

see, that science must begin with the conscious processes of the individual. The observations made by Watson upon his rats are mental processes and are not identical with those made by other onlookers. They resemble those of others, or, at least we assume that they do, and so the "objectivity" of scientific observation and the theories based thereon is obtained.

6. Watson has probably discounted the complexity of the native equipment of the infant, and he has certainly discounted the complexity of such psychological processes as reasoning, memory, imagination, emotion.²

Man's life is not to be fully understood by reference to the purely physiological movements which occur within his body. Behaviorism has accomplished much good, but Watson's theory taken by itself does not point the way to a satisfactory psychology.
