#### Uniform agreement made

Dal and adidas Canada strike up a 3 year deal

In a deal unlike any other in Canada, adidas Canada has agreed to suit up all Dalhousie varsity teams with uniforms, practice

for competition.

The deal, which amounts to nearly \$250,000, will be in effect for the next three years.

"[Dalhousie] is a good school with a good sports program," said John Kawaja, of

wear and sporting apparel needed adidas-Salomon Canada, Ltd. "For us, it is an opportunity to partner up with an organization that shares the same values as us. We think that having people wear our product would be a good thing."

The feeling among coaches and athletes is mostly positive, siting that without the burden of seeking corporate sponsors to outfit the teams, they can concentrate more on sports.

"Well, basically, it is an area of underfunding," said Jim Charters, Manager of Varsity Promotions at Dal. "With coaches looking for funding, it was more work on their plates. With this deal, they can go back to the gym, and [the Dal athletic department] doesn't have to take anything out of the budget."

The deal also involves Adidas distributing Dalhousie athletic gear and equipment to the Dal community. Gear can be purchased at the Athletic shop or at the Bookstore.

"The deal we have is similar to deals in the United States, like in Notre-Dame," said Charters. "The gear is also available to the public; Pharmacy [department] wanted shirts for their co-ed

Kawaja admitted that the Adidas-Dalhousie deal was worked out fairly easily. He also said that this is a 'win-win' situation, apparently, for both the Dal varsity teams and Adidas.

"We hope that, you know, when someone sees that we're sponsoring Dal sports, they'll pick our product next time they're at the shoe-wall at the nearest athletic store," Kawaja said.

manufacturers can outfit the variety of sports offered through Dal varsity athletics.

Adidas was already the official supplier to the Dal soccer and basketball teams.

"Sports marketing was founded on pro athletics," said Kawaja "But we are a supporter of grassroots sports. You don't have to be Vince Carter, or a member of the Toronto Raptors.'





#### Universities Hiring Fewer Profs

WINNIPEG (CUP)— A recent Statistics Canada study has revealed a decline in professors at Canada's universities. Universities across the country currently employ almost ten percent fewer full-time faculty than they did in 1992.

Assistant professors and other lower-ranking teaching staff were affected the most. The report indicates these positions have decreased by 20.5 percent since 1992. At the same time, part-time faculty increased by six percent. The report concludes that universities are relying more on part-time faculty to deliver their educational programs.

Mike McAd, the University of Manitoba's Vice President of administration, says cuts in federal government transfer payments in the early 1990s are to blame for the falling employment levels. He adds that less money from Ottawa has made it difficult for provinces to maintain funding levels to universities.

Peter Blunden, president of the University of Manitoba Faculty Association, says he is worried about the estimated 30,000 new faculty positions that Canada will need to fill over the next ten years. Blunden says that not enough PhDs are being produced to fill the anticipated vacancies.

"This will mean fremendous competition among universities in Canada and the U.S.," said Blunden. "Universities will have to work very hard to not only hire people, but to hang on to people they already have."

#### Tuition Doubled in Past Ten Years

OTTAWA (CUP) — The national average cost of undergraduate arts tuition this fall, at \$3,378, is more than double the cost just ten years ago, according to the same Stats Can study.

Despite tuition freezes in half of the provinces, fee increases in Ontario, Alberta, and Nova Scotia drove up the national average. The highest average increase was 7.5 percent in Nova Scotia, where students pay the highest undergraduate arts fees in the country, at \$4,408.

"The report confirms that the 1990s was the worst decade in Canadian history for tuition fee hikes," said Michael Conlon, National Chair of the Canadian Federation of Students

The report blames rising fees on the attempt by universities to offset reductions in education spending by Ottawa and the provinces. Tom Traves, President of Dalhousie University, says that the high tuition fees in his province are due to the lowest level of per-student government funding in the country.

Jim Turk, director of the Canadian Association of University Teachers, says many institutions have more than doubled ancillary fees for students in an attempt to make up for government funding.

"The only people that can afford to go to the medical school at the University of Toronto this year are children of doctors," said Turk. "This is not the kind of thing we like to see happening. This is bad news for students and bad news for equity in Canada."

