## Dalhousie History

THE SKINNY ON YOUR SCHOOL

Early in the 19th century, George Ramsay, the 9th Earl of Dalhousie, who was Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia at the time, wanted to establish a college that would be open to all, regardless of class or creed.

He fulfilled his dream by using the spoils of war: Castine, a small port in Maine, was being used during the War of 1812 as a base by American privateers who harassed shipping along the eastern seaboard. Lord Dalhousie sent a Royal Navy force from Halifax to capture Castine and turn it into a Customs port of entry. When the war ended, the Navy returned to Halifax with the money it had collected as Customs duties.

Lord Dalhousie invested 7,000 pounds as an endowment for the college and put aside 3,000 pounds for its construction. The earl,

whose home, Dalhousie Castle, was near Edinburgh, wanted the new college to be modeled on the university in the Scottish capital and to adhere to the principles of religious toleration.

After the college was founded in 1818, Lord Dalhousie was appointed Governor-General of Canada and left Halifax. Without his influence the college faltered, the subject of much religious argument and with a board of governors that showed little interest in its future. The first instruction was not offered until 1838 but the operation was only intermittent, and degrees were not awarded.

Nearly 50 years after its founding the college was reorganized and in 1863 opened with six professors and one tutor. The first degrees -

- three -- were awarded in 1866. The student

body in that year consisted of 28 students working for degrees, and 28 occasional stu-

The original site of the college was on Grand Parade, in downtown Halifax, where City Hall stands. In 1886, the university moved to the Forrest Building and spread gradually to the Studley campus.

In this century, and particularly in the last 40 years, Dalhousie grew steadily. As the number of buildings and programs increased, so too did the numbers of students and teaching and support staff; today, Dalhousie has more than 13,000 students, 1799 faculty and 1684 non-academic employees.





#### Eliza Ritchie Hall


Opened in 1987, Eliza Ritchie Hall provides traditional, co-ed accommodation for 92 students in three sections. Eliza Ritchie Hall is comprised of single and double rooms for both first year and senior undergraduate students. Located in front of the Dalplex Athletic Facility, students living here take their meals at either Shirreff Hall or Howe Hall.



Facilities in this three-storey building include study rooms, a multi-purpose room, computer room, reception area, laundry facilities and leisure lounges with kitchenettes.

#### Howe Hall

Centrally located on campus, Howe Hall provides accommodation for 731 students -- mostly undergraduate -- in six different sections called houses. Cameron House is for males only; Fountain, Henderson, Bronson, Smith and Studley Houses are all co-ed. Physically-challenged students should contact the Residence Life Manager for details regarding accessibility.



Both single and double rooms are available in moderate, low-key and quiet sections. Traditionally, single rooms are reserved for senior undergraduates, with double rooms for first-year students. Facilities include a main dining hall, lounges, television rooms, a computer lab, a canteen, a games room, squash courts, study areas and laundry rooms. Classes, sports facilities and libraries are minutes away.

#### Shirreff Hall

Shirreff Hall is the largest women's residence on Dalhousie's campus and provides accommodation for 451 female students in four wings - New Eddy, Old Eddy, Newcombe and the Annex. Both single and double rooms are available in moderate, low-key and quiet areas.

Shirreff Hall offers a dining room, a visitor lounge, library, tuck shop, laundry rooms, reception desk, study areas, television lounges, computer rooms and kitchenettes. 

#### **Gerard Hall**

Gerard Hall is a 12-story traditional style co-ed residence that houses 254 students. Individual floors are alternately male and female. Gerard offers single and double rooms and is located on Sexton Campus. The Sexton Campus is approximately a 15-minute walk from the Studley Campus, where most undergraduate classes are held. 





## Parking

**DUDE, WHERE'S MY CAR?** 

In the Halifax area, the meter caps are colour-coded according to the maximum time they allow parking your vehicle. In Dartmouth they are not presently colour-coded but will be in the near future.

The meters take any combination of  $5\phi$ ,  $10\phi$ ,  $25\phi$ , \$1.00 or \$2.00 coins (minimum  $25\phi$  for 15 minutes). Maximum available time for the meter is indicated on the face of the meter. Only deposit the required coins for the maximum time on the correct meter.

The meters are in operation -

a. Halifax Area - 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

b. Dartmouth Area - 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

All of the above times exclude weekends and holidays.

When "special events" occur in HRM, such as shooting of a film, fireworks, tree lighting, construction zones, etc, parking in these areas become restricted. These areas will be marked with temporary markings. These no parking zones are in effect for 24 hours a day. These areas are also tow away zones.

If the meter is malfunctioning please call 490-4000.

#### **Snow Removal**

In order to enable HRM work crews to plow and salt streets more efficiently and safely, it is the intention of the Traffic Authority to enact regulations prohibiting the overnight parking of vehicles from 1:00 a.m. to 7:00 a.m. on any streets within the Urban Core Area of the Halifax Regional Municipality during the coming winter months.

