A native of South Africa. He earned B.A. and M.A. degrees in History (with Honours) from the University of South Africa as well as a Ph.D., in History, from the University of Natal. He made his journey to Canada in 1975 as Senior Killam Professor of History, Dalhousie University. He also was involved with St Mary's University and Mount St Vincent University. Dr. Pachai also made an incredible contribution to the Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission as an Executive Director from 1989-1994.

He had a passion for teaching and sharing the rich heritage and culture of peoples of the African Diaspora. A historian and author he penned over 20 books that shared a great knowledge of history and culture. Recipient of many awards and honours, Dr. Pachai will be sadly missed by all those he touched. He will be remembered for his humbleness, wisdom, contribution to society and for providing a reference point of research for African Canadian history and culture.