#### Bookstore Strike at U of T Ends

TORONTO — Part-time workers at the University of Toronto's bookstore have reached an agreement with their employers, ending a strike that attracted the attention of Margaret Atwood and Noam Chomsky. Workers at the bookstore, owned by U of T Press, had been on strike since June

Approximately 100 professors backed the union, saying they would not conduct business with the store until an agreement had been reached. Workers also received more than 1,000 letter and

e-mails of support, including ones from Atwood, Chomsky and former CAW president Bob White.

In a deal ratified August 29, workers will be given a two per cent raise this year, and another two per cent next year. Currently, part-timers at the bookstore earn \$7.35 per hour. The union and management also reached agreement on issues of job security, seniority, and grievance procedures.

The deal will be up for re-negotiation in October of 2001.

#### Entrepreneurial students given sight into future

In conjunction with the University College of Cape Breton, is implementing its first year of a new program designed to offer students an entrepreneurial introduction and certificate while completing undergraduate degrees.

"At Dal, there are a lot of people that are passionate about their studies," said Ed Leach, program co-ordinator and instructor. "This gives these people who can actually make things happen an opportunity to get help and training in their goals."

The Entrepreneur Skills
Program (ESP) is offered to any
Dal student driven towards a goal
of venturing their own business.;
the people at Dal that want the
opportunity to take the initiative,
with guided help from the school.

The program has a cost of \$700 per year for students enrolled in the program. This fee includesthree meetings per term with the program co-ordinator to ensure that the student is getting sufficient assistance from the program in their entrepreneurial goals.

The ESP consists of a first year of two half credits, one or two years of courses that are tailor made for the students' business needs and a final year in which the business goals are all tied together in the program.

The program does not interfere with a student's degree; rather, it is a complimentary . program that can be taken from any degree, and is not exclusive to business students.

"It offers a service to students," said Leach. "Students get one-on-one teaching and help to make sure that they are getting the guidance they need."

Up to 20 scholarships are also available for the program for September 2000. These scholarships go towards the ESP fee included for students participating in the program, and will total approximately \$2,100.

In order to apply for the Entrepreneur Skills Program, students enrolled at either Dal or UCCB must submit a 450-500 word essay describing why this program

is a good idea for their study and future goals. A resume and completed application form must also be submitted.

One of the points emphasized in the application process is how the program is good for a student in a particular and precise way.

The ESP essentially gives students a practical and easily accessible way to complete their career goals while attending university. Leach says ESP is helping Dal and UCCB "change the learning system for the better," according to Leach.

The evidence is there.
Last year, under the name
Entrepreneurs by Design, the
program was tested with a group
of Dal students with positive
results. One of the students
enrolled in the program last year
is now owner and operator of the
Pizza Delight in the Bayers Lake

Industrial Park.

"[Pizza Delight owner/ operator] Craig Hubbard is a good example of the people that are going to be taking advantage of this program," said Leach. "[ESP is for] people who know early in their university careers what they want to do, and use [ESP] to make their goals happen."

The Entrepreneur Skills
Program has been in the works for
the last four years, says Leach,
and all the details won't be
worked out for another few
years, but the program is in full
swing this year, offering real and
valuable experience for anyone
who wants it.

Although only at Dal and UCCB right now, it is hoped that this program can expand across Canada, giving entrepreneurial opportunities to students with real aspirations in the self-owned business world.

## Native stance for unity Ontario Chippewas Support Burnt Church Mi'kmaq

Images of Department of Fisheries patrol boats, ramming and swamping the smaller Mi'kmaq fishermen's, boats sear the hearts of every Native person in Canada. We all feel great sympathy for the Native peoples of the East Coast in their struggle and we sit in support because we have experienced the same kind of hate ourselves.

For once it was shown for all to see on national TV.

In 1993, an Ontario court recognized the rights of the Chippewas of Nawash and the Chippewas of Saugeen on the Bruce Peninsula in Ontario to fish for trade and commerce. It took the Ontario and federal governments until this year to sign an agreement with us that recognizes our rights and admits us as equal partners in the management of the commercial fishery. In the seven years between the court decision and the agreement, our people suffered from such things as

cut nets, nets forcibly removed from the waters of Georgian Bay by government agents, boats damaged, and physical attacks.

As Francis Nadjiwon, a fisherman, said on a show aired by the CBC's 5th Estate, "It's racism. It's not just here; it's all over. No one wants to see us get a resource back."

