


### MARGARET ANN CURRIE Ellershouse, N. S.


### CAROL LIPKUS Glace Bay, N. S.


### JOAN SHIRLEY NICKERSON Moncton, N. B.


### WINIFRED ANNE HYNDMAN Charlottetown, P. E. I.

### RONALD B. COLEMAN Kentville, N. S.




### FINTON AYLWARD St. Lawrence, Nfld.





#### DONALD E. WILLIAMS Lancaster, N. B.



The success of student government at Dalhousie depends to a large extent upon the interest and industry of the student body as a whole, for the main function of the Council of Students is to provide the framework and necessary financial assistance to organizations under its jurisdiction. There is a relatively small sphere within which the council acts in direct contact with students. The majority of student benefits are derived through member organizations. To the executive and members of these organizations I extend my heartiest congratulations for a job well done. The contribution of your co-operation and hard work to the success of student government this year is immeasurable.

Perhaps the major accomplishment this year was the improvements made to the dining-room in the men's residence. These improvements have ended many years of dissatisfaction with conditions there and have worked to the advantage of all parties concerned. University officials have been most co-operative in this respect.

In the field of external affairs, interest in the National Federation of University Students has reached an unprecedented level. There is a large and active committee on the campus this year, and student opinion permitting, indications are that N.F.C.U.S. will play a major role in conducting student interests on a national level. The survival of N.F.C.U.S. depends upon active student committees in all universities throughout Canada and implementation of National Policies. N.F. C.U.S. has proved somewhat inadequate in these departments in the past but the future is indeed promising.

The council this year has devoted much attention to the ever increasing interest in interfaculty sports. Financial support given to this very important aspect of student activity is almost triple the amounts given in previous years. This increased support was given mainly because it was felt that through this medium the old Dalhousie spirit of which we so often hear would be revived, and because the emphasis is upon student participation. It seems too many are satisfied with merely being good spectators. It is gratifying to see so many taking advantage of the opportunities offered by interfaculty competition this year.

The financial position of the council has been quite satisfactory in carrying on the activities of previous years. It does not permit, however, the undertaking of new activities or substantial improvements to existing activities. With a close budget, the criterion must be the financial assistance received in previous years. So long as this is the major factor in receiving appropriations from the council and the merits of the case are of little weight, overall improvements in students activities are impossible.

In closing I would like to express my sincere thanks to everyone who has helped me discharge my duties as council president, especially the vice-president and secretary-treasurer of the council.





Several conferences were arranged for this year to give any interested students a chance to meet together, as responsible members of the Christian community, with S. C. M. members from other Maritime Universities.





#### ARTS AND SCIENCE SOCIETY







### GLEE CLUB


