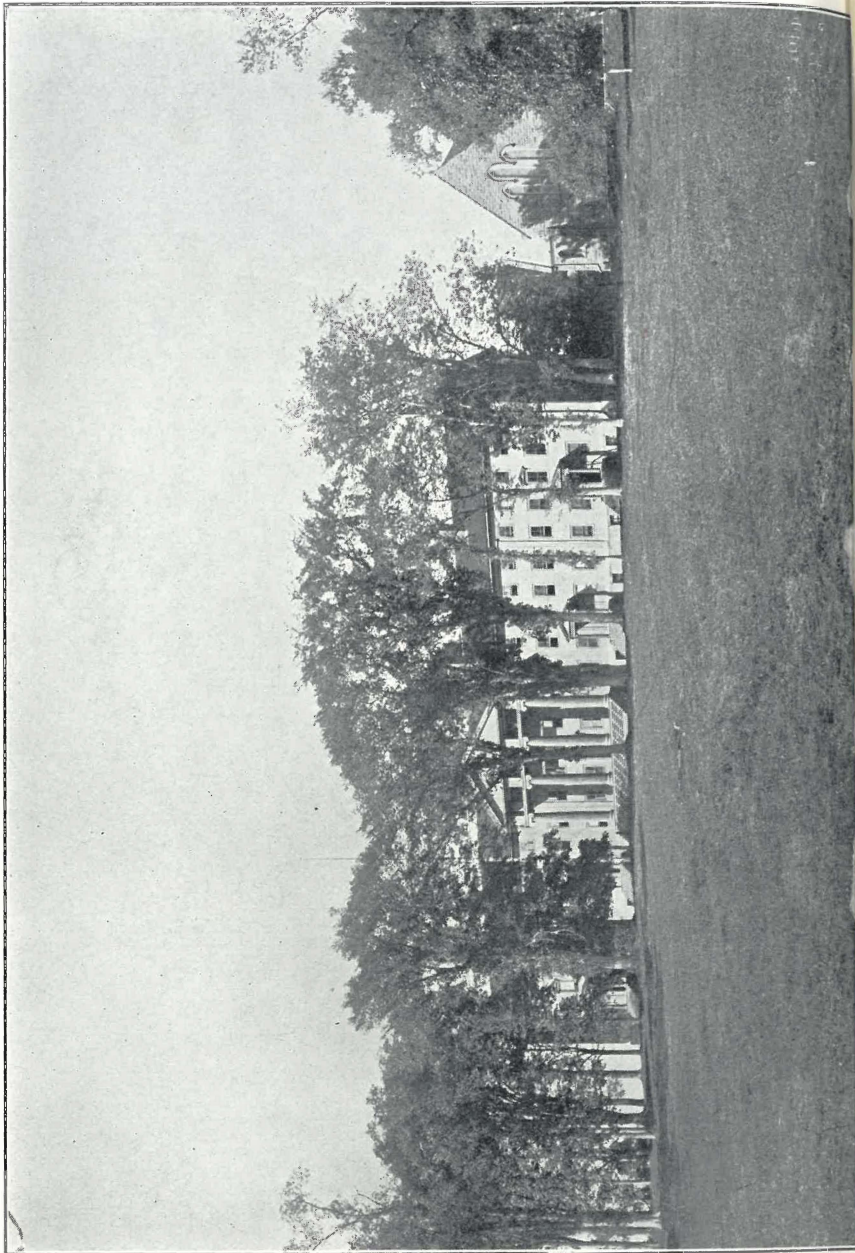

## Introduction.

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KING'S COLLEGE owes its origin to the Loyalists. It was founded by an Act of the Legislature in the Province of Nova Scotia in the year 1789, through the exertions of Dr. Charles Inglis, the first colonial Bishop, and was opened in 1790. The corner-stone of the main College building was laid the next year by Governor Parr.

The main College building, a substantial structure of wood and stone, has stood the storms of over a century and has housed, for a time, hundreds of the most eminent men of the Eastern Provinces. The new Science Wing faces north-east and overlooks the President's House. The Collegiate School, with its adjoining houses, occupies commodious grounds opposite the large campus, which affords the College ample room for both football and cricket. The Collegiate School, now in its 127th year, is fully equipped as a modern boarding school, and has added a department in Manual Training.

The first President of the College was the Rev. William Cochran, a graduate of Trinity College, Dublin, who was formerly Professor of Classics at King's (now Columbia) College, New York.

A Royal Charter, conferring upon the College full University powers, was granted by King George III in 1802, which makes this the oldest colonial University in the British Empire.

The Board of Governors originally consisted of the Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Province, the Lieut.-Governor, the Bishop, the Chief Justice, the Provincial Secretary and four other members of the Government. This Board was abolished and a new Board formed by an Act of 1853, of which the Bishop was the only *ex-officio* member, the others

being elected by the Alumni. In 1895 the constitution of the Board was again altered, and it now consists of thirty-seven members: the Bishops of Nova Scotia and Fredericton, *ex-officio*, two elected by each Synod, one by each rural deanery in the two dioceses, three from Prince Edward Island, and twelve by the Alumni, as before.

The residential system, which is an important feature of College life, is modelled on that of English Colleges, and brings together men of different temperament and training, broadening their ideas and smoothing down individual peculiarities as nothing else can do.

In the College Chapel, a beautiful stone building erected in 1877, the regular services of the Church, which all students are expected to attend, are held every morning and evening. While King's is essentially a Church College, it imposes no religious tests and gladly welcomes men and women of all denominations to its various classes. Students belonging to other religious bodies desiring to attend their own services on Sundays may do so with the permission of the President.

The College building is heated with hot water, and in addition to this students may have fires in their rooms. The old-fashioned roomy studies are shared by two (and in some cases three) men, but each has his own separate bedroom.

The new Science Wing, built in 1912, makes ample provision for lecture rooms and up-to-date, well stocked chemical and physical laboratories, and, in addition, provides accommodation for 20 men in residence, so that a man may have a single room to himself, or two men may share a common sitting room, while each has his own sleeping room.

The Haliburton Room in Middle Bay serves as a common room for the students, while No. 2 President's Bay, is set apart as the Reading Room.

King's College was the pioneer of scientific training in the Province, and has a well equipped chemical laboratory and a valuable collection of philosophical instruments.

A handsome stone building which stands on the slope of the hill to the south of the College contains the Library and Convocation Hall. The Library is a large and extremely valuable one. The foundation of the Library was largely the work of John Inglis, afterward third Bishop of Nova Scotia, who was sent to England by the Governors in 1799 to collect books and subscriptions for that purpose. Many rare editions and bibliographical treasures are to be found here, such as the Boydell Shakespeare, the Marquis of Buckingham's Homer, Sowerby's Botany, an *editio princeps* of Paradise Lost, the publications of the Record Commission, eighteen volumes from the celebrated Aldine press, and twenty Elzevirs, Bryan Walton's Polyglott, and many others. The most important benefactions of recent years have been those of the late Dr. T. B. Akins, Rev. Dr. McCawley, for many years President of the College, Rev. G. W. Hodgson, Rev. Rupert Cochrane and Rev. E. Ansell. There is unfortunately no Library fund and the keeping up of the Library depends almost entirely upon the fees of the students.

