

# Dal's new reactor treats raw sewage

Cuts to Dalhousie are like thorns to gardeners — all too common and a real pain in the ass. That's why it's a bit of a surprise to see Dalhousie invest in a major purchase even if it may save money down the road.

Recently the Board of Governors voted 28-12 in favour of investing 4.7 million dollars in a new on-campus nuclear reactor. The reactor will supply the entire campus with electricity plus produce an abundant surplus which can be sold to the province for profit.

Says Dr. Ivana Nukem from the physics department, "The province is charging us over \$100,000 a year for power. The \$4.7 million investment is clearly a savings."

The reactor will be purchased from a Russian vendor, Crackincore, who has supplied reactors to such places as Glasnova, North Haverbrook, Shelbyville, and Chernobyl.

It's an early 60s design, but Yuri Adolt spokesperson for Crackincore is reassuring saying, "Old? Is not a problem. No go boom. 30-day warranty."

Board of Governors spokespeople

back Crackincore saying, "They [Crackincore] have an excellent track record. They've only had one safety-related incident in their 35-year history and they assured us it was very minor."

Dr. Hal Abbott from the oceanography department says there may be spin-offs as well that the university should look into. "The reactor needs plenty of water for cooling. Halifax needs a sewage treatment plant. It seems a natural marriage to me."

Dr. Abbott proposes the reactor be used to house a sewage treatment plant. Raw sewage would be used to

cool the core which would irradiate the sewage and remove bacteria. The sewage could then be safely dumped into the harbour.

Adolt from Crackincore says "Sewage? Oh yes. Will work good. No go boom. 10-day warranty."

Naturally, even good ideas have their opponents. Dr. Killam N. Burnem from the Chemistry department says Dal shouldn't build the reactor. Instead, he says, it should build an incineration plant that will generate enough electricity to supply the needs of the university. His plan doesn't generate extra electricity to sell, but it does solve the county's garbage problems.

"This could be a major feather in our cap when it comes political backscratching time," says Burnem. "We will have some big favours we can call in. We can show [John] Savage what savage really means."

"The campus community is really behind us on this plan," explains Mr. Yess Mann, an assistant to Dr. Burnem. "For instance Beaver Foods has offered to take the toxic ash from the incinerator off our hands at no charge. It seems everyone is pitching in."

Spokesperson Tom E. Ake from opening.

Beaver Foods says, "If they want to try and merge the incinerator and sewage treatment facilities, we will even back that. We can accept up to 100 tons of sewage ourselves right now for 'processing'."

Dr. Burnem says that if the reactor must go through that, at least the sewage-filled coolant can be used to heat buildings on-campus, providing an additional dollar savings.

When asked if the reactor could handle an additional heating load, Adolt from Crackincore said, "Heat buildings? Oh yes. Will work good. No go boom. Two-day warranty".

Once land near the Life Sciences Centre has been secured, building will start this May and will finish in late June. The reactor should then fire up July 1 in time for Canada Day celebrations. A massive fireworks display will be launched from atop the reactor to commemorate the event. All students will be invited for the festivities. The Halifax Fire Department will even be taking the day off work to help host the event.

Adolt from Crackincore says, "Fireworks? Oh yes. Very safe. No go boom. One-day warranty," but regrets he will not be able to attend the opening.



# The year at Dal: 1993-94 in review

MAY: Jeff Rappell and Caroline Kolompar take student union office, pledging "better communication" with the university administration.

Biology Department admits that under cover of its seal sterilization experiments, it is conducting research into population control for arts students. "This does not represent a bias towards the sciences at Dalhousie," says the department.

Mount St. Vincent University Student Union, after Alcohol Awareness committee chair and President-elect Cathy Thorpe shows up plastered at a charity event, shuts down the student newspaper, the *Picaro*, for reporting on it. "I am not a drunk," insists Thorpe. *Picaro* staff announce plans to keep publishing by holding bake sales.

Jefferson Rappell says Mount St. Vincent student council and *Picaro* should practice "better communica-

tion.

JUNE: Dal's Board of Governors votes to reappoint Reuben 'Jurassic' Cohen as Chancellor for another year, despite student protests that he routinely insults women and minority students at convocations. President Howard Clark defends the decision as "part of Dalhousie's commitment to protecting endangered reptile species."

The same Board meeting names Sir Graham Day Dalhousie's next Chancellor. The appointment of Sir Graham, a millionaire from the British petroleum industry and Margaret Thatcher's privatization crusader, "does not reflect a trend towards scientific and private-sector influence at Dalhousie", says Doctor of Chemistry Howard Clark.