Washington State. In both those states, as in Canada, landmark court decisions recognized Tribal rights to fish commercially. In the US, as in Canada, a victorious backlash boiled over (which continues to simmer). In the US, things finally quieted down when state and federal governments partnered with Tribes to manage fish and wildlife harvests. One big difference is, however, that

the US federal government supported the Tribes' bid for recognition of their rights and, later, their bid to be included in the management of the

fisheries.

How can we not be included? How else can we be assured we will enjoy our rights unless we have an equal say are in how they are managed? The federal government has said it recognizes self-government as a right protected by the Constitution.

Are we to preside only over our poverty? Are we not to help manage a resource that will restore our self-sufficiency?

The UN's draft charter on indigenous rights calls for selfgovernment and the sharing of management responsibilities.

So does the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples. And the Convention on Biological Diversity - an international agreement which Canada has signed and ratified — enjoins the signing countries to embrace the traditional knowledge that indigenous peoples possess and accept them as full partners in the management of natural resources.

The path for governments is clearly marked. All they have to do is walk it.

Last Wednesday's Sloan concert at the SUB lacked the energy necessary to pull off a live show effectively. In fact, the band lacked so much energy that they had to rely heavily on the audience's enthusiasm and paid

Throughout the night the audience drifted out continuously so that by the first encore less than half of the original crowd was left to see Singer/guitar player/ drummer Chris Murphy ham it up before launching into "Underwhelmed". Murphy managed to pose and preened his way through the night with all the campiness of a drag queen

'Good in Everyone" drew the biggest response of the night, and subsequently brought out the strongest signs of life from the band. It was only during those moments when Sloan played their most popular singles that the show verged on being memorable.

Opening act Mike O'Neill proved a good choice for crowd warmer with his friendly banter and pleasant stage persona. His dull pop set the stage for Sloan's dull pop, or as guitarist Jay

Ferguson describes it "It's almost like we're adult contemporary."

When O'Neill's backup band was given the opportunity, they proved themselves as a tight and rocking trio that threatened to overwhelm the singer/songwriter. Had they been allowed to let loose for forty-minutes the whole night might have proven salvageable, instead they backed up O'Neill quietly and effectively.

The front of the stage was barricaded and lined with friendly and talkative security on the one side while the other was lined with crushed teenage girls smacking gum, looking bored and occasionally singing along.

The four multi-talented members of Sloan traded off instruments for different songs... yada yada ...nothing that you haven't heard about or from them before. Which is maybe my biggest complaint. They didn't do anything you haven't seen already on Much Music. They didn't sound any differently than their records.

Sloan failed to offer anything worth twenty bucks and they offered little in the way of a spontaneous or even interesting live performance.

In the last year they have released their latest full length album (Between the Bridges); toured in the spring; appeared on Don Mckellar's critically acclaimed television series Twitch City; briefly toured Europe over the summer and started working on their next album. They are without a doubt hard working and have earned their success.

Success has for Sloan come and gone and come back, first with what Ferguson says was a fairy tale start, signing a record deal with DGC

'At that time it was their hay day, Nii vana and Sonic Youth and Teenage Fanclub and Hole had just been signed they were a cool big label," said Ferguson. "At that point we were like whoooeee we're successful, but there's been ups and downs."

One of the downs included the temporary break up in 1994 that came as a result of DGC's lack of support for their second album.

'DGC listened to our album and told us to record it all over. They didn't like it because it didn't sound like the same band," said Ferguson. After getting back together for One Chord to Another Ferguson said the band found success again.

"Really since we've been able to put our own records on our own label, Murderecords, that's when it felt really successful."

Perhaps the reason for Wednesday's lacklustre show is the fact that Sloan already defines themselves as being successful.

"We're home for about 4 days—which is enough time to do laundry," said Eggermont. After those 4 days Chixdiggit begins the second leg of their tour — in Europe.



What were you most impressed with?


The energy of the crowd,

#### The Violence-Strewn Way of the Gun

So proclaims Mr. Longbaugh (Benicio Del Toro) during one of the quieter moments of Way of the Gun, a new film directed and written by Chris McQuarrie, screenwriter of The Usual Suspects. While nowhere near as polished as the latter, Way of the Gun manages to carry its story off respectively with only a few minor snarls.