The aggregate outlay necessary for a student taking a College course varies of course accordingly to the tastes and economy of the student, but it may be approximately set down at about \$250 a year.

Matriculation examinations are held in June and also during the first week of the Academical year. Arrangements may be made for holding these examinations elsewhere than at the College.

Students are prepared for Matriculation at the Collegiate School of King's College; at "Edgehill," the Church School for Girls; at Rothesay Collegiate School for Boys; and at St. Peter's School, Charlottetown.

A School of Law in connection with King's College was established in St. John, N. B., in 1892. Students passing the final examination of this School receive the degree of B. C. L. from King's College, and are admitted attorneys in the Province of New Brunswick without further examination.

*Affiliation With Other Colleges and Universities.*

Students who have taken the prescribed Science course and passed the required examinations are admitted to the third year of the course of the PROVINCIAL TECHNICAL COLLEGE at Halifax, and such students, upon presentation of a *Testamur* of having passed the final examination of the Technical College may be admitted to the degree of B. Sc.

Graduates in Arts who have attended lectures during their College course in Constitutional History, Contracts, Torts and Crimes, and having passed the required examinations in those subjects, are admitted to second year standing in the LAW SCHOOL OF DALHOUSIE COLLEGE and can graduate in two years from their entry into the Law School. The Board of Governors has approved of a scheme whereby students from the JAMAICA CHURCH THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, after a residence of six terms at their own college and passing the required examinations in the subjects of the Divinity Course at King's College, may receive the diploma of L. S. T.; and further that divinity students who have completed the required residence at the Jamaica Church Theological College and have passed the necessary examinations according to the requirements of King's College, may be admitted to the degree of B. A.

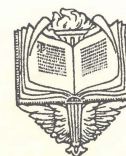
King's College is affiliated with the UNIVERSITIES OF OXFORD, CAMBRIDGE AND DUBLIN, under conditions which allow an undergraduate who has taken at least two years' work, to pursue his studies and take his degree at either of those Universities on a reduced period of residence. Under the terms of affiliation with Oxford, candidates for the *Rhodes Scholarship*, who have taken the Arts Course at King's College, including Greek, are exempt from the qualifying examination.

The Rhodes Scholarship will be open to students from King's College in 1916.

## SPECIAL ENDOWMENTS.

*The Sir Henry Mill Pellatt Chair in Philosophy.*—This chair was founded in February, 1914, by Colonel Sir Henry Mill Pellatt, D. C. L., Knight Bachelor and Commander of the Victorian Order, and is of the value of \$1,500 per annum. It shall be known as the Sir Henry Mill Pellatt Chair in Philosophy.

*The Plummer Fellowship in English.*—This Fellowship was founded in February, 1914, by J. H. Plummer, Esq., D. C. L., President of the Dominion Steel Corporation, and is of the value of \$500 per annum. It shall be known as the Plummer Fellowship in English, and may be held either by the Professor in English or by the lecturer in that subject at the discretion of the Board.

## Expenses.

The general charge to Resident Students for board, room, attendance, regular examinations, etc., is \$200 per annum, payable in two equal instalments of \$100 each.

Non-resident Students attending lectures are required to pay \$24 per annum for general dues, in instalments of \$12 each.

Provided the Bursar's Account is paid in full within one week after being issued, a discount of 10 per cent. will be allowed on the above fees, thus reducing each payment for Resident Students to \$90; and that of Non-Resident Students to \$10.80.

No student whose accounts are still unpaid after 30 days, unless he has the written permission of the President or the Secretary of the Board of Governors to defer the said payment for a limited time, can claim any reduction of fees or privileges of the University.

### \* TUITION FEES.

Tuition Fees are \$12 per year for each subject or a maximum of \$48 for all subjects in which lectures are taken.

Students are charged a library fee of \$5 per annum.

## Alexandra Hall.

Alexandra Hall for woman students was opened in September, 1914. It is conducted under the same regulations as the residence for men, the schedule of fees being the same. The following special rules apply to Alexandra Hall:

1. Resident students of Alexandra Hall are required to make good any damage done by them to College property or furnishings.
2. Permission must be obtained in order to be out of the building after 8 p. m. Leave to be out after 10 p. m. must be obtained from the President.
3. The students may receive men callers in the drawing room on Thursday evenings from 8 to 10, and on Sunday afternoons from 3 to 4.
4. All students are expected to attend the College Chapel.

### Students.

Persons who are less than 16 years of age are not admitted as students of the College, except under special circumstances. "Undergraduates" are those who have duly matriculated. "Conditioned Students" are those who are pursuing the same course without having passed the whole of their matriculation examination; if they successfully pass at the end of the first year the examination in the work of the year, they may count their terms from the time they actually came into residence, providing they take, as subjects for their first year, all subjects required in Matriculation.

A registration Fee of \$2.00 will be charged to all students who enter without passing the Matriculation Examination.

Women are admitted on the same terms as men.

Undergraduates who have taken a partial course at any other University recognized by the Board of Governors, may, upon presenting certificates of standing, be admitted *ad eundem statum* and complete their course at King's College, provided the certificates show at least as much work done as called for by equivalent examination at this University.

Students who have taken a partial course at King's College, or some other recognized college, may complete their course and obtain the degree of B. A., under the following conditions:

1. They must have had at least two years of college residence, and have taken successfully during that time some regular course of study.
2. They must reside a sufficient time to make up four years of residence.
3. They must satisfy the College Board that they have done work equivalent to that prescribed for the first two years in Arts.
4. They must pass the required examinations, at the times appointed, in the subjects selected for the third and fourth years in Arts.
5. Those availing themselves of the above privileges must take their examination at Windsor and will be charged a fee of \$15 for each examination taken.

### Matriculation.

The President of the College must receive from each candidate for Matriculation the regular fee before the day of Examination, and a certificate of good moral conduct extending over a period of not less than eighteen months immediately preceding. In the case of candidates from a boarding-school, a certificate from the Principal will suffice; but those candidates who have attended a day school must, in addition, produce a certificate from the minister of the church they have attended.

The Faculty of the College are authorized to accept certificates from the Head Masters of approved schools in lieu of Matriculation.

The Junior Leaving Examination (Grade XI) of the High Schools of Nova Scotia or an equivalent examination of another province is accepted *pro tanto* as equivalent to the Matriculation Examination. Candidates will be required to pass in such of the required subjects (if any) as are not covered thereby.

## SENIOR MATRICULATION.

(Admitting to Second Year.)

Subjects: I. Latin. II. Mathematics A. III. English. IV. Chemistry. V. French *or* Greek *or* German. VI. Mathematics B, *or* a language not taken in V.

