## Agreement signed in Europe

An Academic and Friendship Agreement has now been signed between NSAC and the Agricultural University in Nitra, Czech and Slovak Federal Republic. Dr. Les Haley, NSAC Principal, was there for the signing ceremony on May 21, and for planning discussions.

The agreement commits both partners to promote cooperation between the two agricultural institutions in agricultural research and education. Faculty members are encouraged to develop projects which include personnel visits, opportunities for students, research and technology adaptation, and the exchange of scientific and genetic materials.

Dr. Haley had opportunities to examine some of the changing agricultural practices in the Slovak region of the country. He noted the increasing role of management training for all parts of the industry, and a strong desire to develop broader international links.

Dr. Nabil Rifai from the NSAC Department of Agricultural Engineering and a former graduate of the Agricultural University in Nitra, was

present during Dr. Haley's visit. He had planning meetings with the Dean of Agricultural Mechanization, with the view of beginning joint research

## **MacRae Library Open House Exhibition**

The title of this year's Open House exhibition in MacRae Library is "On the Level: Some Common Methods of Calibration." Its theme is the way humankind has measured, weighed, made angles, squares, curves, corners and so on at various times in history, but particularly here, in the Maritimes, during the last two hundred years.

Old measuring devices drawn from the Agricola Archives and from private collections will be on display. They include "travellers," which were used to measure the circumference of wagon wheels; giant dividers, which were used in shipbuilding; and various types

of scales (including a beam-scale grain-measure made of brass, which was used in the Annapolis Valley during the nineteenth century). There will also be some recently vanished but still familiar "measures" like milk bottles and a wooden egg-shipping

Modern measuring instruments, including electronic ones, will also be on view and in use. The N.S.A.C. Agricultural Engineering Department is involved in this exhibition and hopes to set up working exhibits which will enable visitors to draw their own lines and arrive at their just equilibrium.

## Alumni Weekend Babysitting Service, July 27, 1991

As a result of requests in previous years the Alumni Association has arranged for babysitting service on Saturday night, July 27, 1991 from 5:00 p.m. til 10:00 p.m.

Arrangements have been made through the N.S.A.C. Day Care Centre located on College Road next to the Athletic Centre field. The Day Care Centre must abide by their rules for insurance purposes which state that a ratio of one adult to every 7 children must be followed. Therefore we must know prior to the day the number of children to be left in their care and so we are requesting a pre-registration and pre-payment.

Let's take a few moments to review the rules.

- 1. The Day Care Centre can house 33 children maximum between the ages of 18 months and 5 years. However, they will require minimum of 15 children in order to offer the service on the 27th.
- 2. The children will be provided with a nutritious supper and snack.

3. A program will be planned.

4. There are mats available for the children to sleep on, however, you will have to bring your own blanket and a change of clothes if desired.

5. Fee for the evening is \$18.00/child.

As you can see the Day Care Centre will provide a good babysitting service for your child. If you plan on attending the Alumni Weekend and would like to have your child/children placed in the Day Care for Saturday night then please preregister now. The deadline for pre-registration is July 15, 1991. If we have a minimum of 15 children then you will be asked to guarantee your spot by forwarding the \$18.00/child fee by July 24, 1991.

## Robinson is new head

Dr. L.E. Haley, Principal of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College, has announced the appointment of Dr. A. Robin Robinson as Head of the Department of Chemistry and Soil Science, effective July 1, 1991.

Dr. Robinson, a native of the Province of Quebec, received his undergraduate and graduate education at Macdonald College of McGill University from which he received his Ph.D. in 1975. He joined the Faculty of NSAC in 1975 as an Assistant Professor in what was then known as the Department of Chemistry.

He has provided leadership in his field of biochemistry, both as an effective teacher and productive researcher. He has actively supported interdepartmental research at NSAC which has resulted in his participation in numerous cooperative research projects. He has served on several faculty committees and has represented the College on the Atlantic Committee on Food, as well as on the Board of the Atlantic Institute of Biotechnology.

Two of his more notable research accomplishments have been the application of pregnancy diagnostic testing in dairy cattle, and the development of analytical procedures for use in identifying meats from various animal species.

Dr. Robinson will replace Professor Henry MacConnell who has been Department Head for the past ten years. In making this announcement Dr. Haley expressed appreciation to Professor MacConnell for his valuable leadership as a Department Head, and for his continuing assistance as Associate Professor in the Department of Chemistry and Soil Science.


