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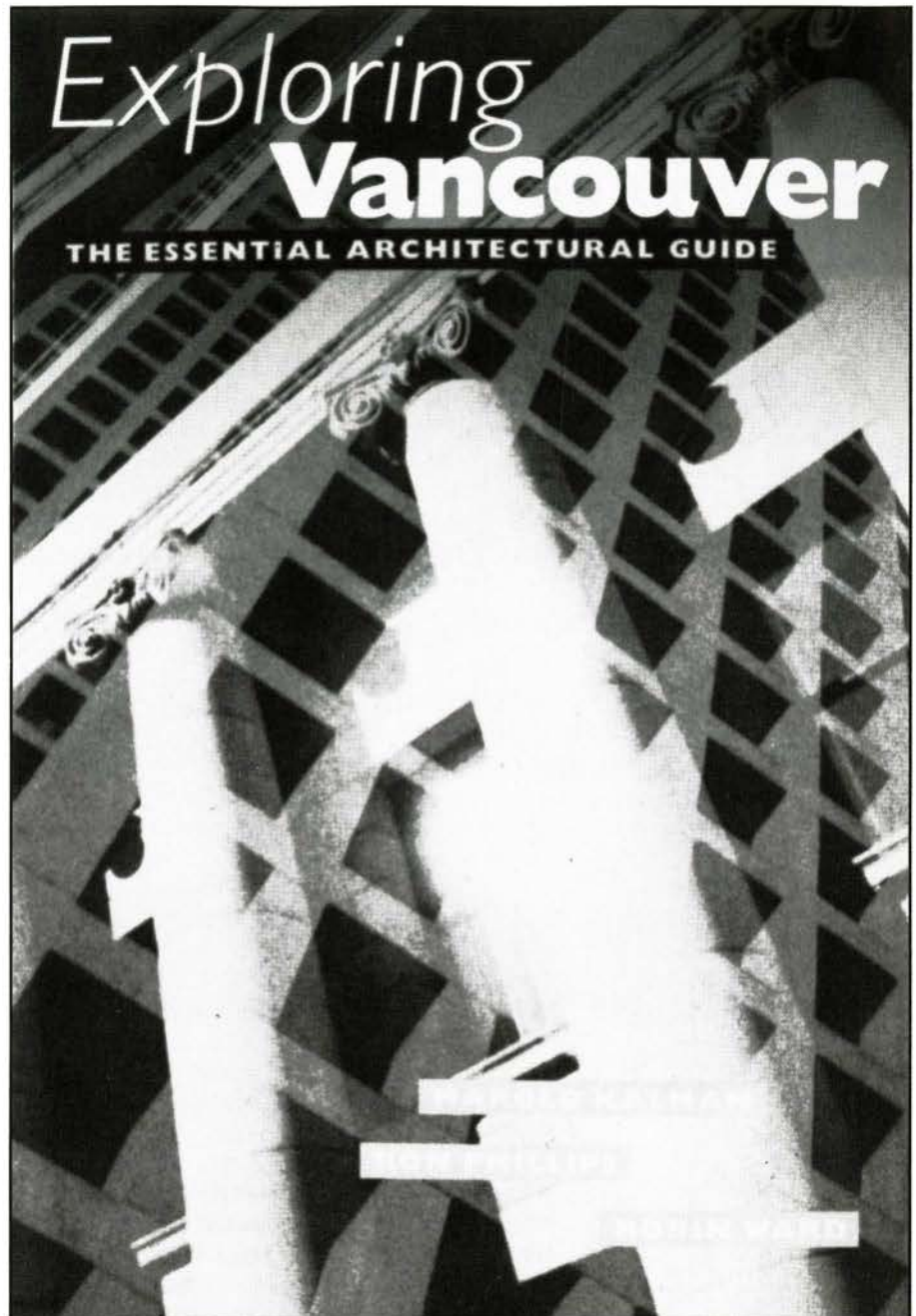

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NATIONAL HISTORIC SITES SYSTEMS PLAN REVIEW, 1992-94

The National Historic Sites Directorate of the Canadian Parks Service (CPS) is now undertaking the first full review of its Systems Plan for national historic sites since the original plan was prepared in 1981. The Systems Plan is a general guide to the systematic establishment of new national historic sites by CPS. It is intended to assist the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada and the CPS program in identifying potential sites and research priorities for future initiatives.

Canada's national historic sites are places which represent many of the major aspects or themes of Canadian history. There are at this time about 750 national historic sites in Canada. Of these, 114 are currently administered by the Parks Service. The others are in the hands of other agencies, institutions or private individuals. In addition, the Parks Service has erected an additional 350 plaques to the national significance of particular persons or events in Canadian history.

To date, under Canada's Green Plan, the Parks Service has already established a number of themes in Canadian history as priorities for the Plan review. They include the themes of Public Works; Mining; Energy Development; Large- and Small-Scale Commerce; Manufacturing; Canada and the World; Agriculture; and Engineering and Architectural Achievements. Other major aspects of Canadian history which so far have been identified as priorities include the History of Women, Aboriginal Peoples, and Minorities in Canada.

The task force charged with developing proposals for the Plan review is attempting to consult widely with interested constituencies over the course of this exercise. For example, the CPS is convening national workshops with specialists and representatives of Canadian women and Aboriginal groups to identify potential ways of improving the commemoration of both groups. As well, CPS is endeavouring to consult with a range of heritage agencies and professional associations with a stake in the establishment of national historic sites over the next decade and beyond.

RESEARCH BEGINS ON 1967 CENTENNIAL PROJECTS IN ONTARIO

In 1967, in celebration of Canada's Centennial, programs were initiated at federal, provincial, and local levels to commemorate this landmark national anniversary through the construction of public buildings, parks, monuments, and infrastructure. While they constitute the most enduring public representations of Canada's Centennial spirit, no comprehensive documentation of these projects exists.

Research is under way to catalogue the publicly funded Centennial projects located in communities throughout Ontario. These commemorative projects include theatres, libraries, hockey arenas, college campuses, gardens, free-standing monuments, and bridges built, altered or added to during the late 1960s.

Funded in part by a grant from the Ontario Arts Council Design Arts Program, the research is the private initiative of two independent researchers, Marco Polo and Joni Carroll. Both are graduates of schools of architecture and both have a keen scholarly interest in 20th century architecture. Carroll and Polo began their work in January 1993, and hope to conclude their study within twelve months. They plan to prepare a computerized database register and to publish their findings as a catalogue of Centennial Architectural Projects in Ontario. For further information, please contact:

ABBOT LOWELL CUMMINGS AWARD, 1992

The Vernacular Architecture Forum, an international organization of folklife and architectural scholars, awarded its Abbot Lowell Cummings Award for 1992 to Prof. Betsy Cromley for her book on early apartment buildings, *Alone Together*, and to long-time SSAC member Prof. Gerald Pocius for his book, *A Place to Belong: Community Order and Everyday Space in Calvert, Newfoundland*.

The Abbot Lowell Cummings Award, named after the founding president of the Forum, is awarded annually to recognize outstanding scholarly work in the field of vernacular studies in North America. Jerry's "fascinating and sophisticated treatment" of the social perception and use of space in a three-hundred-year-old Newfoundland fishing village beat out a dozen competitors to win the award.
