It was in the latter spirit that the Society's thirty-seventh annual conference convened in Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, May 26-29, 2010. The conference theme, *Traditions of Ingenuity*, acknowledged both the creativity that has enabled Lunenburg to evolve and grow over two hundred and fifty years, and the deep historical roots of this UNESCO World Heritage Site.