The requirements in each of the above subjects will be the same as required in the first year of the Arts Course.

Any person holding the Grade "A" Nova Scotia Provincial Certificate, (or an equivalent from another province) covering the subjects required, is also admitted to the second year.

It is therefore possible for a student (who is sufficiently advanced at entrance) to obtain his B. A. Degree after three years' residence at the College.

The Junior leaving examination (Grade XI) of the High Schools of Nova Scotia (and equivalent examinations in other provinces) is accepted as equivalent to Matriculation Examination, in such subjects as are covered thereby and provided that the mark made in each subject be not less than 50 per cent.

For Matriculation in Science combined with first year's work see pages 42, 43, 44.



### Terms and Examinations.

The Academical year begins in September, and contains two terms. Michælmass Term extends from the first Wednesday after Sept. 21st, to December 22nd: Lent Term from the first Wednesday after 2nd day of January to the second Thursday in May.

Lectures are not given on the following days: Thanksgiving Day, Ash Wednesday, Thursday to Saturday in Holy Week, Easter Monday.

Students are required to pass the terminal examinations in regular order. No student who has failed to pass a terminal examination shall be allowed to present himself for examination in the subjects of any subsequent term until he shall have passed a supplementary examination in the subjects in which he has previously failed. The College Board will in their discretion require a student, who, from whatever cause, shall fail to keep up with the work of his year, to "degrade," i. e. to go into a lower year, in which case, such student shall lose the seniority of the year from which he degrades. Students shall rank according to the number of terms they have kept.

University and College examinations shall be arranged by the College Board subject to the approval of the Governors.

At least a week before the beginning of any Supplementary Examination students intending to write at such examination shall send the President in writing the name of each subject to be taken, accompanied by the customary fee.

The University examinations shall be conducted under the immediate supervision of the President, who shall convene

meetings of the examiners for the purpose of arranging and determining all matters relative to the examinations.

No examiner shall make known to any candidate his or her marks, in any subject, until after the official publication by the Secretary.

No candidate shall be allowed to leave the place of examination till half an hour after the distribution of the papers, nor shall any candidate be permitted to enter and write after this half-hour has elapsed.

No undergraduate shall be allowed to keep a term unless he has paid all his College dues and complied with all other regulations.

The standing of undergraduates is determined by the yearly examinations.

A College Examination of each year shall be held at the end of the Michælmass term, in all the subjects of Lectures of the Term, and all students shall be required to present themselves at the examination unless excused therefrom by the President on account of illness or for other reasonable cause.

Students who fail at the above examination may present themselves for re-examination in those subjects in which they have failed at a Supplementary Examination to be held in Holy Week.

The examinations at the end of Lent Term of the Third and Fourth years will cover the work of the whole year.

For particulars concerning affiliation with Oxford and with other Universities, see page 8.

### Discipline.

All students are required to report to the President on the first Monday of Michælmass Term, and on the first day of Lent Term.

The resident students are under the immediate charge of the President (or, in his absence, the Vice-President).

All students in residence are expected to attend the services in the College Chapel. Students who are not members of the Church of England may attend the Sunday Services of their own Church with the President's permission.

Attendance at all Lectures in the course entered upon except those which are announced as optional, is compulsory upon all students, and no student is allowed to absent himself from the examinations in any subject in which he has taken Lectures, except by special permission of the Professor.

Students who have absented themselves from any Lectures without permission of the individual Professor and without proper excuse, will be reported to the weekly meeting of the Board of Discipline.

More than two unexcused absences from Lectures in the same subject or forfeiture of Lectures from disorderly conduct, will disqualify a student from examination and from keeping his term. Periods of practical work in Science will count as Lectures.

Students residing in the College are not to be out of it after 10 p. m., without the permission of the President (or in his absence, the Vice-President) and permission to be out after midnight must be obtained from the College Board. The College authorities may enter the apartments of undergraduates at all hours of the day or night.

No visitor is allowed to remain in College after 10 p. m., unless by permission.

All noise is forbidden in College during Lecture hours.

The President is authorized to impose fines for infraction of regulations, insubordination or disorderly conduct; matters of a more serious nature are referred to the Board of Discipline, which meets once a week, or oftener if required.

The Board of Discipline may deprive any Student of his Term for negligence of due preparation for Lectures.

In case of sickness a medical certificate must be produced, if required by the Board.

The introduction of intoxicating liquors into the College or their use therein is absolutely prohibited.

Students are forbidden by the Statutes to resort to any inn, tavern or public house, except for special cause approved by the President.

Graduates below the degree of Master, residing in College or attending lectures at the College, shall be subject to the same discipline as undergraduate students, but may be granted special privileges at the discretion of the College Board.

No student may reside in College during vacation without the written permission of the President, and the President and Board of Discipline shall have the same authority and power over such students as are exercised by him or them according to the provisions of the preceding sections.

The Academical habits shall be the same as those which are worn in the University of Oxford.

In accordance with this regulation:—

(a) Bachelors wear a gown with open sleeves ending in a point below the knee.

(b) Scholars wear a similar gown, but with short rounded sleeves.

(c) Undergraduates other than Scholars wear a gown without sleeves.

At least one subject must be continued throughout the whole four year course.

The four subjects chosen for the third year must be continued in the fourth year, and, except in the cases of Divinity, Philosophy, Law and History, must be selected from the subjects taken in the two preceding years.

In the third and fourth years, students must attend at least twelve lectures on an average each week.

Students, who intend following the Mining Course at the Nova Scotia Technical College, may substitute Geology for Shopwork and Analytical Chemistry for Mechanics of Machines.

It has been thought advisable by the Board of Governors of King's College to extend to all Science Students the fullest

privileges in connection with their chosen work, for two reasons:—1st, because a University must be broad in sympathy, liberal in view, and helpful to all those desiring an education; 2nd, because the course of instruction provided by the Professors and Lecturers of the various Faculties should not only be cultural in tone, but also to a large extent utilitarian in effect.

The Provinces whose sons and daughters are attracted to King's College are rich in vast and abundant natural resources. These only wait the touch of the trained hand and the educated mind to yield their wealth for the material prosperity of the people as a whole.

The development of the material wealth of the Dominion of Canada is a reliable barometer indicating the remarkable growth of the study and investigation of Science in our Universities. Years ago it was felt that a great injustice would be done to our young men if we did not make ample provision for such research as would enable them to have a thorough training in Science, and as a result of this feeling King's College became the pioneer of Scientific training in Nova Scotia. Up to the present a preliminary course of two years has been thought sufficient, but, as competition becomes more keen on account of the large numbers from outside our own country attracted here by our natural wealth, it has been found necessary to raise the standard; this raising of the standard makes the extension of the course to three years imperative if the preliminary work is to be thoroughly mastered. We purpose adding to this three year course such special features in a fourth year as will enable the student to take his B. A. degree from this University. While no student in Science will be asked to select the suggested four year course, yet the Faculty strongly recommends it as an excellent basis for further scientific research. When a student has completed the three year course in Science at King's College he may proceed to the Provincial Technical College in Halifax, and fully complete his scientific course in two years. This will entitle him to his degree of B. Sc. in either Civil, Mechanical, Electrical or Mining Engineering from that institution or King's College.

