## Move into new library expected soon

## Expansion work on Cox Institute is under way

Work began in December on the 6.3 million expansion to Cox Institute. When this is completed next winter, about two-thirds of the present floor area will be added

Expanded teaching space in the form of specialized labs and classrooms will be available for the Chemistry, Biology, and Math and Physics Departments. This will enable some reallocation of space in the present structure to better serve the needs

of the Plant Science and Economics and Business Departments.

The architect firm in charge of designing was Dumaresq & Byrne Limited in Halifax and the general contractor is Boyd and Garland Limited. The work is off to a good start with the weather co-operating well for the early excavating and related work. A more complete report on this building project will be given in future issues of Alumni News

# Fund established for Douglas Award

The N.S.A.C. Alumni Association is pleased to advise that a special fund has been established in memory of the late C.A. "Charlie" Douglas.

Charlie Douglas had a long and devoted career in Nova Scotia. He grew up in Scotsburn, Pictou County and worked much of his life for the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing. He was an Agricultural Representative, a Director of Extension, a Director of Livestock, and at the time of his retirement in 1975, Deputy Minister of Agriculture for Nova Scotia. He loved people and was dedicated to the advancement of agriculture, not only in his native Nova Scotia, but indeed across Canada. He was truly a great extension man; one who has left his mark

on many.




The new College library is nearing completion and it is hoped that within the next few weeks the library staff will be able to relocate from Cox Institute to the new building.

The initially planned move had to be


delayed due to a faulty sprinkler head, which caused a postponement in the final finishing work. This has now been rectified and the following pictures give some idea of the progress to date.

#### Book stacking and shelving area

The new Library is a three story building. The basement or the first floor and the second floor will be used for Library Services. The Library will have about 26,000 sq. ft. for its use. The third or the top floor will house the Extension Services Branch and the Agriculture Development and Credit Services.

Facilities in the new Library:

- 1. The books and periodicals (journals and magazines) holdings will be strengthened rapidly with extra budgetary grants.
- 2. A new audio-visual department will be created and AV material acquired. There will be facilities to read or use a wide range of AV products.
- 3. Some of the Library's holdings will be on Microfilm or Microfiche. There will be readers available for both film or fiche. It is planned that one or two Microfilm/Microfiche reader/printers be acquired.
- 4. An on-line information retrieval service, so important for any institution involved in education and research, will be installed.

- 5. Cataloging of books will be automated and computerized.
- The new building will be equipped with anti-theft devices to protect the Library's holdings.
- 7. A substantial effort will be made to obtain materials that our Library does not have from other Libraries, through interlibrary loan channels.

The students and others using the facility will be working in a space which includes seating for 240 persons, a number of individual study carrels, some study rooms, as well as large seminar rooms.

Another important and very interesting feature would be a special collection of historical and archival materials for the Atlantic provinces, Canadian agriculture and agriculture in general.

The new Library is designed to be a Resource Center for Agricultural Education, Research, and Extension personnel for the entire Atlantic Region. Anybody interested in agriculture, directly or indirectly, will be able to make use of the facilities of this institution.

As the saying goes "I have good news and some bad news". First, the good

There has been a steady increase in the number of graduates who have paid up their life membership in the Association. To date some 221 Alumni have joined this group and their fifty dollar membership will remain on deposit drawing interest each year to support the operation of the Alumni Association.

There was quite a good response to our Scholarship Up-Date Campaign. We received to date 232 donations for a total of almost \$9,000.00. It looks now as though this total will reach the \$10,000.00 objective. We will accept donations to the Scholarship Fund at any time and all

donations are tax deductable.

The C.A. Douglas Memorial Fund at present has \$4,400.00 subscribed. You will see in another article in this issue, how the interest from this Fund is to be allocated. This meets the wishes of Mrs. Douglas and the family that the income from the Fund be used for an Agricultural Extension project.

Now, the bad news. Increased costs, especially of postage, have left the operating account very flat. If we hope to continue to distribute two issues of Alumni News each year, we will have to have more

Your Executive has taken the first step to try to rectify the situation. There will be a motion presented at the Annual Meeting in July to raise the fees from \$5.00 per year to \$10.00 per year. This is a step in the right direction. What else could be done to improve the situation?



If the 3,000 Alumni who presently receive Alumni News each paid their membership in the Association, there would be no problem, but at present about 300-400 paying members subsidize the other 3000. With the postage rates in force at present - and they will be going higher this is no longer possible.

The other alternative is to only have paid-up Alumni as members of the Alumni Association. This is a common situation in other Universities and Colleges. To date this has not been necessary in the case of the N.S.A.C. Alumni Association, but the time may be coming when this will be necessary.

This situation can be rectified if those who receive the News use the box on the last page and pay the Annual Membership or send in a Life Membership. The Association can't continue to function as it has in the past, unless it receives a much higher percentage of paid-up members.

# NSAC will be site of AIC national conference

The Agricultural Institute of Canada, an organization representing professional agrologists across Canada, will be holding its 1983 conference in Truro at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College July 10-14. This event, hosted by the Nova Scotia Institute of Agrologists, will have as its theme "Food - At What Cost?".

It is a timely topic as energy costs escalate, as inflation drives input costs upward, and as environmental constraints continue to put pressure on the use of available resources. Also increasing is the concern over the availability and the cost of food. The plenary session will focus on the production cost of food, and the research, technology transfer, marketing and the distribution that affects its costs. Just as important, the speakers will also focus on the social and environmental costs of the food production system.

