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

This included Dr. Jay Farger, Dr. Lynn

MacPhee, Dr. Dan Morrow, Dr. John Rooney, Dr. Mark Richardson, and Dr. Omar Ismail. We don't believe any other post-graduate periodontal program in North America can boast such an outstanding attendance record.

Late in September, Dean Bennett attended a meeting of the Liaison Committee on Dental School Surveys of the American Association of Dental Schools and the American Dental Association as a representative of the Canadian Dental Association's Council on Education. The purpose of the meeting was to attempt to integrate the annual surveys which are administered to all Canadian and American dental schools, so that the data from the Canadian schools would be reported in a complete and understandable way. It was further intended that the discussions begin on the development of a comparable reporting mechanism for the financial affairs of Canadian dental faculties so that the information now gathered could be more comparable with other Canadian schools and with their American counterparts.

Kaireen Vaison attended the National Conference of The Canadian Congress on Learning Opportunities for Women, held in Toronto in August. Kaireen is Program Chairman for CCLOW in Nova Scotia.

Drs. Brygider, Hoar, Chaytor, Graham and Sykora attended the Meeting of the Association of Prosthodontists of Canada in Toronto, on October 18, 19, and 20, 1984.

# TRAVEL (con't)

Dr. D. W. Jones was leader of the six member delegation to the International Dental Standards meeting held in Solna, Sweden from September 3 - 8. The meeting was attended by 144 expert delegates representing 13 different countries. Dr. Peter Williams from the University of Manitoba, currently on sabbatical at Dalhousie, was also a delegate at this meeting.

A total of 27 task groups and 7 working groups held meetings during the week in addition to the plenary session of the full Technical Committee.

The meeting in Sweden involved numerous committees dealing with the development and drafting of new or improved international standards for dental materials and devices. The Technical Committee currently have some 74 standards documents which are being developed or revised in addition to a considerable number of new working drafts.

Dr. Jones reports that the organization and the arrangements made by the Swedish hosts for the meeting were excellent. Translation, typing, duplication and meeting room facilities were first class. The various task group and working group meetings as well as the Technical Committee meeting were conducted in a most efficient manner. A reception was given by the Town of Solna at the City Hall in Solna on Monday evening. On Tuesday, an excellent dinner and entertainment was hosted by the Swedish Dental Trade Association in Stockholm at the famous Operaterrassen Restaurant. Wednesday evening a superb reception was given by the City Hall in the reception room used for the famous Nobel Prize ceremonies. This was followed by a boat trip around some of the 14 islands on which Stockholm is built.

In mid-October, Dean Benntt attended a meeting of the Sub-Committee on Documentation of the Council of Education of the Canadian Dental Association. During this meeting, revisions to the accreditation guidelines for D.D.S., D.M.D., Dental Hygiene, and graduate Prosthodontic programs were further considered and survey forms for "paper review only" surveys of graduate programs in Oral Surgery and Periodontics were further refined. It is the intention that these document revisions bring the guidelines by which educational programs are measured up to date, and more easily interpreted by the educational community. This was the fifth meeting of a series held over the last two years and at least three more are planned.

## DENTISTS' EARLY WARNING DEVICE

The developers of a new electronic device say that it enables dentists not only to detect cavities but to identify them in the early stage of development.

The battery operated machine measures demineralization of tooth enamel - the first step in tooth decay. Bacteria in the mouth etches enamel dissolving minerals. That makes a tooth more porous, which in turn increases its conductivity. So the machine determines the state of your teeth by measuring how porous they are.

According to the developers, the device can predict a cavity years before it becomes one. With that knowledge, the dentist can step up patient education, apply fluoride or use a sealant to prevent enamel deterioration.



# CONTINUING EDUCATION TRIES: "BACK TO BASICS"

A course entitled "Practical Preventive Dentistry" was offered to dental hygienists and assistants Sept. 22, 1984. Drs. Patrick Blahut, Gary Foshay and Gary Jackson presented information from a very practical perspective.

The topics covered were flourides, sealants, and early detection of periodontal disease from an auxillary's viewpoint. Each was presented with an eye to the practitioner in offices and questions frequently asked by patients.

Hygienists and assistants who were asking for a review certainly heard the current information concerning these topics. The course was well attended and the comment heard most often was a plea for more practical oriented courses.

This particular C.E. course differed slightly from others in that for the first time it was co-sponsored by N.S.D.H.A. and recognized membership in C.D.H.A.. In addition, during the afternoon, participants were divided into three groups and attended seminars on each topic. The seminars provided a forum for questions and answers as well as lively discussions related to everyday problems in practices. The format of this course, morning lectures, afternoon seminar, was enthusiastically received.

"Practical Preventive Dentistry" was a resounding success. More such courses are sure to follow.

## RESEARCH NOTES

Did you see the PC's election promises for university research? The MRC together with the other federal research granting councils will be given a full five year funding to replace the current annual appropriations. The PC's said they would maintain an arms length relationship between government and research councils. They also set a target of 2.5% of GNP to be devoted to research and development. The Research Councils have been promised real increases (above inflation). The PC's also said that a Conservative Government would favour contracting research out to universities.

Did you know that MRC gave out a total of \$137.3 million in research funds during 1983/84, about \$82 million of which was in the form of grants in aid and general research, and \$13 million was for major equipment. Did you know that MRC spent \$49,041 on Visiting Professors during 1983/84 and out of the 15 universities participating, Dalhousie received the second highest expenditure on MRC Visiting Professors (\$6,744). Did you know that a total of 1,690 individuals were recipients of MRC Operating Grants during 1983/84. Did you know that Nova Scotia received only 3.5% of MRC funding during 1983/84, Ontario and Quebec received 36.7 and 31.5% respectively, the next highest being B.C. with 8.2%. Did you know that 553 new grants totaling \$16.15 million were awarded by MRC during 1983/84. Did you know that the deadline for new operating grants is February 1, 1985.

Did you know that Jake Epp as the new Minister of National Health and Welfare is now responsible for the MRC and that Thomas Siddon, Ph.D., the Minister of State for Science and

Technology who is responsible for NSERC is a strong supporter of increased funding for research and development.

However, in spite of our poor record in obtaining funding in the Dental and Medical fields, Dalhousie University is said to be amongst the major research institutions in Canada. Dalhousie attracts more than 500 grants annually which bring in at least \$20 million. This funding is made up as follows:
