Update on the Second Science Librarian position

There is no update available today but the Dean will send an update to the Library Council Listserv soon.

Frequently asked questions (FAQ)

An internal FAQ or Decision Tree for staff was suggested to have on hand when questions arise and staff are unsure of who to send them to eg. quick links for who to contact in Resources. This would be good for new staff as well as staff who have been here for some time because of staff turnover in Resources in the last few years. The email address for Resources is library.eresources@dal.ca. It was noted, Resources may use footprints so stay tuned.

SharePoint for the Libraries

When we are using Teams, we are using SharePoint. Every Team that gets created generates a SharePoint site. When Teams or SharePoint sites are created, those SharePoint sites are different than a structured SharePoint site that is actually created through MyDal or with SharePoint Team through ITS. There is no actual Team with ITS for Teams or the SharePoint site is connected to the Teams sites so the intention and purpose and functionality of Microsoft Teams is for collaboration, not a long time storage solution where there is more structure and control in regards to the background elements and capabilities of a structured SharePoint site. It was noted, there is "@" feature to alert someone in case the question needs a timely response. It was noted, The Dean does not want the libraries to pursue a LibAnswers feature for staff because it's not the structural solution to the problem that he would want the libraries to pursue. Please send any questions or concerns, to Courtney Bayne. The Records Management office are doing training sessions for Teams.

It may be good to have a meeting with the Committees to help Michael understand the work that takes place within the committees and how admin support would helpful.


Resources/Sexton Design & Technology Library | Library Council Report

Highlights for September

Associate Dean, Library Services:

Copyright - The copyright office will visit each faculty council this fall to provide a refresher presentation on copyright essentials for the classroom.

Data & GIS Services - Jennifer Strang's instructional material from the <u>GIS Centre's Lunchless Learn Series</u> (which will itself run from September 26 to October 18) will be added to a GIS-related course's Brightspace at the request of a professor.

Document Delivery – The new e-store site for Document Delivery is now live, allowing them to invoice and accept payments in an online portal, eliminating the need to accept credit card payments by phone.

Indigenous Services - Special Projects

- In July, staff from Halifax West (Wendy Lawrence and Robin Jensen), along with one of their students, installed in the Ko'jua Okuom a series of exhibits created by Halifax West students. This exhibits are on loan to Dalhousie and includes red dresses, an interactive board on which you can place your hand to hear a student talk about murdered and missing Indigenous women and girls, an "Unsolved Cases" Tree, and an interactive Moose Hide Campaign exhibit.
- With the financial sponsorship of Communications & Marketing, we arranged for the painting of murals of the 7 Sacred Teachings from Mi'kmaq artist, Lorne Julien, timed to welcome participants of the North American Indigenous Games. These 4' diameter murals are currently on display in the lobby of the Killam Library and we hope to have them installed on the exterior of the building this Fall.
- We commissioned a handcrafted table from Mi'kmaq artisans Jim & Cheryl Walsh from Millbrook First
 Nation (<u>Well Well Wood Crafts</u>), which arrived in the Killam on Wednesday. This gorgeous table is now
 a focal point of the Ko'jua Okuom. We will be arranging a ceremony to bless the table in Mi'kmaq
 History Month or for the National Day for Truth & Reconciliation.

LiveHelp - Fall session begins on September 25, and runs until December 8. Service dates and hours have been posted to the <u>Libraries' Ask Us page</u>

Library Hours – Please check Kristy's report for an update on the Library Hours redesign on the website. I'm very grateful to the ATS team (and the testers!) for working so hard to make this happen for the start of the term. This return to a more "live" type of hours interface will be helpful to all our users.

Welcome Fair - Along with staff members from various library units, the Reference Team, participated in the Welcome Fair on September 5, as part of the *New to Dal* programming. The Fair ran from 10:00 – 3:00 in the Quad. We welcomed just over 200 students at our booth. Students seemed excited to be on campus and interested in the Libraries. Popular question topics included library hours, library jobs, locations and spaces, DalCard library account registration, and printing.