Students may enter the School of Science at King's College by either Junior Matriculation, admitting to the first year or by Senior Matriculation to the second year.

Those who do not intend to proceed to an Arts degree, and have not matriculated in two languages, must add the course in German, as outlined for first and second year Arts.

Matriculated students who have completed the three years' course, as outlined below, to the satisfaction of the Faculty, will be granted certificates, which entitle them to enter the third year of the Provincial Technical College at Halifax.

It is possible for well-prepared students to compass the work required for admission to the third year of the Technical College in two years. Matriculation to such a course has been agreed upon by some of the affiliated institutions to be of the following standard:

Power for running the machines is derived from a Gasoline Engine which the students are instructed to manage and run themselves. Students make their own small hand tools and work through graduated series of exercises involving the use of all the machines and tools in the workshop.

Fitting: Exercises in chipping, filing and scraping. Screwing and tapping. Use of scribing block, gauges and squares in marking out work.

Machinery: Exercises in drilling, turning and screw cutting.

Smithing: The forge and its tools. Drawing, bending, upsetting, twisting, punching, cutting, welding and scarfing. Forging, hardening and tempering tools.

Tin-smith's work with practice in soldering and brazing.

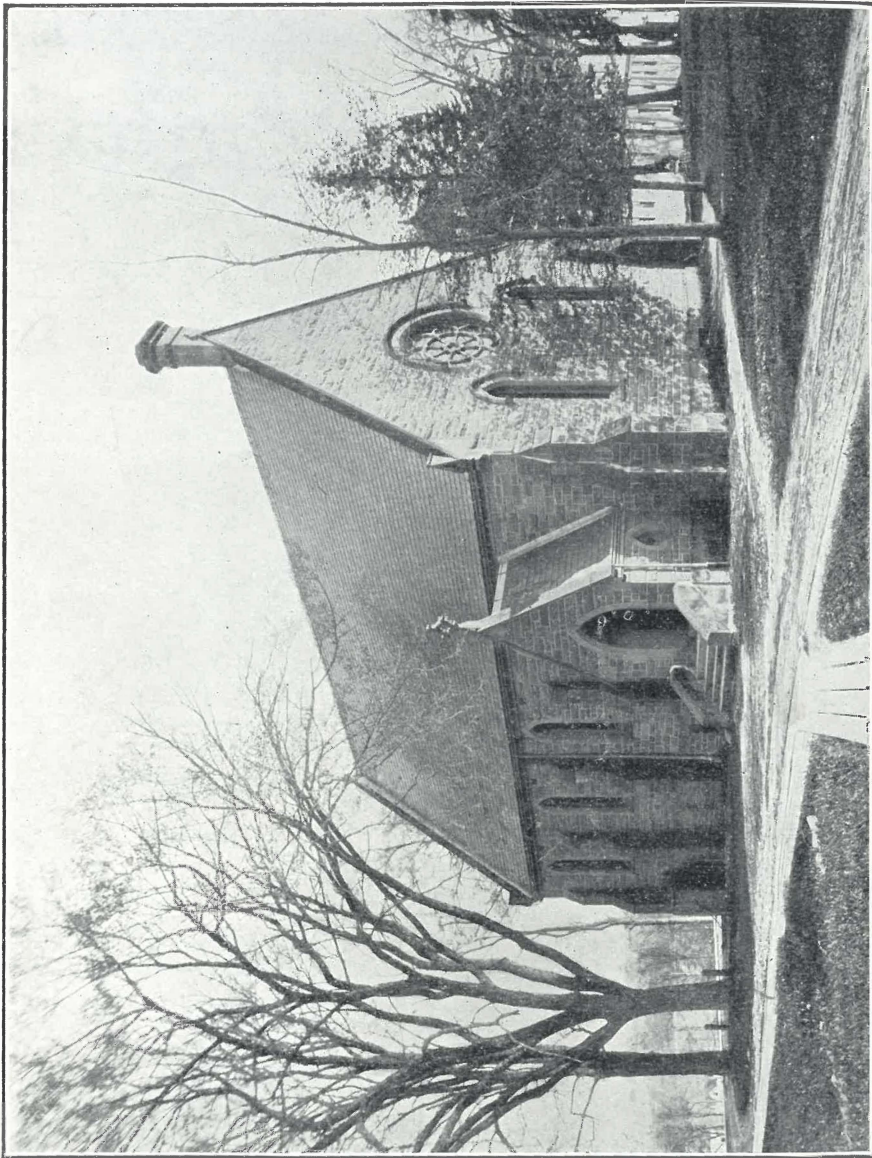

Such persons as have been accepted by the Bishop of Nova Scotia, or another Bishop, may become students in Divinity under any of the following conditions:

1. Undergraduates in Arts who have matriculated in Greek, may, after the end of their second year, take the first year of the Divinity Course concurrently with the third year's work in Arts (making Divinity one of the options for Degree) and the second year of the Divinity Course concurrently with the fourth year of the Arts Course, and complete the third and fourth years of the Divinity Course after graduation in Arts.

Students who take honours in Divinity may however complete their Divinity Course one year after graduation.

2. Graduates in Arts who have not taken Divinity as a Degree option, are required to take three years of Divinity work, combining the work of the first and second years of the Divinity Course in their first year of residence, and subsequently taking the work of the third and fourth years in order.

3. Candidates not required by the Bishop to take an Arts Course may, after passing a qualifying examination, take the four years of the Divinity Course, filling in the first and second years with Arts Lectures in English Literature.

4. Candidates who pass the first year Arts examinations

and complete the Divinity Course may receive the diploma L. S. T.

With consent of the Bishop concerned, and upon the recommendation of the Faculty of Divinity, the first two years of the Divinity Course may be taken in one.

Unless special instructions to the contrary have been received by the Faculty from the Bishop concerned, all Divinity students are required to attend the prescribed lectures of the Divinity course, and such others as may, from time to time, be arranged, and to pass satisfactory examinations in all subjects. A report of each student will be sent to the Bishop at the end of each term, concerning attendance at lectures, examinations, attendance at Chapel and general conduct.

The course of instruction qualifies candidates for the "Voluntary Preliminary" or First B. D. Examination of the Board of Examiners for Degrees in Divinity appointed under the Canon of the Provincial Synod.

## Scholarships and Prizes.

### The Cogswell Scholarship.

[£24 sterling per annum. Open to candidates for Holy Orders, under the direction of the Trustees.]

The Gospel of St. Mark in the Greek Testament; Bible History, that portion included within the reigns of the Kings of Israel. The Thirty-nine Articles generally, and particularly the first division, viz. Arts I—V.