JULY: Prime Minister Kim Campbell announces reforms to the student loan program. In response to criti-

cisms, she responds diplomatically, "Fuck off. I know what I'm doing." Campbell's federal Tories announce they are the 'education party'.

AUGUST: Stats Canada releases summer employment figures, showing few university students were able to find work and most are broker than ever. Kim Campbell says students spend too much money on beer anyway. She calls herself the 'education candidate for Prime Minister'.

SEPTEMBER: Frosh Week sees hundreds of new students with names like 'Toad', 'Vomit' and 'Snot' painted on their shirts pledging undying love to complete strangers on the street. Organizers say they are pleased with the new non-degrading format of Frosh Week.

National Party leader Mel Hurtig promises his party, if elected, will eliminate tuition fees. "I've seen it work on many other planets and I think it's time you Earthlings tried it," says Hurtig.

DSU President Jeff Rappell calls for "better communication" about program cuts.

The DSU announces plans to hold a referendum on membership in the Canadian Federation of Students, and pledges to follow the CFS constitution to the letter in holding the vote. Accordingly, DSU President Jeff Rappell does twenty jumping jacks, five somersaults, hums the first three bars of Beethoven's ninth symphony, and spins around three times while sticking out his tongue and reciting the CFS motto backwards. OCTOBER: CFS Chair Carl Gillis tells the DSU its planned referendum might not be valid because the CFS constitution stipulates Beethoven's ninth must be hummed in the key of G, and Rappell hummed it in C. Rappell calls for "better communication" between DSU and CFS.

Music students sing "We shall overcome" at Carnegie Hall to protest cuts to their department. Library students step up their protest by wearing different coloured socks to class. Dal International Socialists issue pamphlets.

Jean Chretien's Liberals win a landslide in the federal election. Mel Hurtig and his supporters disappear in a shimmering beam of green light.

A night janitor spots President Howard Clark grooving to Slim Whitman tunes one night in his office. In a press release, Clark maintains, "Music is not essential to our mission."

NOVEMBER: Pledging its commitment to access for disabled students, Dalhousie relocates the disabled students' advisor's office to the roof of the A & A. "It's all downhill from there," says Howard Clark.

The Budget Advisory Committee insists students are welcome to bring their feedback to the committee, and announces its next meeting will be held in an undisclosed cave at the bottom of the Grand Canyon.

Dalhousie News nominates Howard Clark for sainthood.

Howard Clark is spotted wearing a false beard and glasses at a puppet show performed at the public library. In a statement, Clark says, "Theatre is not an integral part of our mission."

Library students announce plans to harden the tone of their protest by reshelving books themselves.

Jeff Rappell, in a major refinement of his position, calls for "more open dialogue" on program cuts.

DECEMBER: Scandal hits Dal International Socialists in the form of allegations their pamphlets are printed on non-recycled paper. Socialists vigorously deny this, calling it a plot by "reactionary forces" allied against them "to suppress the voice

of the working class".

University of New Brunswick math prof Matin Yaqzan writes in the student newspaper that date rape is the woman's fault. Lots of people are outraged and Yaqzan announces he is charging \$10,000 an interview. JANUARY: Picaro staff publish a January issue by selling their hockey card collections.

Howe Hall residents insist they saw President Howard Clark in drag on Spring Garden Road. "Costume Studies are not central to our mission," Clark insists in a speech.

The Dalhousie Gazette publishes its 125th anniversary issue on yellow paper in the style of 1869. Hundreds of Dal students complain, saying they don't like the paper's new format.

Matin Yaqzan retires on the proceeds from his interviews and announces he will seek the Reform Party leadership.

FEBRUARY: Famous environmentalist David Suzuki, after denying he is a hypocrite for charging \$10,000 to speak at Dal, is arrested downtown for molesting a seal pup. Dal Science Society springs for bail.

The Dalhousie Senate approves overwhelmingly the Discriminatory Harassment policy. The President of Communist North Korea, Kim Il-Sung, applauds the policy, saying, "North Korea has much to learn from Dalhousie."

An anonymous rich alumnus offers to buy the President's House and evict Howard Clark and his wife as tenants. Art Gallery offers to let the Clarks crash there.

CTV airs "The Matin Yaqzan Story" and offers a million-dollar royalty. Yaqzan says, "I do not regret my actions for a moment."

MARCH: The Gazette sues the Globe and Mail for copyright violation after the Globe's 150th anniversary edition looks suspiciously like the Gazette's 125th. Jeff Rappell calls for "better communication" between the two papers.

Picaro publishes an issue funded by selling Girl Guide cookies. Monarchist League of Canada protests.