McQuarrie is working from familiar territory here; a crime movie where things are never

of brilliance. One great example of this is the interesting way they manage to discourage a pair of bodyguards from tailing their getaway vehicle.

The father-to-be, less than impressed with the kidnapping, happens to have all his money tied up with some extremely shady people. To this end he puts Joe Sarno (James Caan), a bagman, in charge of finding the two kidnappers and "adjudicating" them. This leads to several elaborate plots as people connected to the family or the money involved conspire to come

out on top of an increasingly complicated situation.

This is Way of the Gun's

exactly as they appear and there really isn't anybody who could qualify as a hero. The characters all seem slimy in their own way, and every time somebody turns their back you can almost hear the dagger sliding in.

Our main characters are Mr. Longbaugh and his associate, Mr. Parker (Ryan Phillipe): two small time crooks who are introduced to us in an opening sequence that is completely unrelated to anything that follows it, but is also howlingly funny. Laced with more profanity than many R-rated movies have in their entire running time, this opening will either shock people with its brutality or have them in stitches. This film is worth seeing cheap just for the beginning alone.

The plan of the two crooks is to make a lot of money, any way they can. While trying to earn some cash they overhear a story of a woman who is being paid a million dollars to have a couple's baby. A hastily cobbled together plan leads to the woman's kidnapping as they hold the unborn child for ransom from its parents.

Mr. Parker and Mr. Longbaugh are very hard to get a read on. Although both profess to not be the brightest criminals in the world they do have moments where they show flashes big problem. It's constantly seeking to be clever and filled with little plot twists. But when it all comes down to it, these twists mostly either don't happen or they are less impressive than one would think. The baby's actual mother, in particular, appears in several scenes as somebody who could have a crucial impact on things, but in the end she really has no apparent role.

The acting is decent, nothing spectacular, but competent. I will single out one person who does nothing for this picture, and that is Juliette Lewis, who plays Robin, the surrogate mother. She is flat and unconvincing in her role and seems phony throughout. Since her role is so pivotal to the film it drags down the rest of the proceedings around her.

Bottom Line: Juliette Lewis aside, this movie is interesting to watch. It may be a little too clever for its own good, and it sets itself up with a couple of plot elements that never pay off leading to a vaguely unsatisfying ending. In a way its semiconfusing nature sometimes works to its advantage since it certainly promotes conversation once the movie is over as people try to figure out the little details of the big picture.

# Electrik: Great Grooves But Too Pricey

The DSU put off its first big electronic music dance event on campus Saturday night.

Through the assistance of successful local promoters, Massive Productions, "Electrik" offered three quality DJ performances. Two of these were delivered by local talents, Funkdub and Zoo, and offered support to a two hour set from Humate, a respected progressive

trance producer on Superstition Records out of Germany.

Unfortunately, I arrived too late in the evening to catch either of Zoo's or Funkdub's sets (crowd feedback indicated quality performances from both DJs).

Within the dark, misty confines of the McInnes room, a spectacular event design had been constructed. Eight powerful intelligent lights were suspended in a cross formation above the dance floor, which blended

wonderfully with the sparkling effects of the argon laser mounted behind the DJ booth. A 15-foot computer projection screen contributed to the visual splendour of the event. Soft mood lighting behind the booth supplemented the mood for a dynamic, pounding groove environment.

Humate proved excellent musical flexibility, hammering home a tight mix of funkier tech-house blended with some rougher percussive techno. Late into the set, there were splendid excursions into progressive trance, combining sweeping synths, breathy female vocals, and heavier sequenced percussion elements. The offering was enjoyable for groovers of all tastes and styles.

**DSU Technical Services** should be commended for producing a fantastic multimedia system for this event. Mike

Mader and Aaron Peck assembled the most impressive light and sound combination witnessed at a Halifax electronic music event in the last year.

The audio was crisp and punchy - pounding, but not overwhelming. It was extremely easy for the crowd to start sweating on the dance floor. Security was friendly and tight, and DSU staff was very helpful throughout the evening.

Unfortunately, there were several factors that hindered the overall success of this event. The ticket price of \$20 for a four-hour event was outrageous; making "Electrik" the most expensive event per hour of entertainment of any ever conducted in Halifax. The promoters may have felt a \$20 admission may have been the norm for such events, but this price can only be justified for a minimum of eight hours of music. As a result, at the peak


hour of 12-1 am, the dance floor appeared full to only one third of its capacity.