While the overnight winter parking ban will not be implemented prior to December 1st, the starting and ending



dates of the ban will be determined by prevailing weather conditions and will be widely communicated through the media well in advance of implementation.

Residents are reminded that Section 139 of the Motor Vehicle Act provides that parked vehicles obstructing snow removal or winter maintenance operations may be removed at the owner's cost regardless of time or date.

#### **Bus Stops**

Bus stops are for loading and unloading of passengers - if you park in the designated bus stops you will be ticketed and possibly towed.

When vehicles are parked in these areas, Metro Transit Operators are unable to unload/load their passengers safely, causing safety hazards for Transit passengers which include disabled, elderly, and children.

Loading zones are for loading and unloading goods in a designated area. You must be actively engaged in loading/unloading.

#### Parking Meter/On Street Parking - Alternatives

Sometimes parking meters or signs that display specific amounts of timed parking might not be of sufficient for you if have errands or appointments that might run longer than you expect. Within the Halifax Regional Municipality there are many private parking lots which offer hourly parking to the public. They appear to be more expensive than parking at a meter but, if you add the fine cost of a parking ticket and possibly having your car towed it would be cheaper to park in a private lot. In addition, a vehicle that parks over time a meter, without being removed can receive multiple tickets under the By-Law

#### Hazardous Parking AreasAvoid hazardous parking areas

- in or too close to crosswalks
- \* on sidewalks
- \* fire lanes
- \* within 5 metres of fire hydrant
  - blocking driveways
- within 10 metres of a stop sign
- less than 7.5 metres from a corner



#### Why do I need the DalCard?

Identification. ID cards must be presented to write an officially scheduled examination or to use the library facilities. In addition, some services such as the issuance of bursary or scholarship cheques, require the presenta-

Budgeting and Security. You are committing dollars to food, vending or bookstore purchases so you do not have to carry around cash.

tion of a valid Dalhousie ID.

Time. Lines move quicker when all you have to do is swipe a card. You also don't have to worry about receipts, usage charges (like Interac charges), etc. We can provide a full report of your transactions. Just drop by the University DalCard Office.

Convenience and Flexibility. You can choose the meal plan that best suits your needs! With dollars on your card you have dollars available when you need it.

#### How do I obtain a card?

Students - You may obtain your DalCard after you've registered for your classes at the DalCard Office (1443 Seymour Street) and during peak times a temporary location is set up to accommodate increased demand. Tentative locations will be posted early in the Summer. Sexton campus students may obtain their DalCard at the Sexton campus Student Services Office, B Building, 1360 Barrington Street.

University Staff and Faculty - . A Staff/Faculty DalCard can only be issued if your employment has been processed through Human Resources. The Staff/Faculty DalCard is valid for five years.

Dalplex Users - persons who have already received a DalCard can use the same card at Dalplex. Students automatically receive access to Dalplex facilities. Staff are required to pay a fee to use the Dalplex facilities. Those members of the General Public who wish to use the Dalplex facilities should go to Dalplex and pay their fee. At that time they will get a Dalplex Community Member card.

#### Is there a charge for the card?

Your first DalCard is free. If it is lost, stolen or damaged there will be a \$15.00 replacement

#### How can I use the card?

Debit Card: The DalCard is accepted at all Food Service and vending locations, the University Bookstores (in the SUB and Health Science), and the Academic Computer Labs in the LSC, Libraries, Weldon Law and the School of Business on the Studley and Carleton campuses. (The DalCard is not useable for purchases on the Sexton campus yet.)

#### Where can I use my card?

Dalplex: All Students and any Staff Members or General Public who have paid a fee to Dalplex can use their cards to access those facilities.

Library Access: All Students and Staff Members can use their card to access Library Facilities. Most library databases are licensed to be only accessible to Dalhousie University Students and Staff Members. For more information on library access (See the Library Connection Web Page)

Discounts: Many businesses give discounts to University students. For example, Halifax Transit gives you a discounted student rate on monthly transit passes if you produce a Dalhousie University Student card.







## Glossary

#### REPO KEMPT EDITOR

The University was kind enough to offer a glossary of commonly used terms that may be unfamiliar to new students. We have modified the list in order to better reflect the reality of student life (and because everyone has gone home for the summer and the three of us stuck around to put this puppy together in two straight days - so we are too tired to come up with anything original). Here it is:

Academic Programme: A distinct group of classes and other requirements that lead to eligibility for a degree or other university-awarded credential.

#### Academic sessions:

- Regular session: September April
- Fall term: September December
- Winter term: January April
- Summer term: May August

Advanced standing: Students possessing advanced knowledge of a subject will be encouraged to begin their studies in that subject at a level appropriate to their knowledge, as determined by the department / school / college concerned. Credit: A unit by which University class work is measured. A full year class is normally worth one credit.