“The successful candidate must have attained the full age of nineteen years, and bring satisfactory testimonials of his moral conduct and religious principles for the preceding last three years. He must be a communicant of the Church, and if not on the Matrícula, prepared to enter College; he must be distinguished for talent and literary attainments, and above all for piety, and fervent belief in the fundamental doctrines of the Gospel; and be sincere in his attachment to the doctrines and principles of the Church as expressed in her authorized Formularies; viz.: her Articles, Homilies and Liturgy.”

### The Stevenson Scholarship.

THREE, OF \$60 EACH.

THE REV. J. STEVENSON, M. A., (sometime Professor of Mathematics in King's College), left a sum of money for the purpose of founding three scholarships, tenable for two years, and open to matriculated students in their second year of residence.

#### REGULATIONS.

1. These scholarships shall be competed for in the month of September, and are open to all matriculated students in their second year of residence.
2. No student shall hold more than one of these scholar-

ships; and in the event of two being vacant at the same time, they shall be awarded to the first and second candidates on the list who shall have attained the proper number of marks.

3. Candidates must select from the following list subjects aggregating not less than 600 and not more than 700 marks:

Greek.....	100
Latin.....	100
English Literature.....	100
Divinity.....	100
Mathematics.....	200
Chemistry.....	200
French.....	100
German.....	100
Engineering Drawing.....	100

The marks of any paper shall not count in the total unless they are at least 50 per cent. of the maximum.

### The McCawley Classical Scholarship.

This scholarship is given out of the interest of a fund by subscription for a testimonial to the Rev. G. McCawley, D. D., on his retirement from the office of President.

1. The competition shall be confined to matriculated undergraduates who have completed their first year of residence.
2. The examination shall be conducted by the President, assisted by such other person as the Governors shall appoint for the time being, either within or without the University, as assessor.
3. The examination shall be confined principally to such classical works as the President shall have appointed at the beginning of Michaelmas Term preceding, and shall include the translation, grammatical construction and relation to the context of the passages selected, together with such critical papers in prose and verse as may be set at the examination.
4. The examination shall be subject, in respect of the number of marks required, to the general regulations of the University with reference to prizes and scholarships.

5. In the event of there being no competition, or on failure in the examination, the year's interest shall be expended in the purchase of classical books for the Library from a list selected by the President, having in view, in the first instance, the completion of a collection of the works of all the classical authors, and of the best editions of the respective works, whether English or foreign, and also of books illustrative of the same at the discretion of the President.

6. This scholarship shall be competed for in the Lent Term.

#### School Scholarships.

A scholarship of Fifty Dollars to be given to one pupil each from the Collegiate School, Windsor, Rothesay Collegiate School and the Kings County Academy, Kentville, on matriculation into and remaining in residence at King's College for one year—the amount in each case to be deducted from tuition fees.

#### The Daniel Hodgson Scholarship.

This scholarship, amounting to about \$175 per annum, is given alternately to the Universities of Laval and King's College, and is tenable for four years, provided all conditions are fulfilled by the holder. Its object is to assist students in entering Holy Orders.

Application shall be made and certificate of having passed matriculation shall be filed before July 15th. If there is more than one applicant, the scholarship shall go to the candidate passing the best examination. If for any reason the scholarship is not awarded or is forfeited it shall lapse to the other University.

Candidates for the scholarship must be under the age of 23 years. They must be natives of Prince Edward Island and residents therein for the space of one year at least before the time of their application for scholarship.

The holder of the scholarship at the end of each half

year shall file at the Registrar's office of the Court of Chancery certificates from the authorities of the College that he is taking a full Arts Course, that his moral conduct has been good and that his attention to his studies and his general conduct have been satisfactory. No portion of the scholarship will be paid without the presentation of said certificate.

#### The Almon-Welsford Testimonial.

WILLIAM J. ALMON, ESQ., M. D., endowed King's College with \$400, the interest of which is appropriated as a prize to be competed for by the matriculated students in their first year of residence. The prize shall be presented by the President, in the College Hall, at the beginning of the next Academical year, and the successful candidate shall in a Latin oration, commemorate the gallant and loyal deeds of Major Welsford.

#### The McCawley Hebrew Prize.

[£9 Sterling. Open to all members of the University who are below the standing of M. A., and who have not already gained the first premium in Hebrew.]

This prize is given out of the interest of a Trust Fund in the hands of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts. The fund and the conditions of the prize are thus stated in the Report of the Society:—

“This Fund arises from a gift of £150 sterling, in the British North American Bank, made by the Rev. George McCawley, D. D., Falmouth, Nova Scotia, the interest to be paid to the student of King's College, Windsor, N. S., who shall pass the best examination in Hebrew Bible and Greek Testament; the examination being under the direction of the Visitor and President.”

### The Akins' Historical Prize.

T. B. AKINS, ESQ., D. C. L., Barrister-at-Law, and Commissioner of Public Records, vested in the Governors, as Trustees, a sum of money sufficient to found a prize of thirty dollars annually for the best Paper or Essay on the County History of Nova Scotia, embracing matters derived from all local records and traditions relating to the early and progressive history of each county. The Essays must be given in to the Secretary of the Governors, on or before the first day of April.

The decision on the merits of the Essays to rest with the Governors, or such persons as they may appoint, and to be announced at the Encaenia.

Each Essay to be distinguished by a motto and to be accompanied by a *sealed* paper, bearing the same motto on the outside, and containing the name of the writer.

The Essays, when handed in, are the property of the College.

Subject 1915-16: "The contributions of various nationalities to the development of Nova Scotia."

### Bishop Binney Prize.

(\$20.00.)

This prize, which was founded by Mrs. Binney in memory of her husband, the late Bishop Binney, is given to the undergraduate who passes the best examination at the end of the second year.

### The Governor-General's Medal.

Given to the candidate who obtains the highest standing in the examinations for B. A. degree.

### The Judge McDonald Prizes for General Biblical Knowledge.

Two prizes for General Bible Knowledge are presented annually by his honor, Judge McDonald, D. C. L., of Brockville, Ontario; of the value of \$15 and \$10 respectively. These prizes are open to all years of the Divinity Class, but the same prize is not to be awarded to the same student twice,

nor in any case if the marks fall below 66 per cent. The paper will be set on General Bible Knowledge with optional questions on the particular Bible Study for each year, as part of the annual examinations in May.

### The Wallace Greek Testament Prize.

This prize, consisting of books selected by the Professor of Divinity, is open to all members of the University of not more than twelve terms' standing. The examination shall be held during the Lent Term each year, and the special subjects for examination shall be announced at least six months before the date fixed for the examination.

### The Cogswell Cricket Prize.

CHARLES COGSWELL, ESQ., M. D., made a donation of \$400 to the Governors of King's College, the interest of which is to be expended in the purchase of a set of Cricket Bats, etc., to be given to the best player among the winners of a cricket match to be played annually on the College grounds. "The object of the donation is to promote the health of the students and encourage them in the prosecution of their studies."