The high-ticket price, combined with competition from other local events the same evening, may have contributed to the relatively low turnout (an estimate of 250 people in attendance). A larger turnout was made difficult by such combined factors as the onsite sale of alcoholic beverages (a traditional rave "no-no") and the early finish time for this event (1 am).

With creat music and excellent presentation, the DSU should continue to host quality

However, lessons should be learned from "Electrik": ticket prices should be kept competitive to other local electronic events, and abstinence from selling liquor should attract the numbers of well-behaved electronic dance music lovers.

# The Skinny Fad on Diets

Dieting and weight loss is perhaps one of the most prevalent issues in our society today.

There are so many so-called experts out there promising to make you thin and beautiful in record time with their latest trendy "miracle" diet. And there are far too many of these experts with fad diets in existence to describe them all. However, there are a few especially unhealthy categories of diets out there that

North Americans have latched on to over the years in desperate attempts to lose weight.

Dr. Andrew Weil, a Harvard Medical School graduate and Clinical Professor of Medicine at the University of Arizona is the author of eight books including Eating Well For Optimum Health: The Essential Guide to Food, Diet, and Nutrition. Weil has some insightful theories on eating for health and happiness that often contradict the dogma of these trendy fad diets.

The diet fad phase of the past fifteen to twenty years has been one which aims to minimize the fat intake of the diet. This means banning such foods as eggs, butter, milk, cheese, chocolate, and virtually everything that contains these items. But the problem is that fat has a lot of flavour and when added to our foods increases our enjoyment of them. This is one of the reasons that fad diets are not successful long-term. More importantly, according to Dr. Weil, certain fats such as Omega fatty acids, are essential building blocks in the human body. Moreover, Dr. Weil suggests that most North Americans are deficient in these essential fats, which should comprise approximately 30 percent of our daily caloric intake.

Now this doesn't mean you have to tabulate the calories of everything you eat, just approximate and be reasonable. Dr. Weil suggests salmon, avocados and nuts as excellent sources of "good fats". Instead of aiming to eliminate fat from your diet, which is totally unrealistic and unhealthy, Dr. Weil has an approach that focuses on eating not for weight loss, but for "optimum health". Weil suggests eating sweets, poultry and fish just a few times a week, adding soy products to your diet, using olive oil and avoiding other vegetable oils. He recommends only having wine, cheese, milk and yogurt in moderation. He even suggests a piece of high quality pure dark chocolate as a healthy snack! Part of Weil's philosophy on food is that less processed is best; which means stay away from highlyrefined, manufactured foods. For

instance, eat butter instead of margarine, and sugar instead of artificial sweeteners.

Another fad diet that has become exceptionally trendy over the past few years by promising weight loss through banishing carbohydrates from the diet, is the Atkins Low Carbohydrate Diet. This diet follows the principle that carbohydrates elevate blood glucose levels, which causes the body to produce insulin, a hormone which turns simple sugars into fat. The Atkins diet claims you can lose up to one pound per day by following its restrictions on carbohydrate intake. In this diet, you do not eat more than twenty grams of carbohydrates daily. Just to put this all into perspective for you, an average flour tortilla without fillings has twenty grams of carbohydrates — that would be your daily carbohydrate restriction right there. So no bread, pasta, rice, potatoes, soda or sweets since sugar is a carbohydrate, for the rest of the day. The Atkins diet also restricts certain types of vegetables and many fruits due to their sugar content. If you don't have a problem with those restrictions you might like the fact that you may eat whenever you are hungry and as much as you like - even though you can only eat pure proteins and fats.

Dr. Weil warns that lowcarbohydrate/high-protein diets may have long-term negative effects on the body as well as the mind, and a lot of weight loss from low-carbohydrate diets is actually due to water loss. Drinking plenty of clean water will produce the same effect by flushing out the water your body retains when it doesn't get enough water. Weil recommends that 50 to 60 percent of our daily caloric intake come from carbohydrates, and that most of these servir'gs should be in the form of vegetables, fruits, whole grains, and beans. He also offers a useful tip, suggesting that you can balance the carbohydrate impact on your blood-sugar levels by having lemon juice and vinegar with meals. In accordance with his "eating for health" approach, Weil adds that fruits

# The Brewery MarketA Community Treasure

Every Saturday morning, from 7 am to 1pm, Atlantic Canada's largest community market brings energy and life to the old stone walls of the Alexander Keith's brewery building on Lower Water Street. The "Brewery Market", as it is called by locals, brings farmers, craftspeople, artists, musicians, and vendors from all over the province to form what can only be regarded as a sacred treasure in the very heart of Halifax.