The conference offers a wide range of activities for the Institute members, interested individuals and their families. Nine scientific societies, which are part of the Agricultural Institute of Canada, will offer papers on the latest research. There will be tours to take a look at Noya Scotia agriculture, annual business meetings will be held, and there will be numerous social

events including a pork barbecue, Maritime breakfast, formal banquet, dancing and live theatre, all helping to round out a complete program.

Special events are also being planned for the ladies accompanying their spouses and the youth attending the conference. The ladies' program includes numerous tours, a fashion show and a craft fair. For the youth, activities include a dance, keep-fit programs, tours and movies.

With its long tradition as a centre for agricultural learning in Atlantic Canada, and its surrounding area rich in agriculture, it is appropriate that the major agricultural conference in Canada be held at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College.

# Record size first year degree class registered

On September 7, 1982 at N.S.A.C., 143 students were registered for year one of the B. Sc. (Agr.) program. This was the largest first year degree class to be registered at this institution. Along with returning students, this totaled over 500, a record for size of student body at N.S.A.C.

The new students at N.S.A.C. who registered for Technical courses were about the same in number as last year at 122. The Atlantic Provinces were the origin of all new students this year. When the degree and technical classes were grouped, the proportion from Nova Scotia was a little more than half, with those from New Brunswick contributing between one third and one quarter the total student body. The rest (except for five from Newfoundland) came from Prince Edward Island. This distribution of origin has changed little in recent years.

Though the average academic status of the new students who entered the degree courses this year was higher than last year, the number of "Christmas Graduates" was disappointingly high.

N.S.A.C. is one of the few institutions in the Atlantic Provinces that require those students to withdraw who fall below the established academic level in their first

On September 7, 1982 at N.S.A.C., 143 semester. We hope that some of these will udents were registered for year one of apply again for next September.

One of the characteristics of this year's first year classes is the apparent high number of students with 4-H background. Among these are all four of the Nova Scotia Provincial 4-H 60th Anniversary Scholarship winners.

A new exercise for staff at N.S.A.C. in February, will be the preregistering of the second year degree students for the third year of their program at N.S.A.C. How many will stay at N.S.A.C. for the first of the third year program is anybody's guess. only one thing is sure, some will stay and some will follow the old pattern and go to the University of Guelph or Macdonald Campus of McGill University. N.S.A.C. is committed to offering the four options; Plant Science, Animal Science, Agricultural Economics, and Plant Protection to students when they preregister in late February. Only after that preregistration activity will we have some idea of how many will be headed for N.S.A.C.'s first convocation in May of 1985.

Roy MacDonald, Professor of Poultry Science at the College died in November '82. Roy filled this position with distinction from about 1948 until he retired in 1970. During this period, vast changes took place in the Poultry industry, flock sizes increased, mechanization was widely introduced and breeds changed from pure breds to the present day hybrids. All of these changes were promoted by Roy as Professor of Poultry Science and as the Provincial Poultryman.

In 1970 Roy retired due to a deteriorating physical condition, but he always remained interested in the College and the Alumni Association.

C.A. Douglas

Charlie Douglas died November 28th and the College lost a strong supporter and great friend. Other accounts have dealt with his many positions and interests. It is enough here to say that Charlie knew and loved the farm people of

the Maritimes as few others have done. He had the ability to persuade people that they had abilities they didn't dream that they possessed and he showed them how to use these abilities. His final great effort for the Alumni and the College was spear-heading the Campus Enrichment Fund drive for the Alumni Theatre construction. The Douglas Room and the Alumni Theatre are his Memorial. We shall miss him.

# College archives and historic collections

Following a suggestion of the Alumni Committee, the College archives and collection of historic agricultural artifacts, which are to be kept in two special rooms in the new library, are to be called **The Agricola Collections.** 

The choice of name is an appropriate one. It pays tribute to John Young (1773-1837), who published under the pen name, "Agricola", a series of essays in the Halifax weekly **Recorder** discussing agricultural problems in the Maritimes. He encouraged farmers to improve their methods and formed groups to discuss and solve their difficulties. The letters were published as a book in Halifax in 1822. The Library has a copy of this volume. In retrospect, Young's work can be seen as one of the main factors which led to the founding of N.S.A.C.

Dr. Melville Cumming, the College's first principal, published several articles about Young. In the College archives are the original typescripts, now over sixty years old, of these and many other of Dr. Cumming's essays and speeches.

Since the last issue of the Alumni News, the Agricola Collections have received a number of interesting and important donations. There is not space enough to mention them all, but two in particular deserve notice. Professor Emeritus Roland has donated the three volume set of History of Nova Scotia (Halifax, 1865). This is a rare title, and Dr. Roland's copy is particularly notable for being in mint condition, uncut and unbound, exactly as published. Professor MacLeod, in addition to several other notable books, has donated the four volume, first American edition of John Stuart Mill's Dissertations and Discussions (Boston, 1868). Included in the set are Mill's famous essays on Coleridge, Bentham, Utilitarianism, and the Enfranchisement of Women.

With the generous assistance of another

grant from the College Alumni, several implements have recently been added to the Collections. We now have a barrel maker's vice, for example, which nearly completes the College's collection of a working set of cooper's tools. We have also found a fine one-piece wooden barley fork, a standing flax break, a stump saw, more examples of variously shaped draw-knives, several bean and grain flails (with fairly uncommon wooden swivel caps), and a wooden grain shovel from New Brunswick.

Some of this material, and other things not mentioned, will be part of the College exhibition booth in this year's Agricultural Machinery Show at Fredericton in March. All of it, including books, maps, pictures, and documents, will be on display in the Agricola Collections area of the new Library during the Alumni weekend this
