HENRY A. MESS.—A member of the Executive of the Conference on "Christian Politics, Economics and Citizenship" which met this year at Birmingham, England. Served on two Commissions of this Conference, and thus writes with intimate knowledge of a most important Christian movement in public affairs.

H. S. CAREY.—Of Pembroke College, Oxford. Lecturer in History for the Workers' Educational Association, Ottawa. Author of various articles on social and economic topics, and of a novel, *De Beauvoir the Masterful*, a tale of Elizabethan times.

JOHN EDWARD ANNAND MACLEOD.—A lawyer, head of the firm of Macleod, Robertson, Smith & Co., Calgary, Alberta.

STEPHEN GWYNN.—A distinguished Irish man of letters, author of many volumes descriptive and critical. M. P. for Galway City, 1906-1918. Served in the Great War (Captain, Connaught Rangers). Awarded the Legion of Honour.

NORRIS HODGINS.—Essayist and contributor to many magazines. Instructor in the Department of English, Macdonald College. Editor of *The Journal of Agriculture* for the Province of Quebec. Served in the Royal Air Force, 1918.

OLUF TANDBERG.—Minister of the Universalist Church, Halifax. A Norwegian by birth, who has contributed largely to journals in the United States, and has made special study of the Norse languages and literatures.

VICTOR PERRIN SEARY.—Of Yarmouth, Nova Scotia. Mr. Perrin was awarded the Overseas League Essay Prize for 1924, offered for competition by the Halifax Branch of the League. The winning essay is here published.