### Divinity Grants.

Grants to aid students in Divinity who actually require assistance are made by the Bishop of Nova Scotia at his discretion. The holders of these must fulfil such conditions as the Bishop lays down, and in every case a personal interview must be had.

The Recipients of these grants must sign a bond to serve in the Diocese of Nova Scotia from the time of the closing of their course at King's for a number of years equal to that for which they have received grants.

Any misconduct or failure to keep terms or unfavorable report from the President will cause the grant to be withdrawn without notice.

These students must hold themselves ready to serve as

Lay Readers during Vacation at such places as the Bishop may direct.

### The Binney Exhibition.

\$50 PER ANNUM.

In the year 1858, Miss Binney, sister of the late Visitor, and daughter of the late Rev. Hibbert Binney, in the name and on behalf of her father's executor, handed over to the Governors certain stock amounting to \$1,000, to found an exhibition at King's College, to be called "The Binney Exhibition," in memory of her said father.

The design of this Scholarship is to assist students who may require assistance, and who shall have commended themselves by their exemplary conduct, although their abilities and acquirements may not qualify them to be successful competitors for an open Scholarship.

TERMS.—On or before the 15th day of April in each year, the College Board shall nominate two students, in their second term at the least, whom they may deem best qualified, having regard to their straitened means and the excellence of their character; and the President shall forthwith transmit their names, together with a brief statement of their claims, to the Visitor, who shall select one of them to be the exhibitor, and to receive the interest accruing for the following year, commencing July 1st. Or, at his discretion, if he considers the claims of the two nominees to be equal, or nearly so, the Visitor may adjudge that the amount be divided between them.

### S. P. C. K. Studentships.

The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge offers fifty Studentships of about \$145 each, tenable for three years, to students, who, after taking a Divinity Course at King's College or some other approved College, promise to devote five years to pastoral work in the North-West.

### Matriculation Scholarship.

A scholarship of \$50 has been offered by the Board of Governors of King's College to the highest matriculant from the Collegiate School, Windsor, Rothesay Collegiate School, St. Peter's Cathedral School, Charlottetown, and The Church School for Girls, entering King's College and remaining in residence one year. This scholarship is to be competed for at the June matriculation and the amount will be deducted from the tuition fees of the winner.

### Oratorical Competition.

Messrs. F. E. Harriott and W. Ker Dimock have kindly offered a gold and silver medal for an oratorical competition to be held in Convocation Hall on the first Thursday in November.

This competition is open to all students who have debated at least twice in some King's College Student Society.

## Societies Connected with the College.

### *The Alumni of King's College.*

Under the regime of the old political Board of Governors no share in the management of the College was given to graduates and others who were deeply interested in its welfare. With a view to altering this state of affairs legislation was sought and obtained by certain members of the University for the incorporation of a body to be known as "The Alumni of King's College, Windsor." The Act was passed in 1847, and the society soon made its influence felt. Its expressed object was "The promotion of Education in the said College, and the Collegiate School at Windsor, connected therewith." The first President of the society was the Rev. John T. Twining, D. D. The Hon. H. H. Cogswell was Vice President, and S. L. Shannon, Esq., Secretary and Treasurer. Six years later the original Act of 1789 was repealed and a new Board of Governors constituted, consisting of certain life members, (of whom the last survivor was the late Mr. Justice L. M. Wilkins) and eight members elected by the Alumni.

It was through the Alumni that the Chair of Natural Science was endowed, and a liberal amount was also granted annually towards the salary of the Professor of Modern Languages. Another important work of the society was the building of the Library and Convocation Hall.

While those whose names appear in the Act were all members, and most of them graduates of the University, the terms of membership were very liberal, and "all persons paying an annual subscription of Twenty Shillings or upwards, or making at one time a donation of Twenty Pounds, or upwards" were eligible for election. The amount of the annual subscription was fixed by by-law in 1882 at two dollars.

The annual meeting of the Society is held the day before Encænia.

*The Alexandra Society of King's College*, which has branches all over the Maritime Provinces, was formed in Halifax in 1902 as the Women's Auxiliary to the Alumni, its object to aid the Alumni in raising funds for the College.

In the following June the society was organized in Windsor, the Halifax society joining it, and a promise was given to place the sum of \$1,000 a year at the disposal of the Governors towards the payment of the salary of a new professorship in Divinity. Rev. S. W. Jones, being at the time agent of the Alumni, was asked by the W. A. to form branches of their society in the various parishes he visited. In most instances he only held meetings for women and took a collection, in others he asked for a five year pledge.

In 1910 the name was changed from *Women's Auxiliary to Alexandra Society of King's College*. It has already succeeded in founding the Alexandra professorship, has helped in furnishing the College rooms and in other ways. Its work in diffusing a broader interest in the College is becoming more and more important.