Before you even walk through the doors of the Brewery Market, you'll notice clusters of adults, children, babies, and even a few dogs, gathering as they do every week to meet and talk about what life has brought them during the past week.

Smiles are wide and laughter is high, as people anticipate the spirit of the market inside.

The City Deli is located just off of the crowded hallway leading toward the central atrium of the brewery. It serves as a breakfast venue for those who want to sit down to a homecooked meal, diner-style. and a jolt of java. Be prepared for a bit of a

wait though — the place is always jam-packed when the market is in full swing.

Craftspeople selling hand-carved mirror and picture frames, and metalsmiths making original jewelry on-site mark the entrance of the atrium. Once inside, you experience the full effect of the market — exhilarating to every sense. Explosions of colour from beautifully displayed fresh organic flowers, and fruits and vegetables tease your eyes. The fragrance of potted herbs mingle with the tempting smell of cinnamon from Mary's Bread Basket. Mary's famous cinnamon buns were voted as the best cinnamon buns in town by The Coast. The exotic aroma of Chinese food dances through the air from the stand set up by Cheelin's Restaurant, while further along the circuit of the market the mouthwatering smell of smoked meats and sausages is emitted from the Austrian Smokehaus and Sweet Williams. These are just two of several sources of local fresh meats found at the market, offering free samples of their products.

At several points throughout the market you'll hear different types of musicians varying from the classical sound of a string quartet in the main atrium to the simple folksy sound of acoustic guitar and vocals. You may even spot some people letting loose and kicking up their heels in a jig.

If you're conscious about healthy eating, the market is the perfect place to shop for food. Not only will you find all natural and organic fruits and vegetables, but several v. ndors offer free-range chicken, and unique foods such as ostrich meat from Killimanjaro Ostrich Products.

Tofu is available from Acadiana Soy Tofu, fresh seafood from Mike's Fish Shop, and low-fat chips from Kettle Kitchen Low Fat Food. For the cheese lovers, check out Buttercup Farm Cheeses and then try whole-grain loaves of bread from Mary's Bread Basket. Nova Scotia honey is popular, especially when it is from Cosman & Whidden Pure Honey. They also have Beeswax and Candles. Aside from the fact that food purchased from the market is fresh, usually organic, and/or homemade with care, it is also very inexpensive compared to organic and whole foods found in supermarkets.

The ar work and crafts, usually sold by the artists themselves, are another essential component of the treasure that is the Brewery Market. Jin Chen, famous for his watercolored scenes of Halifax, displays and sells his work each week at the market, dealing face to face with his customers.

Denise Uebele, of Denise Designs, makes and sells "one-of-akind creations bringing the past to light.

She salvages hats and transforms them into fancy and decorative lampshades that have their own personalities, and even their own names.

"The market is a great advertising tool" said Uebele. "You get to meet a variety of people from everywhere. It has a unique atmosphere."

There is a strong sense of community at the Brewery Market. This sensation hails from an age free of shopping malls and electronic media — when people knew the names of their butcher, grocer and local craftspeople. While purchasing the natural, whole, homemade foods and original artwork you get to know the people you're helping support. People take the time to talk, smile, and enjoy one another.


The Brewery Market is a truly interactive old-fashioned community that consists of people from all walks of life who gather once a week to enjoy the simplicity life has to offer.

and vegetables protect the body against disease such as cancer. Also brightly coloured fruits and vegetables, such as oranges, tomatoes, beets, carrots, and broccoli have anti-oxidants that help slow down the aging process. So what about our beloved breads and pasta? Dr. Weil warns against eating white flour — he believes it is "a major contributor to the epidemic of obesity". Instead, Weil advises that you eat firmer pasta and chewier, grainier breads. These are less refined and take longer to be broken down by stomach enzymes, therefore not elevating blood sugar levels quickly. If you have a passion for potatoes try eating small red potatoes and fewer white potatoes — they're less starchy.

