Banned Books of the Past

ince ancient times books have been the subject of censorship. Usually these books were condemned to be burnt, in order to destroy them and the ideas they contained completely. While books are not often burnt today, we do remove them from school and library shelves or refuse to carry them in bookstores.

At some points in time so many books were banned or burnt it would be impossible to fit all of them into this whole issue, let alone just two pages. So, this brief historical outline will highlight some better known books that have been censored, banned or burned and why this happened.

	900 BCE to 500 CE	Ancient Greece and Rome : Books that criticize or go against the religion, morals or politics of the time are publicly burnt
	300 CE	The rise of Christianity: Books that depict the Gods of the Greek and Roman people are banned and burnt
	640 CE	The library of Alexandria's collection of 200,000 volumes is burnt under the orders of Caliph Omar who captured the city.
	1100-1700	Books against current rulers, religions, and political decisions are burnt.
		Fiction books were not generally written during this time period, so most banned and burned books are what we would consider non-fiction today.
	1525	English versions of The Bible are burned by the English Church because they believe The Bible should be available only in Latin
	1559	The Index Librorum Prohibitorum is first created. This is a list of books that Catholics are told not to read.
	1640	Books on the subject of divorce are burned
	1726	Gulliver's travels by Jonathan Swift was denounced as "obscene and wicked" because it satirized the political scene of England at the time
	1788	Shakespeare's <i>King Lear</i> is banned from performance because of his depiction of royalty

1800 Adam Bede by George Eliot is removed from the shelves in many circulating libraries because it is considered "lewd"

George Eliot was actually the pseudonym for a woman writer, which may be another reason this book was banned.

- 1800 Tess D'Ubervilles by was banned from circulating libraries because the main character gives birth to a child without being married
- **1830** Copies of *The Book of Mormon* are banned and destroyed in the U.S.
- 1850 The U.S. and Russia ban *The Scarlet Letter* by Nathaniel Hawthorne because it depicts "bad morals"
- The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn by Mark Twain is banned in the U.S. It continues to be one of the most challenged books even today because of racial issues.
- 1915 Many of D.H. Lawrence's books were banned. Lady Chatterly's Lover is still unavailable in many countries today as it considered sexually explicit.
- 1933 A nation-wide book burning occurred in Nazi Germany on May 10, 1933. Most books were by Jewish authors
- **1955** *Lolita* by Vladimir Nabokov is seized by customs at British points of entry.
- **1960** *Dr. Doolittle* is cleaned of racial references which are used by a parrot in the story

The trial of Penguin Books on the grounds of publishing an obscene book, the aforementioned *Lady Chatterly's Lover*, occurs in England.

- 1978 Gone with the Wind and Silas Marner are challenged in California high schools
- The Diary of Anne Frank is challenged because it is "a real downer" and contains some sexuality.
