CHARLOTTE WHITTON, for many years a prominent figure in social work, has been better known to Canadians, since 1952, as Mayor of Ottawa.

HUGH MacLENNAN, of Montreal, is a well-known teacher, essayist, novelist, and critic. A former Rhodes Scholar, he has studied at Dalhousie, Oxford, and Princeton, and, at the annual spring convocation of Dalhousie in May received the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. Dr. MacLennan has the unique distinction of four Governor-General's medals, two each for fiction and for creative non-fiction.

C. B. FERGUSSON, of Halifax, is Assistant Archivist on the staff of the Public Archives of Nova Scotia and has written on many occasions for *The Review*.

GEORGE P. V. L. O. CHITTICK, of Seattle, Washington, is well known in the literary field and is recognized as an authority on the works of Thomas Chandler Haliburton.

CYRIL CLEMENS, of Kirkwood Missouri, is President of the International Mark Twain Society and has been a frequent contributor to *The Review*.

ALEX. S. MOWAT, of Halifax, is Professor of Education at Dalhousie University and a frequent contributor to scholarly journals.