Contrary to the Atkins diet, where most of your caloric intake comes from protein, Dr. Weil suggests that only 10 to 20 percent of our daily calories should come from proteins, and most of that should come from vegetable sources, not animal. Dr. Weil recommends soy products such as tofu, mushrooms, beans and nuts as excellent sources of vegetable protein. He suggests that most animal protein should come from fish, which also contains many essential fatty acids not found in other foods. Red meat should be eaten only a few times a month. Dr. Weil believes that eating a lot of animal proteins strengthening bones is a myth, and that highprotein diets may actually irritate the immune system. He also warns that high meat diets, as well as caffeine and butter, may affect body odor, so be careful.

Don't be so willing to follow the latest restrictive fad diet promising miracle weight loss. The results will probably be shortterm and may even be harmful to your health

The cornerstone of Weil's approach is moderation — that is, there are no enemy foods. Everything can be eaten in moderation. Weil also adds that everyone should experiment with what they like and what makes them feel good. Society is entirely consumed with dieting to lose weight, instead of eating to stay

Relax. Resist the hype. Eat the foods that will make you happy as well as healthy. Bon

# Kings environmental group and SYC gear up for the coming year

Andrew Angus, new head of the King's Environmental Group has begun an expanded recycling program across the campus, which will include recycling bins for glass and food containers, as well as fine paper waste.

A sorting system was implemented last Thursday on the first floors of two of King's men's residences, and a check on Sunday produced positive results.

"In Middle Bay [one of the residence houses] in the fine paper bin there was only fine paper, only newsprint in the newsprint bin and the correct garbage in the recycling bins. It was awesome," said Angus.

"Our focus this year will depend on the membership."

The group recruited 30 first year students as new members and will attempt to

run a recycling program that will generate money and eventually profits. In turn, these will pay for workshops to "improve education among, faculty, students, administration and staff" regarding effective habits of waste management. According to Angus, these workshops will hopefully be run in part by the Clean Nova Scotia group.

A third year Dal science class will address the difficulty of running an effective recycling program among university residents.

Amelia Clarke, head of Sierra Youth Coalition's (SYC) Sustainable Campus Project hopes that the SYC will be able to use their experiences and resources to help plan a waste management system for King's. Additionally, the SYC will continue with several projects started last year concerning the Dalhousie

environmental policy.

During a waste audit last year Clarke discovered that Dal's compost system was not as efficient as was possible.

"What we discovered in the end is that 43% of the waste stream at Dalhousie is compostable. There are only four centres for composting right now, and the reason they haven't added more is because of contamination. People put too much styrofoam and plastic in the wrong bins, not until we change what goes into the bins can we add more locations," said Clarke.

Throughout the year, the SYC will work with the Dalhousie Senate and Board of Directors to try to ratify an implementation of the environmental policy at Dalhousie. The policy has been in place for several years, but has never been audited. The SYC is running several ongoing projects

including a pilot program to replace cleaning products that contain toxins and carcinogens with safer alternatives around the campus, and attempts to persuade Dalhousie to use more recycled and post consumer waste paper in their photocopiers and printers.

Clarke and Angus will be heading to Victoria to participate in a training program for sustainable campus principles, with more than 30 other colleges and universities

Orton is only 18, but is already one of the best senior female athletes in kayaking in Canada. The Dal student recently placed eighth in the Canadian Sprint Canoe championships held in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia.

Orton, who can register as a junior in kayaking as well, was up against the best internationally-ranked female in kayaking in Canada in the Dartmouth competition. The competition included the entire team from the Canadian kayak K-4 team headed to the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia.

'[Eighth] was a pretty good result, although I was not overly pleased at the final," said Orton. "I am satisfied with what I did."

Orton has worked long and hard to get where she is today.

She has been paddling for over eight years, in both the kayaking and canoeing disciplines.

She specialized in kayaking because it is the only paddling discipline in international competition. Although inroads are being made to include female canoeing in major competition, presently there is no spot for females in canoeing. In order for Orton to be successful in paddling, she opted for kayaking.

Orton represents the future of paddling in Canada. She is already on her way to becoming a carded athlete, which means she'll receive funding from the Canadian

Orton's training consists of over 20 hours a week in the gym and on the water, depending on the time of year. In summer

months, her training schedule is more time-intensive.




