



The President's Message . . .

To the Class of 1956:

The publication of this new volume of *Pharos* is a signal that the day of your graduation from Dalhousie is drawing near. The thought awakens mingled feelings in the minds of those of us who have continuing responsibility in the University.

On the one hand, we are sorry that your undergraduate days are almost over, and that althoug we may anticipate the pleasure of seeing some of you again in the faculties of advanced and professional studies, most of you will now be taking your final leave of the campus, and the distinctive associations that we have had with you are due to terminate very shortly.

We welcomed you a few years ago when you came to us from High School with only the measure of maturity appropriate to your age, and some impatience perhaps with our demand that you demonstrate the seriousness befitting the members of a University. I do not think we were ever unreasonable in our insistence, but we did want you to understand from the outset that when you were admitted to this company you had actually made the transition to the estate of responsible manhood and womanhood. Dalhousie has never regarded itself as a custodial institution for adolescents, but as a fellowship—albeit a delightful one, not lacking in the lighter phases—of young adults who were prepared to think earnestly about the larger issues of life and to govern themselves with all requisite self-discipline. It was with no little satisfaction that we watched you leave callow youth behind, acquire new knowledge, develop a reasoned appreciation of the highest values, and find purposes worthy of your deepest loyalties. We regret that the time is now inevitably approaching for most of you to say farewell to us and to one another, and that we shall no longer have the day to day contacts with you that have meant to much to us and, we dare to hope, o you also.


On the other hand, we share without reserve the joy which your graduation brings to you and to all who belong to you; we congratulate you most cordially on reaching this significant, if still subordinate, goal in your careers; and we give you our blessing as you go out from these college halls to make your contribution to the manifold life of the community and nation. We have implicit confidence that you will not only repay with enduring affection what Dalhousie has done for you, but that you will add fresh distinction to the already illustrious name of the University.

A few days ago I had occasion to look into a collection of addresses which the late Dr. Richard Roberts gave to students in various centres across this continent about the time when I was at the place where you stand now. I read them again with special interest, partly because it had been my good fortune to be appointed as his associate when I completed my own college course, and partly because the addresses themselves have so much intrinsic merit and appeal. I take the liberty of concluding my message to you with words from one of them:

"Your business (whatever it may be) is not your own private gold mine: it is your opportunity to serve your generation according to the will of God. And there is joy in it, when with it the sense grows upon you that you are filling a place in the world, that you are feeding the processes of life,, that you are justifying your own existence. To realize your daily task as a holy vocation, and so to discharge it, to be making good on your particular job every day, putting into it all you know, so that you come to the eend of each day unstained, undishonoured, and unashamed, and glad even though the best work has brought you no more than your daily bread—that is the road to joy, the highway to realization."


I commend this wise admonition to your careful consideration, and suggest that you include it in your philosophy.






JEAN ALLISON ANTHONY Yarmouth, N. S.






SHELIA IEAN COLDWELL Dartmouth, N. S.

"My mind is its own place."



"A winning smile, a happy face, In all our hearts she finds a place."



GRAHAME ALVIN LAING Sydney, N. S.



"Life is what you make it."








BRENDA M. MURPHY St. John's, Newfoundland

GRAEME ALEXANDER NICHOLSON Halifax, N. S.


"Are synthetic a Priori propositions possible?"






MARY E. G. CHIPMAN Halifax, N. S.

LALIA A. DAUPHINEE Dartmouth, N. S.



Dave Peel was elected the Federation's Atlantic Regional President at the Edmonton conference, and at the regional conference, the Atlantic Entrance scholarship was established.






Hockey '56