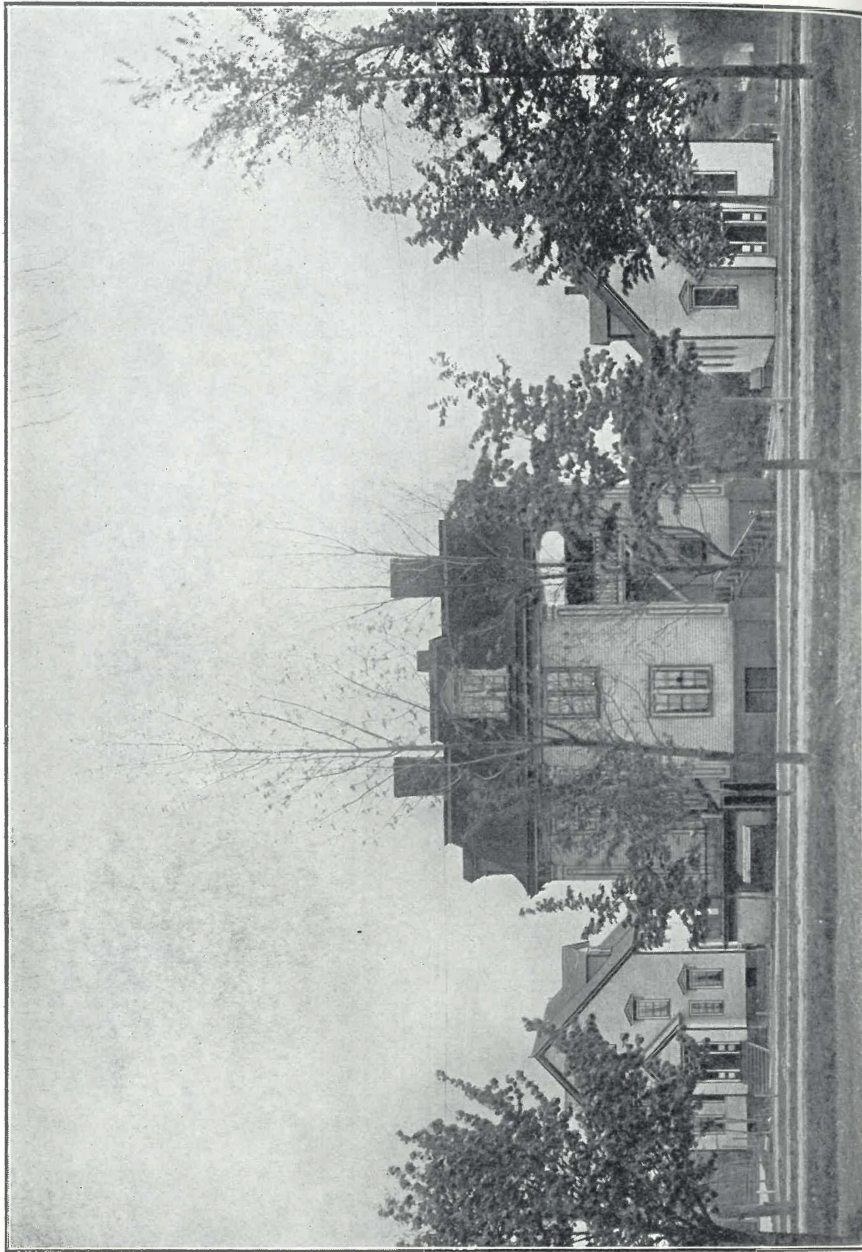

## Collegiate School.

(Established 1788.)

The School for some years shared the College building. Subsequently it occupied premises out at Tonge's Hill. Afterwards a stone building, the cost of which was defrayed by money from the Castine Fund, was erected within the College grounds. This was destroyed by fire in 1873. The present buildings are situated on the beautiful College campus. They are all, including the Gymnasium, provided with electric light and hot water heating.

The School provides a good general education, and pupils are prepared for matriculation at King's and other Universities, for the entrance examination Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont., for Army and Navy, and for commercial pursuits.

Pupils who are members of the Church of England attend the Sunday Services in the College Chapel. Careful attention is given to moral training and religious instruction. Brief reports of Boys' progress and conduct are sent home at mid-term and detailed reports at the end of each term. Pupils are required to pay strict observance to the rules and regulations of the School.

Reductions in the General Fee for Board and Tuition are made for brothers, sons of clergymen, and boys under twelve years of age.

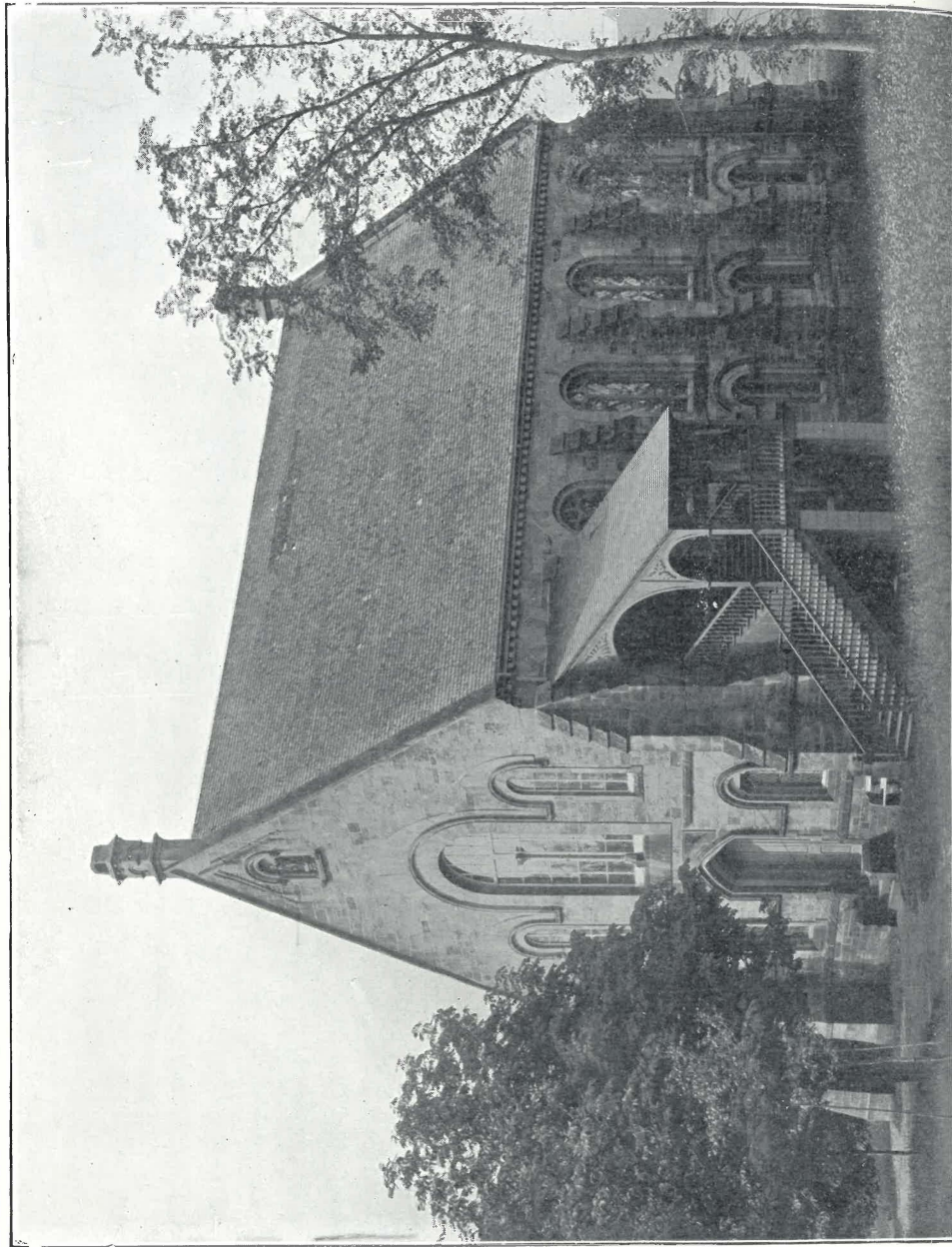

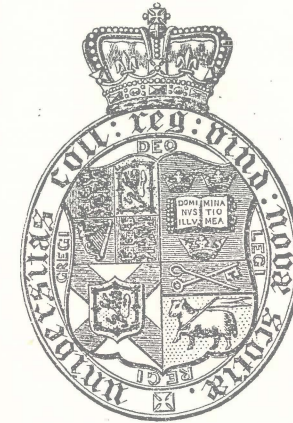

LEGISLATION OF THE PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK  
AFFECTING KING'S COLLEGE LAW SCHOOL.

I. EDWARD VII., CAP. XVII.

*An Act Relating to the Admission of Attorneys.*

Sec.

Preamble.

- 1 Hon. Attorney General and President of the Barristers' Society and another member of said Society to be *ex-officio* members of the Board of Examiners of King's College Law School.