Killam Library:

- On July 1st the Killam welcomed Joyline Makani back from her 6-month Special Leave.
- I'm very grateful to the Killam team of librarians who have been very helpful filling teaching requests from academic departments that are not currently assigned to a liaison.
- Samantha Adema has agreed to cover Philosophy while Jennifer Lambert is on leave.
- My fall schedule has me located in my 3rd floor office of the Killam Library 1-2 days a week. The schedule differs from week to week but the whiteboard in the Killam Reference & Research Services office area is kept up-to-date with my next expected day in Halifax.
- It seems like the Killam Library is bursting at the seams with students very early in the term!! Thankfully our new camera for People Counter data was recently installed, which will provide more reliable data for the Killam.

MacRae Library:

Monthly highlights (1-5 key events, meetings, etc.):

In conjunction with the Writers Federation of Nova Scotia, Dal Libraries hosted a reading event for K.R. Byggdin, the winner of the Thomas Raddall Atlantic Fiction Award. After being postponed from July and rescheduled, *K.R. Byggdin in Conversation with Luke Hathaway* took place at the Glitter Bean Café on Monday, August 14, 2023. The author was very engaged in the promotion of the event and appeared on CBC Mainstreet Halifax on the afternoon of the day of the event. During the event, Dal Libraries provided a land acknowledgement and introduced the hosts. Bookmark Halifax was on site to sell the winning book, Wonder World. There was great attendance, and the crowd was engaged and enthusiastic. The event involved a reading by the author, a conversation led by host and poet Luke Hathaway, and a Q & A period to which the audience brought thoughtful questions. - The Dal Reads Advisory Committee has been revived and hopes to have a book selected and licensed before Department of English winter syllabi are due in November.

- Thanks to the volunteers who represented Dal Libraries at the Welcome Fair on the Studley Quad and the Queer Services Fair at Dalhousie Art Gallery, including Amanda Sparks, Sarah Jane Dooley, Robin Bishop, Kevin Ahern, Gina Coates, Seungkyoo Lee, Joseph Wickens, and Nicole Marcoux. We had 203 students stop by the libraries' table at the Welcome Fair.
- Thanks to Johnelle Sciocchetti and Kellie Hawley for refreshing the Comments, Compliments, Complaints board at the Killam Library. The first update since March!
- We're excited to share that the homepage of Dal Libraries website has been updated with our fall hours. ATS has made the hours widget current and easy to update. *Today's Hours are* highlighted on our homepage, and each location page has the current week's schedule. Check it out. Thanks so much to ATS, with a shout-out to Krishna and John for their hard work.

Academic Technology Services Library Council Report – September 2023

Marc Comeau – Director, Academic Technology Services

- Thanks to the efforts of the ATS team, September has gotten off to a reasonable start from our perspective.
 There are always issues, but there have been no major problems through the first week of classes. My thanks to the entire ATS team.
- The new network from ITS continues to make incremental progress. They aren't providing time estimates for rollout at this time because of the many delays and continued speedbumps they encounter.
- Our team is engaged in significant, ongoing work surrounding the RIM/CRIS system.
- We were able to launch the new hours widget and associated back-end system for the Library hours on the website. The previous version was on a platform that was deprecated and needed to be rebuilt.
- We're working with Linda Bedwell and the Dal Analytics team to assemble a data inventory for ATS. There's a university-wide project to catalogue the data throughout Dalhousie. Our unit maintains a wide variety of data, stored in different states so there is much work to be done in this area.
- We've had productive conversations with the Resources team around what role we can play in better supporting Alma. With Aleph, there wasn't much opportunity for ATS to play a role as Novanet took care of it all. With Alma, there are new opportunities presenting themselves and we're going to work to see how best we can help.
- Our team continues to support those who are displaced by the ventilation renovations, helping to move and setup computers in their relocated spaces.
- We're working on getting to a resolution to a plagiarism detection system problem that has come up. The product we currently use, Ouriginal (formerly Urkund) has been bought out and will end its service at the end of December. The emergence of large language models (Chat GPT for example) has altered this space and has raised valid questions about the current and future utility of this type of tool. We are pursuing a replacement at this time with a broader strategy to see how its value changes going forward.
- Thanks to funding from the administration, we were able to regularize David Green's position into a full-time position. David works in the Brightspace Virtual Support Room helping faculty. Another similar position has an open competition underway. When the dust has settled, we will have fewer people providing this kind of support than during the height of the pandemic but will have an increase over our pre-pandemic support levels. This has allowed us to remain open evenings during the week.
- John Cameron has joined the classroom technologies team, filling a vacancy in the Life Sciences Centre office.
- With the help of our partners, we implemented an integration between Banner and Brightspace earlier this year. It's a huge move forward, allowing changes in registration and name changes to be reflected almost instantly once they're in Banner. Unfortunately, there's another system that is causing conflicts on the technical side leading to problems. We'll be putting in work later this month to find a path forward beyond the workaround.
- I attended an Ex-Libris day at the Novanet office where they shared information about their products and roadmaps.
- I've been attending Information Systems Governance Committee meetings as an advisor. This committee is where administrative digital initiatives go for approval and deliberation.
- I'm participating on a hiring committee for a Threat Management Officer with ITS in their security department. It's an important opportunity to bring our perspectives and values to the table for this hiring process. There exists fundamental friction between the open, giving nature of a library and the controlled, restricted nature of IT security. I think it's important to take any opportunity I can to share our views and perspectives.
- Finally, I would like to thank Mick Bottom for all the work he put in as Acting Director through my leave of absence. Mick did a fantastic job and for that I am grateful.

