ROTP), Medical Officer Training Plan (MOTP) and Dental Officer Training Plan (DOTP). Training given under these plans is divided into two parts: normal attendance at university throughout the academic year and military training each summer. A period of compulsory military service is a condition of acceptance to any of these plans.

ROTP: This plan combines university subsidization with career training as an officer in the Regular component of the Canadian Forces. Successful applicants are enrolled in the rank of Officer Cadet. They are required to maintain a good standing both academically and militarily while in the plan. All tuition and other essential fees are paid by the Department of National Defence. As well, a monthly salary is paid to cover living expenses. Free medical and dental care is provided. Annual leave with full pay and allowances may be granted each year, usually before and after the summer training period. On graduation the Officer Cadet is commissioned as an Officer in the rank of 2nd Lieutenant.

Undergraduate students are also eligible to apply for this program provided they have at least one full year remaining before graduation.

MOTP: Subsidization is provided under the Medical Officer Training Plan for a maximum of three years and nine months of the final years of study in a faculty of medicine, including compulsory internship. It consists of paid tuition, paid book and instrument expenses, complete medical and dental coverage, paid holidays and a monthly salary for living expenses. A successful MOTP applicant is enrolled in the rank of 2nd Lieutenant, promoted to the rank of Lieutenant on the day he/she becomes licensed to practise medicine.

DOTP: Subsidization is provided under the Dental Officer Training Plan for a maximum of three years and nine months of the final years of study in a faculty of dentistry. It consists of paid tuition, paid book and instrument expenses, complete medical and dental coverage, paid holidays and a monthly salary for living expenses. A successful DOTP applicant is enrolled in the rank of 2nd Lieutenant and is promoted to the rank of Captain the day he/she receives a licence to practise dentistry.

Admission Requirements

An applicant must:

- (a) be a Canadian citizen; (b) be physically fit for enrolment in the Canadian Forces; and (c) if ROTP — be at least 16 years of age on the first day of January of the year he/she commences first year studies at university, or if MOTP or DOTP — be at least 17 years of age.
