For example, during the past two years 60 new industries have gone into operation in Nova Scotia! One of these new industries is the Canadian headquarters for the internationally known Bendix Home Appliances Inc., makers of Bendix Washers.

Two other new industries are branches of outstanding British producers—Fairey Aviation Company, Limited, which has opened a plant here for the servicing and production of their Fairey Firefly multi-purpose naval reconnaissance fighter plane; and A. C. Cossor Limited, locating here for the production of radar harbour control and television appliances.