- Team members kindly attended a Summer meeting to help orient the new AD at the end of July. The first meeting of the term is scheduled for later in September.
- A draft report on LibInsight Teaching data has been prepared and will hopefully be finalized for wider distribution in the near future.

Dunn Law Library

- Since Library Council last met, the Law Library has undergone several staffing changes.
 - Anne Matthewman and Linda Clark retired as of July 1. Anne Matthewman has returned to us on a
 post-retirement/limited term/part time basis until the end of 2023. You will usually find her virtually or,
 in reality, on Tuesday, Wednesday's, Thursdays at the Law Library.
 - David Michels embarked on a six-month special leave/sabbatical, as of July 1- returning in January of 2024. H
 - o Hannah Steeves returned from a full-year special leave/sabbatical as of July 1.
 - Mark Lewis began as Chief Law Librarian on July 1, and his old position is currently vacant.
 - The search committee interviewed candidates for the position of Collections/Access Librarian in the final week of August 2023.
 - As a wise philosopher once said, "ch-ch-changes"

- Hannah will be teaching two sections (approximately 120 students) of Legal Research and Writing this year, while Mark teaches one section. The teaching in regular 1L curriculum (including LRW) will not begin until the first week of October this year, as the law school embarks on a series of intensive courses over the month of September to introduce students to the field of law.
- Continuing the theme of change in the law school, the new Dean of the Faculty of Law Sarah Harding, formerly of Chicago-Kent College of Law started on August 21st.

Monthly highlights (1-5 key events, mee5ngs, etc.):

June 24 – July 7 – I joined the CARL Northern Study Tour visi=ng Iqaluit, Yellowknife and Whitehorse with colleagues from research libraries across Canada. The purpose of the study tour was to connect with and learn more about Indigenous peoples, governance and research in Nunavut and Canada's northern territories. Our CARL delega=on met with over 70 government, academic, and community members over two weeks, touring legislatures, libraries, archives, colleges, universi=es, and research ins=tu=ons, and receiving Indigenous guided tours of a number of communi=es. It was a rich and at =mes deeply moving experience with many learnings that I'm s=II sor=ng through and unpacking. While I appreciate the unique opportunity to explore and learn more about the north, there were =mes when I felt conflicted about our presence in these communi=es and the resources it took to get us there and host us, and have been especially concerned about the wellbeing of the many people we met in Yellowknife who had to evacuate due to wildfires shortly aRer our departure.

July 18 – I aUended a mee=ng of the university's new Data Governance CommiUee, which falls under the Digital Governance Steering CommiUee repor=ng to the Provost's Execu=ve CommiUee. In its early days the commiUee is working to define data governance for Dalhousie, establish guiding principles for data governance and iden=fying and suppor=ng the work of data stewards across our campuses. Dal Libraries are heavily invested in this work as cri=cal stakeholders in the management of ins=tu=onal records and data. In my role on the commiUee, I have worked to promote the establishment of clear and prac=cal guidelines that ensure good prac=ce in data management, the reduc=on of duplica=on across the university, ease of access where needed, and the security required to ensure its integrity.

July 24 – I chaired a second Libraries Opera=ons Management mee=ng with managers to share informa=on about how we are managing service levels with current staffing, explore the use of cross-func=onal roles to support different services provided in a single loca=on and establish a shared approach to managing future vacancies. I have found it helpful to gather with our supervisors and their ADs to share experiences and best prac=ces and engage in problem solving together, and plan to con=nue holding periodic mee=ngs with this group.

Aug 3 – Huwaida Medani chaired the second quarterly mee=ng of Employment Equity Leads. The mee=ng included interes=ng presenta=ons from the faculty of Open Learning and Career Development on capacity building for Dal employees and from the Faculty of Computer Science sharing details of a faculty mentorship program recently established there. These mee=ngs provide excellent opportuni=es for sharing informa=on and building strong prac=ces to support employment equity at Dalhousie. They also help us maintain a focus on employment equity in the library. As we con=nue to par=cipate with this group I expect to bring ideas and ini=a=ves back to the library to con=nue improving our hiring processes and supports for current library staff.

Aug 18 – I was pleased to par=cipate in a panel discussion with Dal Libraries interns on career planning. Jackie Phinney and Courtney Bayne hosted the panel as part of the summer intern enrichment program. I enjoyed connec=ng with our librarian panelists and library interns, sharing my own experiences and learning more about the experiences and insights my colleagues had to share with this new cohort of librarians. As a follow up to this event, it was excellent seeing many of you in the Wallace McCain Learning Commons on September 7 for our annual Summer Shine event where interns presented on the projects and ini=a=ves they were involved in over the summer months. It was great to learn about

these projects and to see how our intern program enriches librarian educa=on while adding value to our work and opera=ons in the library. Thanks to Jackie and Courtney for cochairing this program.

Aug 22 – Marc Comeau and I aUended a Novanet Technology Day hosted at the Novanet offices with informa=on sessions provided by Ex Libris. It was good to connect in-person with colleagues from our partner ins=tu=ons and learn more about upcoming product changes. The presenta=on on Leganto was par=cularly noteworthy, as we have previously expressed interest in using this tool to improve our course reserves at Dalhousie.

Important news (Notable news with a University or Library-wide impact)

July 19 – Like many of you I was surprised and excited by the announcement of Kim Brooks appointment as

Dalhousie's 13th President, and I was pleased to accept an invita=on to a recep=on at the President's Residence on July 19 to celebrate the news. Fun fact: Kim intends to move into the residence for her term as President. From my perspec=ve there are many advantages to having Kim in this role, not least of which is having a president who already possesses a deep understanding of Dalhousie and Dal Libraries. Kim has a strong interest in and commitment to libraries, as evidenced by her current role as Board Chair of the Halifax Public Library. I con=nued to report to her throughout the summer months and have now reverted to repor=ng to Frank Harvey who has resumed his role as Provost.

Aug 17 – I attended a full day session for Dal senior leadership on mobilizing change using data from UniForum. The day included a number of presentations by staff from the University of Saskatchewan who shared their approach to working with UniForum data and the lessons they've learned over the last two years. Saskatchewan has taken a slow a deliberate approach to change management, taking time to review data, understand what it means for each faculty and unit and identify areas for positive change. It was encouraging to learn more about an approach to working with UniForum that had no pre-defined outcomes but sought to work with the data to better understand their institution and identify opportunities for improving processes and staff experiences.

Sept 12 – I co-chaired a Digital Strategy meeting with our CIO, Jody Couch, hearing an update on the university's strategy for AI from Christian Blouin and an update on an inventory of research tools at Dal from Jennifer Bain. The meeting wrapped up with a wrap of the committee itself. Digital strategy working groups will continue, but the Digital Strategy Steering Committee is being rolled into the Digital Governance Steering Committee, which includes the same membership as well as additional leaders from across faculties and units. This follows recommendations from the Digital Strategy Pillar 5 on governance, and will help in the establishment of a clear digital governance framework for the university.

Announcements (staff acknowledgements, upcoming events, etc.)

I've begun mee=ng with librarians as part of the annual review process and have enjoyed catching up and learning more about work done over the last year and plans for the year ahead. I want to acknowledge the crea=vity and dedica=on that I see throughout our librarian cohort to making an impact on student and faculty learning and research. While processes like academic quality assurance oRen focus on our provision of informa=on resources to support the curriculum, it's clear to me that it is our people who make the biggest posi=ve difference in the work and lives of everyone in the Dalhousie community.