- 2 Graduate of said School to be admitted an Attorney without further examination.  
3 Sec. 3 of Chap. 33, Con. Stat. amended.

*Passed 3rd April, 1901.*

*Whereas* the University of King's College, Windsor, in the Province of Nova Scotia, has established a School of Law in the City of St. John, in this Province, and has appointed a Dean and Law Faculty and Board of Examiners in connection therewith;

*And Whereas* a Student at Law in this Province, who is a Student in such School, must undergo and pass the Examination prescribed by said Faculty and Board of Examiners before being qualified for the Degree of Bachelor of Civil Law of said University;

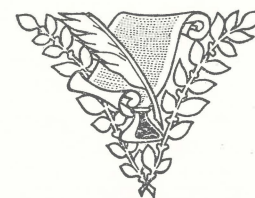
*Be it therefore enacted* by the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Assembly, as follows:—

1. The Honorable the Attorney General and President of the Barristers' Society of this Province for the time being, and such other member of the Council of the Barristers' Society as may be designated by said Council shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board of Examiners of said School of Law.

2. From and after the passing of this Act any Student at Law, making application for admission as an Attorney of the Supreme Court of this Province, on presentation of a Diploma from the said University of King's College, conferring on him the

Degree of Bachelor of Civil Law, and a certificate signed by the Dean of the said School of Law and countersigned by the Attorney General or the President of the said Barristers' Society, of his having there satisfactorily passed the examination prescribed by said Faculty and Board of Examiners, and recommending him for admission as an Attorney of said Supreme Court, and on said Student conforming with the requisites of the by-laws of the Barristers' Society in all other respects, shall be entitled to be admitted as such Attorney without undergoing or passing any other examination.

3. Section 3 of Chapter 33, of Consolidated Statutes is hereby amended by inserting after the word "Laws" in line three, the words "or Bachelor of Civil Law."



## DEGREES IN LAW.

### BACHELOR OF CIVIL LAW.

#### I. MATRICULATION.

(1) The candidate for this degree must be a matriculated student in Arts of King's College, except in cases hereinafter provided for. (Particulars of the University Matriculation Examination will be found in the General Calendar; this examination is held at the College at Windsor, and the following centres: St. John, N. B., Charlottetown, P. E. I., St. John's, Newfoundland, and Bermuda.) If he be an Attorney-at-Law or a Student-at-Law who has been matriculated by any Law Society, or duly entered according to the law and practice of the Courts of any one of the Provinces of Canada he shall be admitted to matriculation in the University without further examination. These shall be termed undergraduates.

(2) The candidate will be required to pass three examinations, separated by intervals of not less than a year, to be called the first, second and final examinations in law.

(3) A Barrister of three years standing, who is a graduate in law of any recognized University, may be admitted to the degree of B. C. L., on passing the examination in Roman Law provided for the second year.

(4) A Barrister of not less than seven years standing, who shall have been a lecturer in the Faculty of Law for three years, may be admitted to the standing of an undergraduate of the third year.

(5) A graduate in law of any recognized University may be admitted as an undergraduate of the third year, and shall be entitled to the degree of B. C. L., on passing the examination for the third year, including an examination in Roman Law.

(6) General students (being those who are not undergraduates) may be admitted to attend the Lectures on producing certificates of good moral character. Partial courses may also be taken.

#### II. REGISTERING.

All undergraduates must sign the matriculation register, and general and partial students the register provided for the purpose.

#### III. TRANSFER OF STUDENTS.

Undergraduates of other Law Schools may be admitted to an *ad eundem* standing in this School if, on examination, they shall be found qualified. Any person duly matriculated may, at the end of the first year, (though he has not attended the lectures of the School) matriculate as a student of the second year on passing the same examination as is provided for students at the close of the first year, and the same provisions shall apply to the third year.

#### IV. FEES.

(1) The following fees and dues are payable *in advance* to the Treasurer.

(2) Special terms can be obtained where two or three subjects only are taken.

#### V. TERMS.

The academical year begins in November, and consists of two terms,—Michaelmas Term, which extends from the second Tuesday in November to the twenty-second day of December; and Hilary Term which extends from the second Saturday in

January to the Saturday next before the second Tuesday in April.

## VII. EXAMINATION AND GRADUATION.

(1) All undergraduates shall be required to undergo examinations at the end of Hilary Term in all the subjects of their respective years.

(2) Every undergraduate, previous to presenting himself for an examination, must obtain from each Professor or Lecturer whose lectures he has attended during the term, a certificate of attendance, which shall not be granted without the consent of the Faculty if there be more than three absences during the course of a term.

(3) An undergraduate who has attended the lectures and passed the examinations of the first two years may be admitted to the degree of B. C. L., on passing the final examination and paying the fees for the third year without attending the lectures of third year.

(4) In order that a candidate may pass in any of the three examinations, he must obtain sixty per cent. of the marks assigned to each paper.

(5) If an undergraduate fails to pass in more than two subjects at an examination he shall lose his year, but if he fails to pass in two or less, he shall be allowed a supplementary examination in such subject, or subjects, at the beginning of any subsequent year, and not sooner.

(6) The certificate referred to in the Act of the Legislature of the Province of New Brunswick, I Edward VII., chap. xvii, sec. 2, is issued by the Dean on the recommendation of the Faculty and is only granted to those graduates who attend lectures during the full three years.

## VIII. ACADEMICAL HABIT.

Bachelors of Civil Law are entitled to wear gowns and hoods. The gowns are of black silk and the hoods of blue silk, trimmed with white fur.

## DOCTOR OF CIVIL LAW.

### Regulations Respecting the Degree of D. C. L.

A. The candidate for this degree must be a Bachelor of Civil Law of five years standing, complete.

B. He must compose and submit to the President of the University, one month before the date of the Encaenia at which degrees are to be conferred, a thesis on some legal subject to be appointed by the Faculty.

C. He must forward to the President of the University with the thesis a declaration that he has carefully read the following course of study and reading, namely:—

2. Bentham. Principles of Morals and Legislation. 1 vol.
3. Dicey. The Law of the Constitution. 1 vol.
4. Domat. Civil Law. 2 vols.
5. Gaius. Elements of Roman Law, by Poste. 1 vol.
6. Hall. International Law. 1 vol.
7. Holland. Elements of Jurisprudence. 1 vol.
8. Holmes. The Common Law.
9. Lorimer. Institutes of Law. 1 vol.
10. Markby. Elements of Law with reference to General Jurisprudence. 1 vol.
11. Savigny. Private International Law. 1 vol.
12. Todd. Parliamentary Government in the Colonies. (2nd ed.) 1 vol.

*Note.*—The candidate may substitute Boutmy's English Constitution for No. 3, Amos' Science of Law for No. 7, and Story's Conflict of Laws for No. 11.

*D.* The candidate must be recommended by the Faculty as a suitable person to receive the degree.
